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

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

From the Plains to the Park Turning a popular Shoals' spot into the perfect place for a reception

Meredith McCanless and Andrews Owen met on the Plains while both studied at Auburn University. When she was a sophomore and he was a junior, they found themselves in the same friend group, and after a few friendly interactions, Meredith asked her future husband to be her date for her sorority's winter formal. She said the rest is history.

"We texted a little over Christmas break while we were both back home — I was in the Shoals and he was in Atlanta," she said. "We didn't officially start dating until April of that year, but we were together from the formal on."

After Andrews Owen graduated from Auburn, he moved to Atlanta while Meredith remained in school for a year. Once she graduated, she moved to Atlanta, too. While the couple was not officially talking about marriage, Meredith said she knew everything was right.

"I knew he was the one when I couldn't picture doing anything in life without him — when I'd think about future moments, I always pictured him being here, and he felt the same," she said.

In March 2021, on one of the coldest days on record for the month, Andrews took Meredith to his Atlanta country club to propose. Meredith said when the couple arrived, everything was super quiet, and her beau seemed nervous, so she felt like a proposal was on the horizon.

"I remember it was super windy, and we were having snow flurries in March, which is unheard of," she said. "He planned to propose outside at one of his favorite spots, but the weather made him move it inside.

"It was perfect, and I was totally surprised by my ring and the fact that he got it from a family friend in Florence — he got my mom and sister involved for that."

According to Meredith, her family has been close to Patty Klos, the owner of Parker Bingham Jewelers, for many years. When Andrews decided to propose, he asked Meredith's mom and sister to go to the store and help him choose a ring.

"They knew the cut that I had always wanted, and they went and sent him lots of pictures," Meredith explained. "It was the best surprise to know he got the ring from Florence from someone we know and love."

After five years of dating, Meredith was ready to be engaged and so excited to begin planning their big day. The first thing the couple did was choose a date (April 15, 2023) because they wanted to make sure all their folks had plenty of time to save the date. April is also a significant month for Meredith, because it is the month her parents were married, too. Then it was time to plan. Meredith did not always have a clear picture of her future wedding while growing up, but she did know that when she pictured the big day, she envisioned being surrounded by family, friends and loved ones.

"There were so many faces I pictured being there, and I always used that as my focus," she recalled. "Of course, I did love looking at pictures on Pinterest and Instagram for inspiration, but I didn't have some big plan."

Instead, Meredith said things began to fall into place with the help of loved ones and her Huntsvillebased wedding planner, Shoals' native Faith Woods.

"We basically did consultation hours with Faith - she was recommended by a family friend, and because she's from the area. she was very familiar with venues and vendors here," Meredith explained. "She was a areat resource and so thoughtful — we consulted with her along the way about how we would lavout our reception, and she just helped us think through the planning process and a lot of little details and logistics you don't think about if you've never planned a wedding or been part of planning one before.

"She was also our fulltime touchpoint the weekend of the wedding."

One aspect of the wedding where Meredith said Woods

provided a lot of help had to do with the reception location, which was uniquely held on the green space at McFarland Park.

"My family is from the Shoals, and my parents were driving past the park one day and just stopped and had this idea to do a really large tent right by the river there," Meredith said. "I was hesitant at first — I wasn't 100% gung-ho about doing an outside wedding and just couldn't visualize how it could come together."

While Meredith's parents thought the location was

ideal due to the large number of guests the couple planned to invite to their wedding and reception, she couldn't imagine how they could turn a tent by the river into an ideal space for a reception, and she said a place like a public park presents a unique set of challenges.

"Weather was a huge TBD the entire time we were planning — I told my parents the tent needed to be fully enclosed, so I didn't have to see it in case it was raining or anything — but it ended up being a beautiful, sunny day," Meredith said.

Additionally, she said they had to get creative to overcome obstacles like power supplies, kitchens for catering, and restrooms though McFarland has public restrooms, they were a ways away from the tent, and did not have ideal conditions for well-dressed wedding guests.


"We had to think about expanding the existing power bank, and we ended up bringing in restroom trailers that had AC and were well-lit so they could be closer to the tent," Meredith explained. "And most venues will have a built-in bar and a kitchen area, but we ended up setting up a catering tent and bringing in coolers."

As planning continued, Meredith realized McFarland was indeed a perfect spot for their wedding reception.

"The river and lakes in the Shoals area are such a big part of the beauty here, and it was a really nice touch and a great space to celebrate," she said. "Plus, the tent was fully customizable, which ended up being incredible and felt like a real space."

Meredith chose neutral décor for the tent, utilizing bamboo chairs, white tablecloths and white flowers with pops of pale blue and plenty of greenery. She elected to use Lola's Gifts & Flowers, which was another special, sentimental touch to the day.

"Carl [Casiday, owner of Lola's] is a great family friend, and he actually did







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the flowers at my parents' wedding," Meredith said. "He remembered everything about the flowers he did for my mom, and it was so special to be able to use Lola's as well."

According to Meredith, all the local vendors utilized for the wedding felt like the perfect match, and she said that in most cases, they were individuals who had long been a part of her family's life — something that made the big day, when it arrived, feel incredibly special.

The eve before the wedding, Meredith and her bridesmaids retired to the Stricklin Hotel after her Pickett on Court rehearsal dinner. They spent the next day getting ready in one of the event spaces the hotel offered.

"The time we spent getting ready was one of my favorite parts of the whole day," Meredith emphasized. "We just hung out, listened to music and told stories."

Once the bridesmaids were ready, the ladies took a short bus ride to Trinity Episcopal Church, Meredith's church home during her childhood and the location of the ceremony.

"I had the church decorated with really neutral, white flowers — I did Lily of the valley, which is very dainty, roses and peonies," she said. "Once we were there, I got dressed in my dress, which was just perfect."

Meredith found her dress at Mandi Jackson Bridal in Atlanta where the owner just happened to see Meredith, her mom and her sister while they shopped and commented on how cute they were.

"She asked if we happened to be shopping for a wedding dress and invited us in even though she was closing," Meredith said. "She helped me pick out my dress, and I did a little customizing on it.

"I really, really loved my dress. It was one of my favorite parts of the planning process and the day as well." Once in her picture-perfect

dress, Meredith had a first

look with her fiancé before they proceeded to the ceremony.

"Our ceremony wasn't very long — probably about 30 minutes," Meredith said. "Then, we got on a bus while everyone headed to McFarland."

As soon as the newly named Owens arrived at the park, the couple boarded a small boat captained by a friend.

"I actually saw a picture on Instagram of a bride who did a ride after her ceremony, and I thought it would be a really special touch and a way for us to have a moment together after the ceremony — plus seeing our guests from the river would be fun," Meredith said. "We ended up having our little private dinner on the boat while we went on a short cruise.

"It was such a peaceful experience and perfect way to just chill out before the reception."

When the couple arrived back at the marina, the guests were prepped and ready for their arrival and first



dance, and from there, the party kicked off.

"Our big thing was making sure it moved along quickly," Meredith explained. "We wanted to make sure the food was ready and the band was ready to play as soon as people got there so that nobody got bored or anything."

Meredith described the band, Not Your Average Party Band, as a "fantastic, super-engaging and very fun band," and she said they did a great job keeping guests entertained and energized throughout the night until finally, the night ended with a bang.

"We had the park until about 10 or 11, and then we had fireworks," Meredith said. "They were such an amazing send off and a great surprise for our guests at the end of the night."

For their exit, Meredith said they gave all the guests






Auburn shakers — "we have about a million shakers left over," she laughed.

Wedding planners find purpose in easing the way for brides MAKING

Blair Garner, owner of Blair Bear Weddings & Events and Master Certified Wedding Planner, has been involved in event planning for most of her life. With a mother who worked in design and a brother who entertained at parties, she said her family was always involved in putting on events.

a PLAN

"One of my very first jobs was at a yacht and country club in Florida, and I learned a lot about hosting events there," she explained. "I had helped with plenty of weddings, but I did my first one before I was certified around 2008.

"I think people were shocked that I knew as much as I did and could handle all the aspects of it - 1 surprised myself as well."

Garner then became a certified wedding planner, and in 2020, she returned to school for her master's degree to become Master Certified.

Now, her business offers planning packages that serve brides who need any level of planning help to prepare for their big day.

The Purpose of a Planner Every bride should have

a planner, even if it is just a short-term coordinator, according to Garner. "I always tell clients —

and their mothers — that my job is to educate on what's out there and help you

get what you want without stress," she said. "I tell them marriage is like setting sail on a life-changing adventure, and before you set out, you must prepare the ship for sea, so you need a seasoned captain who will take charge of the navigation and crew, make sure the ship is seaworthy and prepare you for the journey."

According to Garner, few local event centers have full banquet staff, which means the wedding venue will likely be unable to provide brides with the amount of help they need to make their wedding day exactly what they want it to be.

Garner stressed that many brides believe that a planner will either add too



much expense to the overall wedding cost or will fail to give them any control over their big day.

"The truth is that planners are only there to assist you, make sure you get all of your wants and needs and execute everything for you," she said. "And when you hire a planner, the planner can actually save you money, because planners have the time to negotiate with vendors on your behalf, and they also know which vendors to hire for your specific needs."

Planner vs. Coordinator

Garner said another common misconception is that a wedding coordinator is a "day-of" job.

"You don't really want to hire someone the week before your wedding and say, 'here's everything I want you to do," she said. "There really needs to be a meeting 4 to 6 weeks before, then they function in a management role during your wedding day."

Coordinators generally meet with clients twice before a wedding and come in for about 7 to 8 hours on the wedding day to tie together all the loose ends. While this sounds like a lot of time, Garner emphasized that when the length of the ceremony and reception are accounted for, it only leaves about an hour for the coordinator to assist with set up.

Garner said that after an initial meeting, coordinators will help create a floor plan and timeline, then meet the vendors, put out fires, and assist on the wedding day.

"A coordinator is for the couple that wants to plan their wedding and can handle it all but wants a little help getting to the finish line," Garner said.

Alternatively, a planner is someone who both coordinates and plans based on the wishes of the bride and groom.

"A planner will spend more time with the clients, and planning is much more hands-on," said Garner, who offers both services. "They're with you through everything, and they have the time to be there for the hours of set up and help with all the details you want."

The Hiring Process Garner said that while everyone's needs are different, the wedding planner should be booked before any other details are chosen for a wedding.

"A lot of times, brides will come to me and say, 'I've already booked my venue,'" she explained. "The issue is, they often have no idea what actually comes with the venue, so then we have to go have a site visit and find out what they really offer."

Planning the Big Day Once a planner is booked, Garner said that brides will sit down and discuss their wants and needs. From there, she begins making suggestions. She said planners can help with things like finding a photographer that best suits the style of the bride and groom, and they can work well within any budget.

"We're where you're going to get the bulk of your information — we can tell you which venues are going to meet your needs, be good for your style and the time of year, and even provide information about who will require an additional cleaning fee," she said. "We will go on site visits, talk it out and I'll provide a lot of suggestions — but then the



bride and groom will make their final decisions based on what they want."

Once a venue is selected, Garner said they begin to build a timeline and floor plan that can be tweaked over time. Then, she begins to research and negotiate all the vendors a couple wants or needs that fall within their budget.

"I give them tons of checklists, including one that has to do with flowers," Garner said. "I can tell them which flowers are going to be in season, because in-season flowers will be cheaper than those that are out of season, and I can also tell them which florists will have the flowers they want."

When it comes to décor, Garner said she utilizes 3-D software to create floor plans and layers the décor on top.

"This allows the bride to visualize how it's going to feel to walk into the room and lets them see how much space they really have," she said.

If a bride is undecided on colors or wedding theme, Garner creates mood boards to help them see options based on what she has learned about the couple.

Garner indicated that when brides book full-service planning, she is with them from beginning to end, especially helping the day of the wedding so that brides do not have to worry about any small details.

"I'm there to make sure the candles for the reception are lit during the ceremony, the music is playing when guests begin to arrive, and even to help handle tricky family situations," she said.



Garner said when brides book her for full-service, she is with them from beginning until the end so the bride doesn't have to worry about the small stuff.

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According to Garner, unless a bride and groom have an extra 15 hours a week to dedicate to wedding planning, hiring a planner will make their wedding and planning experience much easier.

"Even if you think you can't afford one, a planner can always customize a package for you and create something that works," she said. "A planner is the leader that makes sure everything is tied together and working as smoothly as it can.

"I'm a helper by nature, and when you get the appreciation of your clients after serving them in a way that helps on their big day, there's nothing like it — it makes all the difference."

What to look for in your engagement ring

Engagements are one of the most pivotal moments to anyone's marriage journey. The central focus, aside from the couple, is the ring itself.

Shopping for a ring can be stressful for just about anyone. With countless gems and jewels to choose from, band types and settings, the options are endless -- and overwhelming.

Creative Jewelers is a Florence-based, custommade jeweler (216 North Court St.).

The store specializes in bespoke jewelry. Customers are welcomed on a walkin basis or through free scheduled consultations. While in a consultation, their designers use CAD-based 3D imaging software to create a client's dream design in front of them.

Aside from custom engagement rings, they also offer lines of engagement rings, diamond pendants and necklaces, gemstone jewelry, silver jewelry, jewelry repair services and high-end handbags.

The store was founded in 1943 as The Time Shop and was changed to Creative Jewelers when now-owner Billy Hammock purchased the store in 1987. His wife Brandi Hammock is co-owner and store manager. The Hammocks married in 2012, and Brandi has worked in the store since 2013.

Before working at the store,

she managed mortgages, but didn't enjoy it as much as she hoped. Her husband invited her to come work at the jewelry store. When he became revenue commissioner of Lauderdale County in 2021, Brandi took over managing the store.

She is studying to be a Graduate Gemologist with the Gemological Institute of America, of which her husband is already certified.

"If you're a couple and you've been talking about [engagement], nine times out of ten there's a Pinterest page somewhere that you've looked at to get ideas of what you like and what you don't," Brandi Hammock said. "Maybe you'd like something

Creative Jewele

Some jewelers like Creative Jewelers and Grogan Jewelers in Florence can help design the perfect engagement ring to fit a budget. a little different, along the same lines, but different from what everyone else has. That's kind of where we come into play."

Reference pictures are important to deciding what exact ring a couple wants. Lon Brown, owner of Florence's Grogan Jewelers by Lon, thinks that knowing what makes everyone happy is crucial to designing an engagement ring.

Grogan Jewelers opened in 1915 by the Grogan family and was later sold to the Browns in 2015. They have two additional locations, one in the Cool Springs Galleria in Franklin, Tenn., and one on Bridge Street in Huntsville.

Lon Brown, who is originally from Vietnam, has been a jewelry entrepreneur for more than 30 years. She has 25 designs available on the company's website, and more on the floor in-store. Before Grogan, she had a store called Lon Jeweler. Brown finds it useful when couples provide a reference photo for what they like. She wants to be as accommodating as possible.

"[The man] gives me the privilege to help him find a ring he likes," she said. "I try to do it with a price that he can live with. You've got to eat after you get engaged."

While Brown knows that engagement rings are a powerful display and extremely important, she also hopes that couples don't break the bank to afford a ring.

"It gives me a good feeling to know if a young man comes in here, we ask his budget and try to work with that," she said.

Creative Jewelers have seen an increase in nondiamond engagement rings, especially with younger couples.

Brandi Hammock says she has noticed the change over the years, and has been







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doing gemstone rings since before its peak popularity. Rubies and sapphires are popular options, as they are more durable and sapphires come in a rainbow of colors. Moissanite is also a popular option, due to its similar appearance to diamonds.

Another change in favorite is the growing popularity of lab-grown in favor of naturally occurring diamonds. According to Brandi Hammock, around 60% of the market is labgrown. Natural diamonds are more expensive. The two used to be closer in price, but lab-grown fell to a more affordable price. The new price tag became more appealing to the younger aeneration, so Creative Jewelers began selling them.

There are many ways a couple can scale back on the cost of a ring, and the most important thing is to know what matters most in a ring. A setting type can be sacrificed for a nicer diamond, or a diamond can be swapped with lab-grown or moissanite for those who care less about the gem and more how it looks or are under a tight budget. Brandi Hammock's goal is to make customers as comfortable as possible when it comes to designing their ring.

Both Creative Jewelers and Grogan Jewelers have seen hidden halos appear more with younger clientele. Solitaire settings, which is just a plain band with no additional gems on it, have also been increasing. The trend may be due to budgetary restrictions. Another trend is cluster rings, which have multiple small diamonds "clustered" together.

"I think the young people today have their own taste," Brown said. "They don't pick out what my generation would pick."



THE MORE YOU SEW

Toni Samuel shares wedding dress know-hows brides need

Toni Samuel — Mrs. Toni to those who know her began her fashion journey at 10 years old.

"Í started really liking fashion, but I knew the budget wasn't there for my tastes," she laughed. "I'm from the British Caribbean, and an aunt who lived in England came to the house and saw I had the aptitude for sewing — she was a master tailor.

"At 13, she gave me my first sewing machine, and I cut up my green blouse the only one I had — to get the pattern. I started creating from there."

Now, Samuel is the proud owner of Victory Bridals LLC, which she initially opened in 2016 on Pine Street in Florence before moving to her current location on Darby Drive.

Toni Samuel began her fashion journey at 10 years old. "The two dressing rooms and my sewing room are my happy place," she said as she walked through the large and ornately designed spaces.

With decades worth of experience, Samuel is an expert when it comes to alterations and wedding dress design, and she noted that there are many things a bride-to-be should consider when choosing a wedding dress and caring for it in relation to her big day.

Finding the One

"Budget is first, but that is just a given," she explained. "She also needs to know her color, her silhouette and her size."

Samuel emphasized the importance of a bride knowing the style she wants, because there are many options to consider from sleeves to waistlines and everything in between. However, she emphasized that a dress that is almost perfect can become exactly what is desired with customizations — as long as brides know what they want. "Consider things like wedding theme, religious requirements and certain family opinions," she said. "But I sometimes think brides have too many people offering those opinions she needs to be truthful to herself."

Part of the honesty Samuel said is necessary when making a dress decision is a bride recognizing her size.

"How your regular clothes fit — I want to say that a formal gown is going to fit you smaller," she said. "I have a sizing service for customers, and often, I will measure and the psyche will tell them 'I can't be a 14.'

"I had one bride measured and sized, and when she went and ordered her dress and brought it back to me, it was too small — she ordered a smaller size."

Samuel encourages brides to follow recommended sizing to avoid hiccups and to make sure salespeople have the expertise to properly advise brides on what to buy for certain body shapes so the dress reflects the bride at her best without needing to be completely redesigned. "You shouldn't end up spending just as much to fix up the dress as to buy it," she said. "That just isn't right."

Alteration Planning

According to Samuel, there is no set timeline for dress alteration, because each dress and bride is a unique case.

"With alterations, it's very hard to tell — I say 6 months before, because sometimes you have to practically remake the dress," she said. "If there's nothing but a hem and a bustle, 6 weeks in advance."

Samuel said it is important for brides to research their alteration options and ask the right questions to make sure that the seamstress they choose is proficient at working with the fabric on the dress. She also indicated that the more time provided to complete the work. the better. Brides should include bridal portraits in their timeline if they plan to have those before the wedding. If they fail to do so, the alterations may not be finished in time for the

portraits.

"I can alter a gown in a couple of days, but that's not ideal," she advised. "Dresses with lace or embellishments will take much longer than something simple."

She said it is also important for brides to bring all important accessories to any fittings they have, because shoes and shapewear will drastically change the alteration plan for the dress. At their final fitting, she suggests a bride bring whomever will help her dress on her wedding day so they can learn how to properly lace corsets, zip dresses, bustle trains and care for any additional details.

"Sometimes, brides won't want to try on the dress when they come to pick it up, but it's important that we do in case we need any additional modifications," she said.

Samuel has added backs to backless styles, sleeves to dresses that were sleeveless and frequently takes vintage dresses and modernizes them to the bride's liking. She even has her own

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
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custom dress line, Bygone Grace with Modern Taste, which is made from a homespun cotton fabric worn by past European gueens.

When it comes to modifications, Samuel said anything is possible. Even small modifications can easily be made with the proper timeline.

"Some brides are diabetic and have a [Dexcom] device for insulin, so we make a small insert or modification for that," she said.

Samuel noted that once again, size is an important factor when it comes to alterations, but for a different reason.

"Many brides want to look their best on their big day, so they decide to lose weight," she explained. "But if you do this after you have had a fitting, the dress will not fit you when you come pick it up."

She suggested that brides

considering weight loss begin that journey early in their engagement so they can be at their desired weight when they come in for a dress fitting.

Once a bride's dress is complete and she takes it home, Samuel said it should be cared for ahead of the wedding.

"Some of these dress bags are very small," she said. "If you have a room where you can take the dress out and hang it, or perhaps drape it over the end of a bed, this will help prevent it from becoming wrinkled again."

At the very least, she suggested taking it out of the bag during the week leading up to the wedding.

On the big day itself, she said not to fret if makeup or something small leaves a mark on the pearly white.

"Just use wipes — baby wipes or Clorox — and wipe it gently to get the mark off,"

she said. "Now, that won't work if you spill red wine consider sticking to clear liquids in your dress!"

Even after the wedding, Samuel said brides have options when it comes to their dress. While she knows some leave the dresses hung in a closet and others give it away or sell it, preservation is also an option.

"We offer preservation services — they are organic so there are no chemicals," she said. "It takes about 10 weeks, and it comes back in a sealed box they can see inside with special gloves if you want to take it out."

Ultimately, from choosing the dress to preserving its significance, Samuel said the choice is up to each bride.

"You have to use your best judgment and planning, because you are an individual and must do what is best for you," she said.
