## Governor signs senator Cortese's bill to streamline CEQA; speed up housing production

Governor Gavin Newsom signed legislation by Senator Dave Cortese intended to speed up housing across California. SB 406 will eliminate certain types of repetitive reviews under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) while maintaining California's strong environmental protections.
The Governor also signed Senator Cortese's SB 642 to help protect the public from pollution and deter unfair business practices.
"Our state and regional housing crisis is complicated, but we continue to work together to find ways to ramp up housing production, particularly affordable housing for people in need," said Cortese. "SB 406 will speed up housing by cutting bureaucratic red tape while keeping environmental protections intact."
SB 642 is sponsored by the County of Santa Clara, the California State Association of Counties, and Rural County Representatives of California with support from California Environmental Voters, the Center on Race, and Poverty \& the Environment.
Senator Dave Cortese represents Senate District 15, which encompasses much of Santa Clara County in the heart of Silicon Valley.

Last November, the San Jose Police Department issued dover 700 citations to people who chose to put their own lives and the lives of their neighbors on the line for the sake of likes, clicks and shares.
This was the largest "sideshow" bust to date in our city - and though our officers are working day in and day out to shut down these events, we need the entire community to get involved to stop them. This includes the largest companies who call Silicon Valley home.
These dangerous and illegal events that have literally taken lives are fueled by social media. They are increasingly spread, consumed, and attended primarily for the purpose of generating content to get likes and build a social media following.
And we want to work with the companies whose platforms sideshow participants are using, to find a solution for the good of our entire city. I have sent a letter asking these companies to come to the table and talk through solutions.
Research shows that sideshow posts can attract hundreds of peo-

ple in a matter of minutes. We are asking social media platforms to work in tandem with our police department to suspend the accounts of people who post content promoting these events for 30 days the first time they do it-and indefinitely if they continue to use the platform to promote dangerous, criminal activities like sideshows.

## Days of The CESSWI - Reign of 'Octember'

 Qualified Stormwater Manager Qualified Water Efficient LandscaperWelcome to the soon-coming rains of September and October. Welcome to all they entail. Welcome to the peace and the solace they will bring. Welcome to The Reign of Octember.
One may be inclined to ask: "What does this mean for Almaden Valley?" To this, I retort: "The rains will come. The rains will cleanse all in their path. The rains will rejuvenate that which has gone dormant and still for so very long.
In earlier column entries I have alluded to my affiliation with Stormwater and the discipline of CESSWI. CESSWI is a Certified Erosion, Sedimentation, and Stormwater Inspector. The rains will bring wrath upon dried lands.
The compacted soils of the valleys of Santa Clara County will be rejuvenated by the coming rains; the rains of September and the rains of October. This aggregate will be known as The Reign of Octember.

Clay soils are slow to absorb rainwater. This precious water moves across the compacted soil in sheet flow, carrying with it the constituents and the contaminants of landscape chemicals and metal residues. We must take heed.
The valleys of Santa ClaraCounty, and especially Almaden Valley, are ripe with chemicals that have long been used in the landscapes and terrains of these valleys. Turf lawn fertilizers are no exception.

The coming rains will merge with landscape chemicals and wash them across our soils and into our storm inlets if we are not careful. This rainwater must be captured and harvested on-site at the very first opportunity. We must act.

Detention and retention basins and swales must be built now before the rains come to us. There are precautions that must be taken and creating these basins and swales is a good start; in our gardens and our landscapes.
In the course of studying Green Infrastructure, I have found blueprints and schematics illustrating how we might go about this. Commercial properties and educational institutions are already employing these techniques.
The Reign of Octember requires each and all to prepare for the coming rains of September and October and be ready to capture and harvest this precious rainwater and

stormwater that will hydrate our gardens and landscapes.
Autumn is the ideal and optimal time to plant shrubs and trees. We have many options. I have opted for valley natives. I live in Santa Clara Valley. Almaden Valley has hills and sheet flow will be a challenge. We must take heed.
The country club and the golf courses of Almaden Valley are rich and ripe with herbicides, fertilizers, insecticides, rodenticides, and other chemicals. These will merge with rainwater and stormwater and move across the soils and to the drain inlets if we do not
manage and mitigate.
Make preparations now. Prepare your basins and swales. Create the ideal and optimal conditions to detain and retain rainwater and stormwater. The time is now. Soon come the rains. Soon come The Reign of Octember.

## State kids score among worst for math, language

Gov. Gavin Newsom and other political figures like to brag about California's role as a national or even international leader in all things wonderful.

Theytend, however, to gloss over or ignore indications that California is falling short in some very important indices of societal achievement, such as public education.
When measured against other states, much less other nations, California's nearly 6 million public school students rank among the lowest in national education testing for mathematics and language skills.
The latest round of National Assessment of Educational Progress test results, released last fall, revealed that California's fourth-and eighth-graders were once again in the bottom tier of states in reading and math.
Moreover, California's unusually long school closures during the COVID-19 pandemic reduced achievement even more, as a recent report from the Public Policy Institute of California revealed.
Before the pandemic, 51\% of students met standards in English language arts, or ELA, and it had dropped to $47 \%$. In mathematics, proficiency declined from $40 \%$ to $33 \%$.
"Only $35 \%$ of low-income students met state standards in ELA and 21\% were proficient in math," PPIC reported, "compared to $65 \%$ of higher-income students in ELA and $51 \%$ in math."
Also, PPIC noted, the nationwide tests of reading and math proficiency "shows that California has consistently lagged behind most other states ... 38th in math and 33rd in reading."
We may not need more evidence that Californians lack competence in basic skills, but
last week we got another data dose from the Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies, a global program of testing supported by the U.S. Department of Education.
A new analysis of its data reveals that in "numeracy" - the ability of adults to use mathematics in daily lives - California ranks near the bottom of states, virtually identical to Georgia and other states in the second lowest tier. Within California, just one of its 58 counties - Marin - scored in the highest tier.
The numeracy report was issued just a few weeks after the state Board of Education adopted a new framework for math instruction that advocates claim will increase the computational acumen of California students by making it more culturally relevant.
Board member Gabriela Orozco-Gonzalez, an elementary school teacher in Montebello, said, "The framework's focus on fundamental concepts, open-ended tasks, justice, student inquiry, reasoning and justification aligns with effective mathematics teaching practices. I am encouraged by the incorporation of strategies to support diverse learners, such as promoting multilingualism, facilitating group work, employing visual aids, and establishing cultural connections."
Tom Loveless, a former senior fellow at the Brookings Institution who wrote a book on the Common Core standards, was one of many critics during a three-hour hearing prior to adoption, saying the framework sends a "message that math facts can be treated lightly."
The climactic board meeting reflected years of often bitter debate, dubbed the "math wars," over how best to raise math skills, not unlike a similar conflict over language skills dubbed the "reading wars."
Traditionalist supporters of phonics emerged triumphant in the battle over reading but traditionalists lost on math. Ultimately, the board made a few tweaks aimed at placating critics but left the original concept of downplaying rote skills and early introduction to algebra largely intact. Too many of our students and adults are
"innumerate" - the mathematical equivalent of illiterate - and that has vast societal impacts, from lessening Californians' ability to manage personal finances to depriving the economy of workers with crit-

## ical skills.

We'll see if California's new woke math curriculum improves its standing, or drives us even lower.
