Expansion Plans in the Works for Blue Monarch.

Blue Monarch, a long-term residential and therapeutic treatment community for women and their children, is planning a large addition to their Hillsboro campus upon their 20th anniversary. Founder and President Susan Brinkley received approval for a two-story 9,853.48-square-foot building that will allow the center to better serve families in the community. Brinkley said they have seen a dramatic increase in child trauma in recent years and have developed a program to meet specific needs. The plans include a large event hall, a chapel, and rooms for classes. Blue Monarch has over 200 families on their waiting list in addition to those currently in the program, and Brinkley said this new space will help more people in the community. Chris Rounds shares his love of flying through historic aircraft, The Red Knight

By Kali Bradford Photography by Ashleigh Newnes A LITTLE BOY squinted at the Texas sun, using his tiny hand to shield its powerful rays and give him a better chance of seeing the magic that was about to take place. His sneakers dug into the red dirt, grounding him while his heart raced with excitement. He loved coming to this dirt runway with his dad and watching the larger-than-life metal birds take flight. Each aircraft was full of history and stories of victory. As the WWII-era aircraft accelerated down the dirt runway, it was soon airborne and climbing into the sky. The little boy smiled from ear to ear, knowing that he, too, would fly one day.

For local resident and licensed pilot Chris Rounds, flying has been a lifelong love and dream. Since childhood, flying has symbolized both freedom and accomplishment for Rounds, leading him to travel the country and the world, sharing his love of aviation with the masses. It has also enabled the flying of such treasured and famous planes as The Red Knight, which has a unique history.

Rounds said his love of flying came from his father. His trips to the airfield with his father to watch WWII-era planes take off and land were the foundation that led to a lifelong love of flying.

"Older planes have always intrigued me since I was a young kid," he said. "It was always fun to fly up there and see all of the old warbirds and walk across the strip and have lunch. These planes are a symbol of our heritage, our history, and the freedom that we enjoy. Those Saturday's flying around with my dad instilled a passion for aviation and airplanes of all sorts."

After gaining his pilot's license at an early age, Rounds said he enjoyed showing his friends his love of flying by taking them up in the air with him.

"My first flight as a licensed pilot was in 1978 after I got my private pilot's license from Evelyn Brian Johnson in Morristown, who was an aviation legend," he said. "After I got my certificate, I was the only one in my area with a pilot's certificate at that age. I took a lot of friends flying."

THE RED KNIGHT

The Red Knight was a Canadian air force aerobatic display aircraft that operated from 1958 to 1969. The red-painted Silver Star performed loops, rolls, Cuban 8s, horizontal 360s, inverted flight, and high-speed passes at air shows around North America.

"The Red Knight is an airplane that I really enjoy flying," explained Rounds. "Its design is so unique. It was designed and built right after WWII at the very beginning of the jet age. I will say that out of all the airplanes that I have flown, it is one of my favorites. It's just in a league of its own, and it's one of the best flying ones I've ever seen designed. It was designed in 1946 and built in 1956 and was very much ahead of its time."

Rounds added that he enjoys showcasing the historical aircraft in air shows and other aviation events across the globe.

"The overall purpose for the plane is to take it to different air shows and events around the country so people can enjoy seeing a piece of history, not only up close and personal but to see it fly," he explained. "My mission is to help share my passion with aviation and to let people know that it is always a dream of mine to fly something like this and to let them know how dreams do come true."

THE SKY'S THE LIMIT

While traveling to air shows and events is important, Rounds hopes to reach a whole new generation and audience through social media. Through social platforms like Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube, he hopes to share his love of flying and teach others the necessity of aviation.

"I hope people understand what an important role they play in our society for our freedoms and advancements in technology," he said. "Flying is also one of the best challenges people could take on, and it can be one of the most enjoyable things they can experience. I hope they come away with the feeling that the sky's the limit with their goals in life. We live in the best country in the world, and that did not come without hard work and ambition. As far as social media goes, it would be nice to say that here's a normal, everyday guy doing something he loves to do and wants to share his passion." **GN**

Growing into a tradition

Starting with just a small group, the gathering has reached around 50 people making it an annual tradition that now brings together more than just family to eat, fellowship, and enjoy a hayride around the backroads of Tullahoma.

"We invite friends and co-workers," added Chris. "Our children also have friends they like to invite over. We enjoy the fellowship that comes along with it. We are able to catch up with those we haven't seen in a little bit and meet those who might be attending for the first time."

Jacqueline said there had been as many as 90 people attending.

"The year of COVID, we actually had our largest turnout of about 90 people," she said. "We thought that would be the year no one would come. But I think because everybody had been inside and contained for so long, they were ready to be out and with friends and family." With a large number of people attending, Jacqueline said planning is crucial. She starts a list of food and necessities as early as May and works diligently to schedule a date when everyone can come. Chris said the event would not be what it is without Jacquline's expert coordination and dedication.

"Her job is harder than mine," he said. "I get to do more of the fun side of things. She does a great job planning everything, ensuring everyone is invited, and the food is prepared. She is the backbone of the whole operation."

While tedious and stressful at times, Jacquline said the event truly is a labor of love.

"It's just great to see everyone come together," she said. "Both sides of our family, friends, and co-workers all come together to fellowship and to be thankful for all God has blessed us with. It wouldn't be possible without Him. It's truly amazing to have all these people who make up our lives come together."

Chris added that one of the highlights of hosting the event has been the excitement of the children who attend each year.

"That's probably the part that I hold the closest to my heart is the kids," he said. "Especially with agriculture, a passion I've had all my life. I grew up in town, but my grandparents had a farm, and I loved to visit them and ride on the tractor with my uncle or do something to help one of the neighbors. I spent my summers there and made a lot of great memories. And now, when the kids come out, and we see their eyes light up at the [sight of the] tractor, I feel they get the same feeling I did at their age. They have a good time. They enjoy themselves, which probably makes me the happiest about it."

ALL IS an exciting time around these parts. Its arrival brings a sense of warmth, comfort, and joy, with many things to look forward to during the season. High school and college football are gearing up. Fans don their lucky hats and shirts, excited to participate in the ritual of Friday Night Lights.

There is also a much-welcomed coolness to the air that signals one of Mother Nature's biggest shows of the year with the changing of the leaves. Red, orange, and yellow leaves create picturesque landscapes around every corner.

Another exciting aspect of the fall season is Halloween. Folks are making plans for creativity with costumes and decorating their houses accordingly. They also have a few haunted places to check out with friends and family.

Fall is also a great time to explore the great outdoors. The season creates a breathtaking backdrop for a scenic hike or bike ride. Camping during this time of the year is also an experience, with cooler temperatures and fewer crowds.



But one of the best things about the fall season is the annual visit to the pumpkin patch. It is the quintessential fall activity that is fun for all ages. For the last 18 years, Grandaddy's Farm has offered families a chance to get into the spirit of the harvest season while creating lifelong memories with friends and family.

Since 1951, Grandaddy's Farm has been a familyowned business run by the Dixon family. The farming tradition has been passed down from generation to generation, starting with Charles Dixon and his wife working tirelessly on the land while raising their four children. Despite working full time at a hardware store in Decherd, Charles never gave up on his passion for farming.

Years later, the farm is a family operation with Charles's grandson, Steve, and wife, Karen, along with their two sons, Andrew and Philip Dixon, following proudly in his footsteps. Andrew and Philip say they are proud fourth-generation farmers who work side by side with their dad daily. The family farm has over 2,000 acres in Franklin and Moore Counties, with a significant portion of the acreage being rented property.

"We have a wholesale straw operation and raise several cattle as well," said farm co-owner Andrew Dixon. "We also grow soybeans, corn, and wheat. Diverting our farm operation has allowed us to handle more households living off the farm."

While the farm has been a working farm for 65 years for the Dixon family, 18 years ago, the family decided to open it to the public.

Andrew explained that "going into agritourism was another way to keep the farm viable for the future."

"It goes back to when we were kids and working on the farm," added Andrew. "The cornstalk bundles we sold wholesale to fruit stands and farmers markets. That was the way my siblings and I made money. When I was about to graduate, Dad began to look at how we could stay on the farm if we wanted to. Someone had given us the idea to make it a place where folks could visit, and we just put the idea into motion."

Because it was his great-grandfather's farm, Andrew said they knew they had to name it after him.



"This is my great-grandfather's farm. He died four years before we opened. We always called it Granddaddy's Farm, so the name just stuck with it," he said.

Today, the farm offers hayrides, a corn maze, slides of all shapes and sizes, games, pig races, a u-pick pumpkin patch, an apple orchard, and more.

Andrew said that over the years, the farm has added new attractions to encourage visitors of all ages to enjoy the fun on the farm.

"Each year, the farm has built on itself, and we just keep adding more and more," he said. "We try to add things that allow parents to play with their kids. They (parents) are paying customers, and we want them to have a great time and as much fun as the kids are having. We listen to our employees and customers to continue improving the farm."

Their mission is to share the joy of farming, agriculture, and agritourism with their community. The Dixon brothers are passionate about preserving their family's legacy and making lasting memories for visitors to the farm. Their love of agriculture and dedication to their craft makes it easy to carry on the tradition started by Charles over 70 years ago. "I'm excited for my son. He'll be 2 this fall, and I am excited for him to be able to play and enjoy the farm himself," said Andrew. "We love to see everyone enjoying it. My dad has always joked that he enjoys seeing the kids crying when they leave because he knows they're having a good time."

The farm is open from mid-September through October and is located at 454 Highland Ridge Rd. in Estill Springs. Plan your visit at grandaddysfarm.com. **GN**

Seeing the fruits, or in this case, blooms of Graf's labor at his business, Buzzed Blooms, might lead one to believe that he was born with a green thumb on one hand and a shovel in the other. However, Graf's love of plants grew in childhood but bloomed as an adult.

"Both my parents worked," he explained. "We had a small farm with a few cows, but that was it. We grew vegetables and other things because we were lower income, and that's just part of how we fed our family. From a very young age, I got really into plants. I enjoyed being out in the garden."

All grown up, Graf became caught up in the rat race of the marketing world. Tired of the grind, he began to think back to his childhood and love of gardening. Graf then saw an opportunity to gain some peace and extra cash.

"I've worked in marketing since graduating college," he explained. "Ultimately, I needed some relief from marketing. I had this great idea to grow sugar beets. Most sugar in America comes from beets. My idea was to create some kind of small batch artisanal sugar growing sugar beets."

Graf laughs now, remembering the terrible idea of growing such a plant. However, there was a silver lining.

"I killed all of the beets," he said. "I couldn't even get one beet to grow. But I had planted the garden with flowers such as Dahlias, tubers, and Zinnias, which took off."

Graf said the flowers did so well that his mother had asked to purchase some from him.

"Of course, I said no," he laughed. "What kind of son would I be if I made my mom pay for flowers? However, that led me to learn more about the flower industry. I started digging, and I thought maybe I could do this. So I went out and bought 1,000 tulip bulbs."

Graf went through what he lovingly refers to as a learning curve.

"I killed so many plants," he said. "The whole plan was to plant twice as many as you think you killed, and something will survive. And little by little, it took shape."

THE PLOT TWIST

While making real progress as a plant farmer, Graf had to undergo abdominal surgery. That surgery would leave him with permanent nerve damage, ultimately changing the trajectory of his business.

"It was a routine surgery, and it did not go well," he explained. "Because of the nerve damage I sustained from the surgery, I've had to relearn my entire business from the ground up. While I have been fortunate to have a great team [of employees] on the farm, it's difficult to teach them all that goes into [fresh] cut flowers without actually having your body be able to do it or demonstrate it."

While Graf has continued to grow flowers for wholesale purposes, he is now focusing on educating folks about the magic of growing things.

"I educate and teach using the skills I have built up. And that is slowly becoming my new line of business," he explained.

The education portion of Graf's work has found a home on social media platforms such as Instagram and TikTok. Starting with just a few thousand followers, Graf now shares his love of plants with over 65,000 followers on Instagram and 20,000 on TikTok.

He gives tips, tricks, and advice, all with a hefty dose of enthusiasm and love.

Graf said the journey has had its ups and downs, but he looks at this new chapter as a way to continue to grow and share his story with others.

"I'm getting to share my story with others," he said. "Sometimes things aren't all sunny in the garden. People living with chronic pain and disabilities can benefit from and enjoy gardening. I try to help and motivate people to go out there and do what they can; it doesn't have to be perfect."

He added that he also hopes to inspire people that the world of growing things is endless.

"People want to grow things for their community," he said. "They want to build up their local community but feel like they can't because they don't have 100 acres. I show them what they can do in a small footprint."

For the future, Graf plans to do just as his plants do: continue to fight the elements and bloom no matter what.

"I could have shut it down completely, he said. "But I took the time to rework the business for my health, and there's absolutely no shame in that. I'm proud of realizing that and just moving through regardless."

Initially, Linda's leap into offering pickup services at her bookstore was driven by her desire for convenience. Little did she know that her spontaneous decision would blossom into a flourishing platform benefiting farmers and customers. "Customers don't know about these little farmers. So it's exposing the small farmers to the customers, so they know what's available out there," she explained.

Through their unwavering commitment to quality, sustainability, and supporting local farmers, the market has become a place where food, connection, and shared values intertwine to create an atmosphere akin to our grandmother's garden and the childhood farm our parents grew up on.

"They're serving the community and bringing something to the community that you could probably find at Walmart, but it's a better quality, and it's fresher because everything on our market is produced within 30 miles of Manchester. We can offer delivery within Coffee County if needed," Reed said.

"It's convenient. It's fresh. It's varied. We have a lot more varied offerings than anybody would imagine."

1/4 t. salt
dash of nutmeg
1 cinnamon stick, 3 inches
2 qts. apple cider
8-10 orange wedges

In a saucepan, combine brown sugar, allspice, cloves, salt, nutmeg, cinnamon sticks, and cider. Bring to a boil. Remove all spices. In a large serving bowl, pour cider over orange wedges. Serve in mugs and place an orange wedge in each one for garnish.
