### **Grimes was among four finalists** for Mississippi State Department of Education's top position

When the Mississippi State Board of Education named Dr. Lance Evans its new state superintendent of education December 20th, he was the board's top choice among the four finalists for the state's top public education job.

Also among the final four was Russellville City Schools Superintendent of Education Heath

Grimes and the other three finalists

each went through in-person interviews with the State Board of Education on December 11th.

The State Board of Education hired the firm McPherson & Jacobson, LLC, to lead a national search to find its next state superintendent. Grimes said he was contacted by the search firm and asked if he would be interested in interviewing for the job.

"We had a deep conversation about whether this was a realistic opportunity and are they really wanting someone with my skill sets?," Grimes said. "They said they were

### **Russellville City Schools** once again going thru accreditation process

After not going through the process last year, Russellville City Schools administrators are once again in the process of reaccreditation that would also apply to the previous school year as well.

According to Russellville City Board of Education President Greg Trapp, reaccreditation is underway for the current school year.

"Up until last year, this is something we've done each year, so we're going back and getting last year and this year done," Trapp said. "At the end of the school year, we'll be accredited for 2023 and

2024 for all four schools and the system."

In Alabama, accreditation is done through Cognia, a non-profit organization that accredits primary and secondary schools across the United States.

Cognia accreditation and certification help schools meet high standards and to publicly display their dedication to excellence.

Cognia was formed 17 years ago when the pre-college divisions of two accreditation organizations, the Councils on Accreditation and School Improvement of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and the Southern Association of Colleges and

excited because my skill sets matched what the Mississippi State Department of Education was looking for." Grimes was one of around a dozen

candidates selected from the initial pool of applicants to participate in video interviews. After that, he was contacted and told he was one of four finalists for the position, which pays \$300,000 annually.

Grimes said he did notify the Russellville City Board of Education about applying for the job, something he

had done previously each time he applied for a position since he became RCS Superintendent in 2015.

"Since my contract is ending (in June 2024), the board has already made a decision on my contract, so I did not believe it was necessary to notify them, which is something I have always done in previous instances," Grimes said.

Earlier this year, Grimes and the board reached an agreement about his future with Russellville City Schools, whereby he would resign on June 19, 2024 and would be compensated approximately \$20,000 on top of his annual salary.

Additionally, Grimes said the new Mississippi State Superintendent of Education won't start his new job until July 2024, so he would not have been required to resign from his current position.

Although he wasn't offered the job, Grimes said it was an honor to have been selected among the four finalists after a nationwide search.

Evans, who most recently served as superintendent of the New Albany (Miss.) School District, was named the 2023 Mississippi Association of School Administrators' Superintendent of the Year.

He will have to be confirmed by the Mississippi State Senate when it convenes for the 2024 legislative ses-

Schools.

Trapp explained that Russellville High School students can benefit from the school's accreditation when it comes to scholarships, feder-

al loans and college applications.

"College admissions officials will often look to see if you are from an accredited school. If you transfer from an non-accredited school to an accredited school, not all of the course credits may be accepted," Trapp said. "This is one of those things that's been a part of Russellville City



Schools for a long time and it's something you need to have."

Accreditation may be earned for school systems as well as individual schools.

According to www.cognia.org, Russellville High School was initially accredited in 1953. Russellville Middle School, Russellville

Elementary School and West Elementary School each received their initial accreditation in 1977.

As a system, Russellville City Schools' initial accreditation came in 2008.



Russellville will host Belgreen on Tuesday, January 2nd, with a 6 p.m., tipoff. Area games begin Friday, January 5th as the Golden Tigers' girls and boys varsity travel to West Point.

# Golden Tiger boys' varsity basketball team playing through stout December scheduling

Coach Patrick Odom's Russellville Golden Tigers are playing the kind of schedule that toughens up a team before it gets into area play and the post-season.

And even with the difficult schedule, Russellville had a winning record at 5-4 entering its December 22nd game against Deshler in the Times-Daily Tournament.

Those wins include a December 8th 99-61 win over A.P. Brewer in Russellville's first area game. The Golden Tigers' area also includes Lawrence County and West Point High Schools. Seemingly at every turn, Russellville faced another juggernaut in the month of December, and that's okay with Odom, who has a senior-laden team six seniors among his nine players.

"These last couple weeks we've been challenged in every way possible," Odom said. "We have a home and home with Jasper, a Top 10 5A team. Austin was a big challenge as a topranked 7A team. Then we turned around and best Tanner. Even though Tanner is 2A, it's a ranked 2A opponent.

"Northridge is another Top 6A team, so our competition has been really good. But we won the one game that matters (against A.P. Brewer). The rest of the month has been about preparation. We had opportunities in a lot of these games, but we need to get to the point where we finish out those games by playing cleaner and better. But we wanted to expose our guys to what they'll see later on this season," Odom added.

Russellville began the season 3-0 after wins over Red Bay (76-71), Deshler (85-80) and A.P. Brewer (99-61). That was followed by a three-game losing streak, including Jasper (50-69), Florence (66-71) and Austin (52-73).

On December 12th, the Golden Tigers led Florence by 12 after the third quarter but the Falcons outscored Russellville by 17 in the final eight minutes.

"Florence turned up a lot of pressure late in that game," Odom said. "We had some self-imposed mistakes and they made a fourth-quarter run after our third-quarter run and that's what you expect from two good teams.

"They hit a three-pointer inside the final minute to take the lead. It was crazy, but that's high school basketball and when you play good people, you've got to learn how to put good teams away. So it's something we learn from and evolve from," he added.

Russellville's 2023-24 varsity boys roster includes seniors Malachi Duncan, Amir Williams, Bralynn Vincent, KJ Murray, Mike Young and Gavin Hyde. The team's three juniors are Jah Williams, EJ King and Rylan Pratt.

Russellville began play in the annual Bracy Invitational at Deshler High School and Middle School with a December 26th game against Marion County.

Additional opponents and game times will depend on how the Golden Tigers do in the tourney.

After a road game at East Limestone High School on January 2nd, 2024, Russellville begins area play Friday, January 5th against West Point High School in Cullman.

# 'A Salute to Conway and Loretta' coming January 12th to Florence

When Tre Twitty and Tayla Lynn take the stage at the University of North Alabama's Norton Auditorium on Friday, January 12th, they'll bring to life the music of their legendary grandparents, Conway and Loretta.

Far from an impersonator show, the 'Twitty and Lynn: A Salute to Conway and Loretta' takes fans back to an

takes fans back to an era of traditional country music where the unique sound of Conway and Loretta helped push the duo to the top of Nashville's

elite.

The show begins at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are

available through the website www.twittyandlynn.com. Click 'Tour' and the Florence show will be at the top of the list.

The show includes a host of Conway and Loretta's timeless duets with a mix of solo hits from each. Conway and Loretta stopped touring together full-time in 1981, and Twitty died 12 years later.

"Conway has been gone 30 years. Had Poppy (as Tre called his grandfather) lived, I think there would have been a great second act for him and Loretta. There's a lot of people who wanted to see that and we're able to let them hear those songs and stories again."

The foundation of Conway and Loretta's success as a duo came from the natural chemistry between them. And Tre and Tayla share their own chemistry on stage while carving out their own version of those Twitty and Lynn names.

"I think of us as the ambassadors of the Twitty and Lynn names," Tre Twitty said. "We're just the new version of what they already established. But we also want to be caretakers of the past. At our shows, we get generations of fans because country music is passed down."

Before her passing last October, Loretta Lynn herself was one of the duo's biggest fans. She worked with Tre and her granddaughter to build their show in their own image.

"Memaw (as Tayla called Loretta) just loved it. It brought up so many memories of Conway for her and took her back to a place in her life when they were building their careers," Tayla said. "She'd always say that Tre has Conway's heart."

As a young girl, Tayla often toured with her grandmother. On Lynn's Tennessee ranch, where Tayla now calls home, she watched Tre perform some of his grandfather's songs during a concert and the idea for the show soon followed.

More than five years later, they have toured across the country as well as internationally and they have a full dance card for the coming year. Last year, Tre and Tayla debuted at the Grand Ole Opry, performing 'Louisiana Woman, Mississippi Man' on the same wood circle their legendary grandparents once stood.

The show both entertains audiences while honoring Conway and Loretta, while capturing some of the passion the duo was known for.

"Conway and Loretta used to do everything with so much passion—the way they dressed, the way they recorded, the way they performed. We want to bring that to fans who were lucky enough to see our grandparents before and to those who are just learning about them," Tayla said.

"Our show gives people an idea of what Loretta and Conway were like through their grandchildren's eyes. It's a special gift to keep that flame burning," she added.
