Treasurer Beck announces auction of unclaimed property

AUGUSTA, (September 8, 2023) --Maine Treasurer Henry Beck announced today that his office, which manages Maine's unclaimed property program, will begin sending thousands of tangible items for auction that may belong to you or your heirs. These items include coins, jewelry and other collectibles of value, excluding military medals or military decorations.

Each year, the Maine Office of the State Treasurer (OST) receives contents of safe deposit boxes considered abandoned by Maine's banks and credit unions. Called "safekeeping," the safe deposit boxes are presumed abandoned when the property and proceeds remain unclaimed by the owner for more than three years after the

rental period on the box or other depository. By law, the contents of these safe deposit boxes become the care of the State of Maine. where they are held while the office searches for the owner(s).

The Treasurer's Office utilizes many avenues of owner outreach. Telethons, direct mail, town hall outreach, press releases and partnership with the state elected officials are examples of the various methods used. Currently, the most effective tool is the State Treasurer's searchable database at www. maineunclaimedproperty. gov where individuals can search their name and file a claim online.

When the amount of tangible unclaimed property exceeds the space to

expiration of the lease or house it, the Treasurer's office conducts an auction. The office has not conducted a formal auction in nearly twenty years, and therefore is exceeding physical space limits to store property. Property from these safe deposit boxes dates as far back as 1993 and as recent as 2018, and will become part of an ongoing online auction if the Treasurer's Office is unable to find owners/heirs. Note that by law and practice, we never auction military medals or military decora-

if the owners or their heirs are not located," he said.

About safekeeping: Safe deposit box contents must be reported to the state where the contents are

Information on the contents of boxes located in Maine must be reported by November 1 of each year.

The contents of safekeeping are to be delivered to the Office of the State Treasurer no later than June 1 of each year. Once Auctioned, the cash value received from the sale will be available for the owner to claim.

About the auction company: The Office of the State Treasurer went out to bid for an auction company to provide auction services over the next five years. The winning bidder was Lone Star Auctioneers out of San Antonio, Texas. Lone Star has been providing online auction services to unclaimed property programs across the country.

About Unclaimed Property: Unclaimed property consists of money and other financial assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time of inactivity. It includes items such as bank accounts, uncashed checks, life insurance policies, unpaid wages, stocks and dividends, refunds, and safe deposit box contents. Unclaimed Property does not include real estate, animals or ve-

Each and every year, tens of millions of dollars go unclaimed by Maine residents. These financial assets are turned over by thousands of national and local businesses and organizations by a law called MRSA Title 33, Chapter 45: Maine Revised Unclaimed Property Act. http://legislature.maine.gov/statutes/33/ title33ch45sec0.html.

The Treasurer's office holds these assets, free of charge, until claimed by the owner or heir. The State is currently holding over \$310,000,000 in unclaimed property. In the month of June, 2,114 claims were made against unclaimed property totaling \$2,940,533.08 in payments to Maine people. The highest single claim paid in the month of June was for \$161,409 (from a bank account). In June of last year, 2,646 claims were paid totaling \$2,171,671.11.

growth \$350K to support Maine small business expor

WASHINGTON DC (September 8, 2023) - Today, Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman, head of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) and the voice in President Biden's Cabinet for America's 33 million small businesses, announced \$20 million in grants awarded to 49 state and territory international trade agencies across the country as part of the SBA's State Trade Expansion Program

Locally, Maine International Trade Center (MITC) was awarded \$350,000 of that pool to help provide small businesses with the information and tools they need to succeed in export-related activities. Exporting activities include participating in foreign trade missions, market sales trips, designing international marketing campaigns, participating in export trade show exhibits, and attending training

workshops, as well as other important means of engagement. "For over ten years,

the SBA's State Trade Expansion Program has been an important federal and state partnership to get funding directly to small businesses seeking to grow their businesses and our economy with international trade opportunities. And with these funds, small businesses can get tradeready, attend trade shows in foreign markets, and grow through global e-commerce," said Administrator Guzman. "The Biden-Harris Administration remains committed to leveling the playing field for entrepreneurs and ensuring American small businesses can promote their products and services to over 95% of the world's consumers who live abroad."

Since its creation in 2010 as part of The Small Business Jobs Act, the STEP program has award-

ed \$235.5 million in grants and directly supported over 13.000 small businesses' international expansion and export growth. As states improve their exporting skills, the return on investment keeps improving- last year, every \$1 in STEP funding yielded \$43 in export sales.

Here in Maine, since 2020, over 60 small businesses have received financial assistance to support their international exporting goals, resulting in \$6.9 million in actual sales and an additional \$76.3 million in the next 12-18 months. These figures represent a 13:1 immediate return on investment and a projected 143:1 future return on grant funds.

"STEP's profound impact stands as a testament to the SBA's unwavering support of U.S. small businesses seeking to grow their international footprint," said Acting Associate Administrator for

International Trade Claire Ehmann. "As STEP matures beyond its first decade, the SBA will continue modernizing and marketing this signature program that helps small businesses enter and expand into the international marketplace."

"The funding that Maine International Trade Center (MITC) receives from SBA through the STEP program is a vital component of the assistance we offer to small Maine companies that are ready to enter or expand international markets," President Wade MITC "Global Merritt said. competitiveness requires a company to make significant investments in market analysis and entry methods. In some cases, the financial assistance provided through this program can be the difference between taking that next step for international business growth or passing on an opportunity."

Midcoast Symphony Orchestra announces 34th season

(August 18, 2023) —The Midcoast Symphony Orchestra (MSO), conducted by Rohan Smith, returns to the stage for its 34th concert season with performances in Topsham and Lewiston from October 2023 to May of 2024. This year's concert series features a diverse mixture of both canons from the classical musical repertoire by such composers as Beethoven, Mozart, and Shostakovich, as well as many contemporary works including pieces by Latin composers Ginastera, Moncayo, and Piazzolla as well as well known African American composers William Grant Still and the up and coming Jessie Montgomery. The MSO is celebrating Music Director Rohan Smith's 20th year as conductor by revisiting some old favorites as well as tackling Debussy's great masterpiece "La Mer" for the first time. Other highlights include songs by Aaron Copland, symphonic dances from West Side Story, and the extremely complex "Enigma Variations," by Edward Elgar, which will be conducted by guest artist Emily Isaacson. Complete concert and ticket information is available at midcoastsymphony.org. Season tickets for the four classical concerts are now available for \$75. Individual tickets are \$25 in advance and \$30 at the door. All concert tickets are free for students ages 18 and under, or for college students with ID. Audiences are encouraged to purchase tickets in advance online or by calling the box office at (207) 481-0790.

The upcoming MSO season represents a milestone for Music Director Rohan Smith who will be conducting the orchestra for the 20th season. Over the years, Smith has led the MSO to critical acclaim in performances of the major symphonic repertoire of all eras to the present. When reflecting on his longevity, Smith commented, "Sometimes you have relationships that really work when the conductor and orchestra grow together and that is what we have here. The conductor learns from the orchestra, and the orchestra learns from the conductor. Both grow together and discover things together." One of the main aspects of the MSO's volunteer musicians that continues to impress Smith is "the players [motivation] to play because of their intense desire...to perform and study orchestral music from many different time periods, cultures and genres.". He is excited by the inclusion in the 2023/24 season of a diverse selection of material that mixes challenging material from both the old school composers of Europe and America along with some of the newer voices who are just beginning to receive the prominence they deserve. According to Mr. Smith. "The professionals knew about these wonderful composers, but they just didn't really get the exposure they deserved, and that has just widened the musical experience for all of us, it has broadened it all out which is a really wonderful thing. So I am really glad to see that Midcoast is consciously programming diverse voices from the present and the past, which is great." Rohan Smith is Director of Orchestral and Chamber Music at Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire, where he conducts the Symphony Orchestra and the Chamber Orchestra. As an orchestral violinist in New York, Smith performed regularly with the American Symphony Orchestra, the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, the American Composers Orchestra, the New Orchestra of Westchester, and on Broadway.

The MSO's upcoming season also features a mixture of professional guest artists in keeping with the MSO's tradition of featuring the best artists in the region to accompany the midcoast's best known community orchestra. The guest artist for the October concerts is pianist Anatasia Antonacos, who will be joining the MSO for

Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 3. Antonacos is the founding director of 240 Strings, the Artistic Director of Fox Islands Concerts, and a faculty member at the University of Southern Maine. Baritone Philip Lima will be bringing to life many of the songs in the MSO's second concert that features song and dance music from around the world. Lima has appeared as soloist with the Boston Pops and over 70 orchestras, choral societies, and concert series across the United States and in Korea and Ukraine, and he is the Assistant Chair of Berklee College of Music's Voice Department. Appearing as the guest conductor for the third concert of the season is Emily Isaacson, the founder and artistic director of Classical Uprising. Isaacson stated that she "looks forward to making music with the great musicians of the Midcoast Symphony Orchestra and working with them to bring incredible performances to our Maine audience." One of only a handful of female conductors in the country, Isaacson was named the 2018 Maine Artist of the Year by the Maine Arts Commission, one of 50 Mainers Leading the State by Maine Magazine, and the 2022 winner of the American Prize.

The first MSO concert of the 2023/24 season is titled "Soulful Expressions" and will take place over the weekend of October 28 and 29, 2023. The concert features three pieces, including the wellknown Symphony No 5 by Shostakovich. The concert begins with "Aspiration" from William Grant Still's Symphony No. 1. Still was the most immediately successful African American classical composer in the first half of the twentieth century and is considered by many to be the dean of African American composers. The second piece features Anastasia Antonacos in Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 3, one of the beloved composers most popular works in that genre. The concert concludes with a performance of Shostakovich's landmark symphony which was composed as a reflection on criticism to artistic work by Soviet authorities. According to Smith, the symphony hits the listeners "like a coded message of endurance of suffering in a country under invasion" one that is "exceptionally appropriate to be played in the midst of this horrible war in Ukraine." The 45-minute masterpiece promises to wrap listeners in a complex tapestry of emotions as it unfolds.

The MSO's second concert, "Song and Dance Music from Around the World," is presented on January 20 and 21, 2024,, and is suitable for family audiences with its mixture of popular medlies and a "Meet the Instruments" event before the formal portion of the concert. This popular event allows children of all ages the chance to experiment with the various instruments played by symphony members to engage their curiosity about the genre. The program begins with three dance pieces by composers from Argentina and Mexico that will feature Latin rhythms familiar to many audience members. These will be followed by several old American songs by Aaron Copland that originate in hymn tunes and folksongs. A polka by Johann Strauss, Jr. and three songs from "The Boy's Magic Horn," by Gustav Mahler, set the stage for the well-known music from West Side Story, composed by Leonard Bernstien. Music Director Smith is looking forward to the "wonderful juxtaposition of music that is pretty new from the Americas, and music that is tried and true from the old world." Audience members of all ages are sure to enjoy this

The Midcoast Symphony Orchestra is thrilled to welcome guest conductor Emily Isaacson for the third concert in the series "A New Artistic Mélange" offered on March 23 and 24, 2024. The evening begins with the extremely contemporary "Hymn for Everyone" which Jessie Montgomery wrote in 2022 as a partial response to the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. The next piece, Mozart's Symphony No. 38, is another audience favorite that features strong and varied wind and brass parts. The final work in this concert is "Enigma Variations," composed by Edward Elgar as a series of sketches about his friends, which Music Director Smith terms an virtuosic "exceptionally piece" that audience members are sure to find appeal-The 2023/24 concert

series ends the weekend of May 18 and 19, 2024, with an evening titled ""Cityscape, Seascape, Soundscape" consisting of three pieces, beginning with Copland's "Quiet City" which will feature symphony soloist Tim Kenlan on trumpet and Billie Jo Brito on English Horn. That work is followed by "La Mer," the middle of Claude Debussy's three great orchestral trilogies. The final piece, Beethoven's Symphony No 7, is a piece the MSO has performed before, and one that most audience members have heard before, but as Smith states, "Any of the great Beethoven symphonies are pieces you go back to again and again to revisit and relearn and rediscover, and these masterpieces never fail to be revealing." The public is invited to read more about all of the compositions that are part of the 2023/24 MSO season on the company's website at www.midcoastsymphony.org.

Seniors Not Acting Their Age To Islesboro and Back

A paddling trip to Islesboro begins with a three-mile open water crossing of West Penobscot Bay. During a prior outing, I was part of a group that encountered gusty winds and rough seas when we returned from the island. So planning a cruise there entails careful analysis of the weather in advance, particularly winds.

After watching the weather for several days, I identified an early August day with light winds predicted throughout. Warm temperatures and sunny skies made the forecast particularly appealing. I had a glowing forecast but still needed to recruit some paddling companions. An email announcement with my outdoor club, Penobscot

Two of the prospective participants, Bud Gilbert and Allan Fuller, proposed paddling a tandem canoe. I had never been involved in an ocean trip where a canoe was used to navigate to distant islands. However, given the favorable forecast and their strong canoeing skills, it seemed like a reasonable plan. After all, in prehistoric times Native Americans frequently canoed to the islands in birch bark canoes. And, the present day canoeists would have the support of two sea kayakers, Mark Nelson and me.

Winds were almost non-existent when the four of us met at Lincolnville Beach next to the

on a warm, sunny morning. Launching from the sandy beach was very convenient. We were pleased to note conditions appeared calm in the bay. The ferry was loading as we departed.

The crossing was completed without complications. The ferry passed as we approached Warren Island, the closest island in the Islesboro archipelago. The large vessel left a succession of sizeable swells in its wake. Our canoeing companions easily navigated the rolling waves in their 17-foot Old Town Tripper.

Warren Island State Park is an exceptional place to visit. The 70-acre island is just a short distance from Islesboro. Access to the park is exclusively by boat and it contains twelve campsites. A hiking trail follows along much of the shoreline and meanders around the island.

Sandy, the friendly, helpful Park Manager, greeted us when we went ashore. She provided advice on available facilities and encouraged a walk on the hiking trail. The park is extremely clean and well-maintained.

We gathered at a picnic table near the landing, changed into hiking shoes, and began the trek. The scenic walk was an excellent opportunity to stretch our legs. We enjoyed a leisurely pace while completing the one-mile hike. The views of the Camden Hills from the west side of the island were outstanding.

Following a lunch break at the shoreline picnic table, we departed southeasterly in the shallow channel between Spruce and Warren Islands. Turning east at the southern end of Spruce, we entered an exceptionally placid Gilkey Harbor. A large dark vessel moored next to the Islesboro shore captured our attention.

After traversing the harbor, we conducted a close up inspection of the mysterious watercraft. Its unusual name, Contraband, was even more intriguing. A little research indicates the 28.65 meter motor yacht was built by New England Boatworks and is the second largest vessel produced by that firm. No explanation was uncovered for the curious name.

Leaving Contraband behind, we began our return voyage to Lincolnville Beach. Rounding the northern end of Spruce Island, we passed the Islesboro Ferry Landing adjacent to Grindle Point Light on our right and progressed into West Penobscot Bay.

The calm we experienced in Gilkey Harbor was supplanted by moderately bumpy conditions in the bay. A strong tidal current and increased wind velocity from the west generated choppy broadside waves. wake from the passing ferry created substantial turbulence forcing us to temporarily negotiate through large colliding breakers.

Situated low in the water in our kayaks, breaking waves splashed over Mark and me on several occasions. The canoeists took some water over the gunnels but overall they handled the challenging conditions in an exemplary fashion. Following arrival at Lincolnville Beach, Mark re-

ported his GPS measured the length of our journey to be ten miles.

VA to resume reimbursing Maine veterans' homes

WASHINGTON, D.C. (September 8, 2023) Following calls from Maine's Congressional Delegation to reform policy, U.S. Senators Angus King, a member of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee, and Susan Collins and U.S. Representatives Chellie Pingree and Jared Golden announced that the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) proposed new regulations that would reimburse Maine Veterans' Homes (MVH) for the costs of nursing home care for veterans with dementia. The VA's proposed rule would expands the current eligibility for domiciliary care to include veterans suffering with dementia. The rule would also retroactively reimburse MVH for costs associated to domiciliary care dating back to January 2021 when the delegation's initial law was passed.

In 2020, Congress passed legislation authorizing the VA to cover the costs of nursing home care for veterans with early stage dementia provided by state veterans' homes, but the VA delayed proposal of the required rulemaking by more than two years. This delay forced MVH, and in some cases veterans and their families, to pay out-ofpocket for the care costing approximately \$130,000 per month and over \$2.5 million since 2019.

"For decades, Maine Veterans' Homes has provided world-class care to our state's veterans. They've worked hard to meet America's commitment to those who served despite rising costs," said Senators King and Collins and Representatives Pingree and Golden. "This new ruling will ensure the federal government supports our veterans with all of the resources at our disposal so that older Maine veterans struggling to live independently can receive the care and support they earned on behalf of a grateful nation. We hope the VA will move to quickly finalize the new rule to prioritize Maine veterans and meet our nation's solemn promise to the brave men and women who answered the call of service."

"This is an important advancement for Maine's seniors and the right thing to do. Maine Veterans' Homes is extremely grateful to Senator King and the Maine delegation, and the Veterans Administration for supporting necessary rulemaking changin domiciliary care stipends," said Sharon Fusco, the CEO of Maine Veterans' Homes. "These changes will ensure that Maine's seniors are able to receive the residential care they need in Assisted Living settings, paid for with the benefits they are due. In spite of years of uncertainty surrounding reimbursement, MVH has continued to ensure that residential care options were available for our Veterans, sheltering them from "falling through the cracks" due to funding gaps. We sincerely appreciate this change and the support that made it possible."

Domiciliary care was

established by the VA after the Civil War as a type of assisted living that is provided to older veterans who are independently mobile or semi-mobile but are incapable of living alone. Over 130 MVH residents receive domiciliary care, 80% of whom are on Medicaid.

The care was federally reimbursed for years, up until 2019, when the VA abruptly ended payments. The Veterans Health Care and Benefits Improvement Act, signed into law on January 5, 2021, authorized the VA to resume reimbursements for domiciliary care at state homes like MVH. Twenty-eight months later, the VA had yet to announce a proposal for the payments.

Created by the Maine

Legislature in 1977, Maine Veterans' Homes is an independent, nonprofit organization that provides services to Maine veterans at six homes in Maine: Augusta, Bangor, Caribou, Machias, Scarborough and South Paris. Their care includes rehabilitative care, domiciliary care, nursing care, and end of life care.

The Maine Congressional delegation has pushed the VA to reimburse Maine Veterans' Homes for the last several years. In May, the delegation introduced the Reimburse Veterans for Domiciliary Care Act, which would require the Department to begin payments for current care as mandated by law and retroactively provide MVH with the reimbursements for past care.

\$1.2M for Maine Maternal Health Task Force

WASHINGTON,
D.C. (September 8, 2023)

– Today, U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King announced that the Maine Department of Health and Human Services will receive \$1,170,233 through the Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) State Maternal Health Innovation (MHI) program. The goal of the State Maternal Health Innovation Program is to expand on and improve re-

sources for maternal health in Maine and the United States.

The State MHI program awards provide funding for five years, supporting the establishment of a maternal health task force in Maine. This continuation award will allow for the improved collection and use of state-level data on maternal mortality and severe maternal morbidity. Additionally, grantees will work to improve access to

services during pregnancy, which includes expanding direct clinical care availability and workforce training.

"Ensuring the well-being of expectant mothers and promoting maternal health is extremely important for the well-being of Maine people in their child-bearing years," said Senators Collins and King. "This investment is a significant and necessary step towards addressing an area

where our country lags behind the rest of the developed world, and will significantly bolster Maine's efforts to provide comprehensive care and support for mothers. We are grateful for this funding, and appreciate the continued dedication of the Maine Department of Health and Human Services to supporting the health of our state's children and families."


Senators Collins and

King have long supported efforts to strengthen families and improve maternal health care. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, Senator Collins helped to secure a \$26 million increase in funding for State Maternal Health Innovation Grants and a \$87 million increase for the Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Program in the Fiscal Year 2023 Senators King and Collins also cosponsored

the Rural Maternal and Obstetric Modernization of Services (Rural MOMS) Act, a bipartisan bill that would improve data collection, expand services, and award funding to help ensure that new and expecting moms living in rural communities get the care they need. The United States has the worst rate of maternal deaths in the developed world and one of the highest rates of infant mortality.





Highest civilian honor presented to Maine WWII volunteer



BANGOR, (**September 8, 2023**) – The family of the late 2nd Lieutenant Oscar E. Shevenell, CAP, was presented with a Congressional Gold Medal at the Maine Wing Civil Air Patrol annual conference and banquet on Sept. 2.

Shevenell, of Portland, served as an observer and supply officer at Base 19, CAP Coastal Patrol from Aug. 1942 until Aug. 1943. Following his service in Civil Air Patrol, Shevenell enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1944 and served at the Treasure Island Supply Depot in San Francisco.

The World War II

Members of the Civil Air Patrol were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal on May 30, 2014 in recognition of the "unpaid volunteer members of the Civil Air Patrol [who] during World War II provided extraordinary humanitarian, combat, and national services during a critical time of need for the Nation," via Public Law 113-108. "This extraordinary national service set the stage for the post-war CAP to become a valuable nonprofit, public service organization chartered by Congress and designated the Auxiliary of the United States Air Force that provides essential emergency, operation, and public services to communities, States, the Federal Government, and the mili-

In direct response to German submarine activity along the East Coast in early 1942, Civil Air Patrol established 21 coastal patrol bases, including two in Maine - Base 19 in Portland and Base 20 in Bar Harbor.

From March 1942 through August 1943, these bases patrolled the waters off of the Atlantic and Gulf coasts from Maine to the Mexican border with armed aircraft, thwarting submarine attacks and safeguarding shipping lanes, under the authority of the U.S. Army Air Corps.

These missions were flown at members' own personal expense. Cumulatively the patrols spotted 173 U-boats and attacked 57. They escorted more than 5,600 convoys, reported 17 floating mines, 36 bodies, 91 ships in distress and 363 survivors in the water. Civil Air Patrol volunteers continued to serve throughout the entirety of WWII. "It is with great pride that we present this Congressional Gold Medal honoring the legacy and service of Lieutenant Oscar Shevenell and all of the men and women of Civil Air Patrol during WWII," said Maine Wing Commander Colonel Blain Cote, CAP. "2nd Lt. Shevenell's selfless dedication to his dangerous work as an aerial observer is a testament to his courage and patriotism and it is my privilege to join with our national and region commanders to honor him on behalf of Civil Air Patrol and our grateful nation."

Civil Air Patrol National Commander Major General Edward D. Phelka, Northeast Region Commander Colonel Everett Hume, and Cote presented



the medal to Shevenell's children, Joe Shevenell and Julie Barker, daughter-inlaw Kate Shevenell, sonin-law Richard Barker, and niece Tonya Shevenell.

Alongside the medal, the family was presented with challenge coins from Phelka, Hume, and Cote. A chance meeting of Joe and Kate Shevenell and Lt. Col. Robert W. Frost, CAP, North Carolina Wing, led to the identification of Shevenell as a Maine WWII CAP volunteer while sharing flying sto-

After their meeting, the Shevenell family provided Frost with the information they had available. Though the supplied photos were not enough to verify his service, past National Historian Col. Frank Blazich, CAP, researched Coastal Base 19 and was

able to confirm Shevenell's service and eligibility for the medal.

The Congressional Gold Medal is the highest civilian honor in the United States, alongside the Presidential Medal of Freedom. Since the award's inception in 1776, 185 Congressional Gold Medals have been awarded to individuals and institutions in national appreciation for distinguished achievements and contributions.

In addition to this honor, Maine Wing presented annual honors for 2021 and 2020 as well as Commander Commendation awards. The conference also included a day of training for the members of Maine Wing in the three mission areas of Civil Air Patrol: emergency services, aerospace education, and cadet programs.




