

# **Financial uncertainties loom for** local school systems with end of **COVID-19 ESSER funding**

A crowd of approximately 200 heard Franklin County's two school superintendents and the Dean of Academic Affairs for Northwest Shoals Community College discuss the state of their school systems at the Phil Campbell High School auditorium Thursday evening.

The annual event, sponsored by the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce, provides the public an update on the state of the two public

school systems and the county's only community college.

After a welcome from Chamber of Commerce Board President Matt Uptain and PCHS Principal Bart Moss, PCHS student Macey Welborn did the invocation, Jackson Clark led the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance and NWSCC student Eli Cooper performed the National Anthem.

The evening ended with the recognition of 17 educators named as Outstanding Employees for 2023.

# **14 Franklin County schools,** agencies receive combined **\$96.700 in RC&D grants**

On the same day officials from the Northwest Alabama Resource Conservation and Development Council (Northwest RC&D) announced a \$25,000 grant used to purchase new bleachers Tharptown Elementary School, representatives from several Franklin County non-profit and governmental agencies shared how last year's RC&D grants helped their organiza-

The annual announcement of completed projects from the previous fiscal year, 2022-23, was held at the Franklin County Courthouse Annex the afternoon of November 1st.

More than \$96,700 in grants were awarded to 14 agencies last year.

\$25,000 Community Development grant at Tharptown, first of the FY 2023-24 awards, will allow TES to have a central meeting place for students, parents and the community in the gymnasium.

Northwest Alabama RC&D is a 501(c)(3) non-profit that supports educational and community development projects in a five county area including Franklin, Colbert. Lauderdale, Marion and Winston counties.

RC&D councils are funded by the Alabama Legislature. Rep. Jamie Kiel attended Wednesday's event and discussed the impact made by RC&D in Northwest Alabama.

Superintendent of Education Heath Grimes went first and delivered what will be his final 'State of the Schools' speech as Grimes will retire from RCS

In his ninth year as superintendent, Grimes talked about the changes in the system over his tenure. Russellville's Hispanic enrollment continues to increase, up to 1,500 students from 1,300 a few years ago.

Russellville High School was ranked 18th among all Alabama public high schools earlier this year in an annual ranking from U.S. News & World Report. A significant reason for the high ranking, as well as RHS' 'A' score on the annual Alabama report card comes from its success in helping non-English speaking students become English proficient.

"We were the only school system with a Majority Minority District to earn an 'A' on the state report card," Grimes said. "And we also had the Alabama Middle School Principal of the Year in Tony Bonds."

West Elementary, Russellville Middle School and Russellville Elemenary Schools were each named Blue Ribbon Schools of Excellence this year.

But there's a potential cloud on the horizon when it comes to maintaining the teachers and aides who have been a big reason for the system's success with its Hispanic students.

Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds (ESSER), part of the massive American Relief Plan COVID 19 stimulus package, are going to end after the current school year.

"We are spending \$1.8 million in ESSER funding for retired teachers (doing part-time work), a social worker, staff accountant and 17 teachers and six English Language aides," Grimes said. "That money runs out after this year and it accounts for five teachers at Russellville Elementary, six at West Elementary, three at Russellville High School and three at the middle

"That's some significant revenue we need to fill next year. It will be a big challenge but we've talked about it for a couple years knowing this was coming," Grimes added.

RHS students took 492 AP exams with 130 qualifying scores last year. RHS had 25 AP Scholars, three AP Scholars with Honors, five AP Scholars with Distinction and one AP Capstone Diploma.

61% of RHS seniors took at least one AP exam during high school, with 30% of seniors scoring a three or higher on at least one AP exam. This is

another area the school scored well in as part of the high school rankings.

The RHS Class of 2022 had 70 different seniors receive 304 scholarships totaling more than \$2.558 million. And RHS was named the Number One high school in North Alabama for student academic and Career Technical dual enrollment with NWSCC.

"The state of Russellville City Schools is strong thanks to the people we have working here and the dedication of the faculty, administration, staff and our outstanding students," Grimes said. 0Franklin County Schools Superintendent Greg


Hamilton is in his seventh year as the head of the county's school system.

Hamilton began by expressing his appreciation for the working relationship his school system has with Russellville City Schools.

Franklin County Schools has 10 schools over six campuses. The system owns 71 buses, with 52 traditional routes, five technical routes and four special needs routes.

This year's enrollment is 3,473 students, a number consistent since 2020.

"We need to stay where we're at based RCS Superintendent Heath Grimes addresses the limited availability of space," Hamilton said.

Franklin County Schools' enrollment includes 20% Hispanic students, 70% White, 1.75% African American and eight percent classified as other.

The system's budget for FY2023-24 is \$55 million, an increase of more than \$14 million since FY2020-21.

The State Department of Education requires all public school systems to carry at least a one-month fund balance and Franklin County Schools and Russellville City Schools each have a carryover of significantly more than the minimum required.

But Hamilton said there are budget obstacles coming as a result of the end of ESSER funding.

"There is a \$2 million shortfall we have to come up with in Franklin County Schools," Hamilton said. "It's a very difficult situation."

Those shortfalls are in the area of special education (\$1.6 million) and funding for the system's 11 school nurses (\$500,000 shortfall).

There has been more than \$22 million in capital projects completed in Franklin County Schools since 2017. Current projects include the Belgreen High School stadium, the East Franklin Junior High gym and several others. Hamilton said Tharptown High School saw an increase of 10 points on its school report card from the previous year.

He anticipates the county will have 259 seniors graduating next spring. A Red Bay students earned a 34 on the ACT, the highest in the county.

He also mentioned student community projects including Vina High School Ambassadors distributing 4,500 food bags last Christmas.

"I'm very proud of what's going on in Franklin County Schools. We're in good financial shape right now but we're facing some challenges and have to adjust to it this year. It's not fun but that's the reality of where we are," Hamilton said.

presented by the Cattlemen's Association each year to local high school seniors. Cattlemen's Association representative Michael Pounders said the organization receives requests for smaller cookings and this

new grill will make it easier to cook at these events. -Phil Campbell Rescue Squad, \$5,000 for a rescue truck light tower. —Franklin County Emergency Managment Agency, \$8,400 for handheld thermal heat sensors.

"We needed infra-red cameras for our volunteer fire departments." said EMA Director Mary Hallman-

Each of the county's 14 fire departments received a camera. Additionally, a \$6,000 RC&D grant allowed Hallman-Glass to purchase 230 programmed weather radios that were distributed to residents in the East Franklin community.

 Russellville High School, \$10,000 for HVAC Program development. The grant was used for the purchase of training equipment for the new HVAC Career Tech program. This funded the purchase of refrigerant recovery and charging trainers that are instrumental to the program.

Russellville High School, \$5,000 for Outdoor Learning Program. These funds were used to purchase seating and tables for the outdoor classroom at RHS.

East Franklin Junior High School, \$14,931.52 for Chromebooks, tables, lockers and more equipment. Lockers were updated to allow students to get more out of their school day. Students will use the Chromebooks to enhance the quality of their education each day, officials said.

-ARTAG Robitics K-12 Teaching, \$5,000 for electrical safety testing to detect overloaded circuits and low conductivity electrical grounds. This equipment led to the discovery of 22 breakers that were warm to hot and nine electrical grounds in need of maintenance. ARTAG is a non-profit with four retired Tennessee Valley Authority engineers who check for hazards in wiring and to make sure the buildings are up to

-Phil Campbell FFA, \$5,000 for greenhouse irrigation system.

—Bear Creek Collaborative, \$5,000 for creating accessible outdoor learning. Funds were used to purchase computer hardware and software, t-shirts, printed materials, fishing gear, certifications and website hosting, allowing Bear Creek Collaborative to operate as an organization and reach more school systems and agencies to let them know about the redeveloped education center.

-ACES (4H Robotics and Promotion), \$5,880.13 for equipment and supplies needed to host robotics workshops and a club, along with purchasing equipment and supplies.

—NASANA (Spay & Neuter Assistance and Vaccinations), \$2,333.33 to fund cost of rabies vaccinations for animals in the program to help with prevention of unwanted animals and to help with veterinary costs.



well. She's a senior and has received a scholarship offer from Northwest Shoals Community College to run cross-country. They both have worked very hard to earn this opportunity."

Tharptown runners will again compete against 1A and 2A schools at the state championships. Most of these schools have enrollments significantly larger than THS.

But the Wildcats finished in second place at the team competition at sectionals to earn a spot at the state meet. Sectionals were held at James Clements Palmer Park in Madison.

10 boys ran for the Wildcats with the top five times used to calculate team totals.

Those top five times came from Jessie Mitchell, Alex Quintero, Angel Garcia, Edwin Vela and Ricardo Hernandez. Additionally, Frank Gutierrez, Daniel Jimenez, Cody McCluskey, Zach Riley and Ricky Santibanez will take part in the state team championships.

"Every week they get better," Baker said.
