30 years of giving: Unicorn Thrift Shop

he Unicorn Thrift Shop volunteers recently celebrated
30 years of fundraising for the Pacific Clinics non-profit organization with a festive luncheon at Joint Venture Church.

It all started in 1993 with a tiny store in Almaden Valley and a handful of ladies who wanted to get involved and do something for the community, specifically the organization called Eastfield Ming Quong known as EMQ at that time. Thirty years later that shop has grown to encompass three storefronts with 80 volunteers working in it while the EMQ organization itself has expanded its services and changed names several times to its current Pacific Clinics.

The Unicorn Thrift Shop has gotten bigger and more diversified, but the objective remains the same; donate the entire store profits to Pacific Clinics. Pacific Clinics is California's largest community-based nonprofit provider of behavioral and mental health services and is devoted to helping children and families in crisis.

The Unicorn Volunteers have contributed \$3.8 million to Pacific Clinics during their three decades selling donated collectables, books, jewelry, household items, toys and clothing from their shop at the corner of Redmond Avenue and Almaden Expressway.

Musical Oklahoma! back on the Pioneer High School stage after 20 years; October 25-28

wenty years ago, "Oklahoma!" graced Pioneer High School's-related Glue Factory's "stage."

Back then, Pioneer's stage in quotation marks, as the beloved original stage had suffered a tragedy burning not only the stage and all related equipment, but also ruining all the beautiful and memory-filled costumes.

Erecting a stage outdoors in the courtyard, creating a theater in the round so to speak, answered See OKLAHOMA!, page 5

Tragedy on Fleetwood Drive



Two toddlers drowned and a third injured after being found in a day care center pool in Almaden; license suspended

appy Happy Home Daycare, located on Fleetwood Drive in Almaden Valley, had its license suspended last Wednesday after two 1-year old toddlers drowned in the backyard pool.

A residential day care facility in Almaden Valley on Fleetwood Drive has had its license suspended following the discovery of two 1-year old toddlers drowned Oct. 2 in the facilities' backyard pool and were fined \$11,000.

In a statement, state Department of Social Services spokesperson Jason Montiel said the agency notified Happy Happy Home Daycare that its license went under suspension at 5 p.m. Oct. 4, pending a request by the facility's owners — listed in state records as Nina Fathizadeh and Shahin Shenas — for a hearing.


The department also notified the facility that its license may be revoked, and the license holders could be barred from ever operating such a facility again. The Almaden home daycare was ordered to shut down immediately in the wake of the infant deaths.

Two 1-year-old girls — identified by authorities Tuesday as Payton Cobb of Hollister and Lillian Hanan, of San Jose — were found Monday morning in a pool at the home and later were pronounced dead after being taken to a hospital. A third child was found in the water with them and survived after being taken to a hospital.

Sean Webby, a spokesperson for the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office, said police still were investigating the case and prosecutors were reviewing the evidence for possible charges.

The day care facilities' website states: "Welcome to a Happy Happy Daycare where your child can experience the best that daycare can offer. We have an excellent kids-friendly facility providing safe, clean, healthy and fun environment for children to play, learn and grow."

State regulators said they have issued multiple citations to the facility over the past year.

utdoor ice skating will return to downtown San Jose's annual holiday celebration beginning Nov. 17.

Special Ice, which operates many rinks throughout the US, has agreed to produce and operate the downtown San Jose skating rink in the Circle of Palms Plaza this season, the San Jose Downtown Association announced Tuesday. The rink will operate from November through mid-January. Downtown Ice is supported by the City of San Jose.

"Downtown Ice is an iconic event that leaves a lasting impression," said Emery Lykins, president of Special Ice, based in Livermore. "We're excited to be a part of the rink's history, to contribute to this amazing city and hopefully usher in a revitalized future for the rink."

"I am thrilled to have our iconic ice rink back alongside all the many fun holiday-related activities in downtown San Jose that enrich families and people of all ages," said Alex Stettinski, San Jose Downtown Association CEO. "More and more, families are looking for things they can experience together. We're in good hands having the largest producer of seasonal ice rinks in the state on board with us."

"People enjoyed roller skating, but we heard loud and clear that families and friends from all parts of Northern and Central California missed their tradition of coming to skate at our ice rink," said Tricia Lee McNabb, who has managed rink operations since 1997.

"It's increasingly important that Downtown Ice keeps coming back, especially in the wake of Raging Waters' recent closing," McNabb.

Local students among National Merit semifinalists; High school seniors vying for \$28M in scholarships

ozens of students from public and private high schools in Almaden Valley are semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program.

The Almaden students are among 16,000 semifinalists across the nation — less than 1% of the nation's high school seniors — who will now be considered for more than 7,000 scholarships worth close to \$28 million next spring. Nearly 95% of semifinalists are expected to be named finalists, and approximately half of those finalists will earn a scholarship.

More than 1.3 million high school juniors in 21,000 high schools entered the competition through the 2022 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, or PSAT, which serves as the initial screening of program entrants. The semifinalists announced last week include the highest-scoring students in each state.

the call "the show must go on!" Out of the ashes, literally, rose the drama program, fueled by the funding arm known as the Glue Factory. This opened a new chapter of the program, staging "Oklahoma!" to not only help rebuild the actual stage but to restore a community.

Fast forward to today... Steve Dini, the storied Pioneer High School drama teacher who shepherded the program for more than 20 years. moved away to Texas. He's gone on to co-write and even make a cameo appearance in an upcoming film, to grace theaters this Thanksgiving. (More on that in a future edition).

Through an amazing staff including Ashley Coleman, the current PHS Drama Director; Diane Zlotziver, Assistant Director and Costuming co-leader with Kyla Blili: Marissa Bacon. Vocal and Tech Director; Lorie Biviano, Set Designer and Props Mistress: and Iim Wolk. Set Construction; Dini has continued leading the program from afar, moving temporarily back to the Bay Area in October to lead in person through closing night. And what production did they choose to open this new Glue Factory chapter? Well, "Oklahoma!" of course.

Revival of the musical theater

Rodgers & Hammerstein are often credited with reviving the musical theater genre and helping to usher in its Golden Age. "Oklahoma!" was their debut musical, gracing the stage in 1943 at the height of World War II. A needed distraction, it was beloved by professionals and audience members alike, running at the time an unprecedented 5+ years.

As Coleman describes, "This "integrated musical' marked a revolution in American theatre. By using a complete synthesis of music, libretto, lyrics, dancing and staging, Oklahoma was the first musical of its kind and paved the way for what most of us now picture when we think 'Musical Theatre.'" Oklahoma! tells the story of American settlers of the Oklahoma Territory, not yet a state in 1906, through the main female character, Laurey Williams, and her suitors from rival factions - one a cowman (Curly McClain), the other a farmer (Judd Fry).

"'Oklahoma!' is a snapshot of people and culture at a time when the state was first forming. We get to see heartfelt relationships form between cowmen and farmers daughters and those who are trying to challenge these unions," said Vanessa. "One of the great things about 'Oklahoma!' is how the music, story and humor have stood the test of time."

The Glue Factory

Another institution standing a test of time is The Glue Factory itself. The Glue Factory is filled with actors and theater lovers alike. from newbies to the stage through extremely well-trained and accomplished actors.

Vanessa Scoffone, who plays Ado Annie, left the program in 2017, going on to graduate UC Irvine with a BS in Biological Sciences and an interest in veterinary medicine. She returned to the Bay Area pursuing this passion, finding her way back to another passion along the way.

"I remember hearing about the Glue Factory when I was a student at Pioneer, and thought it was amazing that strangers in the community would dedicate their time and talent so that we could continue to have our beloved program," Vanessa said. "When the opportunity presented itself, I could not say no. After two shows with the glue factory, I am here to stay. It cultivates a love and passion for performing, providing a wide range of wonderful people an opportunity to push themselves $out \, of \, their \, comfort \, zone \, for \, a \, wonderful \, cause.$ In our cast, we have current students, alumni, community and staff members."

Jordan Spalding-Correia, who happened to graduate the same time as Vanessa, plays Judd Frv.

"I've worked my way into a great position professionally and have still been able to be in The Glue Factory and show some love back to the program here at Pioneer," said Jordan.

Jordan experienced much the same welcoming environment years ago and has six years of Glue Factory participation to his credit.

"After volunteering for Glue factory's tribute to (Mr. Dini), I had the feeling that the environment was just as welcoming as it was during my time in his class as a student," Jordan said. "After returning to do one of my favorite shows while attending my freshman year at a nearby community college, I was

Jordan was initially a reluctant drama convert. During high school he pursued athletic interests, and as he says he "tried to generally stay out of trouble." But he happened upon Mr. Dini's drama class, and his life was forever changed for the positive.

Diane Zltoziver, a Glue Factory staple with 20 shows to her credit both on and off stage, has a rich theater history herself. Graduating UCLA with a BA in Theater, she spent many years performing in local Los Angeles productions

"My work career took me through two (plus) decades in sales and marketing before making a career change," Diane said. "I went back to school for a teaching credential in English which enabled me to teach Drama and Language Arts at Castillero for 17 years."

Once a drama aficionado, always a drama aficionado, Diane found her way back and then extended her many talents in an understated, unassuming, and humble way for the Glue Factory.

Joining these experienced Glue Factory alumni are newbies including parents and staff, and fellow Pioneer High School Drama program alums in chorus through lead roles. Many names including Julene Johnson, Jacob Johnson, Connor Henry, and Valerie Doyle will be familiar to the community.

Returning drama alumni

What does it mean to have Drama Alumni return to the stage? "I think I can speak for both Mr. Dini and me when I say it's like welcoming your family home. To have alumni return to our stage after 5, 10, 15, 20 years... it's a tremendous gift, and a testament to the environment we have worked to create and maintain for decades. Once a 'Mustang,' always a 'Mustang,'" said Coleman. "One of my favorite elements of the Glue Factory musical is the opportunities for mentorship it creates. Adults working with students in a capacity that is rare to come by. Parents perform alongside their children. Teachers perform alongside their students. Drama alumni perform alongside their former classmates. The adults-- comprised of staff, parents, and alumni-- provide guidance on and off stage; using their expertise, and knowledge to work collaboratively with the advanced drama stu-

To bring a musical of this caliber to life requires skills ranging from the most obvious to the subtle. Acting is shaped and inspired via the directing and choreography talents of Steve, Diane and Ashley. Obviously culling the vocal talents of the assembled cast into a cohesive and pleasant sound falls to Marissa. Then there's the visual side of the house. Each piece you see on stage has been artistically created and/or sourced by the creative Lorie and Jim team. The costuming team of Kyla and Diane and their student assistants work just as diligently to address every detail. "As a costuming team, we look at everything that is available for inspiration. That includes films and photographs of past productions as well as the history of the time period of the play," shared Diane. "We strive to create looks that are colorful, evocative, easy to move in, while also helping to further define each character. This involves finding the best accessories, hairstyles and makeup to complete each look. Sometimes the smallest addition to a costume makes a big difference to the audience."

Each and every member of the cast, crew and staff volunteer their time to bring a yearly major musical production to the community. Many, who work in full time positions, roll straight into a three-hour rehearsal four nights a week. Some volunteer much more than that. All of this to support a drama program which is welcoming to all students meeting them where they're at and providing skills of poise and communication globally necessary in all future professional pursuits. All that investment brings with it hopes for the musical's outcomes.

Shared Jordan, "I hope to leave this production with the confidence that I can help make a difference for those who have helped and worked with me along the way. I hope to once again sharpen my acting skills, and to get better with my approach. I think it's a treat to get to admire live theatre and have a smaller idea of what it's like being on stage. 





What the Planning, Building, and Code Enforcement Dept. is doing to improve the permit issuance process

am thrilled to report that it is now possible to get a Building Permit for certain renovation, remodel, and/or extension projects in less than five business days in San José!

Acting upon your feedback regarding the slow building permit processing times, my office has been actively providing feedback and suggestions to the Planning, Building, and Code Enforcement (PBCE) Department on the launching of new, modernized, and digitized programs that will expedite and streamline the permit issuance process.

The Best Prepared Designer Program (BPD) is a new initiative aimed

at accelerating the permit issuance for eligible projects by allowing professionals who enroll in the program to take full responsibility for building code compliance, thus bypassing the Building Division's standard plan review process. Depending on the scope of the project, building permits can be issued in as few as three to five business days. The best part is that enrollment in this program is entirely free of charge.

To date, 44 professionals have already enrolled in the program, and five projects have been submitted.

In addition to the Best Prepared Designer Program, the city is also launching SJePlans on October 13th.

Recognizing the need for a faster permit process, the city has developed SJePlans as a solution to streamline the review of building plans. Starting mid-October, customers with projects requiring plan review can initiate the building permit

process online and directly upload their plans to SJePlans. This online portal facilitates plan review by City staff, offering the following benefits:

- Submit Your Plans and Respond to Reviewer's Comments: You can easily submit your plans and respond to any comments or queries from your plan reviewer online.
 - Track Review Status: SJePlans provides a convenient way to track the status of your plan review, allowing you to stay informed at every stage of the process.
 - **Permanent Plan Storage:** Rest assured that your plans will be stored securely and permanently within the SJePlans portal for future reference.

Many customers who have already used SJePlans have expressed their satisfaction with its speed and userfriendly features. To ensure a smooth transition to this new approach, short guides and videos will be provided to assist you. Please note that a few project types, including those utilizing our Express or STI/ITI programs,

will not be eligible for this system.

Valley Water groundbreaking: South County Recycled Water Pipeline Project completion acknowledged

Valley Water held a groundbreaking event Oct. 4 to acknowledge the completion of the South County Recycled Water Pipeline Project.

The project expands the distribution of recycled water service to new customers in South Santa Clara County and supports future system expansion opportunities. The additional 3.5 miles of pipeline constructed will also serve as backup to the existing system to help ensure recycled water deliveries during emergencies or outages.

The United States Bureau of Reclamation awarded Valley Water a \$5.7

million grant to help reduce the project's \$23 million cost.

With a hotter and drier climate and extended droughts, water supplies are becoming scarce. Recycled water is a drought-resistant supply of water used for landscaping, agriculture and industrial needs, which helps increase drinking water supplies in Gilroy, Morgan Hill and the unincorporated area of San Martin.

Valley Water was joined at the groundbreaking event by its partner agencies, the South County Regional Wastewater Authority, the City of Gilroy and the City of Morgan Hill.
