Rising Cyber threats to seniors spark community response: The birth and journey of Cyber-Knights

ongressman Jimmy Panetta has awarded Almaden resident Shreyas Kapavarapu The Congressional Award, an honor celebrating America's young people's initiative, service, and accomplishments.

Kapavarapu, a senior at Basis Independent Silicon Valley High School and a representative of Cyber-Knights, was recognized for its work enhancing cybersecurity awareness among seniors in San Jose in just 20 months' time.

Through strategic collaborations and extensive outreach, the organization educates seniors on crucial cyber safety topics.

Reacting to the alarming rise in cybercrimes driven by personal experiences, local advocates shifted their focus from debate forums to real-world problems.

Last year, a local resident's grandmother became a victim of a cyber scam, losing her private banking information. Sadly, her ordeal was not unique.

The 2022 FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center Report disclosed alarming statistics: a sharp 84 percent increase in cyber threats targeting seniors from the previous year, affecting over 88,000 elderly individuals and causing a financial blow of \$3.1 billion.

Recognizing the acute vulnerability of seniors in an increasingly digital society, they took upon the mission of cybersecurity education for the elderly. Preliminary research indicated that awareness programs might slash the susceptibility of See CYBER KNIGHTS, page 3

Senate Bill 10 & unhoused persons discussed by current and former State **Senators Dave Cortese and Jim Beall**

By Denelle Fedor Special to the Times he Almaden Valley Com-

munity Association (AVCA) hosted their monthly general meeting Monday, October 9 with keynote speakers - former State Senator representing District 15 and current Santa Clara Valley Water District Board Director, Jim Beall and current State Senator, Dave Cortese who replaced Jim Beall when he was elected in 2020.

Senator Cortese discussed a variety of issues, including the status of the on-going investigation of organized crime that has run rampant which resulted in defrauding funds from the Office

of Employment Development Department (EDD) during COVID in 2020 and thereafter.

Senator Cortese spoke about his Senate Bill 10 which he authored which would require all California public schools to provide training to all school employees on life-saving responses regarding the increase in opioid, fentanyl and overall drug use under a formal plan known as the Comprehensive School Safety Plan (CSSP). Cortese's legislation would also create a state framework for parents and students to be educated about the current and growing risk of fentanyl exposure and See BILL 10, page 3

Continued from page 1 use resources to help prevent and stop widespread drug abuse.

Senator Cortese shared that fentanyl deaths have increased 863% from 2018 to 2021 in Santa Clara County. Further, the senator shared that fentanyl was the cause of 20% of the deaths of young adults 25 years of age and younger. SB 10 is named after a 15-year-old young girl, Melanie Ramos who died of a fentanyl overdose in her high school bathroom in Hollywood. Melanie did not know she took fentanvl.

senator received The bipartisan support with 80 votes in favor and 0 votes

against SB 10 to move Cortese's bill to Governor Newsom's desk for signature. Governor Newsom signed SB 10 into law on October 13, 2023.

In March of this year, Senator Cortese, called for an audit of the City of San Jose Housing Department's Homeless Program. Senator Cortese's request transitioned to a bipartisan proposal co-authored by Senator Rosilicie Ochoa Bogh (R-Yucaipa), Senator Roger Niello (R-Fair Oaks), Assemblymember Evan Low (D-San Jose) and Assemblymember Josh Hoover (R-Folsom).

Cortese shared what prompted his audit request. "I went on a tour of Columbus Park in San Jose with Gail Osmer, a homeless advocate. I saw garbage that was not picked up, rats running around and unhoused people living in tents within the filth," Cortese explained. "I reached out to the City of San Jose City Manager asking her if she would support his request of an audit and she said she would. She also shared that the city has not spent any of the state funding at Columbus Park."

Cortese requested the California State Auditor to evaluate the City of San Jose's spending on unhoused individuals particularly with reports showing an increase in homelessness in San Jose. He shared that, "human suffering on our streets has persisted too long and we need to move unhoused people into shelters and provide supportive services."

Cortese originally asked that the audit be

completed by September of

2023 so that any recommendations could be implemented through the state budget or legislation. However, the audit is now expected to be completed in December 2023.

Beall discusses homelessness

Jim Beall, former State Senator representing District 15 who is now an elected Director for the Santa Clara Valley Water District, continued with the topic of homelessness in San Jose. In 2018, the Martin v.

Boise Federal Case passed and preempts all local laws. This case established into law that an unhoused person cannot be punished for sleeping outside on public property if there are not adequate alternatives available.

As a result, the Santa Clara Valley Water Board (SCVB) urged Assemblymember Ash Kalra to introduce AB 1469 which would allow the SCVB to use Measure S, which is a special tax voters passed in 2020 that provides \$500,000 annually to the SCVB for the cleanup of homeless encampments and debris on the waterways.

Beall spoke about the importance of the governor signing AB 1469 as the passage of this bill will allow SCVB the authority to work cooperatively with the County and City in having designated places for the unhoused to sleep, so that the SVSB can legally and compassionately remove unhoused people from creek beds and waterways. Governor Newsom signed AB 1469 on October 10, 2023. This law goes into effect on January 1, 2024.

This writer asked Director Beall if he would lead a Town Hall Meeting in partnership with Times Media to review the Homeless Audits recommendation regarding the City of San Jose homeless. I suggested that the homeless monies the City of San Jose receives from the state (from the \$20 billion fund) be earmarked to pay for the recommendations put forth in the audit.

seniors to cyberattacks by a notable 45 percent.

Backed by a tech caregiver certification from the distinguished American Air Force Association's cybersecurity division, the Cyber-Knights initiative was born. What began as a small-scale neighborhood awareness campaign swiftly morphed into a community-wide movement.

Over the span of 20 months, with strategic collaborations with the San Jose Parks & Recreation Department and CyberSenior.org, the team tailored educational resources. Their efforts reached 2.500 seniors across 60 percent of senior centers in San Jose, elucidating key cyber safety areas ranging from phishing threats to secure internet practices.

In recognition of these commendable volunteer efforts, the leader of Cyber-Knights was recently honored with the Gold Service Award by the congressional award team. The success of Cyber-Knights is attributed to its holistic approach-right from forging strategic collaborations to simplifying the labyrinth of cybersecurity terminologies for seniors. The commitment to seniors' digital safety remained non-negotiable, emphasizing clarity in communication and continuous content relevance.

Cyber-Knights' growth underscores the community's resilience in facing challenges head-on and the value of collective efforts. The organization's journey is a beacon, highlighting the importance of adaptability, community collaboration, and unwavering determination in catalyzing societal transformative change.

Valley Water holds groundbreaking to acknowledge completion of South County Recycled Water Pipeline

alley Water held a groundbreaking event Oct. 4 to acknowledge the completion of the South County Recycled Water Pipeline Project.

The project expands the distribution of recycled water service to new customers in South Santa Clara County and supports future system expansion opportunities. The additional 3.5 miles of pipeline constructed will also serve as backup to the existing system to help ensure recycled water deliveries during emergencies or outages.

The United States Bureau of Reclamation awarded Valley Water a \$5.7 million grant to help reduce the project's \$23 million cost.

With a hotter and drier climate and extended droughts, water supplies are becoming scarce. Recycled water is a drought-resistant supply of water used for landscaping, agriculture and industrial needs, which helps increase drinking water supplies in Gilroy, Morgan Hill and the unincorporated area of San Martin.

Valley Water was joined at the groundbreaking event by its partner agencies, the South County Regional Wastewater Authority, the City of Gilroy and the City of Morgan Hill.

Local students among National Merit semifinalists; High school seniors vying for \$28M in scholarships

D schools in Almaden Valley are semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program. The Almaden students are among 16,000 semifinalists across the nation — less than 1% of the nation's high school seniors — who will now be considered for more than 7,000 scholarships worth close to \$28 million next spring. Nearly 95% of semifinalists are expected to be named finalists, and approximately half of those finalists will earn a scholarship.

More than 1.3 million high school juniors in 21,000

high schools entered the competition through the 2022 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, or PSAT, which serves as the initial screening of program entrants. The semifinalists announced last week include the highest-scoring students in each state.

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Via del Oro property to host 150 beds as an emergency interim housing site

n Tuesday, the council agreed to accept the offer of John Sobrato, philanthropist, to use his property at Via del Oro (in D2/D10 EIH concentrated zone), for five years, to build 150 beds as an emergency interim housing site (EIH). Once opened, this EIH could help as many as 1,500 individuals transition into permanent housing.

The community has made it clear that by accepting this EIH, they expect their neighborhood currently with two encamp-

ments to improve. I agree. For this project to be truly successful, it must have a positive impact on the surrounding community/area. To achieve this, the Mayor and I wrote a memo asking for some concrete steps which was approved unanimously by the council. The concrete steps, include:

• Collect and share before and after data on the condition of the neighborhood surrounding the Via Del Oro EIH site for the purpose of ensuring the neighborhood has actually improved.

• Deliver enhanced blight services for areas surrounding the Via Del Oro site starting immediately, prior to the opening of the new EIH. (Jimenez BD #23)

• Prioritize this EIH for those in encampments closest to the Via Del Oro site. City staff have committed to this, but we need to make sure this really happens when the site is opened.

• Prevent re-encampment of areas cleared once those in the encampments closest to Via Del Oro have been relocated to the EIH.

This is the beginning, and not the end of the process and I appreciate your support and understanding as we navigate these challenges together. With the backing of key figures, including Mr. Sobrato, and Joanne Price from Dignity Moves, I am committed to working with the community, the Mayor, my fellow city councilmembers, and city staff, in making the area around the Via Del Oro site an encampment-free zone. I firmly believe that together we are on the path to making a safer, cleaner community for everyone.

San José Mayor and council members call for audit of San José animal care and services

an José's Animal Care Center (SJACS), which has experienced years of staffing challenges, is caring for a record number of animals amid a nationwide shelter crisis. Community concerns have been raised surrounding animal care and engagement with rescue partners and volunteers.

In response, San José Mayor Matt Mahan, Vice Mayor Rosemary Kamei, Councilmembers Bien Doan, Peter Ortiz and Omar Torres are calling for an objective and independent assessment of SJACS.

"Our animals can't speak for themselves – but luckily we have dedicated staff, volunteers, rescue partners and advocates who speak for them," said Mayor Matt Mahan. "This audit will add another voice to the conversation – an independent voice to evaluate concerns, see how our shelter stacks up against industry standards, and make sure we are providing the best care possible while our animals wait for their forever home."

The goal of this audit is to understand where improvements can be made, and ideally result in what staff, volunteers, rescue

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TECH JARGON OF THE WEEK Prompt Engineering

acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words: **Prompt Engineering**

Prompt engineering is a mode of interaction between a human and a large language model that lets the model generate the intended output. This interaction can be in the form of a question, text, code snippets or examples.

An AI model can provide several outputs based on how the prompt is phrased, which can be as simple as a word or as complex as a paragraph. The prompt's objective is to provide the AI model with sufficient information so it can produce output pertinent to the prompt.

In short, prompt engineering acts as a placeholder where the inputs are fed to generative AI applications, such as chatbots.

Why do AI models need Prompt engineering?

Prompt engineering has relevance across multiple AI use cases like text generation, language translation, providing informative responses to questions. Some of the needs of Prompt Engineering are listed below:

• Accuracy of responses: An effectively created AI prompt conveys a user's intent to the AI model, which in turn generates precise, accurate and useful responses.

• Enhanced performance: When prompts are used effectively, it saves time and resources because user tasks are finished quickly, increasing output and performance.

• **Better user experience:** Well-crafted prompts optimize the user experience by letting users easily extract the desired information from the AI model. This improves the user experience and the perceived value of AI systems.

• Enhanced decision-making: Users can make informed decisions more quickly if they receive timely and accurate information via effective AI prompts. This can benefit both individual productivity and organizational decision-making processes.

How does it work?

Whenever an AI model is given a prompt, it goes through the patterns it has learned in its training data -- which can include large data sets -- to generate a response that's contextually relevant to the input. This process is referred to as inference and involves computing the probabilities of various word sequences and correlations based on both the prompt and the training data.

For a prompt to successfully generate the desired output, it must be highly specific. For example, a prompt such as "Write an essay" will produce generic results. However, offering precise details such as the essay type, topic, tone, target audience and word count generates the desired output. Specificity in AI prompts also removes the chances of inaccurate responses.

In next week's article, we shall go into the details of creating these Prompts. So stay tuned!
