Red Cross Month kicks off to honor community heroes

PORTLAND, ME The American Red Cross of Northern New England is kicking off its annual Red Cross Month celebration in March to honor local community heroes who help ensure their neighbors never face crises alone.

Red Cross Month is a national tradition that began in March 1943 when President Franklin D. Roosevelt issued the first Red Cross Month proclamation and each U.S. president has followed ever since.

"During Red Cross Month, we are proud to honor the people in our community who step up to support one another when help can't wait during emergencies," said Stephanie Couturier, Red Cross chief executive officer, Northern New England Region. "This relief and hope wouldn't be possible without these local heroes. Please consider joining in their commitment by donating, volunteering, giving blood or platelets or taking a lifesaving skills course."

Join the Red Cross Month celebration by visiting redcross.org to make a financial donation, give blood or platelets, become a volunteer or take a lifesaving skills course. Those who donate at redcross. org/givingday on March 27 will be part of the 10th annual Red Cross Giving Day, which aims to rally 30,000 supporters nationwide to help provide shelter, food, relief items, emotional support and other assistance for people affected by disasters big and

HELP CAN'T WAIT WHEN EMERGENCIES STRIKE Volunteers comprise 90% of the national Red Cross workforce to power its lifesaving mission, along with generous blood, platelet and financial donors; people trained in skills like first aid and CPR; and other supporters. Below are some of the ways that Maine's nearly 600 volunteers have delivered relief with the Red Cross in times of crisis:

When catastrophic flooding devastated Maine in December, 82 trained Red Cross disaster workers raised their hands to help support the disaster relief operation. The Red Cross provided 154 overnight stays for 101 residents in 4 emergency shelters. With the help of partners, 612 meals and snacks were provided to those impacted by the storm. Our volun-



teers provided 847 relief items, including comfort kits and clean-up supplies to those in need. Red Cross caseworkers also opened 114 cases, serving 317 people with recovery support, including financial assistance and help with medical needs.

In October, unimaginable tragedy struck the Lewiston community. The Red Cross helped support individuals affected by the mass casualty event. 109 Red Cross workers, including 36 specifically trained in disaster-related health and mental health services, supported this response. With the help of partners, a total of 4,204 meals and snacks were provided. Our volunteers distributed 8,076 relief items including comfort kits, teddy bears and other supplies. Additionally, Red Cross caseworkers helped more 100 peoplewithrecoverysupport. The Red Cross responds to more than 60,000 disasters every year. Locally, the Red Cross responded to

282 disasters in Maine in 2023, assisting 1,267 individuals.

Home fires claim more lives in a typical year than all natural disasters combined, working smoke alarms can cut the risk of dying in a home fire by half. In 2023, trained Red Cross volunteers installed 1,167 free smoke alarms in homes across Maine. Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs a blood transfusion. In January, the Red Cross declared an emergency blood shortage. While thousands of donors have answered the call to donate in recent weeks to combat the significant drop in the blood supply, more donors are needed to ensure the blood supply remains steady for those in need of lifesaving medical procedures. In 2023, the Red Cross collected more than 42,000 units of blood and held more than 1,800 blood drives throughout Maine.

As we approach the

final weeks of winter, the 5 p.m., American Legion public is urged to book a time to donate blood or platelets now as we continue to strengthen the blood supply heading into spring. Much like pets provide comfort and support, so does the Red Cross in local communities. As a thankyou for providing comfort during Red Cross Month, all come to give blood or platelets March 1-24 will get a \$10 e-gift card to a pet supply merchant of choice, plus automatically be entered for a chance to win a \$3,000 gift card. 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Seniors Not Acting Their Age Skiing the Maine Huts Trails

My friend, Brent Elwell, is a frequent skier in the Carrabassett Valley region and more familiar with the trails in that area than anyone I know. While we were skiing together at Rangeley Lakes Trails Center recently, a discussion about Maine Huts and Trails ensued. The conversation evolved into a decision to ski to Poplar Hut, one of four lodges in the 80 mile trail system. Our companion, Eggman DeCoster, made it a three-

The Maine Huts and Trails network begins at Stratton Brook Trailhead in Stratton and weaves through the mountains and along rivers, lakes, and streams in a remote wilderness area to West Forks. The trails between Stratton Brook Trailhead and Flagstaff Hut are usually groomed but the status of grooming should be confirmed prior to planning a trip.

The closest access point to Poplar Hut is Airport Trailhead on Route 27 in Carrabassett Valley. According to the Maine Huts and Trails Map, the distance is 3.3 miles and the elevation gain 431 feet. This is also the trailhead for the Narrow Gauge Pathway and other destina-

tions in the trail system.

The three of us met at the trailhead on a gray, seasonably cool, breezy day. At Brent's recommendation, we left our touring skis behind and brought backcountry Nordic skis with edges instead. All of us carried small packs with additional layers of clothing, water, snacks, and a lightweight parka. Brent had the foresight to include a first aid kit, glide wax, and climbing skins.

We began our trek crossing an open field north of the airfield with a partial view of cloud enshrouded Little Bigelow Mountain in the distance. After traversing a bridge over the Carrabassett River, the short connector route joins Narrow Gauge Pathway and Maine Hut Trail.

At the junction, we met two skiers who had spent the night at Poplar Hut. A cheerful discussion about trail conditions, the benefits and deficiencies of different types of skis, and previous ski trips followed. They had welcome news to report; the trail to Poplar Hut was groomed and in good condition.

Initially, the narrow path travels through gentle rolling hills in a predominantly conifer forest. As we progressed, more ski-

ers and snowshoers were met returning from the hut. Nearing Poplar Stream, we plunged down a precipitous hill. Eggman was unable hold a snowplow when negotiating an abrupt right turn at the bottom and crashed into a snowbank. That was our only mishap of the day but not the first at that location as there were several telltale sitzmarks nearby. Nothing hurt but his pride, we skied on.


After crossing the bridge over Poplar Stream, we began climbing more steadily along the south side of the stream. When the gradient steepened, we stopped to add climbing skins to our skis. The skins eliminated the need to use the tiring herringbone technique and facilitated a much easier ascent.

Following the long climb, the trail levels off before it arrives at Poplar Hut. The impressive structure is nestled in a conifer forest and cloaked in snow this time of year.

Although the hut's primary focus is to provide overnight lodging for guests, day visitors are welcome. We stacked our skis and poles, removed our boots in the entry way, and entered the warm spacious communal area.

The staff was very welcoming and we enjoyed hot drinks and snacks while relaxing next to a toasty woodstove. Spirited conversations with lodging guests were part of the entertaining experience. I decided to suggest an overnight hut excursion to my wife, Nancy.

After a pleasurable visit, we added glide wax to our skis and began our return. Soon after departing, we met a group of about twenty skiers on their way to the hut.

The choice to use backcountry skis was a good one as they were invaluable during our steep serpentine descent. The edges assisted with maintaining ski control throughout our rollicking ride down to Poplar Stream Bridge.

While completing the remainder of our most excellent trek, we met more skiers and snowshoers advancing to the hut. I see a visit to Stratton Brook Hut in my future.

My book, Maine Al Fresco: The Fifty Finest Outdoor Adventures in Maine narrates three more ski excursions around the state and several winter expeditions into the huts in Baxter State Park.

Initiative helps farmers, rural businesses access wind energy

WASHINGTON

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) today are launching a new initiative to help farmers cut costs and increase income using underutilized renewable technologies including smaller-scale wind projects. Through the Rural and Agricultural Income & Savings from Renewable Energy (RAISE) initiative, USDA is setting an initial goal of helping 400 individual farmers nationwide deploy smaller-scale wind projects using USDA's Rural Energy for America Program (REAP).

Today's announcement has the potential to make wind energy more accessible in Maine, according to USDA Rural Development Maine State Director Rhiannon Hampson. "This partnership between USDA and DOE creates new funding, technical assistance, and research and development opportunities," said Director Hampson. "In Maine, we already offer free technical assistance to farmers and small businesses pursuing distributed wind energy through our REAP TAG program. Thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act, and the new RAISE

initiative, USDA will ensure that more farmers and other rural businesses can save money and earn income from distributed renewable energy technologies. These infrastructure improvements help protect the environment and combat climate change, providing tangible benefits to all Mainers."

In 2023 USDA Rural Development in Maine awarded a REAP Technical Assistance Grant (REAP TAG) of \$152K to Pecos Wind Power Inc. The company designs, builds, and sells wind turbines generafor distributed tion. Increasing the use of wind-generated power was one priority for the 2023 REAP TAG program, and the company was a successful applicant. Thanks to its USDA REAP TAG funding, Pecos Wind Power now offers free technical assistance to Maine farms and small businesses to help them plan wind generation projects and complete REAP proposals to help fund those projects.

Josh Groleau, co-founder and CEO of Pecos Wind Inc., attended the Distributed Wind Energy Association conference in Arlington, VA today where the new RAISE initiative between USDA

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



MaineCare responds to pharmacy vendor network disruption

AUGUSTA, ME — MaineCare, Maine's Medicaid program, is continuing to respond to a disruption caused by a cyber security issue affecting Change Healthcare, an out-of-state vendor that operates MaineCare's pharmacy claims system. This is a national issue affecting health care systems and Medicaid members in many states.

Because Change Healthcare shut down its systems on February 21, 2024 to limit the impact of the cyber security issue, MaineCare has been temporarily unable to pay pharmacies for filling prescriptions for MaineCare members through the typical system. This has created questions and challenges for Maine-Care members and pharmacies alike.

In response, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Office of MaineCare Services announced today that it has authorized pharmacies to provide prescriptions for up to 30 days to help MaineCare members

access needed medications. This is an extension of the 3-day supply authorization that MaineCare provided to pharmacies last Friday. Pharmacies should continue to fill members' prescriptions as written by providers and process claims as they normally would. The Department will pay all eligible claims submitted once the system is operational again.

While DHHS works on temporary and permanent payment systems for pharmacies, pharmacies should neither turn away nor ask MaineCare members to pay out of pocket for any prescription that is covered by MaineCare. Such prescriptions may be needed for urgent illness as well as chronic conditions.

"It's critically important that MaineCare members have and maintain access to their prescriptions," said DHHS Commissioner Jeanne Lambrew. "We recognize the challenges MaineCare members are facing and will continue to do all we can to limit the impact

of this disruption. We thank pharmacies for their help in ensuring access to needed medications under these extraordinary circumstances."

DHHS is in close communication with Change Healthcare about its timeline for resolving these issues and returning to business as usual.

MaineCare members experiencing trouble getting their prescriptions filled may call the Maine-Care Pharmacy Help Desk at 1-866-796-2463. They may experience delays due

to call volume. Pharmacies may refer to the pharmacy provider guidance released earlier today for additional information.

MaineCare takes the security of members' personal information seriously. Change Healthcare has not indicated that any personal data of MaineCare members was improperly accessed as part of the network disruption.

By marshalling the resources of state government, higher education institutions, and leading defense companies, this public and private partnership will build a pipeline of skilled workers to fill good-paying jobs in Maine's defense sector and fulfil our mission of supporting the defense of our nation. My Administration is proud to be a founding member of the Maine Defense Industry Alliance and to stand shoulder to shoulder with our partners."

"We now have a public-private powerful partnership that is Maine's coordinating body for workforce development for Maine's defense manufacturers. The Maine Defense Industry Alliance will put training opportunities on the fast track, helping the state's defense employers and Maine's workforce," said MCCS President David Daigler, who is serving as the inaugural co-chair of

General Dynamics Bath Iron Works President Charles Krugh said, "Defense-sector manufacturing requires a vast array of skills from design and engineering to precision machining and sophisticated construction techniques. Employers like BIW need to have a seat at the table with our educational partners to ensure the training provided to Mainers prepares them for the jobs of today and tomorrow. Working collaboratively through MDIA to develop a strong pipeline of skilled people will help meet the

industry's workforce needs in the years to come and support our nation's deforce"

The defense sector in Maine employs 19,000 people across more than 150 companies, totaling \$3.2 billion in defense spending in 2021. Over the next five years, the aforementioned three Maine defense employers anticipate there will be more than 7,500 skilled positions to fill, with hundreds more expected across the sector.

In July 2023, Sena-

tor Collins, Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee and Subcommittee on Defense, and Senator King advanced \$986,000 in Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) for YCCC through the Senate's Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education appropriations bill to upgrade lab equipment and expand workforce training technology. The bill, which was officially approved by the Appropriations Senate Committee, awaits consideration by the full Senate and House. This request is part of more than \$13 million Senator Collins advanced for Maine's community colleges in FY 2024 appropriations bills. In 2022, Senators Collins and King secured \$1.5 million in CDS for the expansion of the Welding Training Facility at the YCCC Sanford Instructional Center.



Letter to the editor: **Protect programs for Maine seniors**

legislature took historic action by expanding eligibility for Medicare Savings Programs (MSPs) for thousands of Mainers. MSPs are for people on Medicare who have limited income and resources so they may afford healthcare expenses such as copayments, deductibles, and Medicare Parts A and B. The expanded eligibility for these programs was significant. Under the law passed in 2023, people 65 and older with incomes up to \$27,681 would save \$7,300, and people with incomes between \$27,682 and \$36,450 would save \$2,000 on Medicare costs. Unfortunately,

progress made last year is at risk because, in her supplemental budget, the Governor has proposed rolling back the MSP expansion. Under the current budget proposal, nearly 30,000 older Mainers will lose access to this critical new benefit.

Approximately 345,000 Mainers are enrolled in Medicare for their healthcare coverage. As a share of houseexpenses, Medihouseholds spend more than double that of non-Medicare households on their healthcare needs. Despite growing over time, enrollment in MSPs remains persistently low. Maine should be

expanding the availability of this program, not scaling it back. By advancing enrollment in the program, vulnerable Mainers will be more motivated to be proactive with their healthcare.

We must protect these essential programs that provide support to thousands of Mainers who need help covering their healthcare costs. I urge readers to contact their legislators and tell them that Maine should not consider a budget that cuts critical support to those who need it most.

FAME financing to assist Tanbark Molded Fiber Products

AUGUSTA, ME — At its monthly meeting held on February 15, 2024, the Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) approved financing for Tanbark Molded Fiber Products (Tanbark), a Saco-based manufacturer of molded fiber packaging products. The financing is expected to help create nine Maine jobs and retain an additional twenty-three Maine

FAME approved \$1,594,000 in total financing for Tanbark, which is comprised of a \$1 million FAME Direct Loan and a \$594,000 loan through the Grow Maine program. Grow Maine is administered by FAME and funded through federal State Small Business

Credit Initiative (SSBCI) funds. The funds will assist the company in purchasing and installing equipment for its micro-fiber manufacturing operation. The Maine Technology Institute also has approved financing for the project totaling \$500,000.

"We are pleased to provide support for Tanbark's operations in York County," stated FAME CEO Carlos Mello. "Utilizing Maine wood fiber for eco-friendly packaging is innovative and will help to support the forest products industry in Maine."

Tanbark is a producer of high-end sustainable packaging made from Maine's heritage wood products industry. The com-

pany manufactures molded fiber packaging using wood pulp largely sourced from the Maine woods. The wood-based products have a smooth finish and complex architecture with minimal draft angels. The wood products industry is a targeted sector in the state's tenyear economic development strategy. Additionally, Tanbark's products are free of per-and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), which are a group of chemicals used to make fluoropolymer coatings and products that resist heat, oil, stains, grease, and water. Tanbark's products can be used as a substitute for single-use plastic materials, which can damage oceans and landfills, among other

"We are grateful for FAME's support, which will help us to finalize our equipment purchases and installation and enable us to begin operations," stated Melissa LaCasse, CEO and co-founder of Tanbark. Bill to allow reusable containers approved by Maine legislature

AUGUSTA, ME When Castine business owner Kate Pilotte wanted to offer her meal kit customers reusable packaging, she was told Maine food regulations would not allow it. Kate then asked her State Senator to file a bill that would amend state law so local entrepreneurs have the option to safely offer reus-

able containers as a way to reduce plastic pollution and

This week, the Maine House and Senate approved that bill, LD 2091, setting the stage for an update to state law that will allow businesses to provide food in reusable containers and receive them back for sanitizing. The bill now heads to Governor Janet Mills' desk for consideration.

"LD 2091 will open the door for companies around Maine to make decisions that are right for their business, safely meet customer demands, relieve burdens on local municipalities tasked with waste disposal, and explore new business models," said Kate Pilotte, owner of Farm and Fish, a locally sourced meal kit service, in testimony delivered before the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee. "Customers want this, but I can't respond because the law obstructs my ability to do so."

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
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


