Two mail collection boxes on Lauderdale to be removed this month

The City of Russellville will soon have only one blue mail collection box after the United States Postal Service announced its intention to remove the two collection boxes located on the south side of the Post Russellville Office Lauderdale Street.

Russellville Postmaster Kenny McDonald confirmed the two collection boxes are scheduled to be removed on January 19, 2024. A letter was affixed to the boxes on December 18th to notify postal customers about the planned removal. USPS regulations require a 30-day advance notice before a collection box may be removed.

The remaining collection box will be the one near Russellville Drugs in the Franklin Shopping Center, as McDonald said there were no plans to remove it at this time.

McDonald said the decision to remove the boxes was not made by him or any local officials at the Russellville Post Office. Instead,

Holcomb's confidence high in long shot bid to unseat Aderholt

Don't ask Justin Holcomb how he can overcome great odds against unseating 14-term Congressman Robert Aderholt, because he says that's the wrong question.

"The question should be how is Robert Aderholt going to win and how does he feel about such great odds in favor of Justin Holcomb?," Holcomb told the Franklin Free Press in a recent interview.

The 33-year-old Holcomb is challenging Aderholt in the March 5. 2024, Republican Primary. While Aderholt has faced Democratic opposition in recent years, he's only had Republican Primary opposition twice since first being elected in

Holcomb's message to voters in Alabama's Fourth Congressional District is straightforward—the people of Alabama are disrespected, mistreated and undervalued in Washington, D.C.

And, if elected, he plans to change

"The people of Alabama have been underestimated for far too long, and our current conditions are reflective of leadership that has gone horribly wrong," Holcomb said. This will change on March 5th.

"The country and the world will be put on notice that our people will

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

postal inspectors at the district level decided to remove the two collection boxes after a December 18th incident where someone broke into one of the

boxes and stole all the contents.

That theft, along with collection box breakins in Red Bay, Moulton and Huntsville, led postal inspectors to the decision to remove the blue metal collection boxes at all locations where thefts had occurred.

McDonald said the USPS is working on alternative options to the traditional metal collection boxes that will provide additional security to protect the mail inside. No time frame has been about announced when any new boxes or devices would be installed.

"They're really trying to protect people. These boxes can be pried with a crowbar and the contents gone within a matter of min-

utes. This is being done for our customers. People may not understand that

but there's nothing we can do at the local level," McDonald said.

Russellville Police Chief Chris Hargett said his department received a report from Russellville Post Office officials about someone breaking the lock and prying open one of the mailboxes by the post office.

"We took a report and one of the boxes were broken. They had pried open the door and left it damaged after taking all the contents," Hargett said.

Although the case remains under investigation, Hargett said there are no suspects and no video recording of the incident, which occurred early morning on December 18th.

The collection box had been emptied by postal workers Saturday evening at 5 p.m., so the amount of mail in the box several hours later was likely minimal, McDonald said.

As a safety rule, the USPS recommends customers place mail into collection boxes before the last collection time of the day, to minimize the time the mail is in the box. Postal Inspectors state that most mail theft occurs overnight when there are fewer possible witnesses.

Theft of mail from collection boxes is a rampant problem for the USPS and one that, unresolved, can erode customer confidence in the safety and reliability of mail delivery.

In many instances, including the Russellville and Red Bay mail thefts, the Postal Service has removed the vandalized boxes permanently.

Theft of mail is a federal crime punishable by up to five years in prison and significant fines as well as a state crime of theft of property.

The notice posted on the Russellville collection boxes advises customers to address their concerns to the Russellville Post Office by calling 256-332-2165


never be disrespected again. President (Donald) Trum will feel the support of more than 700,000 citizens in north Alabama who are ready to take their country back from a career politician who's led us astray," he added.

That message of being disrespected is at the core of Holcomb's campaign, and it's a message he's attempting to share with little to no

campaign funds to promote it.

The most recent federal election disclosure information shows Aderholt (in the quarter that ended September 30, 2023) with receipts totaling \$426,370.28, disbursements of \$349.252.89 and \$1,236,562.62 cash on hand in his campaign account.

Holcomb, on the other hand, reported no receipts, disclosures or



Holcomb began personally meeting voters in the Fourth District last summer and he's visited 11 of the 13 counties included therein.

"This is a full-time job for me starting October 3rd through March 5th, 2024," Holcomb said. "I'm self-funded so far and have devoted all my own resources to this point.

"Everyone has been so welcoming. It's very inspirational to go to someone's door and see them excited to have someone new as a candidate," he added.

Holcomb is a former web editor for www.Townhall.com, a conservative website that pulls together political insight and commentary from more than 100 sources.

He has a political science degree from the University of Alabama Birmingham. In 2015, Holcomb went to work in Washington, D.C., where he worked with the Trump campaign to support Senate and House candidates that were key to the Republican plan of gaining numbers in the mid-term elections.

Holcomb's campaign was dealt a major blow in November, when Trump endorsed Aderholt in his reelection bid for Alabama's Fourth Congressional District Undeterred, Holcomb remains consistent with his message.


"I will make Alabama's elected representation more representative of the strong will and virtues of Alabama," Holcomb said. "We have been left behind, discarded and moved to the back of the line. I will reverse this trend, change course, and renew the potential of Alabama."

Holcomb's platform also includes a call for Congressional term limits, something he says he'll abide by if elected.


"There's only one school of thought on the matter and that's the George Washington school of thought. He only served two terms. That set a precedent for the rest of the country," Holcomb said. 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Denied Russellville medical cannabis applicant among those requesting investigative hearing before medical cannabis commission

With a rollout that makes the 1985 debut of 'New Coke' look successful, Alabama's medical cannabis licensing process is once again

being challenged, this time by 12 applicants denied integrated facility licenses, a group that includes the Russellvillebased Natural Relief

Cultivation, LLC.
For the third time, the Alabama Medical Cannabis Commission awarded licenses to five integrated facilities applicants.
These valuable licenses allow



recipients to sell, cultivate, process, transport and dispense medical cannabis at up to five dispensary sites.

Natural Relief Cultivation, LLC, was once again not among the five companies who received integrated facility licenses. Coordinated by Brian Faught, the operator of Arkansas' largest dispensary, Natural Relief entered into an agreement with the City of Russellville in 2022 to purchase 28 acres on Highway 24 East from the city, with the con-

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dition the sale would only go through if its application was proved by the AMCC. The company also has an agreement in place to purchase a separate parcel of land on 24 East to build a dispensary conditioned upon it receiving a license.

Even with an experienced medical cannabis professional leading the application process and hundreds of millions of dollars in place to complete its buildout, Natural Relief Cultivation was not among the top 15 applicants when the commission ranked the applicants at its December 12th meeting.

With allegations of political cronyism, conflicts of interest for commission members and secret meetings, the application process has been challenged in court each time it was completed.

Sen. Larry Stutts, who represents
Franklin County in
Alabama's District Six, has been one of the most outspoken legislative critics of the Alabama Medical Cannabis
Commission.

"You have a few people selecting a few applicants and to get selected is worth millions of dollars. That opens up the floodgates for corruption," Stutts told the FFP last month.

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of the controversy might be manufactured in an intentional attempt to attack the process and get the commission to award licenses to all qualified applicants.

Alabama's medical cannabis law states an applicant who is denied a license may provide a public investigative hearing where the applicant may present any documentation or evidence it believes shows it suitability for a license.

Each of the five integrated facility license grantees paid its \$50,000 license fee within the allotted time and the process to become operational has begun.

With lawsuits pending and allegations that question the integrity of the process, it seems we remain a long way from actually providing medical cannabis to Alabamians whose medical conditions qualify them to use it.

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
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Quilt Guild Exhibition begins January 5th at Florence's Kennedy-Douglass Center for the Arts

A day after the Alabama High School Athletic Association announced its reclassifications for fall sports, Colbert Heights varsity football coach Tyler Jeffreys finalized his team's 2024 schedule, the first time the young head coach went through that sometimes difficult process.

TVA begins prescribed burns on public lands in Alabama

TVA Natural Resources Management has started its prescribed fire program on public lands in Alabama. Counties where burns may be carried out include Colbert, Franklin, Jackson, Lauderdale, Limestone, Marion, and Marshall.

All prescribed fire use is subject to favorable weather conditions and the availability of fire personnel. The planned time period for burning is December 2023 to March 2024.

Prescribed burns, sometimes referred to as controlled burns, are valuable tools to protect and improve natural resources. They can help maintain and establish wildlife habitat, and reduce thatch and leaves that help fuel wildfires. Burns also stimulate the growth of desirable vegetation and recycle nutrients back into the soil.

Safety is a top priority. Fire managers from several state agencies, including the Alabama Forestry Commission, are partnering to prepare written prescribed burn plans.

A prescription is a set of conditions that considers the safety of the public and fire team members, land management objectives and favorable weather.

Proper permits are obtained and landowners within a reasonable distance of the burn are notified of the intent to burn as well as the local volunteer fire departments. The plans are prepared and the safety measures taken are vital to safely meeting the site specific land management objectives.

Prior to and during firing operations, all weather conditions are closely monitored to ensure prescription parameters are met. TVA and partners have safely conducted prescribed burns on more than 20,000 acres of public land in recent years.
