Prince takes reins of **Franklin County Democratic Party**

As the new chairman of the Franklin County Democratic Executive Committee, Trevor Prince plans to run it like a business, and that's likely a good thing for the local party.

Prince owns or co-owns three businesses, including Prince Title & Abstract, King & Prince, LLC (a construction/drywall company) and Prince Family Cleaning, a cleaning service for commercial and residential properties.

And the 24-year-old started each one with a business plan that's led to growth, exactly what he hopes to see for the party that controlled Franklin County politics as recently as 13 vears ago.

Annual event highlights NACOLG's impact in Franklin County

The Northwest Alabama Coucil of Local Governments (NACOLG), serves four other counties in addition to Franklin, but NACOLG's footprint here continued to grow in the past year.

NACOLG officials hosted their annual Fish Fry at the Sweet Water Depot in Florence. In addition to a good meal, the event is an opportunity to share regional collaboration and outreach efforts in Franklin, Marion, Winston, Lauderdale and Colbert Counties.

State legislators as well as local officials attended the event. Rep. Jamie Kiel attended the event and was impressed as to NACOLG's impact within his House District 18.

"NACOLG assists all of our smaller municipalities with grant writing. They are responsible for a large percentage of ADECA grants we bring back to Colbert and Franklin Counties," Kiel said.

"They also administer a program that helps families take care of their loved ones in the home rather than an earlier admission into a nursing home. The Medicaid Waiver Program saves our taxpayers money by providing much less expensive inhome care versus expensive nursing home care," Kiel added.

In Franklin County, NACOLG serves 339 Medicaid Waiver clients. NACOLG officials said the estimated



savings to Alabama taxpayers from 2020-2023 is \$27,000,000 by providing Medicaid Waiver.

Ăn additional \$140,589 was provided by NACOLG in meals for seniors and the SenioRX program, started through the efforts of the late Roger Bedford, Jr., helped seniors save \$1,679,108 on prescription drug costs.

NACOLG Executive Director Keith Jones said his council works well with Franklin County's legislative delegation of Kiel and Sen. Larry Stutts, along with local board members from Franklin County.

"Our team is grateful to play a small piece in a much larger puzzle. You can see by the impact report that we are all working well together to make things happen in Franklin County," Jones said.





Russellville. Politics is nothing new for Prince, who went door-to-door as a young boy campaigning with his father Anthony, who ran for Franklin County Revenue Commissioner in 2008.

Prince accepted the leadership position in the local Democratic Party because he embraces a challenge.

"I'm a member of the Church of Christ and I pray for opportunity in my life, not just success," Prince said. "I don't steer away from a challenge. I accepted this and the challenge now is to get quality Democratic candidates to run. But I do think that's a goal that can be accomplished."

Prince plans to share his message about the Democratic Party to younger voters and Hispanic residents in Franklin County.

"I do hope to work with the Hispanic population in our county to get them more involved in local poli-

tics. They do a lot for this community New Franklin County Democratic Party and a majority of residents in Russellville are Hispanic," Prince said.

Prince believes the fundamentals of the Democratic Party, at least at the local level, are the same as when Franklin County was represented by 100% local Democrats.

"When I talk with people, Republican or Democrat, we still likely share the same beliefs," Prince said. "I believe my fellow citizens of Franklin County probably believe the same things as I do," Prince said.

To orchestrate a Democratic comeback in Franklin County will take some time, but Prince is willing to be patient.

"We're working now to get quality candidates for local offices. We may



not win this cycle, but politics is cyclical, and might go in a different direction in six or eight years," Prince said.

Prince expressed his appreciation to outgoing chairman Eddie Britton after he was elected on September 28th.

"Eddie is a very intelligent person and he's helped me out tremendously since I've started. I couldn't ask for someone with a better history and understanding of the Democratic Party," Prince said. Qualifying for local and state

offices is underway and runs through Friday, November 10th.

Bobcats stay alive for playoff berth with win at Colbert **Heights**

The Phil Campbell Bobcats picked up their first region win on the road against the Colbert Heights Wildcats 32-27 last Friday.

Led by first year coach Jacob Hamilton, the team improved to 3-5 overall and 1-4 in Class 3A Region 8. The first quarter of the game ended with the Wildcats leading 6-0. The second quarter started with a 76-yard touchdown run by the Wildcats, who took a 12-0 lead. But Phil Campbell would soon answer. Hayden Wingo answered with a five-yard run and the two point conversion was good to bring the score to 12-8 with the Bobcats trailing.

The second half began with Wingo breaking loose for a 70 yard touchdown run. The two point conversion gave Phil Campbell the lead at 16-12.

Colbert Heights answered with a touchdown and converted the two point try to regain the lead at 20-16.

In the fourth quarter the Wildcats scored their last touchdown of the game to bring bolster their lead to 27-16.

But Logan Cooper and Wingo both found the end zone in the final six minutes as Phil Campbell took home a 32-27 win.

Wingo carried the rock 11 times for 121 yards and two touchdowns.

Isac Hill carried the ball five times for 57 yards. Cooper had one reception for 20 yards and a touchdown and Wingo had one reception for 15 yards and a touchdown. The Bobcats will face Clements this Friday, October 27 in another their final Region 8 matchup

"I'm excited about it, it's gonna be great competition for us. Clements is a good team, with an explosive offense. We have a chance to force a threeway tie for 4th place, so our kids are locked in and focused on the task at hand. It's going to be a great, competitive game," Hamilton said.

Russellville head coach John Ritter was asked about hosting Fairview next week and keeping his team focused.

"It's for the Regional Championship, that's enough said. They are a real-

ly good team, a really physical team and you know I don't think we really have to say anything special or do anything special to keep our guys focused this week," Ritter said.

Coach Ritter was asked about the impressive play from the offense and the defense, which limited Ardmore to 66 total yards.

Each of these 10 runners earned Elite Runner honors in the Athens Bible Invitational. Tharptown participated in the 1A-3A division, which included several larger schools Wildcat runners left in their wake.

For Mitchell, it's not a matter of if, but when, he breaks his own school record of 16:44:92 in the 5K. For you statistics junkies, that's an average of 5.30 minutes per mile in the 3.1 mile event.

Last Saturday, Mitchell and the Wildcats competed in the James Clemens High School Under the Lights Festival at Madison's Palmer Park.

That's where Mitchell ran his career-best 16:44:92, breaking his previous school record for the fifth time.

"He's worked extremely hard to get into the 16s," said Baker, who took over the program after Joseph Brown resigned to accept a coaching position at Northwest Shoals Community College.

"Early in the year, getting into the 17s was his benchmark. Now that he's broken into the 16s, he's real close, if not already past, the county record," Baker added.

Tharptown's boys varsity finished fourth overall at the October 21st event. Top five times came from Mitchell, Quintero, Vela, Garcia and Ricky Santibanez.

The Wildcats will compete Thursday, Oct. 26th in the Northwest Alabama Championships at Oakville.
