# Gorham awarded grant to address effects of climate change



GORHAM, ME (October 6, 2023) – The Town of Gorham received notification on October 2, 2023 that its application for the State of Maine's Community Action Grant, submitted to the Governor's Office of Policy, Innovation and Future (GOPIF) for funding of eligible projects in the State's Climate Action Plan, was awarded in the amount of \$50,000.

The project that the Town will undertake to address effects of climate change will be to upgrade stormwater infrastructure at the Municipal Center parking lot to improve water quality, maintain building and parking infrastructure to key town services, ensure continued stormwater runoff control during future flooding events, and provide educational opportunities. The project will install a FocalPoint system, which is a high performance modular biofiltration system that fits as a low-impact design standard best management practice. This method utilizes natural systems to remove pollutants and provide water quality control in an urban environment to minimize impact to development.

Not only will this project upgrade essential municipal infrastructure, but it will also showcase new stormwater treatment technology in a highly visible location. Raising awareness of the potential for improved stormwater treatment systems will aid in promoting additional retrofits in other locations in Gorham. This will also raise awareness of the draft Low Impact Development (LID) ordinance, planned for adoption in July 2024.

The Town's application was made possible through the hard work and efforts of Town staff and support by the Greater Portland Council of Governments (GPCOG), who assisted the Town with information gathering and technical support for completing necessary steps to enroll in the State of Maine's Community Resilience Partnership.

The Mills Administration awarded \$2.4 million to 53 communities across Maine to address climate change effects through investments to improve energy efficiency, transition to clean energy, expand local and regional planning capacity, and protect infrastructure from damaging

storms or rising sea levels.

These awards to Maine cities, towns and Tribal governments are through the state's Community Resilience Partnership, which helps communities plan for climate change, reduce carbon emissions, and increase resilience to climate effects.

Since the program was first announced by Governor Mills in December 2021, some 174 cities, towns and Tribal governments in Maine have chosen to participate in the Partnership either as individual entities or in regional coalitions. Since inception, the program has awarded nearly \$6.1 million to 103 communities.

"Maine's work to address climate change is reducing costs for Maine people, creating new jobs and career opportunities, strengthening our communities, and protecting our precious environment," said Governor Mills. "I am proud that Maine people have followed the bold vision we outlined in our climate action plan, Maine Won't Wait, to transition to clean energy and to ensure that their communities can withstand the effects of climate change."

"Through the Community Resilience Partnership, 174 communities across Maine are working to transition to clean energy, strengthen their critical infrastructure to withstand the impacts of climate change, and plan for future climate investments and actions based on local priorities," said Hannah Pingree and Melanie Loyzim, co-chairs of the Maine Climate Council. "We are grateful for the efforts of our community and regional partners on this program and look forward to continuing to advance local and regional climate solutions with them into the future."

"Governor Mills' climate action plan is a blueprint for a better Maine future," said Cathy Conlow, Executive Director of the Maine Municipal Association. "The Community Resilience Partnership is meeting communities where they are on the path to climate resiliency and supplies municipal leaders with the resources they need to be innovators, all to ensure that Maine towns and cities have the opportunity to create a sustainable tomorrow."

Besides the Gorham award, other grantees during this round include:

Penobscot Nation to launch a Wabanaki workforce development initiative that will grow the community's ability to offer residential energy efficiency services

Long Island for a groundwater sustainability study to help the town understand the effects of climate change on its drinking water supply.

Camden for a sea level rise and storm surge resiliency project that will produce engineering and designs so the town can *See* Climate Change, page 3

# Horticulture, gardening training with UMaine Extension

— The University of Maine Cooperative Extension is offering two in-depth horticulture training workshops for Mainers looking to start a career in horticulture or for those wanting to elevate their garden-

ing skills.

The two programs, "Maine Horticulture Apprentice Training" and "Maine Gardener Training," will teach foundational knowledge and skills, offer handson experience through practical exercises and provide an opportunity to learn from experienced horticulture industry leaders.

The "Maine Horticulture Apprentice Training" program offers a comprehensive curriculum suitable for skilled entry-level positions in the horticulture industry. The program, now open for registration, will be held from 6-7:30 p.m. on Tuesdays from Oct. 30 to Dec. 17 and from Jan. 8 to March 14. The three-part program includes online self-paced learning modules, live virtual sessions with horticultural experts from across the state and a 200-hour apprenticeship. Participants should plan to spend approximately 4-5 hours per week on additional coursework like reading, videos and activities.

Successful completion of the program qualifies participants to receive the

Maine Horticulture Apprentice Training micro-credential and the title of Maine Horticulture Apprentice. Backed by the University of Maine System, the micro-credential verifies to potential employers successful completion of a high-quality, rigorous training and demonstrates the skills necessary to be a valuable horticulture industry employee. Certification is available upon completion of all three required course parts.

The Maine Gardener Training program is designed to supply learners with a foundation in horticulture education and skills for use in personal gardens. The workshop is recommended for those who would like to access in-depth training without any volunteer or apprenticeship requirement. Registration will open Oct.

A stable internet connection and registration is required. Space is limited. For exact course fees, schedules and registration, visit the Maine Horticulture Apprentice Training webpage and the Maine Gardener Training webpage.

# Cooking causes most home fires; 10 safety steps from Red Cross

PORTLAND,  $\mathbf{ME}$ (October 6, 2023) During Fire Prevention Week (October 8-14), the American Red Cross of Northern New England reminds everyone that cooking is the leading cause of home fires and issues safety steps to follow to help avoid one of these blazes.

"Cooking brings family and friends together, but this normal, everyday activity can also lead to disaster," said John Montes, Regional Disaster Officer. "In fact, cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the U.S. To help keep your loved ones safe, it's important to stay in the kitchen while you're cooking.'

Follow these 10 steps to help stay safe while cook-

If you are frying, grilling or broiling food, never leave it unattended — stay in the kitchen. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.

Don't wear loose clothing or sleeves that dangle while cooking.

If you're simmering, baking, roasting or broiling food, check it regularly.

Use a timer to remind

yourself that the stove or fire extinguisher to keep in your smoke alarm requires oven is on

Keep kids and pets away from the cooking area. Make them stay at least three feet away from the

Keep anything that can catch fire — potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stove, oven or any other appliance in the kitchen that generates heat.

Clean cooking surfaces on a regular basis to prevent grease buildup.

Consider purchasing a

your kitchen. Contact your local fire department to take training on the proper use of extinguishers.

Always check the kitchen before going to bed or leaving the home to make sure all stoves, ovens and small appliances are turned

Install a smoke alarm near your kitchen, on each level of your home, near sleeping areas and inside and outside bedrooms if you sleep with doors closed. Use the test button to check it each month. Replace all batteries at least once a year if

If you cannot afford to purchase smoke alarms or are physically unable to install one, the Red Cross may be able to help. Contact vour local Red Cross for more information.

If you need a smoke alarm for your home, the Red Cross encourages you to sign up. The smoke alarm and installation are free. The Red Cross is also hosting installation events on the following dates:

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

apply for construction funds to improve the public landing.

Fryeburg to initiate a composting pilot program to prevent GHG emissions from food waste as well as to conserve 74 acres of the Town Forest and build an outdoor learning pavilion to create environmental education opportunities for the town's students.

"This grant will provide the Penobscot Nation the opportunity to generate workforce development and assist Tribal Citizen's with improving the energy efficiency of their homes and reducing our carbon footprint on our traditional homelands," said Gary Fearon, Director of Housing, Penobscot Nation.

"The Town of Camden is appreciative of Maine's leadership on climate action and the Community Resilience Partnership's support for our efforts to make the Camden Public Landing resilient to the impacts of sea level rise and storm surge," said Jeremy Martin, Planning & Development Director, Town of Camden. "The Town has made significant, costly, and repeated repairs to our landing due to the impacts of intense storms and sea level rise. This funding will ensure the Public Landing is redesigned to be resilient and

sustainable for the long-term."

"The Town of Long Island is thrilled to be awarded a Community Resilience Partnership grant from the Governor's Office of Policy Innovation and the Future," said Brian L. Dudley, Town Administrator, Town of Long Island. "Climate change and rising sea levels are impacting all of Maine, especially our unbridged islands. Water resource management is crucial to our island community, and this grant will allow us to examine the impacts on our water supply, both in terms of its quality and quantity.

"Fryeburg is very excited to be the recipient of a Community Action Grant," said Katie Haley, Town Manager, Town of Fryeburg. "The projects that will transpire as a result of this grant are varied, but each is equally important to the Town and our residents as we work to support the Maine Won't Wait climate plan."

This award announcement was made Friday during a meeting of the Maine Climate Council, a 39-member assembly of scientists, industry leaders, bipartisan local and state officials, and citizens created by Governor Janet Mills in 2019 and

charged with developing and updating a comprehensive climate action plan for Maine

Following an extensive public process, the Council delivered its first four-year plan to prepare for and mitigate effects of climate change on Maine, Maine Won't Wait, to Governor Mills on December 1, 2020.

By law, the Council must deliver an updated four-year climate plan by Dec. 1, 2024. Work on this updated plan will be supported in part by a \$3 million grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency from the Inflation Reduction Act.

Since 2019, the Mills Administration has prioritized the fight against climate change in Maine through actions to reduce carbon emissions, transition to renewable energy, and make Maine communities more resilient to climate effects.

With bipartisan support of the Legislature, Maine in 2019 enacted laws setting ambitious targets for transitioning to renewable energy and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. These include reducing greenhouse gas emissions in Maine by 45 percent by 2030 and 80 percent by 2050.

Governor Mills also pledged that Maine would become carbon-neutral by 2045, a commitment she signed into law in 2022. Earlier this year, the Governor committed to accelerating Maine's transition to 100 percent renewable energy by 2040.

In July, White House National Climate Advisor Ali Zaidi joined Governor Mills to celebrate a historic climate milestone for Maine: the state surpassing its goal of installing 100,000 new heat pumps two years early.

Governor Mills then set an ambitious new target of installing another 175,000 heat pumps in Maine by 2027, thereby bringing the number of heat pumps installed in Maine homes, businesses, and public buildings during her time in office to 275,000.

Governor Mills also serves as Co-Chair of the U.S. Climate Alliance, a bipartisan coalition of 25 governors committed to fighting climate change by reducing carbon emissions, advancing clean energy, and protecting people and the environment from the effects of the climate crisis.

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

# A Kayak Voyage to Thrumcap Island



A kayaker passed the rugged shore of Rutherford Island

One of the most interesting and less well-known sea kayak destinations on the Maine coast is Thrumcap Island. Located between outer Johns Bay and the mouth of the Damariscotta River, the diminutive atoll is the last stop after passing a series of rugged ledges with the

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unique name Thread of Life.

The Thrumcap area has some of the richest history in America. Prior to the arrival of European explorers and settlers, Native Americans lived in settlements on the shore of Johns Bay and along the Damariscotta River for centu-

ries where they traveled the waterways in primitive canoes. Explorers such as John Smith and Giovanni da Verrazzano visited the area in the 16th and early 17th centuries. In 1688, a fort was built on nearby Pemaquid Neck during the French and Indian Wars, a conflict that continued for decades

When I recently announced a Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society sea kayak trip to Thrumcap Island, two longtime friends, Dave Boyle and Ken Gordon, enthusiastically signed on. All over 70, we constituted a serious senior threesome.

In the past, I've started my Thrumcap trips from

the boat landing at Colonial Pemaquid State Historic Site at the mouth of the Pemaquid River. Dave suggested a relatively new launch area more conveniently situated at The Gut in South Bristol.

The three of us met at the small landing on the east side of the bridge over The Gut. We were greeted with a glorious warm sunny day with light winds. A paved ramp and adequate parking make this an ideal place to begin and end a sea kayak voyage to Thrumcap.

Paddling three solo kayaks, we benefited from an outgoing tide when embarking into The Gut. The sheltered channel was frequently used as a safe passage by Native Americans during prehistoric times. Today, the tiny harbor is bustling with activity. Fishing vessels and pleasure crafts were motoring to and from their moorings when we exited traveling east.

The waterway widened as we kayaked between Witch Island and Davis Point into Johns Bay. Restored Fort William Henry was visible in the distance on Pemaquid Neck. Angling south, we progressed past the rugged eastern shoreline of Rutherford Island with Johns Island in the center of the bay on our left.

Proceeding south, we arrived at the northern end of Birch Island which parallels and hugs the eastern shore of Rutherford Island. Almost low tide, we speculated about the feasibility of traversing through the attenuated route between the islands. Our nautical

charts were unclear. We gambled and won as we were just barely able to negotiate between some ancient pilings, under a bridge, and through the narrow corridor.

After passing Hay and Crow Islands on our left, we entered the Thread of Life ledges which begin opposite the southern terminus of Rutherford Island. Since the seas were calm and winds light, the sometimes treacherous ledges provided a stimulating opportunity for exploration.

Shortly beyond Thread of Life, we arrived at Thrumcap Island. A small beach on the southern arm of the island offers a convenient place to land. After carrying our kayaks high onto the beach to protect against the rising tide, we hiked an irregular path to the scenic rockbound shore on the south side of the island.

When leaving Thrumcap and departing north, an incoming tide and a gentle tailwind helped propel us between Inner Heron and Rutherford Islands into outer Damariscotta River. We soon passed Christmas Cove on the western side of Rutherford Island. The cove was reportedly named by explorer John Smith when he moored there on Christmas Day in 1614. Some sources dispute that.

Cruising blithely along with the assistance of the wind and tide, we accidentally passed the entrance to The Gut and continued north on Damariscotta River. Unfamiliar surroundings indicated there was a problem. Ken's

GPS confirmed we had missed our destination. Backtracking to The Gut was necessary. A marvelous day, we embraced the "free mileage."

The bridge connecting South Bristol to Rutherford Island was raised for tall boat traffic when we entered The Gut. After the congestion abated, we rode a strong current through the narrow opening completing a phenomenal day of kayaking.

# \$220K in additional LIHEAP funding for Maine

WASHINGTON, D.C. (October 6, 2023) – Today, U.S. Senator Susan Collins, Vice Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, announced that the State of Maine was awarded an additional \$226,115 in Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) funding from the Department of Health and Human Services last week. LIHEAP is a federally funded program that helps low-income households with their home energy bills

Maine's funding

award comes as part of \$17 million in re-allotted Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 LIHEAP funds that were returned to the federal government and are now being redistributed. This brings Maine's total LI-HEAP funding in FY 2023 to \$54,359,414.

"Last winter, Maine families faced high residential heating oil prices, forcing many into making agonizing decisions, like choosing between paying for heat or putting food on the table," said Senator Collins. "This additional LIHEAP funding will

provide much-needed relief to our most vulnerable residents, ensuring they can afford to stay warm during the harsh winter months without sacrificing other essential needs."

Last year, Senator Collins successfully led efforts to secure a total of \$6.1 billion for LIHEAP in FY 2023. LIHEAP is administered by states and accessed through local Community Action Agencies. Eligibility for LIHEAP is based on income, family size, and the availability of resources.







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# Maine Jewish Film Festival marks 25th anniversary

PORTLAND, ME (October 6, 2023) -- The Maine Jewish Film Festival (MJFF) will kick off its 25th anniversary on November 4th with a celebration and screening at the Portland Museum of Art, featuring the bittersweet Israeli comedy, Karaoke, followed by a party in the Museum's Great Hall. Over the next eight days, the festival will host multiple screenings of over a dozen films from eight countries and four continents in Portland.

Bangor, Waterville, Lewiston, Brunswick, and Bethel.

The festival got its start in 1995 with a single film shown as part of an arts festival in the basement of South Portland's Congregation Bet Ha'am. The following year, more films were added, and more audience showed up. By 1998, when the popular series had outgrown its original venue, Steve and Judy Halpert, owners of The Movies on Exchange Street, offered their theater for an entire

week of screenings. Lines snaked around the corner, attendance topped 1300, and the series acquired a new name: The Maine Jewish Film Festival.

Three years later now too large to be managed by synagogue volunteers-the festival became an independent entity. Today, MJFF remains one of a handful of independent Jewish film festivals in the United States.

With the support of foundations, local business

sponsors, individual donors and filmgoers, the festival has built an enthusiastic following in greater Portland, also expanding its footprint across Maine. Partnering with Maine cultural and educational organizations, MJFF has brought meaningful programs into schools, museums, colleges, screening rooms and movie theaters statewide.

MJFF appeals to a broad audience by selecting films that explore universal themes through a lens of

Jewish experience; and by welcoming a diverse audience into the conversation. An overarching goal of the festival has always been to promote tolerance and understanding.

MJFF's six-city November festival, will also present The Art of Silence, a piercing look into the art and life of mime Marcel Marceau; Rabbi on the Block, about charismatic African-American rabbi Tamar Manasseh, who takes her message into the

streets of Chicago's South Side; Valeria is Getting Married, a drama about a young woman arriving in Israel as a mail-order bride; and I Am Not, a journey of self-discovery through the eyes of a bright but troubled neurodivergent teen.

# Sen. Collins becomes 15th person in history to receive award

WASHINGTON,
D.C. (October 6, 2023) –
On Tuesday, U.S. Senator
Susan Collins became the
15th person to ever win
the Naval Heritage Award.
The award is presented to
distinguished Americans
who have significantly
supported the nation's Sea
Service, and whose lives
and career exemplify the
core value of Honor, Courage, and Commitment.

The first person to win the award was Maine Senator Margaret Chase Smith in 1995. Other previous recipients of this award include President Ronald Reagan and Bob Hope.

Admiral Lisa Franchetti, the current Vice Chief of Naval Operations who has been nominated to be the Navy's next Chief of Naval Operations (CNO), presented Senator Collins with the award at a ceremony that honors our Navy and the people who support it. Three former Secretaries of the Navy were present at the event, which is also honoring two former service members with the Lone Sailor award.

"Senator Susan Collins' advocacy for a strong Navy and a robust national defense has been instrumental in giving our warfighters the tools they need





to protect our nation and our families," said BIW President Chuck Krugh. "Her support for the shipbuilders of General Dynamics Bath Iron Works encourages us to continue to produce the highest-quality surface combatants that deserve their Bath-built-is-best-built reputation. It's a standard of excellence that Senator Collins embodies in all the work that she does for our state and our country."

"This Naval Heritage Award means so much to me as my State of Maine has a naval heritage that is unsurpassed," Senator Collins said. "In 1607, the first ocean-going sailing ship built in the New World was launched at Popham Colony. Today, Maine's shipbuilding heritage continues at Bath Iron Works and the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard."

Senator Collins received this award for her vears of dedication in the U.S. Senate to ensure our nation's Navy remains the world's preeminent naval power including through securing additional funding to increase the number of Bath Iron Works-built Arleigh Burke-class destroyers in the fleet and making generational investments to modernize our nation's public shipyards including Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in Kittery, Maine.





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# **Domestic Violence Awareness Month**

### October is Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Month

For October 2023, President Joe Biden released this proclamation on National Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Month.

Domestic violence touches every community in this Nation. Americans of every race, religion, and background are affected; its consequences transcend generations, impacting children and reshaping whole families. During National Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Month, we stand with the tens of millions of people who have experienced intimate partner violence, and we thank the first responders, service providers, and community members who work to make sure that every American can live in safety, with dignity and

I was always taught there is no worse sin than the abuse of power, especially when that abuse is directed toward a partner. But just decades ago, much of our Nation wanted to keep the issue of domestic violence in the shadows. Survivors sat in shame, and society often looked away from what people too often dismissed as a "family affair."

I have spent more than 30 years of my life working to change that to end gender-based violence in the United States and around the world. I wrote the original Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) in 1990, which made strides toward shifting the legal and social burdens away from survivors, holding offenders accountable, and addressing gendered violence as a shared priority with a determined and coordinated response. That law introduced our Nation to countless brave survivors, whose stories changed the way America saw this issue. It created the National Domestic Violence Hotline to provide confidential support nationwide. It supported shelters, rape crisis centers, housing, and legal assistance, creating life-saving options for survivors and their children. And it helped to train police, advocates, prosecutors, and judges to make our justice system more responsive to survivors. It saved lives and helped survivors rebuild.

Since then, every time we have reauthorized VAWA, we have improved it — broadening its scope to include stalking and sexual assault in 2000, expanding access to services for immigrants and communities of color in 2005, and recognizing criminal jurisdiction of Tribal courts over non-Indian perpetrators and protections for LGBTQI+ individuals in 2013. And last year, we reauthorized VAWA again and strengthened access to services for survivors from underserved and marginalized communities, expanded special Tribal criminal jurisdiction with support for Native communities, and recognized the need to combat cybercrimes and address online harassment and abuse. We brought the Federal Government's investment in life-saving gender-based violence programs to \$700 million this year alone — the highest

funding level in history — and to \$1 billion in next year's budget.

Last year, I also signed the most significant gun safety law we have had in nearly 30 years, which keeps firearms out of the hands of convicted domestic abusers. Another law I signed ensures we continue to sustain the Crime Victims Fund to help domestic violence survivors cover abuse-related costs like medical bills, lost wages, and temporary housing. And further, I signed a law empowering survivors of workplace sexual assault and sexual harassment to take their cases to court. We fundamentally transformed how the military prosecutes sexual assault and domestic violence within its ranks, shifting to specialized prosecutors independent from commanders. We have established a civil cause of action for anyone who has had their intimate photos shared without their consent, and we are working to prevent the spread of deepfake non-consensual images too. And last May, we released the first-ever National Plan to End Gender-Based Violence, laying out a Government-wide plan to prevent and address sexual violence, intimate partner violence, stalking, and other forms of gender-based violence.

Despite all this progress, we have more to do. Four in 10 American women and nearly 3 in 10 American men are still impacted by sexual abuse, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner at some point in their lifetimes. 
Every survivor should know that they are not alone and they deserve better. Together, we will keep spreading awareness, changing culture, supporting survivors, and moving toward a world free of gener-based violence

NOW, THERE-FORE, I, JOSEPH R. BIDEN JR., President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim October 2023 as National Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Month. I call upon each of us to change the social norms that permit domestic violence, provide meaningful support to survivors, and express gratitude to those working diligently on prevention and response efforts. Together, we can transform the country and build a Nation where all people live free from violence.

# Through These Doors, serving Cumberland County

Our history began in 1977. Through These Doors (TTD) is the domestic violence resource center serving victims and survivors of domestic abuse, dating violence, and stalking in Cumberland County, Maine. When we opened the doors to our first shelter in 1977, there were already women waiting on the doorstep.

Our original name was Family Crisis Shelter. Emergency shelters were our most critical service in those days as there were few other options for people who were not safe in their homes. We later changed our name to Family Crisis Services to encompass the wide array of services and programs we provided. In March 2018, we changed our name again. This time to Through These Doors.

This name demonstrates our history and the many ways we are available to survivors, including our helpline, outreach offices, shelter, and other locations and methods. The name indicates a sense of hope and promise for a life free of abuse. Most of the people who use our services go on to better lives with greater safety and autonomy. We want those reaching out for help to feel that sense of future possibility.

TTD provides safe, accessible services to all people affected by domestic violence regardless of race, ethnicity, disability, sexual orientation, gender, age, primary language spoken, or immigration status. Our core service is our free, confidential, anonymous 24-hour helpline to people living in or leaving abusive relationships, struggling with a former partner, and concerned friends, family members, neighbors, etc.

We operate an emer-

gency shelter for people fleeing abuse and violence, transitional services, support and education groups, safety planning, advocacy, support, and legal matters, including Protection from Abuse Orders. We offer specialized support services on issues as elder abuse and human trafficking. We work in the systems of child protective services and local jails and prisons. We engage in consultation and case

assessment with all law enforcement agencies in Cumberland County.

We provide extensive community education, consultation, training, and systems change advocacy to the general public and youth through our Young Adult Abuse Prevention Program to prevent future violence. TTD operates the batterer's intervention program in Cumberland County, Maine, called "A Different Choice."



The club is free and open to youth of all skill levels, from beginners to experienced weavers. All necessary materials will be provided.



# King honored with Congressional Sea Services Award

D.C. (October 6, 2023) -U.S. Senator Angus King was honored by the Navy League Capital Council as the 2023 recipient of its Congressional Sea Services Award in an event held on Capitol Hill. This award, presented annually to a member of Congress, outstanding recognizes leadership and contributions to the United States Sea Services. Senator King accepted it on behalf of the men and women of the sea services and shipbuilders at Bath Iron Works (BIW) and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

Senator King was presented with a binnacle, a casing that holds a ship's compass and lamp - which will reside in his Senate office for a year. The traveling 'trophy' is the actual binnacle from the Sioux Falls Victory ship that saw action, and received a battlestar, in the amphibious assault of Okinawa, Japan in 1945. The ship also served in the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

"We all talk about ships and we talk about aircraft, but it's the peo-

ple – the wonderful people that we have serving us," said Senator King. "The military and our first responders, when you think about it, have the only jobs where you sign your name you're putting your life on the line. That's not true for 95-percent of the jobs in our society. These are the young people who put their lives on the line when they sign up and it's something that we have to constantly remember."

"This is a tremendous honor and I really

overwhelmed and delighted, but I have accepted it on behalf of the shipbuilders in Maine, the shipbuilders in Mississippi, the Coasties along the Maine coast and the Naval personnel all over the country. This isn't my

award, this is their award. Thank you," concluded Senator King.

"Senator King has been a long-standing and outspoken advocate for our nation's safety and security. He has tirelessly fought for a strong national defense, with particular emphasis on maritime forces and seapower, championing funding and innovative policies to increase United States shipbuilding capacity and support for our nation's critical workforce," the citation from the Navy League Capital Council read.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and Chairman of the Strategic Forces Subcommittee, Senator King has been a steadfast supporter of the Navy and Coast Guard. He recently secured key provisions in the FY 2024 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to support the maritime forces and ensure that America's military can continue providing best in class services to protect the 'territory of the brave.' # \$76M in opportunities to advance UMaine research

WASHINGTON, D.C. (August 25, 2023) - U.S. Senator Susan Collins, Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and Subcommittee on Defense, announced that she secured \$76 million in Department of Defense funding that could benefit research and development efforts at the University of Maine (UMaine) in the Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24) Department of Defense Appropriations Act.

"The University of Maine is grateful for all that Senator Susan Collins continues to do through her leadership roles in the Senate for the people of our state, the University of Maine System and the University of Maine," said UMaine President and UMS Vice Chancellor for Research and Innovation Joan Ferrini-Mundy. "This inclusion of \$76 million in the Senate defense appropriations bill mark-up for defense-related research and technology development will enable the continued contributions of UMaine engineers, scientists and students in shaping the future of large-scale manufacturing, and the use of advanced materials and composites for national defense and a range of applications. Senator Collins' efforts are enhancing our state's economy and securing pathways to success for our graduates."

Bill Highlights: Large-scale Manufacturing: \$25 million to support development of a large-scale manufacturing facility that is pioneering 3D printing, artificial intelligence, and other advanced manufacturing techniques.

3D Printing of Unmanned Maritime Systems: \$10 million to support additive manufacturing to prototype unmanned surface vehicles.

New Material Solutions in Severe Environments: \$10 million to support development of new materials that are rapidly deployable in extreme environmental conditions.

Advanced Textiles and Shelters: \$6 million to support continued development of rapidly deployable shelters.

Multi-Material Flexible Automated Manufacturing: \$12 million to support large-scale metal and composites technologies to enable the rapid, low-cost manufacture of castings and forgings.

Polar Proving Ground: \$10 million to support UMaine's partnership in Alaska to provide a Polar proving site for academic research.

Wood to Jet Fuel: \$3 million for continued research converting woody biomass into jet fuel and renewable diesel.

All funding increases in the Defense Appropriations Act are competitively awarded or provided to programs that have received competitive awards in the past.

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



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
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
