Auburn unveils plans for mixed income housing project



AUBURN, ME - At a meeting of the Auburn City Council held on Monday, October 16, the City of Auburn's Business & Community Development Department announced its groundbreaking plans for an innovative mixed-income housing development comprising 100 units in the heart of New Auburn.

The comprehensive project proposal was introduced during the city council workshop. This initiative also includes a grant application submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development, aimed at securing \$9.5 million to cover critical infrastructure costs such as the installation of new roads, sidewalks, and essential public utilities like water, sewer, and gas services for the upcoming residential community.

The proposed housing development includes the construction of 48 brand-new single-family homes, 8 owner-occupied duplexes, and three multi-unit apartment buildings. This forward-thinking project emphasizes the city's commitment to fostering a diverse and inclusive community for its residents.

"This is a wonderful example of government working with private developers and community partners to create innovative, transformative projects that will enhance our housing choices," said Auburn Mayor Jason J. Levesque. The highlight of Monday's workshop presentation is the revelation that Homes for All, LLC, represented by Fatuma Hussein and a team of experienced housing developers, will be spearheading this transformative project.

In addition to the city's involvement, several esteemed partners have pledged their support for this initiative, including the Androscoggin Land Trust which will oversee the management of 25 acres of adjacent conservation land, providing residents with access to scenic hiking trails, as well as the YMCA of Auburn-Lewiston which pledges to establish a modern childcare facility within the development, offering invaluable support to families and working parents.

"As an advocate for a more equitable Maine and community, the Winter Oaks Housing Development reflects Auburn's progress and our hard work towards improving our overall quality of life and building healthier and sustainable communities for everyone through housing and workforce," said Hussein. "I'm excited to see how this project unfolds and begins to pave a new future for Auburn residents.

The project has garnered substantial letters of support from key stakeholders, including the Androscoggin Emergency Management Agency, Community Concepts Inc., the Maine State Housing Authority, and Androscoggin Savings Bank.

The City of Auburn is proud to usher in a new era of housing development that not only addresses the diverse needs of its residents but also reinforces its dedication to community growth and wellbeing.

PORTLAND, ME -- AARP Maine celebrates LGBTQ+ History Month - and the contributions of Maine community activists in building a civil rights movement - on Friday, Oct. 27 at 12 p.m. Eastern when it hosts the online event Maine's LGBTQ+ Exploring Trailblazers: the University of Southern Maine's Jean Byers Sampson Center for Diversity. "Engaging with the LGBTQ+ community and highlighting its valuable history in our state is important to AARP's commitment to equity, diversity and inclusion,' says Noël Bonam, AARP Maine State Director. "AARP Maine is excited years. to highlight the remarkable role our state has played in the greater movement for LGBTQ+ civil rights. The University of Southern Maine's collection illuminates the lives of change-makers active in this movement over the past 50-plus years, as well as those here in Maine who simply lived ordinary lives."

Maine's LGBTQ+ Trailblazers will feature three University of Southern Maine (USM) staff members who have played key roles in the development of the University's LGBTQ+ collection, which preserves papers, photographs and other significant contributions of LGBTQ+ activists in Maine dating back over 50

Susie R. Bock, Coordinator of Special Collections and Director of the Jean Byers Sampson Center for Diversity in Maine at USM, will discuss the work of the Center and spotlight some of the images in "Act Up Fight Back Take Pictures: Ten Years of Queer Activism in Maine," a collection of photographs by Annette Dragon taken during the 1990s, when HIV/AIDS activism and non-discrimination protections in Maine law were prominent concerns.

Megan MacGregor, Instruction and Outreach Librarian at USM, will discuss the importance of the LGBTQ+ collection and its impact on a variety of audiences. She will also field questions from

attendees during the Oct. 27 online event.

Wendy Chapkis, Ph.D., Professor of Sociology and Women & Gender Studies at USM, will discuss "Querying the Past," an oral history project that now features recorded interviews with over 100 LGBTQ+ individuals in Maine. Dr. Chapkis will discuss the unique role oral history plays in giving voice to individuals who might otherwise be overlooked in the narrative of a civil rights movement.

The event will also feature Steven G. Bull, longtime social activist whose LGBTQ+ activism dates back over 50 years, when in 1973 he co-founded the Wilde-Stein Club at the University of Maine in Orono, as well as one of Maine's earliest LGBTQ+ publications, the Maine Gay Task Force Newsletter, launched in 1974.

New Ventures Maine launches mini-grant competition

AUGUSTA, Ventures ME-New Maine (NVME) has announced open applications for their statewide Marketing 2023 Fall Mini-Grant Competition.

The NVME Marketing Mini-Grant Program aims to strengthen access to markets for micro-businesses by supporting the development of marketing tools, materials, and activities. NVME will award cash mini-grants-up to \$1,000 per region (defined below)-to microenterprises for marketing projects through a competitive application process. Applications are due Friday, November 3, 2023.

Eligible applicants include individual miowners. cro-business business partners. or groups of business owners. Businesses apply to the region in which they are based (see below for details).

Application criteria include: 1) Five or fewer full-time equivalent employees; 2) sales in the current calendar year; and 3) gross annual sales of no more than \$150,000 (previous calendar year).

LEWISTON, ME – Absentee ballots for the City Candidate and State Referendum election on Tue., Nov. 7, are now available for Lewiston voters from the City Clerk's Department at City Hall, 27 Pine St., 2nd Floor. The statewide deadline to request an absentee ballot is 4 PM, Thu., Nov. 2.

All pending requests for absentee ballots have been filled, and over 200 ballots have been mailed out.

Registered voters wishing to obtain an absentee ballot may order one via four methods:

Visit the City Clerk's Department - second floor - at Lewiston City Hall, 27 Pine Street, M-F between 8:30 AM and 4 PM.

Download an absen-

tee ballot application from the City's web site www. lewistonmaine.gov/absenteevoting and either mail the completed application or put it in the red drop box on the Park Street side of City Hall, 27 Pine Street.

Use the State of Maine Absentee Ballot Request online site www. lewistonmaine.gov/absenteestatelink

Call the Lewiston City Clerk's Department at 207-513-3124 to have an absentee ballot mailed to you.

In addition, commencing on Mon., Oct. 23, the Early Voting Polling Place will once again be open at Lewiston City Hall to allow voters to cast their absentee ballot in person. The site will be open through Nov. 2, excluding weekends. Hours will be 9 AM - 4 PM.

Races on this year's include Mayor, ballot School Committee At Large, City Councilor seats in all seven wards and School Committee seats in all seven wards. In addition, there are eight questions on the State ballot regarding Constitutional amendments and other items



AUBURN, ME --The Maine Franco-American Genealogical Society [MFGS] will hold its fall general meeting at 10 a.m. Saturday, October 21, in the Androscoggin Community Room of the Auburn Public Library, 49 Spring St., Au-

After the brief business meeting and light refreshments, our guest speaker David Chittim, Androscoggin Historical Society President, will present an overview of recent changes at AHS and explore some of the resources it has available for genealogical research. This is free and the public is welcome to attend both the business meeting and Chittim's presentation which will begin at 11 a.m.

The Historical Society has, as its mission, the collection, preservation and dissemination of history about Androscoggin County and the State of Maine. It maintains thousands of archival records, a research library containing upwards of a thousand volumes pertaining to local history, many hundreds of artifacts, and a small store featuring relevant items for sale. A stated goal of the new facility is to develop rotating thematic exhibits focused on a particular topic, era,

or geographic area so that there will always be something fresh for the public to view. It offers monthly programs on topics of general historical interest, walking tours related to architecture, historic points of interest, and local cemeteries. In addition, the Society sponsors six to eight open houses at the 1796 Knight House during the summer and invites school groups to experience a typical 1850 school day at its West Auburn Schoolhouse.

Chittim, a retired engineer and land surveyor, has actively served on the AHS Board as Treasurer for nine years and as President for the past two, guiding it through the transition from

its cloistered existence on the third floor of the County Building in Auburn to a new, accessible home in the heart of Lewiston. Although not yet fully open to the public, the new museum / library / research facility is accessible by appointment. The Society hopes to be open and fully operational in time to celebrate its 100th anniversary before the end of the year.

Always stay in the

kitchen while frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short time, turn off the stove.

Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove.

Have a "kid and petfree zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove or grill, and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Be alert! If you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol or medication, please don't use the stove or stovetop.

If you have a fire on the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled

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King: Helping older Maine people 'stand strong'

We all know the saying: 'an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.' Well, I've heard of too many older Maine people who have suffered from a household fall and then faced months of costly hospital visits and doctor's bills. So, in an effort to help older Maine people 'Stand Strong' throughout their golden years - while also saving theirs and taxpayers' dollars - I am working to provide Maine adults with cost-effective prevention measures and resources.

In 2021 alone, Maine had over 325 deaths from adult falls and our state ranked 8th highest in the nation per capita on the rate of deaths due to falls. When you look nationwide, over three million older people are treated in emergency rooms for falls on average, yearly. That is too many loved ones injuring themselves-or worse-from events that are entirely preventable.

The good news is that we have an 'ounce of prevention" approach to help Maine's older people. Last month, I introduced two bills as the 'Stand Strong' legislative package, which will directly address these challenges and ensure older Maine people have ac-

cess to preventative care resources. The 'Stand Strong' package is a combination of two bills: the Preventative Home Visits Act and the WELL Seniors Act. Together, these bills will expand Medicare benefits to help with home improvements, make telehealth more accessible and include comprehensive screenings during Medicare Annual Wellness Visits

'Stand Strong' interventions can be as simple as installing a grab bar or signing up for an exercise class that improves balance - and the cost-effectiveness is clear-cut. Hospitalizations are expensive, and the cost to Medicare and other payers to replace a hip can be tens of thousands of dollars. In terms of direct medical expenditures, falls cost our healthcare system \$50 billion annually, with 76% of that borne by Medicare and Medicaid. The CDC estimates that the 2014 total direct cost of treating non-fatal falls in Maine was \$255 million. However, direct costs do not account for the long-term effects of these injuries, such as disability, dependence on others, lost time from work and household duties, and reduced quality of life.

Telehealth has also

played a huge role in making sure Maine people stay healthy - especially for those of you who live in rural communities. In the past, many had to travel a half a tank of gas away to get care. All too often, I heard stories of people that decided to postpone the doctor's visit and cross their fingers for another couple of months. But today, more families across our state can regularly and conveniently attend doctor appointments online which is why these bills include telehealth provisions. So, the way I see it,

More than six million Americans-and 29,000 Mainers-are living with Alzheimer's. 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Seniors Not Acting Their Age Hiking the Scenic Mountains of Donnell Pond Public Lands



A series of long ledges lead to East Black Peak

For me, Labor Day marks the beginning of a change in my outdoor activities. Paddle sports are winding down and fall mountain hiking is gearing up. Not one to quickly surrender the joys of kayaking, for many years I've eased into the transition by planning what I call surf and turf outings. These adventures are loosely described as paddling to a secluded location and using it as base camp to climb mountains. I prefer to get my "mountain legs" by starting with smaller scenic peaks.

The picturesque mountains of Donnell Pond Public Lands meet that criterion. Located in central Hancock County near the Town of Franklin, the lands consist of over 14,000 heavily forested acres that include several rugged mountains enveloping isolated ponds and lakes. An extensive trail system meanders over and around the summits that dominate the conservation area. Numerous campsites have been established along the shores of the lakes and ponds.

While it's possible to connect with some mountain trailheads by road, the campsites can only be reached by hiking or watercraft. That's fine with me since I prefer to load my sea kayak and paddle to one of the remote locations. And, difficult access minimizes crowds.

One of my favorite encampments in the reserve is Schoodic Beach on the extreme southern shore of Donnell Pond. Maintained by the Maine Bureau of Public Lands, the long sandy beach offers several sites with picnic tables and toilets. Trailheads for Black and Schoodic Mountains begin at the beach and the paddling distance from a public landing in Franklin is about three miles.

A hiker reaches the barren summit of East Black Peak day weather forecast in expansive sandy be

day weather forecast in early September inspired me to invite several outdoor friends on a Donnell Pond surf and turf trip. Three of the usual suspects agreed to join me.

We met at the Franklin boat landing on the western terminus of Donnell Pond on a hot, steamy day with light winds predicted. Three of us were in solo sea kayaks while the fourth chose a canoe.

Paddling due east for a couple of miles towards prominent Caribou Mountain, we turned south into a narrow channel opposite Redmans Beach Campsites. A trailhead for Caribou Mountain starts at the beach. Our goal was the more impressive peaks farther south.

southerly direction, a gen-
tle tailwind helped pro-
pel us towards Schoodic
Beach. The distinctive
cliffs of Black Mountain
towered above our desti-
nation. Approaching the

expansive sandy beach, we spotted colorful tents on both ends. Fortuitously, ample space remained available in the center. We found an excellent shaded site with a picnic table.

After setting up tents and changing into hiking gear, the turf portion of our excursion began. Black Mountain Cliffs Loop Trail originates and ends at the beach. Hiking clockwise, we persisted steeply up the wooded northwest side of the cliffs and then along the rim.

Our map indicated it was 1.3 miles to a junction leading to Black and East Black Peaks. An unusual amount of time elapsed without locating the junction and then we began to descend. Consulting a GPS did not resolve the dilemma. We decided to backtrack. Fortunately, the well-concealed East Peak Trail was finally discovered.

Leaving the loop

trail, we progressed north over a hilly route to a rounded high point. Unmarked, it appeared to be the forested Black Mountain summit.

The path towards East Peak declined steeply to a soggy area and then ascended gradually over partially open rocky terrain. A series of long ledges led us to the spectacular barren summit. Although the skies were hazy, we enjoyed sweeping views of the surrounding area before beginning our return.

Following hours of hiking in hot humid weather, our trek ended with a very refreshing swim in the pond. Camping that night was idyllic.

After a leisurely breakfast the following morning, we completed a hike on exceptionally scenic Schoodic Mountain. The open summit offers marvelous views of the mountains of Mount Desert Island. A moderate headwind resulted in a challenging paddle during our return to the landing in Franklin. Ours was an extremely enjoyable excursion in an outdoor paradise.

\$287K for Maine mental health services

WASHINGTON, D.C. (September 21, 2023) – Today, U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King announced that the Maine Department of Health and Human Services (Maine DHHS) will receive a total of \$287,194 from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAM-HSA) Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (MHBG) program. This funding is part of the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act (BSCA), and is in addition to the more than \$4 million Maine DHHS will receive in Fiscal Year 2023 through the MHBG program.

"Mental health remains a critical component of overall community health," said Senators Collins and King. "This funding will help to enhance our state's capacity to address mental health challenges effectively while helping to ensure that every individual in our state has access to the support they need."

The MHBG program supports grantees in carrying out plans for providing comprehensive community mental health services. Specific targeted populations include adults with serious mental illnesses and children with serious emotional disturbances.

Senators Collins and King were key supporters of the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act, legislation that protects America's children, keeps our schools safe, and reduces the threat of violence across our country. The legislation included an expansion of children and family mental health resources and school-based mental health and supportive services.





GEAR UP Maine, run by UMaine Farmington and the non-profit Syntiro, has helped prepare Maine students for postsecondary education since 1998, in-

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cluding more than 29,000 students since 2007.

"For decades, GEAR UP has helped to provide a solid foundation for students across Maine who at times might have felt that opportunities for a postsecondary education were financially out of reach," the Maine delegation said. "By equipping our young people with the resources and guidance needed to build a brighter future we are, in turn, making investments in the future of Maine."

"We are incredibly pleased to have GEAR UP funded in Maine again," said Debbie Gilmer, GEAR UP Maine Project Director. "This multi-million dollar investment in youth from Maine's most rural and economically disadvantaged communities, including a GEAR UP scholarship program, will help address the inequities facing rural students, their families and their communities."

"The University of Maine at Farmington has a long history of supporting the success of students from rural communities, the first in their families to pursue postsecondary education and other underserved students. Over the last 25 years, the GEAR UP program has transformed the futures of thousands of Maine students by raising their aspirations and preparing them to affordably attend and complete college, helping more of Maine's young people reach their full potential through this proven program," said University of Maine Farmington President Joseph Mc-Donnell. "We are pleased that the U.S. Department of Education has agreed to fund this program to continue this work and grateful to Sens. Collins and King and Reps. Pingree and Golden for their ongoing

support of our partnerships with Maine students and schools."

GEAR UP Maine has prepared economically disadvantaged students in Maine for college by providing tutoring, mentoring, academic and career counseling, and exposure to college campuses since its establishment in 1998. Many of the participants of the program go on to earn college scholarships.

Over the course of seven years, the annual \$4 million grant funding will allow the program to follow cohorts of seventh graders through the first year of their post-secondary experience. GEAR UP Maine has 53 school partners located in Aroostook, Franklin, Hancock, Kennebec, Oxford, Somerset and Washington counties.

The Maine delegation has been supporting GEAR UP Maine for many years. In 2021, with the understanding of how many students GEAR UP supports, they challenged the Department of Education when it rejected UMaine's application for a renewed GEAR UP grant. They have also secured millions of dollars for the program in prior appropriations spending bills.

Maine gets \$272K for water quality monitoring at beaches

BOSTON, ME (August 11, 2023) - Today, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced a \$272,000 grant to the Maine Department of Environmental Protection to protect the health of beachgoers. This funding is part of \$10.6 million in grants, announced in May, to help coastal and Great Lakes communities. The funding will support water quality monitoring and public notification programs for beaches.

"With so many beach

closures across New England this summer, people want to know 'where can I go swimming in clean water?'," said EPA New England Regional Administrator David W. Cash. "Today's grant will advance environmental justice in communities vulnerable to and overburdened by water quality impacts by supporting critical monitoring and notification programs. We will continue to work closely with our state, municipal and local partners to deliver information that people need to make good decisions about their health. The results of monitoring can also help us enforce environmental laws and make investments, so beach closures become a thing of the past."

This grant helps fund programs to ensure that beachgoers know when our coastal waters are safe for swimming and recreation.

Under the Beaches Environmental Assessment and Coastal Health (BEACH) Act, EPA awards grants to eligible state, Tribal, and territorial applicants to help them and their local government partners monitor water quality at coastal and Great Lakes beaches. When bacteria levels are too high for safe swimming, these agencies or their local partners notify the public and post beach warnings or closings.

Since 2001, EPA has awarded nearly \$216 million in BEACH Act grants, including over \$25 million to New England states, and almost \$5.6 million to Maine, to test beach waters for illness-causing bacteria and help with public notification and identification of the problem. This program is essential for protecting the health of beachgoers across the country.

"With 3,500 miles of iconic and pristine coastline, Maine is a haven for beachgoers. Especially during the summer season that draws crowds from across the country, it's critical our beaches and waters are safe," said U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King and Representatives Chellie Pingree and Jared Golden. "The BEACH Act funding announced for Maine today will help better monitor water quality and inform the public of unsafe conditions, so Mainers and all who visit our state can safely enjoy all Vacationland has to offer."
