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

Good Shepherd Catholic Church holds dedication for beautiful new building

With meteoric growth the past decade or so, the congregation of Russellville's Good Shepherd Catholic Church needed a church building well beyond the old 175-person church capacity.

Along with some private donors, the Good Shepherd membership responded to that need and the result is a beautiful new church building that can house up to 500 people for a service. The new church was a \$3 million project and according to Good Shepherd Catholic Church's Very Rev. Vincent Bresowar, the new building was paid for before it was formally dedicated last Saturday, October 28th.

"Yes, it is paid for," Bresowar said. "We did a lot of events and fund raising, including food festivals. We also went out and were able to solicit donors from the community and from various parts of our diocese.'

Saturday's dedication service was a major event for the church, and is a prerequisite under Catholic doctrine

Local Democratic Party seeking candidates for 2024 election

The Franklin County Democratic Party is looking for a few good men (and women) to run for local office in the March 5, 2024, primary election.

The Franklin County Demoratic Committee Executive met September 28th to set a date for qualifying for local offices. Qualifying opened September 29th and runs through Friday, November 10th at 5

The committee also set qualifying fees for local offices, including Probate Judge (\$300), Franklin County Superintendent of Education (\$290), Franklin County Board of Education (\$50) and Franklin County

Commissioner (\$100).

Candidates who are not financially able to pay the qualifying fees may request a hardship waiver and the committee may waive those fees.

four Franklin County Commission seats will be on the March 5, 2024 ballot, along with Probate Judge, Franklin County Circuit Judge, District Judge, Board of Education Districts 1 and 4 and Franklin County Circuit Clerk.

New Franklin County Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Trevor Prince said the party is actively recruiting candidates to run in each local office election. But that may be easier said than done, as Republicans hold every Franklin County office except for



before a new church can be used for services.

There was a procession from the old building to the new church, where the Bishop received a key to the new church.

"He consecrates it, blesses it and there's a long ceremony after that," Bresowar said. "After that, we have mariachi music, dancing and food. It's

like a festival afterwards. "This is a big day and a great day of celebration. It only happens when you build a new church, so it's a special dav." he added.

Up until this week, the church held four services each weekend, three in Spanish and one English service.

"We regularly have approximately 1,200 at mass every weekend," Bresowar said.

as seating capacity is three times that of the old building. Construction began in October 2021 and was completed in two years, not a bad time frame for a project in the COVID-19 era.

When Bresowar came to Good Shepherd eight-and-a-half years ago from Holy Spirit Catholic Church in Huntsville, a new building wasn't something he thought about. But that soon changed.

"Around five years ago we really came to the understanding that (a new church) had to happen for this community because it just keeps growing," Bresowar said.

The growth speaks well of the church staff, which includes Jazmin Ambrosio (Parish Secretary) and Flor Solorzano (Director of Religious Education). And it's been noticed by city leaders and residents.



The cause of two recent power outages for Russellville Electric Board customers was revealed to be Sciuromorpha, better known as the modern squirrel, according to Manager Charles Canida.

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At the October 24th meeting of the Russellville Electric Board, Canida said the power outage that occurred earlier that day, along

with the one on October 14th that interrupted Alabama Crimson Tide fans' viewing of Bama's game against Arkansas, both resulted from 24131 Hwy 24 • Russellville a squirrel climbing on a busbar at the REB Substation on South Jackson Avenue.

"It was on the buss work and there's really no way to make that squirrel-proof, Canida told the board. "At 8:45 this morning, you and everybody are aware we had a squirrel get into the substation across the road here.

"Power was restored approximately nine minutes later. Ironically, the squirrel went into the exact location a squirrel went into 10 days ago on October 14th. The dead squirrel this time was laying in about the same place. It's just crazy," he added.

Canida said there is no way to make the buss work 'squirrel proof,' but REB tree trimmers did clear brush and some smaller trees from the west side of the substation in an effort to deter squirrels from coming to the area.

"If you look at a squirrel's habits and read up on it, mid-fall to late fall is when they move the most, gathering nuts and stuff," Canida said. "Maybe it was going up there to hide a nut somewhere, I don't know. It's just ironic it happened 10 days apart."

Canida also attributed a power outage on East Lawrence Street on October 24th to a squirrel walking on power lines across from Innovative Hearth Products.

"It took power off to the few homes across the street from IHP. I'm not a squirrel fan," Canida said. "They cause most of our outages."

Canida did not address why REB's second substation on Walnut Gate Road did not provide power to city customers when the first substation went out.

Former REB Chairman Darren Woodruff said he was on the board when funding for the second substation was approved. Woodruff said Canida assured the board a second substation would provide uninterrupted power in the event of a problem at the South Jackson Avenue substation, or vice-versa.

"That's exactly what he told us and it was the primary reason I supported building a second \$10 million substation," Woodruff said.

In addition to hearing Canida's squirrel update, the board also heard from Chasity Sweatmon of the Cullman based Fricke & Sweatmon, CPA, who performed the board's annual audit.


Overall the board had a \$37,000 profit or increase in net assets for last year. The board improved in your financials overall," Sweatmon

Although the board's assets increased last year, there was no mention by Canida or board members about lowering electric rates. The board approved a 3.1% increase in rates last year, with Canida citing 'declining revenue' as the reason for the increase.

In other agenda items, the board:

--approved paying a prorated share of a year-end bonus for employees in the Russellville Utilities office. The office staff is jointly employed by the three city utilities.

--voted to make Columbus Day a holiday for all REB employees starting in 2024.

Northwest Shoals Community College (NWSCC) will host over 200 students from 15 area schools for the 2023 Northwest Alabama BEST (Boosting Engineering, Science and Technology) Robotics Game Day this Saturday, November 4th, in the Patriot Center (gym) on the Shoals Campus.

Game Day will begin with the team parade and opening ceremonies for fans at 9 a.m., and conclude at approximately 4:15 p.m. with the awards ceremony. It will be free and open to the public.

The BEST Robotics season kicked-off Saturday, September 9th, on the Shoals campus for all area teams. The theme for this year's competition is Incision Decision, which is about robotics-assisted healthcare. Elementary, middle and high school student teams have been working on their robot design & engineering process. The top nine teams will advance to South's BEST Regional Championship at the University of North Alabama on December 1-3, 2023.

In addition to the Robotics game challenge, the students must compile a comprehensive Project Engineering Notebook, and are encouraged to develop an entire "company" around their product. The teams have the option to compete in an oral marketing presentation, to design and build a trade show exhibit, a website, a video commercial for their product, t-shirt designs and more. Many components of the competition are done throughout the week. Saturday will be the finale of the 2023 Northwest Alabama Hub's BEST season. Both the robot performance and team exhibits will be judged on Saturday.

Three fourth quarter TDs earn Hatton a win over Red Bay

The Red Bay Tigers fell to Class 2A Region 8 opponent Hatton last Friday night 36-24, in the region finale for both teams.

The Hatton Hornets finished 3rd in 2A Region 8 while Red Bay was fourth. That means both teams are playoff bound but will open up with road games.

The Tigers are 5-4 overall and finished 3-3 in region play.

The scoring started with a one-yard touchdown run by Red Bay's Gage Edgmon and a successful two point conversion by Jaxon Vinson. The Tigers led 8-0 early in the second quarter.

The Hornets answered with a touchdown late in the second quarter. The two-point try failed and Red Bay carried a 8-6 lead into halftime.

Hatton had the only score of the third quarter with 4:09 remaining. The two-point try failed but the Hornets had their first lead at 12-8.

Forty seconds into the fourth quarter, Vinson scored a on a 10-yard touchdown run and Holden Inmon got the two point conversion, as the Tigers regained the lead 16-12.

Hatton would score on its next three possessions, though, en route to outscoring Red Bay 24-16 in the final 12 minutes.

The Tigers' final points came from Vinson on a three-yard run and he also ran in the two point try. Vinson ended the game with two touchdowns and 156 yards rushing on 26 carries.

Edgmon finished 8-21 with an interception. He scored a second quarter touchdown on a one-yard

On defense, Keeton Lanphear and Eli Farris each had nine tackles Will West had eight tackles for the Tigers' defense.

The Tigers will face travel to Phil Campbell this Friday, November 3rd in one of the biggest county rivalry games.

It was also a good night for Macey Welborn, who was crowned Phil Campbell's 2023-2024 Homecoming Queen.

Clements got on the board first, scoring on a 10 yard touchdown run, making the score 6-0.

The Bobcats managed to bounce back and score on a five yard run by Hayston Scott, making the score 8-6 after a two-point conversion.

The Colts scored one more time before the half on a six yard touchdown run, regaining the lead to 14-8.

Phil Campbell came out of halftime scoring on a 56-yard touchdown run by Braxton Mayfield, making the score 14-14.

Clements responded by taking the kickoff back 75 yards to lead 22-14.

The Bobcats scored on a one yard touchdown run by Scott, tying the game up at 22-22.

Phil Campbell scored again on a 22-yard touchdown run by Hayden Wingo, with a two-

point conversion to make it 30-22.

The Bobcats' head coach Jacob Hamilton was asked about Wingo's performance over the past couple of weeks.

"I've been very impressed with Wingo. He has really turned it on in the second half of the season. We had started him out at tight end, but figured out we needed to



get the ball in his hands more and he's become our go to guy offensively. He's all in, plays hard both ways and has become a major impact player for us. I am very proud of him," Hamilton said.

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'Continued improvement' a theme of Red Bay, Phil Campbell seasons as teams set to clash in regular season finale

With both Red Bay and Phil Campbell's varsity football teams heading to the playoffs next week, there's plenty of excitement surrounding the post-season.

But first, the teams have a Friday night date with each other, as the county rivals close out the regular season.

The Bobcats will host Friday's game, with kickoff at 7 p.m. Red Bay is looking to avenge last year's 24-16 loss on the Tigers' home field.

The Tigers have a 5-4 record, while the Bobcats are 4-5. Red Bay finished fourth in Class 2A Region 8 with a 3-3 record and will travel to Tuscaloosa Academy for an opening-round playoff game November 10th.

After a 44-36 win over Clements, Coach Jacob Hamilton's Bobcats are 5-4 and are likely in the fourth playoff spot in 3A Region 8, although a series of tiebreakers will make that official after this Friday's end of the regular season.

Red Bay lost to Hatton 36-24 last week, but it was another solid night for the Tigers' offense, which

amassed 367 total yards.

Sophomore running back Jaxon Vinson led the way on the ground with 156 yards on 26 carries, with two touchdowns and two two-point conversions.

Quarterback Gage Edgmon had a touchdown run and threw to Holden Inman for a two-point conversion

Defensively, Red Bay held the Hornets to only 82 rushing yards but the Tigers' secondary gave up

235 yards and two touchdowns. The Tigers were also penalized an eye-popping 12 times for 110 yards in the loss.

Coach Heath Childers said his team won't have any problem getting motivated this week for Phil Campbell even with a playoff game looming next Friday.

"We don't have any trouble getting the kids ready to play this game, just like Phil Campbell's kids feel the same way," Childers said. "It's an in-county rivalry and we've played each other for a really long time. Both teams are excited and will be ready to play Friday night."

Childers' review of Phil Campbell game film shows a team he says is well coached and plays hard every snap.

"First and foremost, Phil Campbell is a well coached team. The coaches over there do a good job coaching their kids up," Childers said. "The main thing that pops out in film is how hard their kids play. They play hard, they re hustling and they get after it every play. That's what you notice first is how hard they're playing and that's a credit to their coaches and players.'

While Red Bay is viewed as a ground-oriented offense, Childers said his team's biggest offensive performances included some big passing

"We're a little more balanced than we've been in the past. The real explosive games we've had, we did a great job of taking advantage of what they gave us in the passing game," Childers said.

"That's when you see us putting up a ton of points. It's always good to see, but we do need to be more consistent with the passing game and do a better job of taking what our opponents give us," he added.

Against Clements last Friday, it was the Hayden Wingo Show for the Bobcats.

The junior accounted for nearly 200 yards, including two touchdown runs of 22 and 53 yards. He also hauled in a 61-yard touchdown pass from Hayston Scott. Wingo finished with 100 rushing yards on nine carries and 96 receiving yards on only two catches.

Braxton Mayfield had a big night as well. He ran for 110 yards and a

touchdown on seven rushes. Scott went 3-3 with 124 yards through the air against the Colts.
