Bowling honored as DHR's top attorney in Alabama

Going to court is never easy, particularly for employees of the Franklin County Department of Human Resources.

Whether it's a hearing to enforce a child support order, an order of protection in a domestic violence situation or a situation related to the welfare of a child, these court appearances can be intense.

That's why Franklin County Department of Human Resources

Director Amber Steward appreciates Russellville attorney Jeff Bowling so much. He makes what can be an uncomfortable experience for DHR employees with his patience and professionalism.

"Jeff just takes care of us. We have a lot of new workers and I don't have to worry about them going to court when he's there with them. They know they're going to be taken care of," Steward said.

And Bowling's dedication in enforcing child support orders recently earned him a statewide honor as the

Stutts endorses DeSantis ahead of March 5, 2024 Republican Primary

Since he was first elected to represent District Six in the Alabama Senate, Larry Stutts has never shied away from publicly expressing what he believes is right.

And there has been occasional backlash, as Stutts opposed Alabama's gas tax increase even in the face of strong pressure from Gov. Kay Ivey. Stutts voted against Alabama's Medical Cannabis Act, a bill sponsored by his neighboring Senator Tim Melson, who represents Alabama's District Six.

So when Stutts announced his endorsement of Republican Presidential candidate Ron DeSantis one day after the Republican debate in Tuscaloosa, it raised some eyebrows in a state where former President Donald Trump received more than 62% of the votes cast in the November 2020 election.

For Stutts, he explained his decision as he's previously done with other controversial stances he's taken—he's going to stand by what he believes is right, regardless of any political fallout.

"Ive never made a decision based on its political expediency," Stutts said. "I think Gov. DeSantis is the best candidate. He's done a remarkable job as governor of Florida. He's a former Naval officer and having a Commander in Chief with military

The Russellville City Council approved a 12-month contract for Russellville Police Department Chaplain Bobby Brown at the council's December 4th meeting.

Brown, whose duties with the RPD range from counseling employees to death notifications to families, will receive \$1,400/month, an increase of \$200 per month from his 2023 contract.

"We appreciate all that you do in the police department and we are adding an additional \$200 per month to your contract this time," Mayor David Grissom told Brown. In other

Council votes to handle business licenses in-house with new program

The Phil Campbell City Council took time at its December 5th meeting to recognize the accomplishments of Phil Campbell High School 7th grader Melodie Riley, whose essay recently won the Patriots Pen Essay Contest, an annual vent sponsored by Veterans of Foreign Wars.

VFW Post 5184 of Russellville solicited entries into this year's contest, which had the theme of 'How Are You Inspired by America?'

Riley's essay won the local contest and scored well in the Patriots Pen District contest. She was presented a \$100 check from the VFW Post 5184 and a plush stuffed animal at the council meeting. Several members of Post 5184 attended the meeting as well. Eric Reason, Post Commander, said Riley's essay was outstanding and she should be proud of making the top four essays at the District contest. Riley said Reason was the one who encouraged her to enter.

"Mr. Reason told me about it and I thought 'what do I have to lose?,' Riley said. "I already knew how great America was and how special our freedoms are, but as I was researching for my essay, I didn't realize how many other countries don't have those freedoms."

Riley is the daughter of John and Rachael Laynan. In other agenda items, the council: --heard a report that an \$11,500 offer for timber on a 12-acre tract the city owns along with land near the sports complex. The offer was from Land Management. No action was taken on the offer. --heard a report from Councilwoman Lynn Landers who said the Park and

--heard a report from Councilwoman Lynn Landers who said the Park and Recreation Department will host a Christmas themed movie at Phil Campbell Memorial Park on Friday, December 15th, at 7 p.m. The event is free and pop-corn and drinks will be sold.

--approved purchase of two new sets of tires for two police vehicles.

--authorized repair of a dump truck in the Phil Campbell Street Department to correct rear end issues. Wayne Welborn said he had contacted Rick McClintock in the Union Community about repairing the vehicle.

--approved spending the town's remaining COVID-19 funds (approximately \$22,000) to purchase five new sets of fire gear for the Phil Campbell Volunteer Fire Department, at an expected cost of \$4,000 per set. Councilman Eddie Marbutt said the department's current gear is outdated and the new uniforms will allow safer entry for fire fighters. Marbutt and Mayor Mike McQuary abstained from the vote. --approved a quote of \$2,100, including a \$2,000 set up fee and \$100/month support agreement with ETA Data Direct that will allow the city to issue its own business licenses. Additionally, the council authorized the Alabama Department of Revenue to collect the town's sales tax beginning in the new year. --approved \$5,600 for dues payable to the North Alabama Council for Local Governments for the Senior Meals Program at the Phil Campbell Senior Center for the coming year.

--heard from Cheryl McDuffa, manager of the Phil Campbell Texaco located on Hwy. 237, concerns about a warning she was served on behalf of the business alleging the sale of drug paraphernalia prohibited under the town's ordinance. McDuffa told the council her business doesn't sell prohibited items. Instead, hemp-based products are sold which McDuffa says are legal under Alabama law. "There is nothing listed in the ordinance that we sell. I'm confused as to what we have to take off the shelf," McDuffa said. "We sell Delta 8, 9 and 10 products and those are legal in Alabama. We should not have received a warning because we're not selling drug paraphernalia."

McDuffa said she believes the warning notice was served on her in retaliation. McQuary said he believes the council and police department should meet to discuss what should be included in the town's ordinance. McDuffa asked to be included in that meeting but McQuary said he first wanted to speak with the council and police and then a meeting could be held that will include the three retailers selling these types of products in the city limits.

18 Golden Tigers earn All-Region 8 football honors

After a season that saw the Russellville varsity football team go 9-3 and post a perfect 6-0 record in Class 5A Region 8, it's no surprise to see plenty of Golden Tigers in the Region 8 All-Region Team.

12 Russellville players were named 1st Team All-Region and six more were named Honorable Mention All-Region. Not bad when you can field a team with just your All-Region honorees.

Coach John Ritter announced his All-Region honorees last week. In addition to 18 1st Team and Honorable Mention award winners, Russellville players also earned four Special Region Awards and Ritter was named Co-Coach of the Year for Region 8. Of the 18 All-Region Golden Tigers, 13 are seniors.

The 2023 Region 8 Honorees include: 1st Team:

--Harrison Burch, Senior QB. The Kentucky Wesleyan College bound Burch completed 118 of 207 attempts for 1,766 yards, 15 touchdowns with only three interceptions.

--Nick Pounders, Senior H-Back. A standout, unselfish player who opened up holes in the running game and was an outstanding pass blocker as well, Pounders had five receptions for 46 yards and one TD. But his All-Region honors come from doing the things that don't always show up in the box score.

--Matthew James, Senior DL. A versatile defensive player who excelled at four different positions his senior season after primarily playing noseguard before last fall.

--Malachi Duncan, Senior LB. A player who excelled on defense, special teams and also had eight rushes for 120 yards and two touchdowns as a running back. He had 92 tackles, with 20 for a loss, along with four sacks and three interceptions this season.

--Devin Green, Senior LB. A standout season with 97 tackles, including 10 for a loss and a sack.

--Reece Carson, Senior LB. At his outside LB position, Carson had 88 tackles, including 11 for a loss, two sacks and an interception.

--Braxten Goodson, Senior SS. A hard-hitter who made opposing receivers think twice about going over the middle. Goodson had 85

That kind of praise should have UNA tennis coach Olaya Garrido-Rivas excited to see Parrish joining the Lions' program next fall.

Parrish's record in tennis singles matches for RHS is an eye-popping 84-14, most of that playing Number One court for the Golden Tigers.

She's won Number One Singles at Sectionals three times. She's the first female tennis player at Russellville to reach the state finals in singles. And Parrish teamed with Sofia Tiffin to win Number One doubles twice at Sectionals and the duo was state runner-up for Number One doubles.

Parrish was named the Times-Daily Player of the Year for 2023 and she was invited to participate in the Alabama High School Athletic Association's North-South All Star Week last summer.

The Golden Tigers' girls varsity has qualified for state each year Parrish has been on the team. And the good news for Dollar is Parrish still has one varsity season remaining.

With the decision to sign with UNA behind her, Parrish said she can now focus completely on helping her team reach the state finals once again this spring.

"That's such a relief going into this spring," Parrish said. "Leading up to this point I was always scared wondering if I could play in college and go to the next level. Now I can relax and work hard to prepare to be successful this season and at UNA."
