Groundbreaking community meeting held on development of Pleasant Hills golf course land

Councilperson Domingo Candelas initiated a new more extensive community vision process for Pleasant Hills development

By Kevin Larsen Special to the Times he former 114-acre Pleasant Hills golf course, which closed 20 years ago, is now scheduled to be developed.

The once popular and beloved golf course is one of the largest sites for development in San Jose in the past 15 years.

Located on White Road across from Lake Cunningham Park between Tully Road and Story Road, the site is currently under the jurisdiction of Santa Clara County.

4,000 residents

The future development of this land could create 4,000 residences and more than 700,000 square feet of commercial space including a public park. The public is encouraged to submit ideas for other possible infrastructure.

The entire project requires several community meetings to gain input from the public regarding ongoing planning.

Town Hall Meeting



San Jose City District 8 Councilmember Domingo Candelas did something unique by holding an early Town Hall meeting to provide an early preview of the important planning process. He set expectations for the entire community to know about the project so that important community input can take place.

The first meeting was held as an evening community event Thursday. October 12th at August Boeger Middle School. Candelas used Nextdoor.com, emails and other

ways of informing the public of this meeting to kick start the process of getting the public involved in the "future vision process." The seats were full in the cafeteria with more than 100 residents attending.





Downtown Ice returns to downtown San Jose holiday season with new operator

Utdoor ice skating will return to downtown San Jose's annual holiday celebration beginning Nov. 17.

Special Ice, which operates many rinks throughout the US, has agreed to produce and operate the downtown San Jose skating rink in the Circle of Palms Plaza this season, the San Jose Downtown Association announced Tuesday. The rink will operate from November through mid-January. Downtown Ice is supported by the City of San Jose.

"Downtown Ice is an iconic event that leaves a lasting impression," said Emery Lykins, president of Special Ice, based in Livermore. "We're excited to be a part of the rink's history, to contribute to this amazing city and hopefully usher

in a revitalized future for the rink."

"I am thrilled to have our iconic ice rink back alongside all the many fun holiday-related activities in downtown San Jose that enrich families and people of all ages," said Alex Stettinski, San Jose Downtown Association CEO. "People enjoyed roller skating, but we heard loud and clear that families and friends from all parts of Northern and Central California missed their tradition of coming to skate at our ice rink," said Tricia Lee McNabb, who has managed rink operations since 1997. "It's increasingly important that Downtown Ice keeps coming back, especially in the wake of Raging

Waters' recent closing," McNabb. In this case, Councilman Candelas pushed for a wide-open community meeting to better inform all residents about the process and to request that everyone have a say in what goes on. Also, the development is being developer driven rather than city driven so this is a unique process.

Forefront of planning

"I want to emphasize the vital role of community input in shaping the future of what happens at this site. My main goal is to inform and engage our community to be at the forefront of this entire vision," Candelas said. each." However, if some low-income residences are multistoried then perhaps prices will be lowered.

• The development will largely be market rates but also a mix of all income affordability.

• The City planner manager said the directive of the San Jose City Council is, "Don't just do what you have to, do more," for it's the philosophy of the City Council members in approving this project, meaning exceed bare requirements in all areas for the welfare of the general public.

• Construct multi-modal transportation improvements. There will be a lot of transportation improvements in the development and surrounding areas.

• The developer must fund a fiscal analysis of the development plan. This means, will this development be a net positive for the city or how will it impact the city finances. What will be the monetary impact for the city?

Community meeting set for January

It was stated by San Jose City Deputy Director of Planning, Michael Brilliot, that the first community meeting for this project will most likely be held January of 2024.

The second community meeting to take place in April or May the third community meeting perhaps in June 2024 and the 4th community meeting is not set yet.

The strategy is for the San Jose Planning Department to go to the City Council with

whatever has been established with the planning for the project in August of 2024 and ask for the City Council to accept the recommendations for this process to begin.

The contractor will present a general plan for example where the streets go, an environmental impact report will be done and the 114-acre area will be annexed into the City of San Jose, meaning the land will be overseen by the city.

The city planning department anticipates the project will be developed in parallel with this process of the City Council approval and perhaps in 2025 the proposal may go before the City Council for approval to begin.

"It may be four to five years before the ground breaks," stated San Jose City Deputy Director of Planning, Michael Brilliot. "It may be a number of years before the entire project gets built up from start to finish.



an José's Animal Care Center (SJACS), which has experienced years of staffing challenges, is caring for a record number of animals amid a nationwide

shelter crisis. Community concerns have been raised surrounding animal care and engagement with rescue partners and volunteers.

In response, San José Mayor Matt Mahan, Vice Mayor Rosemary Kamei, Councilmembers Bien Doan, Peter Ortiz and Omar Torres are calling for an objective and independent assessment of SIACS.

"Our animals can't speak for themselves – but luckily we have dedicated staff, volunteers, rescue partners and advocates who speak for them," said Mayor Matt Mahan. "This audit will add another voice to the conversation – an independent voice to evaluate concerns, see how our shelter stacks up against industry standards, and make sure we are pro-

viding the best care possible while our animals wait for their forever home."

The goal of this audit is to understand where improvements can be made,

and ideally result in what staff, volunteers, rescue groups and the community all want: the shelter to be the best that it can be, and provide the best care possible to the animals it serves.

"This audit will ensure that the public can have confidence in the services ACS provides and that we are able to respond to the present crisis judiciously," said Vice Mayor Rosemary Kamei.




