FLORENCE — Some members of Max Harlan's family wore a T-shirt Tuesday bearing an image of him enjoying a day canoeing down Cypress Creek.

"This picture was taken on Cypress Creek about a week before he passed away," said his daughter, Sibyl Stanley.

Harlan is among five people who lost their lives at a low-head dam on Cypress Creek from 1982 to 2011.

A stone structure at the Cypress Creek Kayak & Canoe Access Area now bears the names of

Improvements for Softball

FLORENCE – The University of North Alabama softball program is adding a turf surface to the Hilda B. Anderson Softball Stadium.

The infield will remain as natural dirt, but the outfield, backstop, and foul apron will be converted to state-ofthe-art FieldTurf. The previous turf halo surrounding home plate will also be replaced with FieldTurf, which is in addition to renovated fencing and new foul poles surrounding the playing surface. UNA's primary

Lion logo will be also showcased on the center field turf.

Field renovations began in November 2023 and were led by generous donations from the Anderson family in support of the softball program. UNA's softball complex was renamed **Hilda B. Anderson** Stadium in 2019 to recognize Mrs. Anderson's impact on the growth of the program. The turf project

is scheduled to be completed in time to host UNA's home tournament March 8. The team is conducting winter practices at the Florence Sportsplex during construction.

Family members and friends of the victims gathered at the dedication of the Cypress Creek Memorial at the launch area.

"It's good to have some recognition in memory of those lost," Stanley said.

sister Savanah Her Harlan said she also considers it a tribute to the efforts that were made to prevent another tragedy. "It's also a good recognition of the work they did to keep people safe and prevent another accident from happening," Harlan said.

The old low-head dam, built about 1980 without approval from the Corps of Engineers, was used to divert water to an intake at a city water treatment

plant. It often resulted in a tricky back-current for those traveling in kayaks and canoes.

The city completed a boater-friendly structure in 2014 so the creek no longer has the deadly current the low-head dam created and officials decided to create the monument.

Tad Cole, manager of the Florence Gas and Water Department, said Mike his predecessor Doyle was among those who played major roles in getting this project completed.

"We are pleased that there is now a permanent and accessible home for this beautiful monument," Cole said.

Mayor Andy Betterton said the city wanted to do something special on behalf of the victims and their families.

"This is a perfect place for this," Betterton said.

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"Maybe this is a way that we can, in some small way, recognize the lives that are lost.

Pannell's father Ronnie Pannell wore an Auburn University tie bearing the inscription, "Will 6-13-05" to the dedication. That was the date his son, an avid Auburn fan, drowned at the location.

Pannell said the marker helps make it easier to cope with seeing the launch area while driving along Cox Creek Parkway.

"When I drive by here, I look over and I just see the stone and it means a lot, he said. "It's just so special. It's so accessible. We live close by, and it won't be unusual for me to stop by and visit. I've already brought relatives from out of town here to see Will's name on the stone.'

Pannell said he hopes it also serves as a reminder to canoers and kayakers to be careful on the creek.

He said the 6,000-pound monument will be а permanent reminder of those whose names are on it.

"One thing you don't want as a parent of a child who passed away, you don't want him to be forgotten.' Pannell said.

He said he has gotten to know many family members of the victims.

"We share a heartache," Pannell said. "We share an unfortunate bond.



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



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

What To Do When You Hit A Deer

Even if you're vigilant, auto-deer collisions can happen. Learn what to do next.

Even if you're vigilant about avoiding animal collisions, the risk of hitting a deer with your vehicle heightens in the late fall and early winter. State Farm® estimates over 1.5 million animal collision insurance claims in the United States between July 1, 2019 and June 30, 2020.

What to do after a deer collision

- 1. Move your vehicle to a safe place. If possible, pull over to the side of the road, and turn on your hazard lights. If you must leave your vehicle, stay off the road and out of the way of any oncoming vehicles. Deer are most active at dusk and dawn.
- **Call the police.** Alert authorities if the deer is 2. blocking traffic and creating a threat for other drivers. If the collision results in injury or property damage, you may need to fill out an official report.
- 3. Document the incident. If it's safe to do so, take photographs of the roadway, your surroundings, damage to your vehicle and any injuries you or your passengers sustained.
- Stay away from the animal. A frightened, 4. wounded deer could use its powerful legs and sharp hooves to harm you.
- Contact your State Farm agent. The sooner you 5. report damage or injuries, the sooner your agent can file and process your claim. You can also report a claim online at statefarm.com[®], by calling 1-800-STATE-FARM 800-782-8332 or through the State Farm mobile app.
- Don't assume your vehicle is safe to drive. 6. Double-check that your car is drivable after colliding with a deer. Look for leaking fluid, loose parts, tire damage, broken lights, a hood that won't latch and other safety issues.
- Before a collision occurs, make sure you're 7. protected with the right type of insurance. Damages from auto-deer crashes typically are covered under comprehensive insurance, not collision.

Is it illegal to hit a deer and drive off?

In some states it may be fine to leave the scene after hitting a deer and in other states it may be considered a crime, know the laws in your state. If you hit a deer and it runs away, take pictures of any blood/hair and then look at your car to inspect for damage. If there is damage, call the authorities. If there is no damage, you may drive your car.



I was reviewing text message evidence in a case when I ran across the letters "SMH". I had to ask my secretaries what that meant, and they laughed and told me it meant "shaking my head". Apparently when someone says or does something and all you can do is just shake your head, you can text "SMH" and it, apparently, is understood.

Last Friday, the Alabama Supreme Court got one so wrong all I could so was shake my head.

The Alabama Legislature during the COVID-19 crisis passed a law known as the "Alabama COVID-19 Immunity Act". The ACIA provides, in relevant part, that "a covered entity shall not be liable for any damages, injury, or death suffered by any person or entity as a result of, or in connection with, a health emergency related to COVID that results from any act or omission of the covered entity." This Act provides immunity for COVID related issues.

In this case, an unintended result occurred when a lady who had COVID went to a hospital in Houston County for treatment of COVID and encountered a trip hazard in a concrete walkway that was defective. The lady fell and sustained serious injuries on her way in to seek treatment for COVID.

The hospital claimed immunity under the statute. The injured person's attorney explained to the Court that they were not injured due to COVID, they were injured due to a defect in the premises that would have injured anyone who was seeking treatment for any reason. The Supreme Court held that because they were seeking treatment for COVID and not the flu, a burn, or a broken bone but specifically COVID, the hospital was immune from suit.

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Medicare Minute "Medicare Part A Part 2"

Last week we discussed how Medicare Part A will cover you if you are admitted into the hospital. A hospital, under Medicare, can be acute care hospitals, critical care hospitals, inpatient rehabilitation facilities, long term care hospitals or mental health care.

The one aspect of Medicare Part A we get the most questions about is coverage at a skilled nursing facility (SNF). To be covered by Medicare at a SNF certain criteria has to be met. First, of course, is you must have Medicare Part A. Next your doctor has determined that you need daily skilled care given by, or under the supervision of, skilled nursing or therapy personnel. Your skilled nursing care will have to be in a SNF that is certified by Medicare.

What a lot of people don't know is that you must have a "qualifying" hospital stay to be covered at a SNF. Under Medicare a "qualifying" hospital stay is at least a 3-day inpatient stay prior to being admitted to the SNF. If you go to the ER and are held one day for observation and are admitted into the hospital for two days this does not constitute a "qualifying" hospital stay. If you are admitted on a Monday and discharged the following Wednesday this is not a "qualifying" hospital stay. In the two examples above those are 2-day inpatient stays. A good rule of thumb is you must be admitted as inpatient for at least three midnights.

You also need to know that Medicare Part A will only cover you for 100 days at a SNF and only 20 of those days are at 100%. In other words days 1-20 are covered at 100%. Days 21-100 you will pay the first \$204.00 per day and Medicare pays the rest of the cost. Starting with day 101 you will pay 100% of the bill.
