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

San Jose Chamber's CEO pick could be controversial

By Jana Kadah San José Spotlight once-political powerhouse for business interests in San Jose is looking to return to its former glory—and soon it will pick a new CEO to help it get there.

The San Jose Chamber of Commerce is close to selecting its next permanent CEO after former president and CEO Derrick Seaver resigned in August. Toni Mirenda, former senior executive at Blach Construction, has served as interim CEO but his gig is set to be up in the next few weeks.

Several influential business leaders familiar with the hiring process told San José Spotlight there are two finalists for the CEO role: Nick Adams, president and CEO of NINICO Communications, and Leah Toeniskoetter, founding director of SPUR San Jose, a senior manager at Deloitte and daughter of prolific developer Chuck Toeniskoetter.

Adams and Toeniskoetter beat out several well-known business politicos including former San Jose Councilmember Johnny Khamis, former Vice Mayor Chappie Jones and Silicon Valley Business PAC Director Victor Gomez.

Gomez, a lobbyist and former chief of staff at San Jose City Hall, previously helmed the chamber's political action committee (PAC) in 2015-17 Valley Currents

before he left to launch Silicon Valley Business PAC in 2018. This group aimed to fill a void in the city's political landscape after the chamber of commerce dissolved its PAC amid backlash for racist ads in 2020.

"Ever since that happened, I don't think anybody has really pushed the organization in a way where it's advocating for the needs of the business community in San Jose," Gomez told San José Spotlight. "There's been this huge void, so I hope and expect that whoever ends up in this position does grab the bull by the horns and elevate the work that they're doing in advocacy for the business community."

It's a concern others have shared. While the business community agrees about the importance of revitalizing the chamber by reestablishing its PAC and rallying around local businesses, there are disagreements over who should lead.

Two local lobbyists criticized Adams and questioned his integrity, calling him "slimy" because of his ties to infamous former eBay executive Steve Wymer, who was accused in a heinous stalking and harassment campaign while at the tech giant. Despite his past, Wymer wielded troubling influence at city hall with former Mayor Sam Liccardo and even secured a spot on Mayor Matt Mahan's transition team. Adams did not respond to requests for comment.

Adams, who is not a registered lobbyist, is being accused of lobbying elected officials on the 18th floor including the mayor's office.

This is problematic because backdoor lobbying to influence city officials or policies are not disclosed as is required for registered lobbyists meaning the public is left in the dark. "Nick is the kind of guy that a lot of business leaders don't really feel like he's trustworthy," one lobbyist told San José Spotlight on condition of anonymity, due to not being authorized to speak on the matter officially. "I just don't know a lot of people locally that like him."

But apart from these ethical concerns, the lobbyist says the chamber needs to refocus on its goal of *See CHAMBER CEO, page 10*

being allocated to maintain them. Martin Fontana Parks Association was created to help fill this gap and to preserve the parks as places for neighbors to meet and appreciate the outdoors.

Preserving California native plants and natural habitats

MFPA also focuses on preserving California native plants and natural habitats for wildlife. At the beginning of 2023, MFPA revamped an area of Fontana Park known as "Five Islands." This area has been transformed into a beautiful location with five sections of California native plants, pathways and a bench and neighbors who frequent the park for walks, jogs and playground visits are able to enjoy it. With "Five Islands" in mind, the Class of 2024 approached MFPA to see if they had other areas they could beautify, and they were more than eager to have NCL's help.

After meeting with the MFPA president, Kelly Shepherd, the class decided to tackle a 30 ft. by 20 ft. area that is overrun with weeds and borders an open grass field with a par course. The new project involves clearing out the area, breaking up and amending the soil, and planting a pollinator garden with California native plants to attract bees, hummingbirds, and butterflies to the park.

The Class of 2024 has organized themselves into committees with a research group tasked with selecting native plants to attract pollinators and thrive in the climate, while the materials team is involved with pricing and shopping for plants and soil and keeping to a strict budget. The design group works alongside the research team, creating and drawing a layout for the area. Some of the young ladies chose to be liaisons scheduling workdays and coordinating with the entire

class and MFPA and a documentation team who have been busy photographing and documenting the chronology of the project.

The Class of 2024 is working together efficiently on the project and hopes that this will help the local community, beautify the park, and provide shelter for the local wildlife, while having a great time doing so.

Words of encouragement


The entire chapter of NCL is also becoming involved with painting large river rocks with designs of pollinators and words of encouragement to scatter over this beautiful garden.

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


Continued from page 1 sweet," explained Ezra, who plays Dr. Sanderson, one of the asylum physicians.

Elwood lives in his mansion along with his sister, Veta, and Veta's daughter, Myrtle Mae. Veta, played by PHA senior Sofia Chichizola, is convinced of her brother's insanity when he continues to blame mishaps on Harvey. Trying to figure out a way to help her brother, but also insure she and her daughter are left well off, is Veta's aim. "(Veta)'s a bit of the villain character, which I'm having a lot of fun playing. She's a little wacko herself, it's like she can't tell what she's doing or why," said Sofia.

Coming off the villain himself in last year's play, PHS senior Donovan Collins has done a 180-degreeturn with this role. "Elwood P. Dowd is a very funny man. He's very happy, very cheery, which are traits I like to think encapsulate me. I try to be the sweetest to everyone and especially to those I care about. Elwood is like that." When asked who he played, Donovan's humble nature shone through: "I play one of the main people."

Every one of the students described the play as funny, but in a highbrow "smart" sort of way. "It will provide the audience a good laugh, it is a very funny show with a lot of funny moments. However, there is a level of attention the audience must commit to in order to not miss any of the humor." shared Donovan. Ezra agreed. "There are humorous lines in the dialogue, very funny lines, and the humor is very precise, so if you're not paying attention, you will miss it. Because of this, we're working quite a bit on our enunciation and pacing to ensure our audience gets the most out of their experience."

So much fun, such a great atmosphere with people who are excited about the projects," said Ezra.

"It's all just amazing. Great productions, so many great people, Mrs. Coleman has built a program where people really care about each other, and most of my friends have come from the program, each of whom I love dearly," said Donovan.

Best places to shop on Black Friday 2023

B lack Friday, Nov 24, 2023, one of the year's biggest shopping holidays, is almost here. Knowing the best places to shop can save consumers hundreds or even thousands of dollars this year on everything from jewel-ry and clothes to appliances, furniture and electronics.

JCPenney, Macy's and Belk are the top three retailers for Black Friday shoppers, according to a new report by the personal-finance website WalletHub. The report surveyed over 3,500 deals from 13 of the biggest U.S. retailers' 2023 Black Friday ads.

"JCPenney offers an average discount of 59.1%, and you'll save the most money when shopping for jewelry, apparel, accessories, and appliances," said Cassandra Happe, WalletHub analyst. "Macy's is the second-best Black Friday retailer, offering an average discount of 58.2%, with especially good deals on jewelry, clothing and furniture. Belk takes third place, saving consumers an average of 54.8%, with great offers on appliances, apparel and con-

sumer packaged goods like makeup and shampoo."

While Belk has a lot fewer locations than JCPenney or Macy's, consumers nationwide can take advantage of Black Friday deals at all three retailers by shopping online.

Some retailers are offering much smaller Black Friday deals this year. For example, Costco only gives an average of 17% off, and shoppers at The Home Depot will save an average of around 21%.

"The best Black Friday deals can save you up to 85%, which could translate into hundreds or even thousands of dollars in savings, depending on the extent of your shopping spree," Happe stated. "Knowing exactly where to find the best deals can also help you save a lot of time and avoid a lot of aggravation. You don't even need to leave your house and fight the mob in an actual store." Tips for Black Friday Shopping

• Research the Stores with the Best Deals: Knowing ahead of time which stores provide the best savings will help you get the most bang for your buck. Checking out Black Friday ad scans is a good way to set your sights on the best deals in advance.

• Use a Rewards Credit Card: Putting your Black Friday purchases on a rewards credit card can save you an additional 1% to 5%, and even more if you use them to earn an initial bonus. Just make sure to stick to a budget and only charge what you can afford to pay in full by the due date.



ily cabin in Sierra City, CA. This cabin provided wonderful family time and great stories for several generations of Huffmans. Huff and his wife, Cecilia, spent much of their retired years enjoying the view and gardens of the cabin. They also loved to travel and spent time in Europe and took many trips to Mexico.

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EVC recognized as leader in supporting transfer students

vergreen Valley College recognized success in enrolling and graduating Associate-Degree-for-Transfer-earners and closing racial/ethnic equity gaps

EVC has been named both a 2023 Champion of Higher Education and 2023 Equity Champion of Higher Education by the Campaign for College Opportunity last week, which recognized EVC as a top performer in three specific areas: • Associate Degrees for Transfer Awarded as a Percent-

- Associate Degrees for Transfer Awarded a age of all Associate Degrees Awarded
 - Equity Champion for Black Students
 - Equity Champion for Latinx Students

The Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) is an instrumental pathway that has streamlined the transfer process and made it easier for students to earn a bachelor's degree after completing an associate degree program.

'A Degree with a Guarantee'

The Associate Degree for Transfer is designed to ensure that students are able to seamlessly transfer without accumulating excess units and spending more time and money on their education than necessary. Touted as "A Degree with a Guarantee," students graduating with an ADT are guaranteed admission and junior standing into the California State University system.

Equity measures instituted

Racial equity gaps persist in transfer rates between Latinx and Black students and their peers. Because of this, the Campaign for College Opportunity developed an equity measure that assesses how Latinx and Black students are accessing and earning an ADT relative to the campus average.

Strong performance of Latinx and Black Students on EVC campus

Due to the strong performance of Latinx and Black students on its campus, Evergreen Valley College was honored as a 2023 Equity Champion for both Black and Latinx Students. In order to earn this recognition, two criteria had to be met: at least 65 percent of Black and Latinx associatedegree earners had to earn an ADT and these students had to perform as well or better in this metric compared to the full student body.

'Equity Champion' recognition

Evergreen Valley College was one of just three colleges in California to be recognized as an Equity Champion for both Black and Latinx students.

"While there is still much work to be done to ensure that all students who want to transfer to a four-year university have the opportunity to do so, this recognition shows that the hard work of our dedicated faculty and classified staff is having a positive impact on the lives of our students, particularly when it comes to closing the equity gap and achieving positive educational outcomes," said Evergreen Valley College President Tammeil Gilkerson.


advocating for businesses before it attempts to relaunch a PAC. Membership was at an all-time low following the 2020 scandal, with hundreds of local leaders leaving the group. There were no more than 300 members when Seaver was CEO, he previously said, but under his guidance that number grew close to 800. Before the scandal the chamber had 1,500 businesses.

"I have clients waiting on the sidelines that will not join the chamber until they know that it's a business advocacy organization," the lobbyist told San José Spotlight. "And you have essentially picked the top two people that don't know anything about advocacy."
