FLORENCE-The Florence-Lauderdale Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB) has received the results of their Epsilon digital advertising campaign launched in spring of 2023.

In April of last year, the Florence-Lauderdale CVB launched a \$60,000 digital advertising campaign in seven feeder markets including Nashville, Birmingham, Atlanta, Memphis, Tupelo, Chattanooga, and Knoxville. They did so in partnership with Epsilon, the global leader in outcome-based marketing,

The campaign produced over \$2.1 million in visitor spending which translates to a \$36:1 return on ad spend. 1.1 million unique visitors were reached with 9,800 visitors in the market to spend money. There were a total of 34,000 transactions with 3.5 purchases per visitor. The campaign ran from April 17, -December 31, 2023.

How Much Car Insurance **Do I Need?**

Learn about coverage limits, collision and comprehensive, deductibles and other important terms to help decide on how much is right for you and how you can save.

When you are getting a vehicle, it's common to consider what the recommended auto insurance coverages are. After all, required coverage varies from state to state and sometimes there are state minimums which are typically very low. Unfortunately, there's no black and white answer. It depends a lot on what coverages you need and the amount of deductible you feel comfortable with.

How much liability insurance do I need?

Liability insurance covers expenses when you're at fault in a crash. The coverages extend to the other vehicle(s) and people who sustain damages in the crash, as a result of your negligence. Most states require you to carry a minimum amount of liability coverage on your vehicle.

No one can predict exactly how much you'd have to pay if you cause a crash. But the key question to ask is: Can you afford to cover any damages exceeding your coverage limits?

To get an idea of how much liability coverage you might need, add up the value of your home, cars, savings and investments. Then subtract your debts (what you owe). For example, if the total "net worth" was \$220,000, you could consider \$250,000 liability for injuries per accident. If you feel you need additional coverage, you can increase it typically in \$50,000 increments up to \$500,000. If you feel you need coverage beyond that, consider an umbrella policy.

Keep in mind that liability insurance is usually shown as a series of 3 numbers, for example 100/300/100. Each number in this series represents a dollar amount - read in thousands — of coverage in different categories.

100: The first number represents the maximum amount of coverage for each individual bodily injury claim. In this example, up to \$100,000 is available for each injured person.

300: The second number represents the maximum amount of liability insurance coverage for bodily injury claims for the entire accident. In this case, up to \$300,000 is available for all injured persons.

100: The third and final number represents the maximum amount of property damage liability coverage. In this example, there is \$100,000 available to pay for property damage for which an insured is liable.





jumps in African American skills, incomes, and even business ownership.

Southern plantations and businesses despaired of their dwindling source of cheap labor. But by the 1880s, they were rescued by the grand political and economic bargaining that ended Reconstruction in the South and resulted in the Ellis Island-era "Great Wave of Immigration.' Each year over the next four decades, an average of nearly 600,000 immigrants — roughly 1% of the total U.S. – flowed population primarily into northern labor markets. That largely blocked the flow of Black workers from the South. In fact, many former slaves and families moved their back to the lower-wage South after they were displaced by desperate

immigrants willing to accept appalling working conditions.

In this way, mass immigration solved not just northern economic elites' "worker shortage" problem, but southern elites' too. By 1910. about 90% of all African Americans were still laboring as farm workers and household servants in the South, primarily on or near the southern plantations where they or their ancestors had been enslaved.

Finally, in 1924, public pressure from notable Black leaders of the day like A. Philip Randolph and W. E. B. Du Bois forced Congress to drastically reduce annual immigration.

The ensuing tightness in northern labor markets created a huge demand for underemployed, underpaid southern workers. Some six million

African Americans left the South during the Great Migration, only made possible by tighter labor markets. By the 1960s, the share of Black households that were considered middle class had expanded from two in 10 to seven in 10. African Americans' greatly increased economic clout was an important factor in Congress passing the Civil Rights and Voting Rights Acts of 1964 and

But the economic boom didn't last. Congress reopened mass migration in the 1960s, and — just as before — economic progress ceased for most Black Americans.

In response, federal commissions in the 1970s called on Congress to reduce the immigration numbers. However, lawmakers instead heeded the concerns of employer lobbies that expressed fears of "worker shortages."

In 1989, another federally commissioned study found that the nation's declining birth rates would tighten labor markets and likely lead to more Black Americans being pulled into the workforce.

Predictably, business lobbies warned of a "worker shortage" and once again convinced lawmakers to import even more foreign laborers. Instead of viewing tight job markets as an opportunity to bring disadvantaged more Black Americans into the workforce and close racial wealth gaps, Congress chose to enable businesses to fill the open jobs with foreign workers. In the decades since, the U.S. government has

has offered lifetime work authorization to more than 30 million immigrants, not counting

millions of foreign workers who have entered the country illegally.

The United States doesn't have a worker shortage. For example, approximately four in 10 working-age African Americans with only high school diplomas don't have jobs. Many would jump at the chance to work, if recruited at fair wages and working conditions.

It's not difficult to see racial bias behind worker shortage the According narrative. anthropologists to like Angela Stuesse, Black workers many recognize that the term "labor shortage" has discriminatory undertones. In her words, it's "shorthand" for businesses not wanting to employ African Americans or "adjust working conditions and wages to retain employees.

For two centuries, the labor shortage myth has been used to justify immigration policies that disadvantage Black Americans. Today, the median household wealth of descendants of American slavery remains much less than that of recent immigrants — and less than 15% that of the descendants of European immigrants and settlers.

Given our history, claims of a "worker shortage" should put any racially sensitive American on high alert.

Dear Savvy Senior,

Does Medicare cover any weight-loss treatments for overweight retirees? I just turned 65 and need to lose about 100 pounds and would like to know if Medicare can help. Overweight Owen

Dear Owen,

Yes, traditional Medicare does indeed cover some weightloss treatments like counseling and certain types of surgery for overweight beneficiaries, but unfortunately it doesn't cover weight-loss programs or medications. Here's what you should know

Who's Eligible: For beneficiaries to receive available Medicare-covered weight-loss treatments your body mass index (BMI), which is an estimate of your body fat based on your height and weight, must be 30 or higher.

A BMI of 30 or above is considered obese and increases your risk for many health conditions, such as some cancers, coronary heart disease, type 2 diabetes, stroke and sleep apnea. To find out your BMI, the National Institutes of Health has a free calculator that you can access online at nhlbi.nih.gov/health/educational/ lose wt/BMI/bmicalc.htm.

What's Covered: If you find that your BMI is 30 or higher, Medicare Part B will cover up to 12 months of weight-loss counseling conducted by a medical professional in a primary care setting (like a doctor's office).

Most counseling sessions entail an initial obesity screening, a dietary assessment and behavioral therapy designed to help you lose weight by focusing on diet and exercise.

Medicare also covers certain types of bariatric and metabolic surgery for morbidly obese beneficiaries who have a BMI of 35 or above and have at least one underlying obesity-related health condition, such as diabetes or heart disease. You must also show that you've tried to lose weight in the past through dieting or exercise and have been unsuccessful.

These procedures make changes to your digestive system to help you lose weight and improve the health of your metabolism. Some common bariatric surgical procedures covered include Roux-en-Y gastric bypass surgery, which reduces the stomach to a small pouch that makes you feel full even following small meals. And laparoscopic adjustable gastric banding, which incert an inflortable band that create a creatic pouch ancircling. inserts an inflatable band that creates a gastric pouch encircling the top of the stomach.

What's Not Covered: Unfortunately, original Medicare does not cover weight-loss programs such as fitness or gym memberships, meal delivery services, or popular weight-loss programs such as Jenny Craig, Noom and WW (formerly Weight Watchers).

Medicare also does not cover any weight-loss drugs, but it does cover FDA approved diabetes drugs that have

unintentionally become very popular for weight loss. Medicare Part D plans cover Ozempic and Mounjaro for diabetes only, not for weight loss! So, your doctor will need to prescribe these medications for diabetes in order to get them covered.

Medicare also does not cover Wegovy or Zepbound because

they're approved only for weight loss. The reason behind the weight-loss drug omission is the Medicare Modernization Act, which specifically excluded them back when the law was written 20 years ago. They also excluded drugs used for cosmetic purposes, fertility, hair growth and erectile dysfunction.

Without insurance, weight-loss medications are expensive, often costing \$1,000 to \$1,300 a month. To help curb costs, try websites like GoodRX.com or SingleCare.com to find the best retail prices in your area. Or, if your income is limited, try patient assistance programs through Eli Lilly (LillyCares.com) which makes Mounjaro and Zepbound, or Novo Nordisk (NovoCare.

makes Mounjaro and Zepbound, or Novo Nordisk (NovoCare. com) the maker of Ozempic and Wegovy. If you happen to be enrolled in a private Medicare Advantage plan, you may have coverage for gym memberships and some weight loss and healthy food delivery programs. These are considered expanded supplemental benefits and have gradually been added to some plans to provide coverage for nutrition, health and wellness. Contact your plan to see what it provides.

Medicare defines medically necessary as "healthcare services or supplies needed to diagnose or treat an illness, injury, condition or disease, or its symptoms and that meet accepted standards of medicine".

Medicare Minute

One of these other services covered by Part B is transportation by ambulance. Medicare covers and helps pay for ambulance services only if other types of transportation will endanger your health and will only cover and help pay for you to be transported to the nearest medical facility that's able to give you the care you need. If you choose to be transported to a facility farther away you may have to pay more.

Another service Part B covers is Durable Medical Equipment (DME). DME must be long lasting equipment that is used in your home for medical reasons and has an expected lifetime of at least 3 years. Medicare has a long list of equipment that falls under DME.

One of the most important benefits of Medicare Part B are the preventive services that it covers. These services include health care that is used to prevent illness or detect illness at an early stage.

Medicare.gov list 23 screenings and shots that fall under preventive services. They include things such as mammogram screenings, colorectal cancer screenings and flu shots.

Part B has an annual deductible of \$240 and a coinsurance of 20%. This means that if you have Original Medicare only, with no other supplemental coverage, you will owe the first \$240 filed on Part B each year and, after the deductible is met, you will be responsible for 20% of the cost of Part B services you receive.

Let's Not Hand China a Victory in the Pacific

t has been about years since Gilbert and 80 -the Marshall Islands campaign, a bloody struggle against Japan during World War II that cost thousands of Americans their lives. Congress Today, is poised to squander their sacrifice for freedom by granting China a generational opportunity to severely undermine security America's position in the Pacific.

At issue are three long-standing, bilateral Compact of Free Association agreements between the United States and the Federated States of Micronesia, the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau. In exchange for modest financial assistance, each agreement grants the U.S. strategic denial rights and defense exclusivity with these nations.

denial Strategic rights allow the U.S. to unilaterally block the Chinese, or any other military, from entering the countries covered by the compacts. Exclusive defense rights allow the U.S. to access compact waters and to construct military sites on the first and second island chains. These facilities could prove critical in a possible defense of Taiwan or in protecting and resupplying our Japanese, Korean, and Filipino allies in the event of a conflict with China.

U.S.-Marshall The Compact also Islands allows the U.S. to test and improve missile accuracy launching missiles by from California that land on the Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands. Furthermore, Palau will host the new Tactical Multi-Mission Over-the-Horizon Radar system, which will grant the U.S. expanded air and maritime awareness in the Indo-Pacific.

The compacts with Micronesia and the Marshall Islands formally expired Sept. 30. The recent short-term funding packages have kept the agreements on life support, and the U.S. has agreed to renew the agreements and maintain access for 20 years at a total cost of \$7.1 billion. But it has not arranged for the funds to pay that bill.

is common with As many congressional fights, the key holdup has been a dispute over how to pay for the compacts. In many cases, Congress requires spending increases to be offset by either a decrease in spending or an increase in revenue. In other words, Congress, like the American taxpayer, is encouraged to have a balanced budget.

Despite knowing for years that an offset would be necessary to cover the relatively small sums involved, the White House has refused to make cuts to pay for the deals their negotiators struck, and Congress has been unable to agree on a bipartisan proposal that funds the compacts.

Because of how the prior compacts were funded, Congress needs to offset only about \$2.3 billion in new funding for all three countries across 20 years. That averages to around \$40 million per country per year.

It shouldn't be difficult to find that money elsewhere, considering that between April 2021 and September 2022, the U.S. gave nearly \$2 billion to Afghanistan, Venezuela, Pakistan, and the Palestinian territories—much less useful "investments" by far.

Funding the compacts is the fiscally responsible move, as the agreements theoretically save the U.S. tens of billions of dollars, given the added militarv capabilities the U.S. would need to field and deploy to compensate for the loss of access. In comparison, since 1986, the U.S. has provided about \$6.5 billion in assistance to the compact countries in return for defense access and military privileges.

In addition, failing to renew the compacts leaves the U.S. less safe and raises major doubts about America's ability to fund its key priorities and support its key allies in the Indo-Pacific. To nobody's surprise, China is ready to pounce if the compact provisions expire.

To avoid handing China a major strategic victory, Congress must find a way to fund the compacts. While Congress works to identify an offset, the Biden administration must offer better solutions. For example, rather than requesting \$3.1 billion for a National Strategy on Gender Equity and Equality, the administration could reallocate its budget request to cover the budget compacts.

Options to pass the compacts seem limited. The National Defense Authorization Act doesn't include the compacts; this is a missed opportunity. The compacts also could be included in a possible national security supplemental package.

If neither of these options is feasible, then the House and Senate could pass the compacts as a stand-alone bill. Regardless of the pathway, time is not on America's side.

Congress is at a critical juncture. No other agreement in the world may match the value that Micronesia, the Marshall Islands, and Palau offer the United States in exchange for a relatively modest rounding error in the Pentagon's budget.

Failure to fund the compacts would constitute strategic malpractice by Congress.





The good news is he has stayed under the credit limit. The bad news is he has never made any payments on the purchases he made, and now he owes about \$3,800. *He's a good student, and my*



husband and I want to look at this as a young person's one-time mistake. Do you think we should pay off the card for him just this once? Melinda

Dear Melinda.

Believe me, I understand you wanting to help him out. It means you've got a good heart, and you love him. No parent likes seeing their child in a bad situation.

There's a reality here, though, I hope you won't overlook. It's his debt, not yours. He knew what he was doing when he signed up for that credit card. He knew what it meant, what was expected, and he's the one who should make good on the repayment. There's nothing unfair about that.

Now, you're right. This is a typical young person's mistake. And like a lot of mistakes our kids make, it's one that's bad and wonderful at the same time. ASK THE **ATTORNEY** What's The Right **Amount Of Pay**



The first part of worker's compensation that most people see is 2/3 of their average weekly wage. The average weekly wage is based on the 52 weeks prior to the injury as reported on a W2 form and that includes contributions by the employee to 401K and health insurance that the employer pays for the injured worker.


Let's say you were a school bus driver injured on the job. Over the past 52 weeks, you have been working for the same employer driving to basketball games and football games in addition to your regular workday that you were paid for, then whatever the average of your last 52 weeks of earnings is how you would calculate your average weekly wage.


This sum of money is not taxable. It's not really defined as wages and so it's not subject to the claims of creditors other than for child support. It's subject to a minimum and maximum amount per week. No social security is paid on worker's comp which means that someone who's totally incapacitated at an early age will never draw social security.

Temporary total disability is paid to someone who is hurt and recovering. It stops when the doctor, chosen by the employer, decides that the injured worker has reached MMI which is maximum medical improvement. Often workers never know that their weekly payments are going to stop, and that sudden loss of income can provide an opportunity for the employer to settle the case for less than it's worth. It happens all the time.

People who know us or are recommended to us will stop by with settlement offers. Any good worker's compensation lawyer should be able to evaluate the offer and tell the injured worker whether they can add value to the case or whether the offer is reasonably fair. This should be done at no charge.




