Kids Not Coming Home for the Holidays? Here's My Motto

I was in the middle-school puppy-love stage of life when I heard this quote by Richard Bach, "If you love something, set it free; if it comes back it's yours, if it doesn't, it never was." There is a fairly similar quote from the early 1900's by a Lebanese-American Writer and Poet named Kahlil Gibran. Both gave the same advice, and I followed it. Pretty smart I'd say, since the middle school crushes are long gone and I'm not one for chasing anybody.

That's a hard thing to do, isn't it, love someone so much that you are willing to let them go, for their own happiness, not knowing what the future holds or if you will be a part of it? I'm sure as young as I was back in the in 7th and 8th grades, I had not understood it that deeply. But I have since, and it has always been a wise place to come from. I believe this philosophy should be used in parenting.

This spring, I had the treat of all three of my children (and my granddaughter) home at the same time! It was the second time in a year! Given all of their responsibilities and logistics I just assumed it would not happen again for five more years. Our time was very short, I hadn't any big plans for them, the house was not nearly as clean as the last time they were here, and I hadn't been grocery shopping in a bit. I didn't have much money and not a whole lot to offer, but they still came. We had a blast! At the end of the weekend, as the last one drove away, I stood on my front porch waving goodbye, teary-eyed. I felt sad but I also felt honored. They had gone to great lengths and made sacrifices to do this. I had to ask myself why. Why do some kids come home, and some parents are continually heartbroken because their kids don't? I'm not entirely sure of the answer. But I am a self-evaluating person. Most of my life has been a series of questions about how and why I do things and whether the outcome was positive or negative. So I started to think.

We have a family motto, "You do you". It means we can all be ourselves, live our lives, and do our own thing without the pressure of doing it differently and on anyone else's timeline. When I text my kids, I don't expect them to drop everything to text back. If they are busy, or maybe they just don't feel like responding right then, it's alright. They will eventually. They sometimes apologize for not texting back sooner. I aways tell them "No worries...you do you". I don't give them grief, and they give me the same grace.

As they each transitioned into adulthood, I never saw the need to be attached, know their every move, or what they were doing every second of every day. I let them live their



lives by respecting each one of them and their boundaries. I have also never relied on them for validation or put them in a position to be the source of my happiness. I don't ever make them feel obligated and have NEVER EVER guilted them (that's a big no-no in my book). I am happy when they're home, but I am happy even if they are not. I have a life and so do they. And we live it. If I invite them to something, and they don't oblige, I don't take it personally, and I don't think it's wrong for them to say no. It's their life and deserve to live it how they want. During my interactions with them I've made a practice of not being judgmental, bossy, or overly opinionated, and I have never uttered the words, "I told you so".

I have to believe that these parenting practices, loving them how they are, letting them fly, have led my kids to respect me, and not only come home, but confide in me, ask me for help, text/call, and have deep discussions with me. I've many times had other parents say to me, "I wish my kids did that". Well, I didn't tell them to, they just do it.

The holidays are approaching, and many parents would love for their children to come see them during college break, military leave, and even with their own families. But some won't, and some never do. Those quotes I mentioned above could apply here. I know we just have so much love for our children and want it back tenfold, that when they start pulling away, we sometimes just want to hold on tighter because we miss the little stages and want those feelings and



connections back. But that's not the way to go. If you are struggling with an undesired RSVP from your kids for Thanksgiving or Christmas dinner this vear, or vou are discouraged because vou never see or hear from them, it would be a good idea to put yourself in their shoes. Is the invitation something you are offering because you need them. are you trying to recreate old times? Is it because you just want to get them in front of you to see what they are up to, share your own whoas, or give them your opinion about how they are living their lives? Or is it a genuine kind gesture but they just can't make it this year? Try having empathy and understanding, you might not know everything that is going on and it may not be as easy as you think for them to make it home. If you get the feeling that they don't want to be around for other reasons and maybe not telling you, it might be time to ask a tough question, "Why?" Be open to the answer without a harsh reaction. Our best lessons about ourselves can be learned in relationships. With open honest communication

without judgment, without getting angry, doors can open up to better connections and maybe them coming home for the holidays (or even more- texting, calling, or confiding in you). I say quite often that parenting is not about us, but sometimes it is. Just because we are parents doesn't mean we are perfect. We are all flawed.

If you are commonly upset when your adult children pass on an invitation or opportunity to get together, put yourself in their shoes. Take a moment to try to understand. When they transition to a grown-up life of their own, our priorities are no longer their priorities. This is okay and quite healthy. They have detached, and that is something that is supposed to happen. Don't take it offensively, and if there is a reason that they don't RSVP with bells on, and you are their reason, be humble and hear them out. If they are brave enough to tell you...it is a good thing. It means they care.







According to psychologist Regine Muradian, who works with students on learning and study skills, electives also can increase a student's desire to learn by offering a respite from the pressures of required courses.

Schools vary regarding how many elective classes high schoolers may take each year. Electives typically are a more prominent component of upperclassmen's schedules because they may have already completed most of the core curriculum requirements. Here are some tips for selecting electives.

• Go with what you know. Pick courses that tie into already established



interests. If you love to write and get to the bottom of a story, then a journalism class may be ideal.

- Step outside your comfort zone. Another way to pick electives is to try new things and explore classes in that way. Maybe you never thought about computer programming before, but think it could be interesting to dabble?
- Choose with future major in mind. If you have an idea of which subject to study in college, you can select electives that align with that major. Someone who plans to major in finance may select an elective in marketing or business management, for example.
- Think about what colleges want. Colleges accept applicants based on academic performance, but they're also looking for students who check an assortment of boxes. Think about which electives may help you look more attractive to admissions departments. Classes in STEM, public speaking, debate, and international affairs might help you stand out.
- Diversify your skills. Richard Detweiler, researcher and president emeritus of the Great Lakes Colleges, says a top preparatory factor to earning a six-figure salary is not one's college major, but having taken a large share of classes outside of one's major. Diverse courses throughout high school and college can put students on a successful path.

Choosing electives need not be complicated. Students can opt for different strategies to select classes that will complement core learning.

How to Set Up the Ultimate Workstation for Kids at Home


