Meth seized and arrest

On October 17, the Aitkin-Itasca-Mille Lacs Violent Crimes Enforcement Team (AIM VCET) executed search warrants in the City of Aitkin pertaining to the trafficking of methamphetamine.

Through investigative measures, AIM VCET had identified Lucas Peifer, 44 of Sauk Centre as a source of methamphetamine to several Northern Minnesota

communities in Aitkin, Itasca and St. Louis Counties. Over two pounds of methamphetamine were seized along with \$7,000 in cash.

Peifer was taken into custody without incident and is being held in the Aitkin County Jail on charges of 1st Degree Possession of a Controlled Substance and 1st Degree Sales of a Controlled Substance.

Secretary Simon stands in support

Keith Ellison announced [Oct. 20] that his office has intervened in two cases at the Minnesota Court of Appeals in support of writs of prohibition against Mille Lacs County District Court Judge Matthew M. Quinn. In a total of at least six cases, Judge Quinn has sentenced people convicted of felonies to probation — then has issued an order that declares Minnesota's new Restore the Vote law unconstitutional and bars them from exercising their legal right to vote. This flies in the face of the new law (Minn. Stat. §201.014, subd. 2A (2023)), which clearly says a person with a felony conviction "has the civil right to vote restored during any period when the individual is not incarcerated for the

"Judicial restraint and respect for the separation of powers are essential principles of our justice system. When either of those principles is violated, Minnesotans lose trust in the system — and Judge Quinn has violated both principles," Attorney General Ellison said. "I support a writ of prohibition as the best option for quickly keeping Judge Quinn from further violating our justice system and Minnesotans' trust."

Attorney General Ellison continued, "It took two decades to pass a law to restore the right to vote to people who are longer incarcerated, and the new law that restores that right is fully constitutional. Minnesotans should know Judge Quinn's illegal orders have no effect on their voting rights. I strongly encourage all eligible Minnesotans — especially those no longer incarcerated — to fully exercise their right to register to vote and to vote. The health of our democracy depends on the full participation of every eligible voter - no exceptions."

At the same time, Secretary of State Steve Simon stood with Attorney General Ellison to offer support for these legal efforts as well as to defend the right to vote for all eligible Minnesotans.

"We cannot allow for any distortion of the rules for voter eligibility in Minnesota. Local elections in communities across Minnesota will take place in just 18 days — on November 7. And voting in Minnesota's 2024 presidential nominating primary starts just 13 weeks from today — on January 19," Secretary Simon said. "Minnesota has a proud tradition of showing up at the polls in nation-leading numbers, and I know that will continue."

Two of the individuals that Judge Quinn has unlawfully prohibited from exercising their legal right to vote have filed for a writ of prohibition at the Court of Appeals. A writ of prohibition is appropriate when a district court exceeds its authority and causes an injury for which there is no other speedy or adequate remedy. Writs of prohibition serve as a check on the improper exercise of judicial power and are warranted to prevent a district court from violating separation-of-powers principles.

Late [on Oct. 19], Attorney General Ellison's office filed notices to intervene in those cases and filed memorandums in support of the writs of prohibition. In the filings, Attorney General Ellison argues that Judge Quinn abused his authority in ruling the Restore the Vote law unconstitutional. Courts are supposed to be neutral decision-makers and decide the issues that parties raise. Courts are not supposed to independently raise and decide issues on their own. Judicial restraint is especially important when addressing the constitutionality of a statute. Statutes are presumed constitutional; it is a very high bar to hold otherwise. Moreover, when the constitutionality of a statute is challenged, the Attorney General must be notified and provided with an opportunity to defend the statute.

Judge Quinn, however, in the context simply of sentencing people convicted of felonies, ruled the law unconstitutional without prompting, without the question having been

notice to the Attorney General, the Secretary of State, or other appropriate authorities. But a sentencing court has no discretion whatsoever over voting rights: only the Legislature decides when the right to vote may be restored, and the court plays no role. Voting rights are not up for

debate in a criminal sentencing. Attorney General Ellison additionally argues that Judge Quinn is wrong on the law and that the Restore the Vote law is in fact constitutional

The Minnesota Constitution is clear: people with felony convictions cannot vote "unless otherwise restored to civil rights." The Minnesota Supreme Court has made it clear this phrase means the government can restore rights through legislation. The Supreme Court affirmed that principle just this year in an important case called Schroeder v. Simon.

For more than 150 years, the Minnesota Legislature has decided when and how to restore voting rights to people who have served their sentences for felony convictions. Every time in that the Legislature has revised the mechanism for restoring felon voting rights, it has expanded those rights. The Restore the Vote Act the Legislature passed this year is firmly in that long tradition and is entirely constitutional.

- Memorandum Supporting Writ of Prohibition in In Re April Sky Weyaus
- Notice of Intervention in In Re Emilio Andres Trevino vs. State of Minnesota
- Memorandum Support Writ of Prohibition in In Re Emilio Andres Trevino vs. State of Minnesota

The Court of Appeals is expected to act quickly on the writs of prohibition.

Rep. Davis legislative update

Republican legislators recently invited school staff, law enforcement and others to the Capitol for a meeting as we aim to fix a law that has left dozens of Minnesota schools without school resource officers.

The issue centers on a change in state law Democrats enacted last spring which limits how SROs are allowed to de-escalate aggressive or violent situations, taking away tools they can use to keep students and teachers safe. Concern and confusion ensued with the start of the new school year, causing dozens of law enforcement agencies to pull SROs from schools across

The issue has been further muddled by public officials offering contradictory opinions of what the new law means, including differing interpretations from Attorney General Keith Ellison and Hennepin County Attorney Mary Moriarty.

This lack of clarity and differing interpretations underscores the importance of a legislative

fix, but Democrat leaders have ignored repeated requests from Republicans to conduct public hearings to seek solutions.

Reports show 90 percent of students agree it is a good idea to have an SRO or police officer at their school. That speaks volumes regarding the service SROs provide and how much students appreciate them. The safety of our children is at stake here and we cannot afford for Democrats to continue burying their head in the sand on this issue, as if it will just go away on its own. In fact, this problem is not going to go away until SROs are fully restored in schools they'd been serving.

I attended the meeting and said he appreciated the insight testifiers provided. One person we heard from is the president of the National SRO Association and an assistant police chief for Golden Valley. For someone with those credentials to emphasize how this new law not only puts children, teachers and staff at risk, but also puts officers at risk, really hit home.

Other testimony presented during the committee painted a picture of how the new law is compromising safety in schools. An official from the Riverbend Education District in South Central Minnesota said, "My staff is on a daily basis, having their classrooms completely destroyed by students. We have police officers in town going, 'Not our area, we don't get involved." A retired teacher indicated, "I can't imagine being a teacher when things get a little riled up. And there's not an SRO to calm that situation down."

We need to fix this problem in a special session. We can't have Democrats drag this out any longer and continue causing our children's safety to be compromised.


Donna is survived by her three sons and spous-

Emerald Ash Borer found in Cass

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture announced that Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has been found in a cluster of trees near Remer, in Cass County. An Agriculture Department employee spotted signs of EAB in the trees and was able to locate larvae and collect samples. Federal identification confirmed emerald ash borer. It is the first presence of EAB in Cass County, which makes 45 counties in Minnesota with EAB.

"I ask everyone to be vigilant and take precautions to help limit the spread of this destructive pest," Senator Justin Eichorn (R-Grand Rapids) said. "Make sure to properly dispose of ash wood, follow wood quarantine guidelines, and report any signs of infestation to the Minnesota Department of Agriculture. Let's do everything we can to keep it contained and limit the impacts of EAB in our community."

Since this is the first time EAB has been identified in Cass County, The Department of Agriculture instituted a standard emergency quarantine. This limits the movement of firewood and ash material out of the area to reduce the risk of spread.

The south and east side of

the quarantine is the county border. The northern edge of the quarantine follows Minnesota Highway 200 west to County Road 129, County Road 129 south to County Road 7, and County Road 7 west to Minnesota Highway 84. The western border of the quarantine is Minnesota Highway 84 to County Road 79 and east to the county line

The Agriculture Department will also be hosting a virtual meeting for residents to discuss the discovery of EAB. There will be a brief presentation by Ag Department staff and tree care professionals followed by a Q&A:
