

Can You Drive Safely In Severe Weather?

It's helpful to know how to drive safely in ice, snow, rain, fog and other inclement weather.

Driving in regular weather can be hard, but when severe weather conditions hit, it's important to take extra precautions. You probably already know that slowing down and increasing concentration can make a big difference. But these safety tips for specific kinds of weather can help you get to your destination safely.

TIPS FOR DRIVING IN RAIN

- Turn on wipers. Yes, it's obvious, but remember to keep them maintained. Wipers should be replaced every six to twelve months for optimal performance. You may also want to consider curved beam wiper blades.
- Use headlights. Visibility is usually compromised in rainy conditions. Headlights can help. All states have laws requiring the use of headlights in low visibility.
- Keep windows clear. The defroster or air conditioner may help keep windows and mirrors clear.
- Be patient. Take it slower than normal and leave more room when stopping. Wet pavement may cause loss of traction and lead to sliding or hydroplaning.
- Do not cross flooded roadways. Because it's tough to tell how deep water may be, it's best to find an alternate route when there are heavy rains.
- Turn off cruise control. When roads are wet, it is best to allow the driver to control speed and react to conditions. **DRIVING IN FOG TIPS**
- Turn on the low beams and fog lights. Headlights should be on and set to low beam in the fog.
- Wait it out. If you're having trouble seeing, safely pull over to the right side — well out of the traffic lane — and turn on your emergency flashers. Wait until visibility improves before continuing.

TIPS FOR DRIVING IN HIGH WINDS

- Look out. Keep an eye out for flying debris. And use extra caution near trailers, vans or vehicles carrying lightweight cargo.
- Some cars shouldn't be driven. It's best not to drive a trailer, van or other "high-profile" vehicle (autos with high centers of gravity like SUVs and trucks) in high winds. **INCLEMENT WEATHER DRIVING TIPS**
- Turn on headlights and wipers.
- Listen to the radio. Tune into a local weather station for storm and traffic updates.
- Do not try to outrun a tornado. Get out of the car and find shelter. If you can't reach a safe structure, lie down in a ditch. DRIVING IN ALL TYPES OF WEATHER
- Buckle up. Every trip, every time.
- Focus on your destination and avoid distractions.
- Emergency kit. Pack and store an emergency kit in your trunk or cargo area with items you could use in the event of a roadside situation.
- Recalls. Check to verify there are no safety recalls on your vehicle.
- Give them room. If you see vehicles or emergency personnel on the side of the interstate, move to the opposite lane.





Medicare Minute "Annual Wellness Visit"

Medicare wants you to be as healthy as possible. Because of this, Medicare offers you the opportunity to receive many of your preventive screenings and tests at no out-of-pocket cost to you. If you are in the first 12 months of starting your Part B, these benefits are called "Welcome to Medicare" visits. If you have had Part B for more than 12 months, they're called "Wellness" visits. There are, however, a couple of rules that must be followed for you to receive these benefits at no cost.

The first thing to know is, **you only receive one "Wellness" visit per year.** If you go to a specialist, and they code your visit as a "Wellness" visit, you cannot go to your primary care physician and receive another "Wellness" visit. It is your responsibility to know how your visit is coded. If you do not want a visit to a specialist or primary care physician coded as a "Wellness" visit you must speak up.

The second, and maybe the most important, thing to know is; for a visit to be coded as a "Wellness" visit it must be for **preventive services only**. Your "Medicare and You Handbook" states; **"If your doctor or other health care provider performs additional tests or services during the same visit that aren't covered under this preventive benefit, you may have to pay coinsurance, and the Part B deductible may apply."** In other words, if you are having a medical issue and go to your doctor and discuss this issue, you probably will not be able to use your "Wellness" visits are **for preventive screenings and tests only!!**

If you go to your primary care physician or specialist, and they "break the news" to you that a visit is not eligible to be coded as "Wellness", please be patient with your provider. It's not that they do not want to help you; it's that Medicare will not approve it.


Identifying Anxiety

find where true strength comes from. I learned this from rage. And truly, even though life is/was scary, I have never been a scared person.

Lesson #3: What we learned in my childhood was to keep going. Tomorrow is another day. When we heard the dishes rattling in the kitchen in the morning, it meant that we had made it through the night, and that we were in a new day. And this day could be better. Dad went to work, and, sober in the days, he earned us a living. And in the days, we kids achieved in many ways, and so did Mom. We kept going. And our fortitude grew. Our constitutions got stronger. Out of the rubble of our childhood, God made us strong.

Lesson #4: Change can happen. I don't want my descendants to go through such trouble to learn to believe in themselves and to learn to believe in the power of God. I have been through the struggle for them. I just want them to listen to my words. It is the eternal power of God that you are looking for. God gave my family the opportunity to change. We learned His truth, obeyed His gospel and we became new and loved. There's no need to struggle. Just know

Creator. There's no need for alcohol or escape routes. Just believe in yourself because He believes in you. Oh if I could constantly whisper in your ear, I would say, "God loves you and so do I."

or "she. People who consider themselves nonbinarv may prefer they/them pronouns.

I am told that the nongendered pronouns of "they/them" make sense for someone who does not identify as strictly male or female. Those who consider themselves gender diverse or expansive, bigender, trans, nonbinary, or gender non-conforming may use a variety of pronouns, including 'they/them" which they consider "singular gender neutral."

Other possible discussions on the topic aside, as a traditional news publication we are concerned with the proper usage of the "They/them" terms. indicates a plurality; two or more and has for many centuries.

Those reading about an individual and seeing the word "they" would naturally assume that there is someone else referenced in the article that they apparently missed.

Therefore, any incorrect pronoun usage in the release that we catch will either be corrected or will be avoided altogether.

We can dictate a lot and have a significant amount of control and freedom over our lives. However, with singular plural pronouns and established over the centuries, making such an exception is not grammatically correct and is simply not worth the confusion.







Dear Savvy Senior,

Who should be screened for lung cancer and how it's covered by Medicare? I used to smoke but quit many years ago and am wondering if I need to be tested.

Just Turned 65

Dear Just Turned,

Even if you haven't touched a cigarette in decades, you could still be due for an annual lung cancer screening, based on new recommendations from the American Cancer Society (ACS).

The new guidelines state that adults ages 50 to 80 who currently smoke or used to smoke the equivalent of one pack a day for 20 years should get an annual low-dose computed tomography scan (also called a CT scan), no matter how long ago you quit.

ACS guidelines previously said that those who quit 15 or more years ago were in the clear. But new studies have shown that expanding screening eligibility saves lives, even among people who quit smoking years earlier.

Early Detection Saves Lives

Lung cancer is the deadliest cancer in the United States. According to the American Cancer Society, an estimated 234,580 new cases are expected to be diagnosed in 2024, and about 125,070 Americans will die from the disease.

While lung cancer can occur in anyone at any age, cigarette smoking is the top risk factor and is linked to about 80 to 90 percent of lung cancer deaths, and most people diagnosed with the disease are age 65 or older.

What makes lung cancer especially tricky is that it's often symptomless until it's at an advanced stage, when it's harder to treat. Early detection can lead to a 20 to 25 percent improvement in survival rates, resulting in fewer deaths from lung cancer.

But a 2022 report from the American Lung Association found that only 5.8 percent of people eligible for lung cancer screening in the U.S. get screened, and the screening rate is as low as 1 percent in some states.

Screening & Coverage

If you fall into the population eligible for a lung cancer screening, start by speaking with your doctor, even if it's been a long time since you smoked.

Medicare Part B will cover lung cancer screenings with a low-dose CT scan once a year for people ages 50 to 77 who are current smokers or quit in the last 15 years and have a 20-pack-year history. Patients must have an order from their doctor or health care provider and should not have symptoms of lung cancer.

A low-dose CT scan is a noninvasive test where you lie down and hold your breath while being moved through a doughnut-shaped X-ray machine. The scan takes several X-ray images of the lungs and can help to identify possible abnormalities in the lung tissue.

There are some potential risks with this screening, including the possibility of false positives, which can lead to more scans or invasive procedures. According to the American Lung Association about 12 to 14 percent of lung cancer screening scans will have a false positive, which is about the same rate as with mammograms.







Dear Dave,

My wife still feels weird about us doing that, since the money paid off all the student loan debt she accumulated before we got married but none of the debt I brought to the marriage. I look at everything as ours, not mine and hers. What can I do about her sense of guilt and feeling indebted to me? Anonymous

Dear Anonymous,

This isn't an uncommon thing in situations like yours. But more than feeling indebted to someone or experiencing a sense of guilt or shame, it's really a discussion about differing views of marriage.

You're never in debt to your spouse. You should be all in where your husband or wife is concerned. Remember the vows? For richer, for poorer, In sickness and in health. If she makes you chicken soup when you're sick, does she charge you for it? Of course not. When you get married, you agree to take on each other's burdens. Once you walk down the aisle with someone, you're choosing to serve each other. You're also choosing to take on each other's debt, income, assets and each other's crazy parents. Everything!

It all boils down to having a shared view of a proper marriage relationship. And the proper (and biblical) view is we own everything. There's no mine and yours anymore. Now, you can't *make* her feel—or not feel—a certain way. But you can ask her questions to understand where she's coming from and what blockers are keeping her from being totally together in this. Talk about it. Put your heads together and practice thinking about your

marriage as a union. It will take some encouragement from you and some getting used to on her part, but if you work together, it's a muscle you can grow and develop together! -Dave
