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# Franklin EMA Director describes last week as most severe weather emergency in her five years on the job

It didn't take Mary Hallman-Glass long to answer where the January 2024 arctic weather blast ranked among the severe weather events she's been through as Franklin County Emergency Management Agency Director.

"It's the most severe I've dealt with in my five years (as EMA Director)," Hallman-Glass said.

And as of Monday night, Franklin County residents were still dealing with icy road conditions sufficient to cause Franklin County Schools to remain closed through Tuesday.

"It's the combination of all the sleet then temperatures never getting high enough to give it a chance to melt," Hallman-Glass said. "And all it did was just sit there and get hard."

While most Franklin County resi-

# RHS great Tiggs to be honored at Jan. 30th home basketball game

When the Russellville Golden Tigers host West Point Tuesday, January 30th for girls' and boys' varsity basketball games, the evening will be about much more than just trying to beat an Area 15 opponent.

The night will belong to 1983 Russellville High School graduate Luther Tiggs, who will be honored at halftime of the boys' varsity game.

It will be a 'back to the 80s' theme for the RHS student section, a fitting motif for a night that honors Tiggs and the 1982 Golden Tigers, who won a state championship that season. Tiggs was named the state's

Most Valuable Player as well.

A two-time All American at RHS,
Tiggs went to the University of
Cincinnati to play basketball for the
Bearcats. But Tiggs transferred to
the University of North Alabama
and the decision was a good one,
as he would become UNA's all-time
assist leader in a game, season and
career.

Assists are a fitting record for Tiggs to hold, as he's assisted those around him to become better players, students and people his entire career.

Tiggs retired last year from his coaching job at Bob Jones High School, ending a 33-year career as an administrator, teacher and

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
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
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

coach, including 22 years as a head coach at Bob Jones, James Clemens, Sparkman and Buckhorn High Schools. He finished with 427 career wins

as a head coach, with only 248 losses. Tiggs was inducted last year into the UNA Sports Hall of Fame.

"Luther has been honored in all of his roles for his success and impact, and now it's time for his hometown to do the same," said RHS Principal Jeremy Madden.

"We hope to see a big crowd show up to celebrate the legacy of our own Luther Tiggs and the positive way he has represented Russellville over the years," Madden added.

Tiggs shined in the AHSAA state playoffs as a Golden Tiger, but teams he coached were no strangers to the post season themselves.

His 2005 Sparkman team made the AHSAA Final Four, and the next season Sparkman posted a 32-4 record, Tiggs' best win-loss record in one season.

Tiggs and his wife Sylvia have been married 32 years and have two sons.

Although retired from education, Tiggs still serves on the committee for the annual Alabama All-Star Basketball Game and he remains tournament director of the annual N2Hoops Tournament he helped start while at Bob Jones.

Tuesday night is expected to include a few unknowns for Tiggs. Although Tiggs knows he

will be attending Luther Tiggs Night, Madden has a few tricks up his sleeve in not sharing all the details of the evening with its honoree.

Those may include appearances from some special guests along with some other surprises.

Throwback signage from the 80s along with students dressed in 80s attire will also make the evening a special one for all in attendance.

dents heeded the recommendations to stay at home, some didn't have that choice due to emergency situations. Others just decided to ignore safety warnings.

The net result? A lot of vehicles in ditches and a lot of sliding that caused damage to those vehicles.

"There still are a lot of cars in ditches. I get it, if you're running out of food or have some emergency. But you need to understand we ask them to stay at home because it's a matter of life safety," Hallman-Glass said. "We had an elderly couple who couldn't get out to get their medicine, so they called 911 and I was able to get their medication to them.

"Sometimes people don't want to call because they know we're so busy. So they think 'I've got a front-wheel drive car so I can drive on this, then they soon learn differently," she added.

From wrecker services to ambulance crews to police and fire department personnel, Franklin County's first responders answered the call last week, again and again.

"It takes all of us. We've all got to be on the same team, because one ambulance service can't do it alone. One fire department can't do it. It takes a team effort together to get something done. And I feel like that happened last week with everyone helping each other," Hallman-Glass said.

The hard sheets of ice made driving nearly impossible in some areas, even for four-wheel drive vehicles, Hallman-Glass said.

Emergency personnel, including Franklin County EMA, transported dialysis patients for treatment, and assisted ambulances that could not make it up driveways or roads to get to patients.

"We had one ambulance run off the road after it slid and wrecked. There was a law enforcement vehicle that ended up in a ditch and I damaged my vehicle after a slide," Hallman-Glass said.

Dangerous ice remained on some county roads Monday night after Monday's temperatures weren't high enough to melt it all.

"It will take this rain (forecast for Tuesday night and Wednesday) coming in to melt it, so we're hoping the rain will start Tuesday night into Wednesday and that will take care of most of this," Hallman-Glass said. "The road temperatures are so cold, the ice just hasn't been melting."

Hazardous road conditions and ice around the Franklin County Courthouse and Courthouse Annex forced their closing on Monday, January 22nd. And backstreets in shaded areas in the City of Russellville remain iced over, Hallman-Glass said, so motorists are encouraged to use extreme caution traveling on non-major collector roads.

# RHS honored nationally for gender diversity in AP Computer Science Principles class

As high school students begin to consider their desired career path once their education is complete, computer science is one of the most rapidly growing career choices.

And an award received by Russellville High School indicates the school is doing all it can to expose students to this vital field.

RHS was honored last week with the AP (Advanced Placement) Computer Science Female Diversity Award for the outstanding job RHS' AP Computer Science Principles (CSP) instructors and students have done in expanding girls' access to this important program.

According to College Board research, female students who take AP Computer Science Principles in high school are 500% more likely to major in computer science or a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) as compared to female students of similar background and academic preparation who don't take CSP.

Female students remain underrepresented in high school computer science classes across the country, though, accounting for just over one-third of AP Computer Science Principles participants.

Almost 58% of the nation's high schools teach foundational computer science, and only 1,127 of those received this year's AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award. With more than 23,500 public high schools in the United States, less than five percent qualify for the award.

Russellville High School met the requirement of having 50% or more female students in its AP Computer Science Principles classes.

"Computer science is the source code of our economy and much of the career landscape," said Trevor Parker, Head of the AP Program nationally. "In the six years since we began the AP Computer Science Female Diversity Award, it's been heartening to see schools like Russellville HighSchool welcome so many more young women into this vital field."

Brea Colagross is in her sixth year as AP Computer Science Principles teacher at Russellville. Colagross, whose teaching experience prior to CSP was in math and business education, said once she was asked to teach computer science eight years ago, she put in hundreds of hours of training and workshops to become certified, which totally changed her outlook on job opportunities for her students

"It exposes students to such a different way of thinking about the world," Colagross said. "Now, rather than just being users of technology, it changes their thoughts to become those who have the ideas of change to innovate our world.

"Whether it's design, programming or cyber-security, the opportunities are so vast. I have two former students working for NASA now. Whether or not my students decide to major in computer science and it becomes their job and career, it's a whole other way to take their math and science skills and use them to think in a completely different way," she added.

Providing female students with access to computer science courses is a vital step toward the goal of gender parity in STEM careers. These are generally high-paying jobs that help drive American innovation and creativity.

Students who complete AP Computer Sciences Principles and pass an exam earn college credit for taking the course in high school.

Colagross also teaches a freshmen Foundational Computer Science Principles course as well as IT Fundamentals and Python Programming. While the AP Computer Sciences Principles class has

a large number of girls, Colagross said her other classes continue to see male student numbers exceed female student participation.

"It's interesting to see the number of boys outweigh the number of girls who sign up for these classes," Colagross said. "I encouraged my daughter to take the class, then she encouraged some of her friends to take it and that's a good way for more girls participate. When they see the class as fun, opportunities come from that and then they use their experience to recruit others."

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## Voters to decide amendment related to local legislation

When Alabama voters go to the polls for the March 5, 2024, primary elections, they will also vote on one constitutional amendment.

Amendment
One will appear
on all ballots,
regardless of
whether the
voter casts a ballot in the
Republican or
Democratic
Primary.

The language of Amendment One reads as follows: Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Alabama 2022, to amend Section 71.01 authorizing the Legislature to



sign and transmit local laws or constitutional amendments before the transmission of basic appropriations.

Section 71.01 of the Alabama Constitution prohibits any bill or law from being considered by the House of Representatives or Senate before budgets are approved by the Legislature and sent to the Governor, unless an additional vote is approved by the House and Senate of at least a three-fifths (3/5ths) vote.

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Essentially, the Constitution requires the Legislature to pass a budget and send it the governor for signature before it can consider any other legislation.

If voters approve Amendment One, the Legislature may vote on and approve local laws or local Constitutional amendments even before the budget is approved.

Local laws are those which are not classified as general, special or private laws. While general laws apply to the entire state, a local law only impacts the residents of a particular county or counties.

The same is true for a local Constitutional Amendment. An example of a local Constitutional Amendment for Franklin County came in 2018 when voters were asked to consider extending the county's one-cent sales tax (with 75% going to the two school systems in

Franklin



County and 25% to the Franklin County Commission for road and bridge improvements) for a 30-year period.

Previously the one-cent tax was considered by Franklin County voters every two years.

Under the 2024 amendment, the Legislature could approve local legislation and clear the way for local amendments to be placed on the November general election ballot.

The Legislature has frequently used the three-fifths rule to usher through bills before approval of a budget, a procedural step called the Budget Isolation Reduction.

Why a Constitutional amendment is needed is something advocates of Amendment One must explain to voters. Count the Association of County Commissions of Alabama Executive Director Sonny Brasfield as one who supports the amendment.

"Local legislation is designed to deal with a problem in a particular county that's different from problems in neighboring counties. We think legislators ought to be able to bring those bills at any time and not be restricted by this budget isolation vote," Brasfield told a Birmingham television station last week.

Whether Alabama voters agree remains to be seen.

After a slow start last year (0-5), Russellville

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

went on to post a 5-1 area record and a Class 5A Area 14 championship.

Just like 2023, 2024's schedule is loaded with teams who regularly compete for state titles, including 7A Sparkman, a perennial competitor for the North each season, Piedmont, which has reached the 3A state championship and Arab, ranked No. 3 in 5A last season.

The Golden Tigers will face those teams in a two-day round robin event at Arab on March 29-30.

Other pre-area opponents include 7A Florence, James Clemens and Austin, 6A Baldwin County and Saraland and talented squads from Mars Hill Bible School, Guntersville, Brooks and Cullman.

"It's important to be able to compete against a high level club," Smith said. "You should do that, so we try to give our guys that opportunity on weekends throughout the season and especially prior to area play. Even on weekends after area play, we try to go play the best across the state," Smith added.

Russellville's Area 14 again includes Lawrence County, West Point and Jasper. Each of those teams gave the Golden Tigers a good test last year.

"We won a tight game one with Lawrence County, we went into extra innings against West Point and we lost game one to Jasper last year, so I believe we have some quality opponents year round, both in and out of area," Smith said.

The Golden Tigers begin their 2024 season, weather permitting, February 15th with a home game against Florence at 4:30 p.m.

And it's going to take some TLC to get the field rehabilitated after a week of being blanketed by a sheet of ice.

"Now that the ice is melting off, our plan is to apply fertilizer this week and with warmer temperatures and rainy weather, we hope to salvage the perennial rye we put out last fall," Smith said.

"It really hurts us when it comes to not being able to practice on the field. The first week was canceled and this week will be primarily indoors wherever we can go to get work in," he added.
