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

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

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

Many years ago, a family walking on the Riverwalk found an emaciated ferret. They brought the ferret to us. We fixed a cage for him with the proper food, water, and a blanket for cuddling. He ate, drank, and then immediately settled in for a nap.

A few days later, another person found an emaciated ferret on the Riverwalk and brought her to us. It seemed to be too much of a coincidence for two ferrets to be found in the same condition in the same place, just days apart.

We put the second one in the cage with the first one and were able to witness a wonderful reunion. They obviously were bonded. After a meal, they cuddled together. We found them a home where they remained together.

Ferrets are intelligent and are wonderful companions. They do have specific needs and specific characteristics. They are definitely carnivores and must have a meatbased diet; in fact, it is now known that they cannot process fruit and should be fed a high quality ferret food. They were originally bred to hunt rabbits.

They sleep 14-18 hours a day and are mostly actively between dawn and dusk. Their average life span is 7-10 years. Most companion ferrets






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in the United States have been "de-scented," although in some countries that is outlawed. In some countries, it is actually illegal to keep ferrets as pets.

antique, even if we know more about the maker's work than about the maker. Few names of antique folk artists and country crafters are known today, and even less is known about the people behind them. John Boyer, who made seed chests in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, in the mid- to late 19th century, is one of these crafters.

Boyer Chests

This seed chest, attributed to Boyer, sold for an impressive \$28,320 at a Conestoga auction. The chest features grain painting, a popular decoration at the time. Grain painting meant painting an inexpensive material, such as pine, to resemble an expensive wood, such as mahogany. Boyer chests have a distinctive style of grain painting with diagonal stripes on the sides and vertical lines on the front drawers, which are visible on the chest pictured. We may not know his life story, but John Boyer clearly left his mark on the antiques world.

Wooden wringers from the late 1800s and early 1900s sell for about \$50 to \$100 depending on condition.

TIP: If there are traces of glue on the back of a label, soak the label and carefully scrape the glue off under

She was of Methodist faith and attended Hickory Grove United Methodist church in her younger years and later other churches.


She worked in Reidsville N.C. in her younger years. She also enjoyed being around her family so much and doing plastic canvas tissue boxes.


In addition to his Mother and Father, Larry was predeceased by a nephew, Joey Bennett.

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

NO-BAKE PEANUT BUTTER PROTEIN ENERGY BALLS

Makes 20-22 energy balls

-1/4 cup water

— 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter or almond butter

-1/4 cup honey

protein powder

— 1/2 cup uncooked steel cut oats 3/4 cup natural or vanilla whey

 2 tablespoons natural unsweetened cocoa powder

3 tablespoons unsweetened shredded coconut



Mix all ingredients except the coconut in a bowl. Spoon coconut in a separate bowl.

Scoop a tablespoon of the mixture and roll it into a ball with your hands. Gently roll the ball in the coconut and set in a storage container. Refrigerate for 15 minutes, then serve.

Store in refrigerator. Freezes well. Alternative Idea: Use 3/4 cup chocolate-flavored whey protein powder in lieu of plain or vanilla and omit cocoa powder.



Whom to trust?

Wouldn't you get a sick feeling in the pit of your stomach if you wondered whether your treatment nurse had obtained a fake diploma?

Three owners of nursing schools in two states were found guilty, as well as several of their pals (for a total of 27 scammers), for a scheme that involved selling fake nursing diplomas they apparently got from two formerly genuine schools. Students who wanted to take the national nursing board exam could purchase from the scammers diplomas that would allow them to take the tests. The genuine schools were eventually closed because of their test failure rate. However, some applicants managed to pass the exam and used the fake documents to get jobs everywhere in the country. Over 7,000 fake diplomas were handed out.

What happens now, one wonders? Assuming there were records, will anyone go after any of the faux nurses and at least let their new employers (such as the Department of Veterans Affairs) know about the fake diplomas?

In another case, a man was sent to prison (not for long enough) for distributing over \$16 million in adulterated HIV drugs, as well as other medications, all around the country. The scammer and his pals actually set up businesses in multiple states from which they sold the corrupted drugs to wholesale drug suppliers, which then sold them to pharmacies, ensuring that the drugs were spread far and wide. The criminals had on hand enough drugs to net them at least \$25 million when sold.

In one gut-wrenching case, two nurses lied to investigators after a patient died at a VA hospital. They claimed they hadn't "paused" the patient's medication. They actually had. The patient died.

Curiously, one nurse was given only three months in the federal slammer, and the other one got six months. Even more curious, the judge gave them both until January to turn themselves in at the prison, noting the "circumstances of the offense." What on earth does that mean?

Daily Step Counting

How many daily steps do we really need for optimum health? Ten thousand steps seems to be the gold standard in most of what we read to keep diabetes and high blood pressure (as well as several other conditions) at bay. And how do we keep track of all our steps?

Before you decide on a target number of steps per day, call your medical provider and ask how many you should be doing. You might learn that with an otherwise active, healthy life, several thousand steps per day might be enough, rather than the whole 10,000.

How to count those steps is the tricky part. I have several of those little clip-on step counters, and unfortunately, they all come up with different results. I have no way of knowing which are accurate.

There is a popular tracker called Fitbit, a fancy step counter that looks like a watch. Each model has pros and cons, per thousands of online reviews. Some do more than just count steps; they also keep tabs on your location with GPS, your pace and how far you've walked, your sleep profile, your heart rate and your stress level. They can be pricey, especially if you want to unlock all the features and sign up for Fitbit Premium to see all your data on the dashboard.

Your best bet is to Google "best step counters for seniors" and wade through a few dozen choices. You'll find Apple Watch, 3DTriSport Walking 3D Pedometer, Garmin Vivofit 4 activity tracker and so many more. If you have a subscription to Consumer Reports, check their reviews on activity trackers for seniors.

Before you opt for an expensive tracker, visit a store where they are sold and try them out. A watch font might be too tiny to read, or a clip-on might not stay clipped on.

Bonus: Several Medicare Advantage plans provide either free or reduced-cost Fitbit devices.

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The Best Bread Pudding

116 oz loaf French bread

5 eggs

1 cup sugar

11/2 cup milk

11/2 cup heavy cream

2 tsp vanilla

1 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp nutmeg Sauce:

1 Tbs flour

1/2 cup sugar

4 Tbs butter

1 tsp vanilla

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350.

Spray a 9"x13" baking dish with non-stick cooking spray.

Cut bread into 1"-2" squares and add to large bowl.

In another bowl whisk together your milk, cream, eggs, sugar, vanilla, cinnamon and nutmeg until combined.

Pour over bread and stir gently to coat, let soak for about 20 minutes.

Spread into baking dish and bake in oven for about 50-60 minutes until center is set. In saucepan whisk together sugar, flour and heavy cream until combined.

Add in your butter and heat on medium until butter melts and liquid starts to boil. Whisk until thickened slightly then remove from heat and stir in vanilla.

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
