# Former Gov. LePage hosts fundraiser for families of victims in Lewiston

There are several efforts on the way to help the City of Lewiston heal. Our effort is to raise \$500,000 by the 15th of December. The funds will be distributed directly to the families of the victims both those who died and those who were injured. In looking into the mass shooting, it became clear to me that many of the surviving families lost their primary bread winner. They have lost their income stream. Many are getting help for food and heat, but little else. In fact, several did not have life insurance and funeral directors covered the cost to bury the victims and hospitals provided charity care for many of the injured. However, Christmas and winter are coming, and many have little resources to get by. Thus far, I have

raised \$250,000 and am looking forward to reaching our goal by the 15th of December.

I am working with Androscoggin Savings Bank and the Lewiston Auburn Metro Chamber of Commerce Foundation to get the contribution held in a 501c3 so all contributions will be tax deductible. All the proceeds will go to the families with the exception of finger foods for the evening of December 15, and possibly music if we cannot get it donated for the Celebration of Life to be held at the Royal Oak Room In Lewiston from 5pm to 8pm that evening. This effort is clearly intended to provide help to the families of the victims at a time of need. The Celebration of Life will also help the community heal going into Christ-

mas and the new year. We are asking for donations of \$150 per person and \$250 per couple for the Celebration of Life.

The money raised to date comes from individuals and organizations who will make up the host committee. I am in hopes of raising \$400,000 through host contributors, \$50,000 through smaller donations and \$50,000 at the Celebration of Life.

To meet this goal, New Beginnings has partnered with the City of Lewiston, will staff the center with appropriately trained staff and security professionals to monitor the property's exterior, and strengthen its collaborative partnerships with local providers to support guests.

#### **Boston Celtics honor Tom Giberti** of Auburn as Hero among Us

AUBURN, ME --Tom Giberti of Auburn, Maine was enjoying a night of bowling on October 25th in Lewiston when he saw flashes inside the bowling alley and realized there was an active shooter. Giberti got the attention of several children who were hunkered down in fear and convinced them to run towards him. As the group ran toward an exit, Giberti was shot multiple times as he shielded the children from harm. He survived the mass shooting.

For his courageous actions in Lewiston, Tom Giberti was honored as a Hero Among Us during the Boston Celtics home game against the Chicago Bulls on November 28, 2023.

#### Cloutier bills to support health care workforce advance

AUGUSTA, ME -The Legislative Council voted earlier this month to advance two bill proposals sponsored by Rep. Kristen Cloutier, D-Lewiston, that would support the state's health care workforce by adding Maine to the Physician Assistant Licensure Compact and prohibiting the Maine Department of Health and Human Services from enforcing electronic visit verification practices among hospice care providers within the MaineCare program.

The Physician Assistant (PA) Licensure Compact is an optional, interstate occupational licensure agreement. States that decide to join agree to recognize a license issued by another compact member state via a compact privilege, allowing PAs to more easily practice in member states.

"In Maine, we are facing a significant health care worker shortage," said Cloutier. "Joining the PA Licensure Compact will establish license reciprocity with other member states, removing administrative burdens and making it easier for PAs who are

already licensed elsewhere products available to stuto be able to work in our state. It will help us better ensure that our community members can access the crucial care they need."

Cloutier's second bill would prohibit the Maine Department of Health and Human Services from implementing electronic visit verification practices for providers who offer hospice care within the MaineCare program, unless mandated by the federal government.

"Currently, many hospice care providers within the MaineCare program are unable to comply with electronic visit verification due to increased administrative costs," said Cloutier. "Without the promise of increased fraud prevention, this practice is unnecessarily hurting our providers and families."

In addition to the two bills that were accepted by the Legislative Council, Cloutier is sponsoring two bills that have been carried over from the First Special Session of the 131st Legislature. LD 348 would require public schools serving sixth through 12th grades to make menstrual

dents in school bathrooms. LD 1505 would amend the Maine Cooperative Affordable Housing Ownership Act to include group equity cooperatives and provide that a housing assistance program must be made reasonably available to residents of housing cooperatives.

The Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature will begin on Jan. 3, 2024.

Cloutier is the Assistant House Majority Leader and is currently serving her third consecutive term in the Maine House of Representatives. She represents House District 94, which includes part of Lewiston, her hometown.

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# Seniors Not Acting Their Age **Tunk Lake Surf & Turf**

For several years, my son, Adam, and I have enjoyed fall surf and turf trips. We combine lake or pond sea kayaking with mountain hiking while camping in remote areas. The outings reflect the transition of our outdoor activities due the change in seasons. Our paddling adventures are winding down, while fall mountaineering is beginning.

Overnight fall trips have a lot of appeal for us. The autumnal colors are often spectacular, black flies and mosquitoes are almost non-existent, and competition for campsites is minimal. And, there are few things more aesthetically pleasing than relaxing around a warm campfire in a wilderness setting on a cool dark evening.

Our latest surf and turf trips were based on Moosehead Lake and Attean Pond. However, I recently completed one with friends beginning on Donnell Pond. The expansive Donnell Pond Public Lands offer another stimulating opportunity to mingle kayaking and hiking, Tunk Lake and East Peak of Black Mountain. That was our choice this year.

Adam and I began the expedition at a boat landing on the northern

on a beautiful, sunny late October day. The landing is on Route 182 approximately ten miles east of Franklin.

The vibrant colors of the foliage were dazzling when we departed kayaking south on Tunk Lake. We paddled into a gentle headwind with a continuous view of the barren summit of East Peak to our west as we traversed to the southern end of the lake.

Finding a suitable campsite was our first objective. There are three choices in the southern sector of the lake: Thumb, Partridge, and Hurricane Hole. Access to Thumb was difficult, Partridge lacked available firewood. but Hurricane Hole, closest to our mountain destination, was just right.

Once settled in at Hurricane Hole, we paddled to a rudimentary landing in the extreme southwestern corner of the lake. After changing into hiking clothes, we walked old camp roads towards East Peak.

The confusing roads did not reconcile with the Donnell Pond Public Lands map. Following a lengthy misguided detour, we finally located Big Chief Trailhead, the start of the

terminus of Tunk Lake southern approach to the summit of East Peak. By the time we found the elusive trail darkness loomed; too late to begin a climb. We postponed the trek until the following morning.

Camping on the lake that evening met my definition of perfection. We enjoyed a spectacular sunset followed by clear starry skies and a brilliant crescent moon. A substantial campfire kept us warm until we retired.

We awoke to gray skies and patchy fog. The surrounding peaks were enveloped in clouds and fog. An ascent without views seemed likely.

Breaking camp, we kayaked to the nearby landing. This time, there were no delays locating Big Chief Trailhead.

Our climb began in a mixed conifer and hardwood forest. Following a moderately steep ascent, we emerged onto a succession of gentle-sloping partially-exposed ledges. The fog lifted and we benefited from outstanding views for the remainder of the trek.


After descending deep into a wet densely-wooded col, we scaled precipitous ledges to the summit. A party of three arrived from the opposite direction shortly

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They were the only hikers or paddlers we encountered during the entire out-

Thanks to the clearing skies, the summit area offered fabulous views of the surrounding mountains and lakes. The majestic peaks of Mount Desert Island could be seen in the distance. At one of several overlooks, we peered down into the southern

end of Tunk Lake where Hurricane Hole is located. Despite a chilly southwest wind, we lingered to embrace the wonderful panoramic vistas before returning to our kayaks.

A strong tailwind resulted in an entertaining paddle back to the Route 182 boat landing. The powerful blow propelled us rapidly north towards our objective. Approaching the landing, we navigated through increasingly large waves some with whitecaps. Our attempts to surf the waves in heavily-laden vessels were The invigorating futile. finale to our trip was the perfect culmination to an outstanding two-day outdoor adventure.

### UMaine meets the needs of Maine teachers, outdoor leaders

ORONO, ME — The University of Maine's College of Education and Human Development is launching three new graduate certificates aimed at teachers looking to boost their knowledge and skills in the areas of multilingual special education, adapted physical education and outdoor leadership.

The five-course (15 credits) Multilingual Special Education graduate certificate, offered entirely via UMaineOnline, is designed to equip educators with a deeper understanding of evidence-based practices and educational policies to support culturally and linguistically diverse students, including multilingual learners, with disabilities.

According to the U.S. Department of Education's

Office of Special Education Programs, nearly 12% of multilingual learners in K-12 schools have a disability. Between 2012 and 2020, this student population grew by nearly 30% nationwide.

Melissa Cuba, UMaine assistant professor of special education, says that under federal law, multilingual learners with disabilities are entitled to language acquisition and special education services, both of which are needed for them to be successful in school and beyond.

"This requires a great deal of collaboration and coordination among educators who have applied knowledge of special education and language development best practices and policies," says Cuba. "So this program responds to a growing need across our state and region to ensure educators have the skills and tools to work as a team to provide these services."

UMaine's graduate program in special education now offers five graduate certificates, all of which can be applied toward a master's or education specialist degree in special education.

The Adapted Physical Education graduate certificate addresses the need in Maine for more teachers with the knowledge, skills and practical experiences to support students with disabilities in physical education classes. The five-course sequence (15 credits) is designed to enhance teachers' use of age- and developmentally-appropriate practices for all learners.

Educators who complete the certificate will be eligible to apply for the Maine Department of Education's adapted physical education endorsement.

"All students deserve appropriate support in order to participate in classes that promote their physical, emotional and intellectual growth," says Shannan Fotter, lecturer in kinesiology and physical education and coordinator of the certificate program. "This certificate will give teachers a more robust understanding of how to conduct accurate and comprehensive assessments of students with disabilities, as well as how to design and adapt instruction that meets their needs."

The Outdoor Leadership and Education graduate certificate provides students with a combination of hands-on practice and theory to facilitate meaningful, high-quality outdoor learning opportunities for participants of all ages. The five-course program (15 credits) is focused on the professional knowledge and field experiences needed for anyone interested in successfully incorporating more experiential and place-based learning into various preK-12 schools, postsecondary and adult education settings.

A recent report from the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis found that Maine's outdoor recreation economy grew more than 16% from 2021 to 2022 and generates more than \$3 billion annually. That's about 4% of the state's gross domestic product, the sixth highest per-

centage among all 50 states.

"Maine's natural resources have always been an essential part of our heritage and economy," says Lauren Jacobs, lecturer and coordinator of UMaine's outdoor leadership program. "Outdoor industries and jobs are particularly important for the sustainability of rural communities. We're excited to offer this graduate certificate to help build a skilled cadre of stewards, educators and guides to lead groups knowledgably, ethically and safely in a variety of wilderness settings."

All graduate certificates require a bachelor's degree. Prospective students can apply online via the University of Maine Graduate School. More information is available online.



# Appreciation and respect for older Mainers

Maine is fortunate enough to have the oldest population of any state in the country. In the Legislature, Democrats and Republicans are well aware of the many important contributions made by older Mainers and are always on the lookout for ways we can assist the folks who have given our state this great distinction.

As Senate Chair of the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee, I made it a top priority this year to seek out ways in which the state could do more for these citizens who have given so much, and continue to give. For instance, in the biennial bud-

get, we opened up the Property Tax Fairness Credit to all Mainers age 65 and over, raised the maximum benefit of the credit — from \$1500 to \$2000 — and increased income eligibility. In order to benefit from the Property Tax Fairness Credit, simply file Form 1040ME and Schedule PTFC/STFC for the tax year during which the property tax or rent was paid. You can find these forms by going to www.maine.gov/ revenue/tax-return-forms or calling 207-624-7894.

We also expanded the State Property Tax Deferral Program, a program that allows Mainers over 65 to age in place and ensures that property taxes are still delivered to municipalities, requiring repayment of the loan once the property is sold or becomes part of an estate. This year, we improved the program by increasing participants' maximum income from \$40,000 to \$80,000 and increasing the maximum amount of value of liquid assets from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

One item I was pleased to fight for in the budget was an increase to the annual income tax pension deduction from \$30,000 to \$35,000 for all retired Maine residents this tax year. This initiative simply puts more money in all Maine pensioners' pockets. The amount increases to equal the maximum so-

cial security benefit in the following years. Questions about whether your pension qualifies for the Maine pension income deduction should be directed to your tax advisor or Maine Revenue Services at 207-626-8475.

Other significant budget items directed at helping older Mainers include increased eligibility and removal of the asset test for the Medicare Savings Program; a one-time three percent cost of living adjustment for retired State employees — providing a maximum benefit of \$726 and an average benefit of \$527 to approximately 37,600 state sponsored plan retirees — and an

increase in the state's contribution toward the retired teachers' share of health insurance premiums from 55% to 60% in fiscal year 2023-24 and from 60% to 65% in fiscal year 2024-25.

Finally, the budget appropriates \$2 million for Elder Justice Roadmap projects, including funding to provide staff for Maine Legal Services for the Elderly and support for older adults that have had open cases with Adult Protective Services. And we directed \$1 million to Area Agencies on Aging, Maine's "one-stopshops" to answer questions from older adults, individuals with disabilities and their care partners about a wide range of services.

In addition to all of the items we included in the biennial budget, I would like to highlight the Respite for ME pilot program, which was created by Lewiston Rep. Kristen Cloutier. Respite for ME will support people who care for family members and loved ones who are older or have a disability, often while also working to make ends

meet. Eligible caregivers may receive grants of up to \$2,000 to help cover things like respite care, assistive technology and legal consultations.

# 2024 dog licensing kicks off, licenses expire at year end

LEWISTON, ME -The Lewiston City Clerk's Department is reminding all Lewiston dog owners that state law requires all dogs to be licensed if they are six months old or older. Per state law, a dog's license expires December 31 of each year.

Renewal notices are being mailed out this week to approximately 2,000 dog owners who licensed their dogs for 2023. Res- PM, to register their dog. idents may renew their pet's license via the mailin portion of the renewal notice or by going online to the city's website (www. lewistonmaine.gov/doglicenses), and the tag for the new year will be mailed to the owner. Residents may also go to the City Clerk's Department at Lewiston City Hall, 27 Pine Street, Mon - Fri, 8:30 AM - 4

In order to license a dog in Maine, the dog must have a current rabies vaccination, and this certificate must be presented at time of licensing. If a dog owner cannot locate their copy, they should contact their veterinarian's office to request a duplicate copy of the rabies certificate.

Rabies is a serious

problem in the state. Residents are urged to take the time to protect their pet against this deadly virus. If an animal is suspected of having rabies, it is quarantined. If during this time, the signs of rabies still appear, the only way to test an animal for rabies is to euthanize the animal. Dog licensing ensures rabies vaccination which protects the health

of the pet as well as the health of the community.

The Maine annual license fees are \$6 for a dog that is spayed or neutered and \$11 for a dog that is not altered. If applicable, the spaying/neutering certificate must be presented when licensing a dog for the first time.

#### Shaw bill advances, seeks to enable Mainers to grow their own food

AUGUSTA, ME -The Legislative Council recently approved a bill from Rep. Kathy Shaw, D-Auburn, that would make it easier for more Mainers to grow their own food by exempting buildings used for the cultivation of crops, like permanent greenhous-

es, from the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code (MUBEC).

The exemption included in the bill, An Act to Exempt Buildings Used to Cultivate Crops from the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code, would allow more individual property owners

in municipalities with over 4,000 residents to grow their own food year-round. Under current law, buildings used to house livestock or store harvested crops are also exempt. Shaw's proposal would not include an exemption for the cultivation of cannabis.

"As a lifelong farmer living in rural communities, I have been able to grow my own food - something that has come to be a privilege in today's world," said Shaw. "My bill is a simple step toward expanding the right to grow one's own food yearround to more Mainers. This

legislation, inspired by local constituents, would increase the resilience of our food systems at a time when it is greatly needed and have enormously positive impacts.'

Shaw's bill will be heard when the Legislature meets again in January.

Shaw is serving her first term in the Maine House representing part of Auburn. A lifelong farmer and president of the Cumberland and Falmouth farmers markets, Shaw serves on the Legislature's Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry.

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# Report highlights Maine's assets, progress, challenges

Hallowell, ME -The nonpartisan Maine Economic Growth Council today released its 29h annual Measures of Growth Report - a comprehensive snapshot of how the state's economy is performing relative to our long-term goals, to other states, and to the nation.

The Report finds that overall, Maine continues to perform exceptionally well in terms of environmental stewardship and has made promising improvements to internet connectivity, entrepreneurship, and achievement of postsecondary degrees and credentials. However, the lingering impact of the pandemic on children's mental health and learning, the high costs of housing and energy, and other systemic challenges continue burden communities, businesses, and households.

The Council noted that Maine's quality of life and other enduring assets set the stage to overcome challenges and for additional investments to achieve economic growth, a more resilient economy in an uncertain global environment, and long-term and more equitable pros-

"This Report provides critical insight into Maine's economy and workforce," says Steve Von Vogt, CEO, Maine Marine Composites and Co-Chair of the Maine Economic Growth Council. "We must continue to harness Yankee ingenuity, innovation, and public-private partnerships to capitalize on Maine's unique strengths, respond our economic challenges, and eradicate systemic inequities."

For the first time this year, the report highlights four examples of creative initiatives that are helping address some of Maine's longstanding challenges. Look for our "Indicator in Action" stories within the Report about Downeast Broadband Utility, Nonantum Resort, Nyle Systems, and Telstar Academy.

"We hope other employers are motivated by the story of our hiring program for formerly incarcerated Mainers," says Colby Marvin Bracy, Director of Human Resources and Philanthropy, Nonantum Resort. "These employees are very loyal. In part because we gave them a chance and they feel valued...but more because they prove to themselves and society that they are capable and reliable. They show up for work on time, they are resourceful, and they have great attitudes it enriches the entire organization."

For the second year in a row this year's report Yellow Light Breen, Presi-



Maine's particular challenges in workforce availability and participation, an urgent issue in every industry and region. "The Report unpacks the dimensions and driving forces which stem from years of demographic, economic, and social changes compounded by a global pandemic.," says James Dill, Director of the Diagnostic and Research Laboratory and Pest Management Specialist, UMaine Cooperative Extension and Co-Chair of the Maine economic Growth Council. "Overcoming these challenges and building the workforce Maine needs will require attracting more working-age people from other states and countries, retaining more of the young people born here, and helping people of all ages, genders, abilities, races, and ethnicities to improve their skills and participate fully in our economy."

"There is also reason to be encouraged," savs dent & CEO, Maine Development Foundation. "For the first time, the Council assigned a Gold Star to Postsecondary Degrees & Credentials - calling out Maine's substantial progress over the past decade - reaching 55% of Mainers with a college degree or shorter-term educational or industrial certificate of value in 2021. This ranks Maine among the fastest improving of any state."

In total, the 2023 Measures of Growth Report tracks 31 indicators that represent Maine's assets and areas of challenge.

The Council assigns Gold Stars for significant progress in:

Wages: In 2022, wages remained above the EPSCoR average but fell 1.5% after adjusting for inflation.

Post-Secondary Degrees and Credentials: In 2021, 55% of Maine adults had a credential of value, up from 53% in 2019 on the way to the overall goal of 60%.

Internet Connectivity: In 2023, 86% of Maine

locations have either average or broadband internet, up 8%.

Air Ouality: In 2022. there were 24 moderately unhealth days, four fewer than last year.

Water Quality: In 2022, Maine maintained its excellent water quality

Sustainable Forestlands: In 2021, the growth-to-removal ratio rose 8%to 1.43 and remained above the sustainability goal.

The Council assigns Red Flags for needed attention to:

Labor Force: Maine's labor force shrank 1.5% to 675,000 in 2022.

Research and Development: In 2020, Maine's R&D spending from 1% to 1.1% of GDP --- but still significantly lags peer states and the target of

Fourth-Grade Reading: In 2022, 29% of Maine 4th graders were proficient in reading, a sharp drop from pre-COVID levels.

Eighth-Grade Math: In 2022, 24% of Maine 8th graders were proficient in mathematics, down from 34% pre-COVID.

Cost of Energy: The price of industrial electricity rose 17%in 2022, mirroring nationwide increases.

State and Local Tax Burden: In 2021, Maine's tax burden remained unchanged at 11.7%.

Housing Affordability: Housing affordability appears to have dropped in2022, but complete data are not currently available.

Mental and Behavioral Health: In 2020-2021, the percentage of children with a mental and/or behavioral condition rose


