Family Matters with Amber

Focusing on the whole kid not just the achievement

The term "participation award" has often held negative connotations. It implies that everyone should receive a prize regardless of effort or skill. It's easy to understand why a lot of parents don't like it. However, there's a powerful message hidden behind this approach, and I personally feel the Participation Award should get more credit, and here's why.

I grew up with a father who was always focused on my grades, and if he wasn't focused on those he was focused on how I could help him in his real estate business, or on the mistakes I made. He was a Navy dad, raised by an Army dad. He had high expectations and often that involved some level of perfection. I come from a very driven family of hard workers, and there's nothing wrong with that. It served us all very well. But growing up I felt like I was never allowed to fail, do what I wanted, or heck, just be me. That, I'm afraid, has not served me so well.

As parents, we are quite aware that we are

our child's first teacher. We often have high expectations of ourselves which are then easily transferred onto our children. Sometimes without even thinking, we are measuring our success by that of our children. That doesn't often go away. It's sad to me, that we can sometimes forget what it was like to be a kid.

All my life I have had ADHD (or at least I believe that to be true looking back). Now that I am diagnosed, I can see that there is probably only one or two people in my lineage who don't have it (albeit they are not diagnosed). I bring this up because ADHD has added another level of 'doing' focus to my life, which I also brought into my parenting style. I was always busy. A family of workaholics and high achievers (with ADHD) we have really set the stage for busyness and are achievement focused people who are hard on ourselves. As a mother, I was not only trying to outdo my own last task, but I

was also pushing my kids to outdo theirs as well. Long story short, I too often have been overly focused on the doing than the being. As an adult, I have a hard time relaxing-struggling for decades with a perfectionist mindset and a habit of over-productivity. I have pressed that upon my kids and that is a lot of pressure. Whether it's getting an A in a class, an above passing grade on a test, or making the right decisions, I wish I did more of just complimenting them. More often applauding them for who they are, not just what they did.

Genuinely complimenting our children for who they are is important. It may not seem like it, in a world where it's easy to shower our kids with praise based solely on achievements. In a world where we have so many options to do anything, and mediocre just doesn't seem like enough, there are kids everywhere who are quiet but still shine, seem lazy but they are brilliant! There are kids who don't do sports but have so much ability to achieve success in other areas of life. What about them? What about the budding scientist who prefers reading experiments to winning races, or the thoughtful soul who excels at empathy rather than

being an academic genius? And the gamer, who refuses to be the socialite their sibling is...they might be the next computer programmer? The 10 year old who wants to be a YouTuber might be the next philanthropist with their nominal success. Look that up, there are so many who use their platforms to help others (though their parents cringed because they said they wanted to be famous as an online influencer). Just because their sites aren't set on something we can make sense of (or believe in at the time) doesn't mean it's not going to bring them (and other people) joy... or result in success.

- Celebrating their intrinsic qualities-Notice and comment on their kindness, resilience, sense of humor, creativity, or even their quirky interests. Saying "I love how you always help others" or "Your imagination is amazing!" fosters self-acceptance and confidence beyond external measures.
- Focusing on effort and progress: Instead of fixating on winning or attaining perfect scores, highlight their dedication, perseverance, and willingness to learn. Say "I'm so proud of how hard you practiced your piano piece" or "You never give up, even when things get tough". This builds

natural motivation, and a growth mindset.

- Create a space for authentic expression: Encourage kids to explore their passions without pressure to compete or perform. Whether it's building fantastic Lego creations, writing whimsical stories, or simply enjoying quiet exploration, allow them to pursue their interests for the joy it brings, not external rewards.
- Embrace their individuality: Resist the urge to compare your child to others. Every child develops at their own pace and possesses unique talents. Celebrate their differences and encourage them to do the same.

Every one of us has a unique spark that makes us who we are and every kid deserves to feel like a star. Why shouldn't they? They exist every day, attempting to do their best. They should be acknowledged. They should be loved for who they are through acceptance and encouragement because that would be the greatest prize of all.




