

Flag Pole Dedication at the Iowa Great Lakes Sanitary District

At the regular board meeting on January 23, 2024, the Trustees of the Iowa Great Lakes Sanitary District honored Bob

Boettcher by dedicating the flag pole at the Sanitary District Office for his public service and his service as a Trustee. Bob retired in September of 2023, after 28 years as a Sanitary District Trustee. He was appointed as the first Senior Advisor of the Iowa Great Lakes Sanitary District upon his retirement.Most of Bob's time as



a Trustee, he served in the position of Vice President or President of the Sanitary District board of Trustees. Bob's history of working with the Sanitary District goes back to 1945, when he worked for the Iowa Conservation Commission. Between 1939 and 1950 the Iowa Great Lakes Sanitary District was operated by the Iowa Conservation Commission (now knowsn as the Iowa Department of Nature Resources). One of Bob's jobs while working for the Conservation Commission was maintaining the road at the Iowa Great Lakes Sanitary District. Bob is a World War II veteran, and has also served as a city council member in Orleans and Spirit Lake as well as Mayor of the City of Spirit Lake.

The flagpole outside of the Sanitary District office will be relocated as part of the ongoing improvements at the wastewater treatment plant. The dedication of the flagpole on January 23, 2024, was also Bob Boettcher's 100th Birthday.

This week, we'll cover a trio of tools for "Protecting Your Interests While You Are Alive":

I. A Financial Power of Attorney

The Basics. A financial power of attorney (POA) is a legal document authorizing someone to make financial decisions on your behalf.

- When It Applies. A POA applies while you are alive, but unavailable to act for yourself. You can structure it to:
- Begin immediately or upon a triggering event (such as a debilitating accident or illness).
- Remain in force during a finite time period or be ongoing. • Apply to all your financial matters or only to specific transactions
- Common Scenarios. A financial POA can be helpful to address: · Capacity: If you become incapacitated due to illness, injury or dementia.
- Availability: If you're unable to be present for a financial transaction, such as if you're traveling abroad or you're otherwise preoccupied.
- Convenience: If you'd simply like to make it convenient for someone else to be able to make financial decisions for you - such as your spouse or a trusted sibling, your parents, or your adult children.

Additional Tips.

hom you grant a POA is only your legal agent while you are alive; their authority ends the moment you pass away. Your estate's trustees should take it from there.

Spirit Lake Protective Association Receives Major Conservation Award by Steve Weisman

The Spirit Lake Protective Association (SLPA) received a major award at

the Minnesota State Chapter Leadership Convention held in Willmar, MN on January 19-20. The award, which is the Minnesota

Pheasants Forever (PF) "Partnership of the Year for 2023," was presented to the SLPA for its efforts in working with conservationists, clean water groups in both Minnesota and Iowa, along with national conservation organizations to secure a 195.5-acre parcel of farmland just north of Shore Acres on the north shore of Big Spirit Lake.

This land will now provide a much-needed wildlife area and an important buffer to protect Big Spirit Lake waters. The land has been named the Howard K. Vincent Waterfowl Production Area Site in honor of Howard K. Vincent, the former longtime CEO of the national Pheasants Forever organization.

Sabin Adams, Minnesota Public Lands Manger for PF presented the award to Joe Ulman, board member for the SLPA. Adams reflected on the award. "Having the Spirit Lake Protective Association come to the table as a partner in this acquisition was a major win for Pheasants Forever, public lands and water quality. Doing these kinds of projects alone would be nearly impossible and therefore finding great partners is essential. Anytime you can have a partner like SLPA, who can bring local, as well as financial support to a project, you can do incredible things. The Howard K. Vincent acquisition could not have been done without them. We look forward to partnering with them on

the next one!" According to Ulman, "The SLPA is honored to be given this award. It is amazing how so many groups, organizations and individuals came together to make this project happen. We thank the Minnesota Pheasants Forever for recog-

nizing our efforts."

John Smeltzer, president of the SLPA, reflects on the significance of this project and the importance of organizations working together. "The importance of the collaboration and patience required to make a project like this come together should not be underestimated. The SLPA is but a small partner in this entire effort. We have a passion for protecting our waters, and we appreciate the investment we are all making in this area. This is truly a legacy project."

That same evening, Ulman presented a symbolic check to PF CEO and President Marilyn Vetter for \$250,000 from SLPA Membership and friends (including \$100,000 from Dickinson County Water Quality Commission) on behalf of SLPA and its membership for its efforts in helping make the "Spirit Lake North" project, now the Howard K. Vincent Waterfowl Production Area, a reality.

Marilyn Vetter, President and CEO of Pheasants Forever, shared her thoughts on the efforts of the SLPA and the "Partnership of the Year" award. "Quality wildlife habitat, publicly accessible lands and clean water are defining benefits produced by Pheasants Forever and its partners when permanent protection projects come to fruition. Furthermore, these projects transcend county and state lines with public benefits for all."

She continued, "To that end, The Habitat Organization is incredibly proud to announce the Spirit Lake Protective Association as our 2023 'Minnesota Partnership of the Year' recipient. Their support of the Howard K. Vincent Waterfowl Protection Area, located on the border of Minnesota and Iowa, will now protect water quality in Big Spirit Lake for generations to come while boosting the outdoor economy for the surrounding region."

Smeltzer concluded, "The motto for the SLPA is 'Quality of Water - Quality of

• Your agent(s) should have access to the documents that describe the POA you've granted them. If they can't prove what their role is, they may not be able to act on it when needed

II. Trusted Contact Person(s)

The Basics. In 2017, the SEC approved the role of trusted contact person as part of a FINRA Rule 4512 amendment. The amendment requires the option to name a trusted contact as an extra line of defense for your accounts. If the custodian feels you are being financially exploited, they then have a back-up person they can talk to about some of their concerns.

When It Applies. While the primary aim of the FINRA amendment is to prevent financial elder abuse, there are at least two scenarios when a trusted contact can be useful:

• If you are unavailable, and the custodian believes your account may have been compromised

• If you are cognitively impaired

Common Scenarios. If a loved one is exhibiting signs of dementia, a trusted contact can help prevent them from falling prey to financial exploitation. What if your aging parent tries to empty out their own bank account to help a "friend" in need? If your parents have named you as a trusted contact, an account custodian who suspects foul play can reach out to you, explain the circumstances, and receive your "second opinion."

Additional Tips. If you've named someone as a trusted contact, your broker or account custodian can discuss some of your relevant circumstances with them and gather pertinent information from them, but they cannot make any financial decisions on your behalf, nor can they view your account.

III. A Healthcare Advance Directive

The Basics. Your healthcare advance directive can offer two types of protection:

- Your living will provide your life-sustaining and endof-life medical care instructions, and related healthcare preferences, in case a time comes when you cannot state them for yourself.
- · Your healthcare directive can also name healthcare representative(s), or agent(s) and grant them healthcare power of attorney. If you cannot make your own healthcare decisions, your agent can decide on your behalf, guided by your living will.

When It Applies. Your healthcare advance directive only comes into play if you are alive, but unable to direct your own medical care.

Common Scenarios. Accidents and illnesses can rob you of your mental capacity. If you do not have an advance directive in place, healthcare professionals and/or key family members may have to make medical decisions for you, without knowing what you would have preferred.

Additional Tips.

Not only should almost everyone have an advance directive, but it should be easy to get a hold of. Distribute copies to your primary physician and any of your other healthcare providers to keep on file. Also, share it with key family members.







Every year the Dickinson County Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD) offers trees and shrubs to landowners and citizens within the district and surrounding area. The trees and shrubs are used for windbreaks, wildlife habitat and tree plantings. The profits from these sales are used to support the Dickinson County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The SWCD can cost-share for farmstead windbreaks and tree plantings through state funding. Ask at the district office for specific details. All cost-share projects must meet the planting specifications of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). Financial incentives are also available through the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) for shelterbelts, riparian buffers and field windbreaks. Contact NRCS or FSA for details.





Awe to Alarm to Apocalypse for America

Most Americans viewed with awe the declaration of Donald Trump for the Republican presidential nomination in 2016. His boasting that Mexico would pay for a southern border wall; declaring he would eliminate the national debt in no time; replacing the ACA with a better plan; classing all immigrants coming through Mexico as drug dealers/smugglers, criminals and rapists; banning Islamic travel; claiming John McCain was a non-hero because he was captured; and suggesting a closer friendly relationship with Putin would lead to negotiating world peace, would surely be ripped to shreds by traditional Republican candidates running against him. Lo and behold, they all dropped out, leaving him as the party's nominee and he won via the electoral college after losing the popular vote. Alarm bells sounded right away as Trump declared his inauguration crowd was the largest in history, followed by thousands of other outright lies delivered over four chaotic years of his presidency. It became clear he had no knowledge, concern or care for governing or the Constitution, placing loyalty and personal gain as his prerogatives. He immediately asked American taxpayers to fund the border wall. He had no plan for replacing ACA. His immigration initiatives were disastrous, displacing children and family members. He belittled our own CIA and intelligence agencies on the international stage while being coddled by Putin. His only legislative initiative, a gigantic tax cut increased the national debt over seven trillion dollars and greatly expanded a widening wealth gap. Still, Republican leaders across the country apparently fully endorse his candidacy. Have Republicans really become the Anti-American Constitution Party? Do they really think strong-man regimes like Russia, China, North Korea, Turkey or Hungary are paths forward? Awe and alarm are historical markers to learn from. Apocalypse is on the horizon if we don't overwhelmingly vote Trump and his supporters out in the next election cycle.



Maggie's Story

When I have a good day, I have a wonderful day. Leaving my office knowing that I allowed someone to feel heard, validated, and loved feels amazing. Seeing the moment when something you have said flips a switch somewhere in someone's mind allowing them to experience that "ah-hah" moment is honestly one of the best feelings in the world. Other experiences that remind me why I am here every day include visits with family or children after the residents have worked so hard to rebuild bridges that had been severely damaged, getting the job they really wanted, and every single day that they are stronger than their disease.

As promised in last week's article, I will be sharing stories that I have been trusted with and given permission to share. The names and other identifying information have been changed to ensure confidentiality for the residents. This week I would like to introduce you to Maggie. Maggie has been a resident with Discovery House more than once. Her first stay with us was early in my time as the director. Maggie came in as a referral off the streets and had not been to treatment prior to coming to the house. Very shortly after starting this brief stay with us, Maggie got involved with a gentleman and lost her focus. Recovery stopped being her priority, and as is typical, once the focus moves from themselves and recovery to a relationship, it becomes a very slippery slope. Maggie struggled with her mental health, guilt and shame from her addiction, and had given up hope of being reunified with her children. Maggie relapsed and was asked to leave Discovery House. Several months later, I received a call from Maggie asking if I would consider letting her come back to Discovery House. Maggie shared that she was clean and was trying hard to stay clean but could not do it where she lived. I decided to open the door for her and prayed that this time would be different. And different it was. Maggie was a completely different person. She was engaged, socialized with others, and was beginning to gain trust back with her children. It was an incredibly slow process, but she was extremely excited. About 3 months into Maggie's second stay, she walked into my office and asked if we could talk. Maggie had relapsed. She was upfront and honest, stated that she wanted to go to treatment but wanted to come back after, and promised not to do it again. And she meant it with all that she was. I genuinely believe that she was being completely honest and had every intention of staying clean. I completed a referral for her to go to treatment and sent Maggie to her room to sober up. The following morning, I followed up with the treatment center that I sent the referral in to and confirmed that Maggie was on the list and it would be 1-2 weeks before they would have a bed for her. Two more days go by and Maggie comes to my office door again. She is visibly upset with herself and tells me that she used again. I sat with her for some time discussing how her disease was controlling her life and helping her to identify the triggers that led to this relapse. Maggie was able to identify that her "gateway drug" was men. Every time her focus changed from her recovery to a relationship, she found herself back out there. There was no update on the bed in treatment for Maggie and her recent relapse was too powerful. She left Discovery House and planned to go for treatment when the bed was ready. One week later, I received a call that her spot was open. I called, drove past places she had been in the past, and called some more. Maggie was back in the depths of her addiction. The bed was filled with someone else. Occasionally Maggie would call and check in with me and I could hear desperation in her voice. I continued to remind her that she did not have to live like this anymore.

Fast forward to early December 2023. I received a call asking if I had a bed available, and if so would I accept Maggie back as a resident. This time, I had the ability to offer Maggie a bed in a different location. We talked about the damage that was done to her relationship with her kids after her last relapse and her fear that this time they would not trust her to stay clean. Maggie was terrified that she had destroyed her final chance to be part of her children's lives. Her oldest child was the first to talk with her. Through her, Maggie sent a message to her second and third children. At Christmas time, she was able to see her youngest child while still talking to her oldest and asking her to relay messages to the second and third children. Just over a week ago, Maggie walked into my office visibly upset. When I asked her what was wrong, she told me that she had attempted to contact her second child and he responded this time, but his response was "not right now" when told he could call anytime. Maggie was torn between being happy that he responded and sad that he was not ready to talk to her. In the few minutes that it took for us to explore the possibilities that he was doing something else or was with friends and he literally meant "not right now," he sent two more messages to Maggie. The first telling her that he loved her, and the second telling her that he had a game that Saturday morning. He told her where it was and what time and invited her to come watch. I assured her that she would get to the game. "Not right now" meant that he would call later. And he did. He called, they talked, and she told him she would be there on Saturday. Saturday morning, I picked Maggie up from the house at 7:30 am and we drove to her son's game. When we got there, we found seats and waited. Maggie's son saw her from behind us and came running to see his mom. He threw himself into her arms in a hug that was filled with so much excitement that he knocked her coffee right out of her hand. He kept saying how much he loved her and was so glad she was there. I watched Maggie as her face lit up, her heart began to heal right before my eyes, and her relationship with her second child found one more broken piece to put back in place. It was truly one of the most beautiful things I have ever watched, and I feel blessed to have been the one that was with her. Yesterday, Maggie got a call from her mother, who she also had not spoken to, regarding her third child. The only one that she had not gotten to see yet. They were celebrating her birthday and Maggie's mom called to invite her to the party. Just a week prior, her daughter did not want to see Maggie. Now, Maggie was going to the birthday party and spending the day with both her daughter and her mother. Two of her other children were there as well. It is not "fixed". There is still a great deal of healing that needs to happen for both sides. Maggie has a long road ahead of her in her recovery, but she is taking the right steps and is avoiding her "gateway drug" and relationships. Maggie is correct this time when she says she does not have another relapse in her. Every time an addict goes back out, it is worse than the time before. Maggie does not physically have another relapse in her. And equally as important, she likely does not have another relapse in her children's eyes. Today, Maggie feels blessed and remains motivated by the hope that someday her relationships with her children can be healthy and she can be more involved in their daily lives. For now, she is taking things one day at a time and doing the next right thing.



Hilton Magic Strikes Again

Michelle and I headed down to Ames Saturday morning to watch #23 Iowa State take on #7 Kansas in an epic Big 12 battle. It was a chance for us to see both of our kids and also catch some great college basketball. Shaelyn has been doing a sports medicine rotation with the Iowa State team doctors, and this was her last game for her monthly rotation, which was fun to see her down on the court taking in the action. Tyler is in his last semester at Iowa State, and he and a group of friends camped out from Friday afternoon until they let the students into Hilton Coliseum on Saturday around 10AM, taking in the full Hilton/ Iowa State experience.

The game was a typical Iowa State/Kansas showdown. The first half was a defensive battle, with neither team able to get much going with any offensive rhythm. Iowa State was down 26-25 when Tamin Lipsey had a break away lay-up and was fouled hard by Parker Braun, which was called a flagrant foul after review for a shot to the head. Jayhawk coach, Bill Self definitely did not agree with the call, and was issued a technical foul for sharing his thoughts with the officials. No one in the nation is better out of timeouts than Self and the Jayhawks, and they once again converted, this time with a Hunter Dickinson three-pointer. KU would also get a three from Kevin McCullar and a free throw from KJ Adams to trim the lead to 74-72 with just over 1:00 left in the game. On the next possession, ISU got the switch they wanted late in the shot clock with KU freshman Johnny Furphy having to try and guard Keshon Gilbert; Gilbert rose up with just :02 on the shot clock and delivered a dagger with a three-pointer to give ISU a 77-72 lead and send Hilton Coliseum into a frenzy. The Cyclones would get a stop on the next KU possession and salt the game away at the free throw line to pull out the impressive 79-75 victory. The Cyclones were led by Tre King, who hit four 3-pointers on his way to 21 points and also snared 9 rebounds; Gilbert added 16 points and 6 rebounds, Curtis Jones 15 points

The win pushes Iowa State to 16-4 overall and a tie for second place in the Big 12 with a 5-2 conference record. Kansas falls to 16-4 overall and is tied for fourth with a 4-3 Big 12 record. The Big 12 has proven to definitely be the top basketball conference in the country once again this year. The latest EPSN Bracketology has nine Big 12 teams in the NCAA Tournament, and an amazing 10 Big 12 teams are in the top 50 of the kenpom.com power ratings. While I'm not sure Iowa State has the firepower to win the Big 12, if they could go around .500 from here on out, they would finish with an 11-7 conference record, which would



Dear Motor Medics,

My car runs pretty well, and I am not one to bring it in just to have it checked over once in a while. I am more of the kind of person who visits the shop once the car has broken down. After listening to your show. I am thinking I may be able to save some money by doing some preventative maintenance instead of waiting for major breakdowns. Recently my brakes started making some noise, but they don't do it every day. How can I tell the difference between needing brake repairs or if it's just a little noise; and if I wanted to be proactive on brake maintenance how often should they be checked? I have been in before for a squeak and they said they were fine, just a little rusty.

Dear Joanne,

Routine maintenance will save you money on repairs. Regular inspections should be performed on safety items at each oil change and addressed as needed. These inspections are done for free at most shops so check around to see if yours does not offer this service. Inspect brakes annually and completely check them right away if there is a change in pedal travel or if noise is heard when applying them accompanied by grinding. Damp mornings can cause rust on the braking surfaces resulting in noise. This should go away after a couple of pedal applications and should not be felt in the pedal.

Dear Motor Medics,

I am a longtime fan of yours and you have saved me countless dollars on repairs by teaching me how to do them myself, and when they are larger than I can handle you have taught me how to look for the best mechanic. I drive a 2012 Ford Explorer and I am getting ready to pull a trailer with it. I have owned it for several years and it has a hitch but no trailer light connector. This will be my first time pulling a trailer with this vehicle. Can I just tap into the taillights to connect my trailer light connector, or do I need something special? I don't want to cause a problem with the vehicle. I have also serviced the transmission and rear end prior to towing as well.

Thank you, Darren in Port Saint Lucy Florida.

Dear Darren,

Great idea you had on the proactive transmission and rear differential service. Depending on the size of the trailer and load you may think about a transmission cooler if the Explorer is not equipped with one. For the trailer wiring you need to make sure you do not overload the electrical system. On this vehicle and many others, a tow wiring kit is advised. Available at most auto parts stores this kit takes its power from the battery directly and uses relays activated by the vehicles lights to power the trailer lights preventing damage to the vehicles system.





Free Cervical Cancer Screenings Available

January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month and Dickinson County Public Health has important information to share that can help those in our county. This year the American Cancer Society expects there will be roughly 13,820 new cases of invasive cervical cancer in the United States, and that about 4,360 women will die from it. Most women are diagnosed with cervical cancer between ages 35 and 44, although 20% of diagnoses are in women over age 65. Unfortunately, cervical cancer incidence rates have increased 1.7% each year from 2012 to 2019 in women ages 30 to 44. Fortunately, likely reflecting the first signs of cancer prevention from HPV vaccination, cervical cancer rates have decreased 11% each year in women ages 20 to 24. HPV vaccination is available for boys and girls starting at age nine.

Human papillomaviruses (HPV) are the most common causes of cervical cancer. Certain strains of these viruses have two proteins that turn off some tumor suppressor genes. This allows the cells lining the cervix to grow too much and develop changes in additional genes, which can lead to cancer. Early cervical cancers and pre-cancers usually have no symptoms. However, symptoms once the cancer is larger and grows into nearby tissue can include:

- Abnormal vaginal bleeding
- Unusual vaginal discharge
- Pain during sex
- Pain in pelvic region

The best way to find cervical cancer early is by a regular pap smear and HPV test. The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services' Care for Yourself program provides free pap smears and pelvic exams to a limited number of women who meet any of the following qualifications:

- Resident of Dickinson, Emmet, or Osceola counties, and
- Are between the ages of 21-64 years of age, and

•Have a monthly income of \$3,038 (take home pay) or less (add \$1,070 for each additional household member), and

· Have no health insurance, or

• Have health insurance, but are unable to pay for out-ofpocket expenses related to screenings

Lakes Regional Healthcare (LRH) recently received their audited financial results for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023. LRH ended the year with a net loss of \$70,972 which was a .1% negative margin from operations. LRH's cash and unrestricted investments were \$35,858,813.

LRH's net operating revenue totaled \$57,982,137, a 1.2% decrease from the prior year. This figure included \$56,762,283 in net patient service revenue and \$1,219,854 in other operating revenue. Net non-operating revenues were \$1,720,628, which comprised of \$944,382 in investment income, \$1,020,000 in county tax revenues, \$41,110 in the sale of assets, and \$284,864 in interest expense. Operating expenses for the year totaled \$59,806,396, a 4.9% increase from the prior year, and included \$21,776,209 for salaries and benefits; \$15,724,140 for supplies and other expenses; \$19,080,012 for purchased services and professional fees; and \$3,226,035 for depreciation.







Brown Butter-Balsamic Ravioli

6 tablespoons butter Finely chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley or 16 sage leaves 2 tablespoons balsamic glaze (or cook 1/3 cup balsamic vinegar and 1 tablespoon light brown sugar until reduced down to 2 tablespoons thickened vinegar) pound ravioli, homemade or store-bought Toasted pine nuts, chopped hazelnuts, or walnuts (optional) Grated Pecorino or Parmigiano-**Reggiano** Cheese

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Cook ravioli per directions, until desired tenderness. Drain, reserving 42 cup of

the cooking water. While ravioli are boiling, heat a large skillet over medium heat. Add the butter and melt. Add the sage, if using, and cook the butter for 2 to 3 minutes, until nutty and deeply golden. Remove the sage to a paper towel-lined plate Remove the butter from the heat and add the balsamic glaze (or reduced balsamic). Add the sauce and about 1/2 cup salty cooking



water from the pasta to the ravioli to coat evenly. Top with nuts, if using, sage or parsley, and pass more cheese.
