TVA's Burns thru March

KNOXVILLE-TVA Natural Resources Management has started its prescribed fire program on public lands in Alabama. The counties where burns may be carried out include Colbert, Franklin, Lauderdale, and Limestone. All prescribed fire use is subject to favorable weather conditions and the availability of fire personnel. The planned time period for burning is January-March 2024.

Prescribed burns are sometimes referred to as controlled burns. They are valuable tools in protecting and improving natural resources. They can help maintain and establish wildlife habitat and reduce thatch and leaves that help fuel wildfires. Burns also stimulate the growth of desirable vegetation and recycle nutrients back into the soil.

Safety is a top priority. Fire managers, including those from the Alabama Forestry Commission, are partnering to prepare written prescribed burn plans. Proper permits are obtained and landowners within a reasonable distance of the burn are notified. All weather conditions are closely monitored to ensure prescription parameters are met. TVA and partners have safely conducted prescribed burns on more than 20,000 acres of public land in recent years.


WORK HARD NOW, CELEBRATE LATER

During his senior year, Spurrier led Florida to a No. 11 ranking and an 8-2 record, winning the 1966 Heisman Trophy, the Walter Camp Award, and was a unanimous All-American.

Spurrier finished his college career with 4,848 passing yards and 37 touchdowns, establishing numerous Florida and SEC records along the

He used that experience to establish a coaching career that spanned over 400 games. These include a national championship team, seven conference titles and nine conference Coach of the Year awards. Spurrier won 72% of the college games he coached.

As a coach, Spurrier led Duke to the 1989 Atlantic Coast Conference championship before returning to his alma mater, the University of Florida, as head coach in 1990. During his 12 seasons with the Gators, Spurrier's teams won six Southeastern Conference championships, one national title, and finished ranked in the nation's top 10 nine times.

then spent year as coach of the Washington Redskins (now Commanders) of the NFL before returning to the college ranks at South Carolina. Spurrier remained there for 12

In his first season at South Carolina, Spurrier led the Gamecocks to a 7-5 record and a second-place finish in the SEC Eastern Division. In doing so, he posted a five-game winning streak. This was the 15th-consecutive year in which he had a fivegame winning streak, something no other coach in college history had accomplished. He was honored as the SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press after leading the Gamecocks to a school-record five straight SEC wins. This record included first-ever win at their Tennessee and their first win over Florida since the 1930s. all, Spurrier

compiled a 226-85-2 record in 25 seasons as a major college head coach. He became the fourth coach to record 100 or more wins as an SEC coach against SEC competition not including three wins against SEC teams

while coaching at Duke. Only Paul "Bear" Bryant (159) won more conference games than Coach Spurrier's 131. Spurrier passed John Vaught (106) and Vince Dooley (105) during the 2010 campaign.

Spurrier was selected by the San Francisco 49ers with the third overall pick in the 1967 NFL Draft. He played there for nine years, spelling John Brodie as quarterback in 1972 and leading the 49ers to a third-consecutive NFC West Title.

Fondly known as "The Head Ball Coach," Fondly Spurrier is a member of the Orange Bowl Hall of Fame, the National High School Hall of Fame, the Florida Football Ring of Honor (2006), the South Carolina Hall of Fame (2021) and the College Football Hall of Fame as both a player (1986) and a coach (2017). These achievements make him the fourth person to be selected as both a player and a coach.

Medicare Minute

"Signing up for Medicare Part 1"

The most common way to qualify for Medicare is when you are turning 65. You will have a specific time period, set by Medicare, to enroll in Part A and Part B Medicare. This is known as the Initial Enrollment Period (IEP).

If you are qualifying for Medicare by turning 65 you will have a 7 month window to enroll in Medicare. This window is based off of the month you turn 65. It starts 3 months prior to the month you turn 65 and extends 3 months past the month you turn 65. For example, if you are turning 65 in September your IEP begins in June and extends all the way through the month of December. If you are eligible, you may not have to pay a premium for Part A, but Part B will have a premium.

For those electing to sign up for Part B after their IEP a late-enrollment penalty may be assessed. This penalty can last as long as you have Part B and there may be a gap in your health coverage. However, one exception to this rule is being employed and having coverage through your company's group health plan. If this applies to you check with your benefit coordinator, Medicare or contact our office.

In most cases, if you are already drawing your Social Security or Railroad Retirement Board benefits you should automatically be signed up for Part A and Part B. If you are not drawing your Social Security or RRB benefits and want to sign up for Medicare you can do so by signing up online at ssa.gov, visit your local Social Security office or give our office a call and we can help direct you.



today.) On that chilly December morning, the crowd cheered when the covering was removed from the new marker and proud alumna, Glyndell (Whitsett) Clemmons, read aloud the text inscribed on each side. Briefly, it tells the lifespan of the school (1951-2004), the names of the principals who oversaw the teachers and students during those 53 years, and other interesting information. It even includes the lyrics of the school's Alma Mater which students proudly sang (or played as members of the marching band) at gatherings of all types.

Look carefully the accompanying photograph. It is an aerial view of the 25acre campus which was designed by the worldfamous firm established in 1858 by Frederick Law Olmsted, America's first landscape architectural company. The panoramic shot of the front façade of the grand building clearly shows its International Modern design which was popular in the U.S. and Europe from, roughly, 1930 to 1960. The total cost of the three buildings (auditorium, academic and gymnasium) was \$1,100,000. When Coffee High merged with Bradshaw High to form Florence High in 2004, the Coffee High buildings continued to be the home of students and faculty in grades 7-9. However, the building was razed in 2016 and replaced by the large Greek Revival structure for all students in the entire school system who are in grades 7 and 8.



Beginning 2024 a Little Heavier?

Editor:

2024 is here and congratulations – you are here to celebrate!

This is the time of the year when people are making New Year's resolutions. Typically, the most common is to lose a few pounds.

I suspect you want to lose a couple of pounds. Maybe you need to lose several pounds like I do. From September 1-December 27, I gained 15 pounds. On September 1, I weighed 198 pounds. Then on December 27, I weighed 213 pounds.

My trend started when I had my colonoscopy. My doctor didn't want me to eat any salads and a number of other healthy foods in preparation for my procedure. I had some very happy meals and gained almost two pounds leading up to my test. A couple of family get togethers, a vacation, Thanksgiving and Christmas added up to 15 pounds. I can tell the difference when I put my shoes on.

Developing plantar fasciitis and a sore foot didn't help matters either. Many Americans deal with this occasional foot issue. During flare ups, it really hurts to

The only way I'll be able to shed the pounds is to get really strict with my eating. We gain weight by eating too much and we lose weight when we cut back the portions and eat much less. A lot of our

eating is habit. We think we have to be eating all the time. Winter months are tough because we sit in front of the TV and think we must have food going into our mouths.

Consider proportional eating. Eat three small meals a day. Women can typically lose weight if they keep the calories to 1200 a day. If you are active, then maybe 1400. Aim for three 400 calorie meals. Men typically can lose on about 1700 calories a day. This gives you three meals at just under 600 per meal. Keep in mind that food often has more calories than we think.

Another option is to graze all day. A fitness trainer friend eats six times a day, but it's only about 300 calories at a time. The upside to this plan is that you are looking forward to your next little meal. If you like to eat all the time, this may be your best plan.

Any activity will also help. Winter months are tough, so you have to be creative. Walk in place. Clean your house. Do sit-ups while watching television. Do some toe touches, pushups, squats, and anything that will get your heart rate up. Gym memberships soar at this time of the year. If you have time to go to the gym, it might help you get through the winter. Mentally, it might help you to get out of the



defend religious liberty, to stand for faith and patriotism and stand unapologetically for the fact that we are one nation under God."

He IS good. His practice of drawing parallels between two wildly differing religious perspectives is convincing. Yet, living faithfully under either one of these umbrellas would totally exclude recognizing the other.

While in Iowa last Wednesday, Vivek's response to a divisive baiting by a leftist reporter is one for the ages, employing both brilliant tact and a searing sharpness. The video of his response was trending heavily on social media afterward. Below is the text of his response. We ALL should engrain this in our consciousness.

YOUNG FEMALE REPORTER:

"You didn't say that you condemn white supremacy, though."

You wanna know what the best way is to end discrimination on the basis of race? Stop discriminating on the basis of race. Do that and we're going to move this country forward. And I don't care whether you're black or white or brown, or anything in between. That's how we're going to unite this country.

You people have been responsible for dividing this country to a breaking point, creating a projection of national division. I meet people from the South Side of Chicago to meetings like this one, of every shade of melanin, multiple, from man to woman -- doesn't make a difference -- who are hungry for reviving unity in this country. And you with your catechism that you try to get politicians to whatever fake headline you're going to print on the basis of this conversation tomorrow. That's what's dividing this country to a breaking point. Shame on you. Look people in the eye and tell them what you've actually failed to tell them for the last five years. Own the accountability for your own failures as the media. That's how we rebuild trust in this country. And until then, I don't have a lot of patience to play the games.'

Toenail Trimming Tips for Seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend some good toenail clipping solutions for seniors? My toenails have gotten increasingly thick since I've gotten older and have become very difficult for me to reach down and cut.

Almost 80

Dear Almost,

Trimming your toenails is a task that most people don't think much about, but as we get older it can become very challenging. For many older adults, like yourself, toenails can become thicker and harder to cut, and reduced flexibility can make it more difficult to even get into the right position to cut them. Fortunately, there are solutions available that can make this job a little easier.

One of the simplest tricks

for cutting thick toenails is to simply take a bath or shower, or soak your feet in warm water, prior to cutting them. The water helps soften them for easier cutting.

There are also toenail softening creams you can buy, like "Miracle of Aloe Toenail Soft" and "Barielle Toenail Softening Cream," that temporarily softens thick, hard nails. Just rub it into your toenails at bedtime and in the morning, they'll be easier to cut and file.

Most people's toenails grow about 1/16 inch per month, so it's appropriate to cut them every six to eight weeks.

When cutting nails, take care not to cut too far down. Overaggressive trimming and cutting the toenails too short can lead to ingrown

toenails. Podiatrists typically recommend leaving a very small bit (about 1/32 inch) of nail past the nail bed when trimming.

You may also want to avoid a rounded cut. It's best to cut the nails fairly straight across, ensuring that the corners of the nail do not cut into the skin folds of the toe. And use an emery board to smooth the jagged edges and corners that can snag and potentially tear the nail as it grows.

Top Toenail Clippers

There are a number of medical-grade or specialty toenail clippers recommended by professionals for older adults.

For thick nails the "New Huing Podiatrist Toenail Clippers" is a top option. This clipper has a sharp, curved blade that easily cuts through any toenail, no matter how hard or thick it has gotten, and a nonslip, cushion grip that allows for comfortable clipping.

For those with limited mobility, check out the "Clipperpro Omega Select Toenail Clipper," which has a long plastic grip that's much larger than that of a standard

set of nail clippers and a blade head that swivels 180 degrees. Both of those features make this clipper much easier to use for anyone with arthritis or mobility issues, since they have more control and an added range they can reach.

And for people who have a hard time bending over, there are long handled toenail clippers like the "DriFeez Long Handle Toenail Clippers" which come in four sizes - 20, 24, 28 and 32 inches long. It also has a heavy-duty clipper with a 1/8-inch-wide jaw opening designed to cut thick toenails.

All of these clippers are available online at sites like Amazon.com or Walmart.com at prices ranging between \$10 and \$40.

Toenail Trimming Services If you get to the point that you can't, or would rather not cut your own toenails, a podiatrist can provide both foot and toenail care. But be aware that routine foot care is not covered by Medicare unless you have an underlying condition or injury that requires a professional to tend to your feet.

If you are generally in good health, regular pedicures at a nail salon is good option for

getting your toenails cut and is much cheaper than visiting a podiatrist.

Our smartphones are windows into our lives.

They contain information on who we are talking to and how we spend our time with a precise record of phone calls, text messages, emails, and apps. The wealth of information in your phone makes it the perfect target for prying eyes. Unfortunately, there's a good chance those eyes may belong to your partner.

Here at WhistleOut, we surveyed 1,000 Americans to learn just how common snooping through your partner's phone actually is. We found that over a third of Americans (36%) admit to snooping in their partner's phone and 58% of Americans think that snooping is okay. This behavior happens across all ages and among both men and women. It can also lead to major arguments and a loss of trust in your relationship.

What is phone snooping?

Phone snooping is searching another individual's phonewithout their knowledge.

Many times this behavior is driven by suspicion, like looking for secrets or invading someone's privacy. However, it can also be caused by curiosity. For example, if someone has ever given you their phone to look at

vacation photos and you absentmindedly kept swiping after they ended, you were technically phone snooping.

Snooping can happen in any relationship, such as romantic partners, among friends, or even a parent searching their child's phone. That said, snooping among partners often carries extra stigma. While it can be simple curiosity, it usually occurs because you suspect your partner is doing something wrong or you no longer trust them.

What are phone snoopers looking for?

Because your phone holds tons of information, phone snoopers can sift through a lot of data.

Common targets for snooping include:

- Texts
- Phone calls and voicemails
- Direct messages in social media apps
 - Emails
- Photos
- Apps (such as dating and financial apps)

Opinions on phone snooping

A majority of Americans believe that snooping is okay. That statistic includes all genders, but men are slightly more likely to support the practice. That said, only 36% of Americans admitted they've actually acted on those impulses.

- 58% of Americans think snooping on their partner's phone is okay
- Men are slightly more likely to think phone snooping is okay than women
- Over a third of Americans (36%) admit to snooping on their partner's phone

Phone snooping is a problem for all generations

The major differences in opinions on phone snooping are between the generations. Gen Z reported the highest rates of thinking phone snooping is okay, while baby boomers and Gen Xers reported the lowest.

• 82% of Gen Zers think phone snooping is okay, while 65% of Millennials think it's okay

- Less than half of Gen Xers and Baby Boomers think phone snooping is ever justified
- Millennials are the most likely to have looked through their partner's phone with over half (54%) admitting to snooping. Baby Boomers are the least likely to have snooped on their partner's phone (17%), followed by Gen Z (34%)

Millennials are the big story here. The majority of that generation believes that phone snooping is okay and over half of them have done it in the past.

Gen Z, while having the highest support for phone snooping, actually has some of the lowest rates of people who admitted to snooping. This could be because of Gen Z's overall approach to technology and social media. They are generally more open online with fewer reservations about protecting their privacy. Most of them are also tech-savvy enough to poke around social media to answer their questions without feeling the need to break into their partner's phone.

Many phone snoopers don't find anything incriminating

What do people find when they snoop on their partner's phone? Most commonly, people found nothing at all that would sully their relationship. That said, some people found their partner was cheating or talking to an ex

- 1 in 3 people who snooped found that their partner was cheating, while 1 in 4 found that their partner was talking to an ex.
- 44% of phone snoopers found nothing incriminating

If the rates of people caught cheating or talking to an ex seem high, keep in mind that many people only snoop on their partner's


phone if they're already suspicious something is happening. There's a bit of a confirmation bias in analyzing the findings of people who already suspect their partner is hiding something.

Most people don't regret phone snooping

Regardless of what people find on their partner's phones, the majority of people who snoop don't regret it. That said, confronting your partner or getting caught can have consequences. Some snooping incidents have led to major arguments and breakups.

- 68% of people who snooped say they don't regret snooping through their partner's phone
- Over 1 in 4 phone snooping incidents led to an intense argument (27%)
- However, in nearly the same amount of cases (26%) the partner was actually okay with the phone snooping

Methodology: We conducted a survey of 1000 U.S. adults using Pollfish. These results are post-stratified.
