



#### Red Bay Museum, Belgreen football program beneficiaries of FCCDC quarterly grant awards

The Franklin County Community Development Commission met April 5, 2024, and approved a number of grants to local schools and non-profit agencies.

The commission, which includes Brad Bolton, Jeremy Campbell and Russellville Mayor David Grissom, meets quarterly to review grant applications. The commission is comprised of two appointees from Franklin County's legislative delegation and a rotating seat between the mayors of Russellville and Red Bay. Sen. Larry Stutts reappointed Bolton

and Rep. Jamie Kiel reappointed Campbell to another four-year term.

With the most recent grants, more than \$2.634 million has been returned to Franklin County since the inception of the funding. The funds come from in lieu of tax payments from the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Grant awards for the April 5th meeting included:

--\$1,250 to Vina High School for bathroom renovation.

--\$500 to Tharptown High School for Franklin County Special Olympics expenses.

-\$250 to Red Bay High School volleyball for equipment.

#### TVA to focus efforts on aquatic nuisance plants

Although they are referred to as 'nuisance plants,' invasive aquatic plants are far more than just a nuisance to the health of a lake.

These invasive aquatic plants, some of which cover the lake's surface, can disrupt the ecosystem and impact the community and recreational use of the body of water. Water quality is often degraded by these nuisance plants which create conditions harmful to fish, including largemouth bass.

That's why the Tennessee Valley

Authority is committed to maintaining public access to its reservoirs by managing nuisance aquatic plants.

TVA is hosting an event April 25th to update its efforts to manage nuisance aquatic plants on Guntersville Reservoir. The challenge for biologists is to preserve the positive impacts of aquatic plants while attempting to minimize the negative impacts on recreational use.

My Lake Guntersville is a partner with the W.E.T. Foundation, a nonprofit organization created to promote and preserve the ecological health of Lake Guntersville, as well as meeting the needs of as many



recreational users as possible, according to www.mylakeguntersville.com.

The organization recently purchased a CD3 watercraft cleaning system, which is available free for boaters to clean, drain and dry their boats to help reduce the spread of invasive plant and/or animal species.

The CD3 is a mobile watercraft cleaning that unit helps prevent boaters from transporting any species of plant or animal into nearby lakes from the one the boat was most recently used on.

wet/dry vacuum, air compressor, three hand tools and lighting for public use.

TVA will soon begin herbicide treatments in its reservoirs ahead of the 2024 peak recreation season. Additionally, TVA natural resource managers will be evaluating the effect of their decision to lower water levels and expose vegetation to freezing temperatures in January 2024.

The CD3 unit is free for public use. Step-by-step instructions are available through a free CD3 app.

From March-November 2023, TVA and its contractors treated more than 1,400 acres, cut and harvested more than 150 acres of aquatic plants and collected and removed more than 120,000 cubic yards of floating eel grass from the Guntersville Reservoir, all part of TVA's ongoing efforts to maximize recreational use on its waters while also protecting their ecosystems.

Motorists who travel County Road 75 over Cedar Creek will soon see repairs and improvements thanks to a grant secured by Rep. Jamie Kiel as part of 'Rebuild Alabama' funds.

The Russellville High School varsity track and field teams have made the turn and are on the straight away, so to speak, in their 2024 campaign. Following two home meets and a final regular meet at Deshler, the Golden Tigers have just the sectional meet at Scottsboro and, perhaps, a state meet in front of them.

"I really don't know the right word to describe just how proud I am of this team and these kids," Russellville head coach Chris Boatwright said. They've been working really hard all year and really putting in a lot of time and effort and practice to get better and better every meet."

Russellville hosted two meets on April 1 and April 15. The RVL Invitational, held on the first of the month, saw both girls' and boys' teams finish in first place. The Golden Tiger girls ended the meet with 122 total points, while the boys topped the standings with 124 points. In all, Russellville finished with 15 medalists, including seven gold medal winners.

"I think we've been improving, as a team, in every meet we've been in this year, and in all the events, individual events, we're getting better times and higher jumps and longer throws," Boatwright said. "It was a goal of ours to finish first as a team, both boys and girls, in our meets this year. I was really, really proud of the kids that they were able to do

#### **Golden Tiger boys, girls tennis teams advance** to state tourney

The Russellville High School varsity boys' and girls' tennis teams are headed back to the state tournament after both clinched Class 4A-5A Section 8 titles last Tuesday.

Both Golden Tiger teams competed in six championship matches each—four singles and two doubles matches—and came out on top in every single one.

Russellville senior and North Alabama commit Peyton Parrish paired with Sofia Tiffin to take down second-seeded Brooks 7-5, 6-0 in the No. 1 girls' doubles championship. Kinsley Palmer and Lily Cate Pace did the same in the third flight, defeating the Brooks duo 6-4, 6-1.

Parrish, Tiffin, and Palmer were also three of Russellville's four singles champs on the girls' side. Seeded No. 3 in flight one, Parrish powered through to eventually topple the top seed, Deshler's Landen McCalpin, 7-5, 6-0.

"Peyton Parrish, my number one, has been hurt for the majority of the year, and she's only been back a couple of weeks," Russellville girls' head coach Charlotte Dollar said. "She played through a lot of pain to push through and help us get there and win another Section championship.

Tiffin, in flight two, blew past the competition in her bracket, winning both the first two rounds 6-0, 6-0 before beating Brooks' Darby Clark 6-0, 6-1 in the championship.

"Sophie Tiffin played lights out at number two. You couldn't have played any better than her. She was amazing," Dollar said.

Kinsley Palmer, seeded No. 2 in her bracket, dispatched Brooks' Anna Lee Hall 6-2, 6-0 to win her singles title, while Sarah Kate Kiel, after battling through a tiebreaker in the semifinal round, went on to win the championship in her flight 6-3, 6-0 over Deshler's Aleece Hollis.

"We had multiple who won in both singles and doubles championships," Dollar said. "Everyone's got to

win (to win the Section title), so we're just so proud of them for doing that." While praising her players, Dollar also gave credit to her other coaches who have assisted in the success of the team.

"I need to say that Leanne Strickland is the most amazing coach. She has helped us all these years to get to where we are. She's a doubles specialist, and she's helped us so much to be successful in doubles matches. We wouldn't be here without her," she said. "This year we've added Lee Taylor Bishop, and she's been a big asset for us, as well."

Russellville's boys' team's doubles champions were Bralynn Vincent and Reece Carson in the No. 2 doubles championship and Malachi Duncan and Drew Strickland in flight three. The pair of Vincent and Carson sailed through their bracket, eventually taking the title from Deshler 6-0, 6-4. Seeded No. 2 in their bracket, Duncan and Strickland too faced Deshler in the final round, winning in three sets 6-4, 4-6, 10-7.

Vincent and Duncan were also among the Golden Tigers' four singles champions in the boys' tournament. The Tomas twins, Josue and David, were Russellville's other two victors. Josue Tomas faced Wilson's Noah Hetrick in an intense match that needed a tiebreaker to decide the winner. Josue, in the end, came out on top winning the third set 11-9.

David Tomas also needed a tiebreaker to beat his rival in the championship round, Deshler's Brody Black. After dropping the opening set 2-6, David came back to win the next two 6-3, 10-5.

Vincent, the third seed in his bracket, rolled through to a 6-0, 6-1 championship win over Wilson's Chandler Peters. Duncan took the first set and the tiebreaker against Freddy Franks of Wilson to round out the list of Russellville's champs.

"We had six people playing in the championships and we won all six," Phillips said. "I told the kids...if you take care of business, we'll win."

"We played four tiebreakers and we won them all. That's all the kids and their will to fight and play hard. I'm just so proud of these kids, man. I love each and every one of them," he added.

As predicted by both Russellville coaches, the tournament was a tight, competitive affair.

"It was super close," Dollar said of the girls' tournament. "Deshler and Brooks both have phenomenal teams and have been very successful this year. Brooks has been more successful this year than they've been in a long time, so we knew they would be tough. Their top three are just lights out. They are amazing players and so we feel very blessed and lucky to have been able to come out on top."

On the boys' side it was Deshler and Wilson that gave the Golden Tigers some fits.

"I mean, hats off to Deshler and Wilson. Out of the six championship matches, we played four tiebreakers," Phillips said. "This boys section has been great. Deshler is always going to be good. Wilson is good. They have great coaches, they have great players, and it seems like they're always bringing it."

It is the second straight year that both the Russellville boys' and girls' teams have won the Section 8 tournament. Dollar and Phillips both credit their respective seniors for the roles they have played in the success of their teams.

"For this particular group, I have seven seniors who have been with us for a long time, and it's amazing what they've been able to accomplish," Dollar said. "We've been to state together a bunch of times and we are really excited to be able to take them back for their senior year. They've earned it."

"My three seniors in this group, I had them in ninth grade...and I asked them if they would come out for tennis in the spring. They didn't have a sport and I challenged them to play tennis, and they all laughed about it at first, but I told them they would be able to do something special if they really took a liking to it and worked hard at it," Phillips said. "Reese Carson, this is his second year playing and he's our number one seed. Bralynn Vincent, I put him at one doubles and threw him to the wolves and he really had to battle last year to get to where he is. And Malachi Duncan, too."

"They believed what I said and they took it and ran with it. All I did was mention tennis and they did the rest. It's all them, it's all them," he added.

All that remains for Russellville is the state tournament to be held in Mobile April 22-26, and both Golden Tiger squads are striving to make an impressive showing of it. Phillips, waiting to set specific goals for the tournament, said he hopes his team can improve on a couple of top 10 finishes the last few years. Dollar said a few of her players have the ability to make a run in Mobile, but whatever happens she's excited for the journey.

"I feel like a couple of my players have a really good chance of going really deep at state. I hope one or two of them can pull off a win because it'd be amazing to have a state championship out of this bunch. And you never know, three or four of them could pull it off and we could have a team one," Dollar said. "Sometimes it's just luck of the draw. You've got to take your lumps with your good luck and see what happens. We're just really thrilled to be going again. Anything that happens down there in our favor is just icing on the cake."

Crumpton grabbed gold in the boys' long jump; and Skyler Ergle was first in the boys' 110-meter hurdles. Avery Watts was the girls' high jump

champion, Keira Cruse won in the girls' long jump and Ari Willingham took the gold medal in the girls' 200-meter race.

The Golden Tigers had similar success at their Golden Tiger Invitational on April 15. The boys' team, once again, finished first over 20 other competing schools, tallying 122 total points. The girls' team finished in second, behind Marion County, with 59 points.

"I was really impressed with the girls with the top two finishes in our home meets," Boatwright said. "More than anything I've been proud of the buy-in and their commitment. They've really put in the work, and it's paying off."

Though the Golden Tigers had just one first-place finish in the individual events—Skyler Ergle won gold in the boys' 110-meter hurdle— Russellville did end the day with 14 total medalists: 10 on the boys' team and four on the girls' team. Junior Keira Cruse, who Boatwright praised as one the team's leading performers, secured silver in both the girls' triple jump and long jump events, while Ella Copeland and Lourdes Ellis finished second and third, respectively, in the 1600-meter run and the girls' shot put.

On the boys' side, Russellville's 10 medals were won by 10 different Golden Tigers. Besides Ergle's top finish, Mason Herring, Tait Barnes, and Jah Williams all finished second in the triple jump, javelin throw, and 110-meter hurdles, respectively. Cash Crumpton, EJ King, Shiloh Willis, Cade Parker, Hunter Kastberg, and Jeremy Winston took bronze in their respective events.

The final meet for the Golden Tigers before Section was a Deshler-hosted meet on April 19. There Russellville finished in second place in the boys' standings and fourth in the girls' standings. In all, the Golden Tigers medaled in 13 events with the likes of Keira Cruse, Tait Barnes, and Cash Crumpton winning multiple medals. Russellville's best finish was by Cruse, who won the girls' triple jump event.

Thrilled with the individual performances throughout the year, Boatwright said he was also happy with the team mentality his athletes have taken pride in.

"In track, you know, all these events are individual events, but I've really challenged them to view it as a team sport. It's an individual sport but a team sport at the same time. What you do as an individual has an impact on the team," Boatwright said. "So, yeah, go out there and give it your best shot but know that you're not just running for yourself, you're running for your team."

"You don't have to win every event you're in, but try to grab those top 10, top eight finishes and know you're gaining team points," he added. "The buy-in has been incredible."

Still, while stressing a team approach, Boatwright knows the allure of personal achievement and accolades. Over the last two years, 11 school records have been broken. It's one tool the coach uses to motivate the athletes on his team, but, Boatwright says, he doesn't have to do much motivating—they're pretty driven all on their own.

"Going into it, it wasn't a goal of mine to have kids breaking 11 school records," Boatwright said. "Some of these records have stood for a long time, but I'm seeing the times and heights some of these kids are getting and I'm like, 'You can beat this, you can break this.' I push these kids to try and grab these records. They're there for the taking."

The boys' school records broken include the 4x800-meter, the 3200-meter race record set by Pascual Felipe, the 110-meter hurdle record

broken by Skyler Ergle, the 300-meter hurdle set by Eli Cooper, and the boys' pole vault record set by Hunter Kastberg. New girls' school records include the long jump and triple jump set by Keira Cruse, the high jump set by Avery Watts, Lourdes Ellis breaking the shot put record, Aleah Bonman in discus throw, and Ari Willingham setting the 100-meter record.

"I think having that goal of breaking a record, it makes kids want to be a part of it," Boatwright added. "They're really enthusiastic about it. They're excited and always looking, driving for their next PR. I'll have a kid who'll PR and be four seconds off (the record) and they'll come to me like, 'Coach, I might not get it this year, but I'm going to get it next year.' I think it's something they can get excited about. To have 11 records broken so far, that's been really cool."

Up next for the Golden Tigers is the Section meet in Scottsboro on April 26 and 27. As of April 15, Boatwright said, Russellville has had 23 Section qualifiers.

"You know, we're really excited about competing at the Section meet. There's going to be a lot of great athletes from other schools there, but watching our kids all year, I know we can go there and our kids can stack up against some of the best," Boatwright said. "With the number of our kids competing I think we've got a chance to really compete as a team. We'll try to grab top eight finishes and see how many team points we can get, see what happens."

"I'm just really proud of this team and what they've been able to do this year. It's my goal to make this thing bigger and better in the future, and, I'll be honest, I think things can only go up for this program because of these kids and how hard they work."



but, heck, tonight we made it a beauty contest," Russellville head coach Jess Smith said. "I'm just really proud of this team. We've got another week together and I'm excited about it."

The Golden Tigers went to work right away in game one, putting up four runs in the bottom of the first inning after a three up, three down top half. Two leadoff walks put Russellville in scoring position guickly, and an error allowed senior Daniel Askew to score the game's first run. Back-to-back RBI singles from Michael Scofield and Brodie Vandiver made it 3-0 and then Elliott Green scored on a wild pitch to extend the lead before the inning came to a close. A sacrifice bunt by Vandiver scored Brandt Cummings for Russellville's single run in the third before the Golden Tigers put up a massive seven-run fourth inning. Russellville opened the at-bat with four straight singles, with hits by Askew and senior Devin Green scratching three runners across. Cayden Johns, who got the start on the mound for the Golden Tigers, helped himself out and took one for the team with the bases loaded—that made it 9-2. Russellville's final three runs of the game came in the next at-bat when an Eli Boutwell single to left field cleared the bases.

Ty Engelthaler relieved Johns in the top of the fifth and shut the Spartans down with two groundouts and a strikeout to end the game. Though Russellville finished game one with nine hits and was able to trigger the mercy rule with a big fourth inning, Smith felt his team's performance, overall, was lacking a little something. "To be honest, I don't feel like we played to the standard that we want to play in game one," Smith said. "I thought it was kind of a lackadaisical approach. It's great, you know, winning in big fashion, but in postseason baseball it's not really about what you do, it's how you do it."

"My message to (the team) between games was from here on out, whoever we play in the playoffs is a nameless and faceless opponent," he said. "'Your focus is on you and executing to our standard in the game that we play." The Golden Tigers clearly got the message. Russellville put together two four-run innings in the third and fourth before doubling the advantage with an eight-run fifth inning. The hosts tagged the Spartans with 12 total hits in game two and, as Smith pointed out, the timing couldn't be better for Russellville's bats to start

'Some guys that had kind of been going cold with the sticks got going again," Smith said. "Neyland (Baker) with two big-time doubles, Brandt (Cummings) had two hits again...Johns had another three-hit day, and Michael (Scofield) had a two-hit day. Some of these guys that had cooled off here recently got back hot and that was awesome to see."

Russellville's bats were loud in game two, but the even bigger story was how quiet Pleasant Groves' were. With Brandt Cummings on the mound, the Spartan bats weren't just quiet, they were mute. The senior right-hander tossed a gem—a five-inning no-hitter in which he struck out 12 of the 16 batters he faced. Issuing no walks, Cummings' lone mistake was hitting a Pleasant Grove batter to start the fifth.

"Brandt has gotten better and better on the mound for us in every one of his most recent appearances. A lot of people don't realize, but he has had a no hitter going through at least 4 innings in his last three appearances on the mound," Smith said. "It has certainly caught our coaching staff's attention. He

is arguably one of our best velocity guys and has one of the better off pitches on our staff with his breaking ball. He's always had the talent. What's made him progress, in my opinion, is him learning 'how to pitch' and not just throw.'

"He has done a really good job of getting ahead in the count against opposing hitters, and even when he is behind, he does a great job of working the count back to neutral or even in his favor. He has learned how to change speeds and keep hitters off balance," Smith added. "I feel like this year has been characterized by a lot of guys performing in different ways in big spots. Brandt has been a top performer at the plate for us this season and has gotten better each week defensively, and now he is piecing together his best outings on the mound at the most important time of the year.

Sweeping Pleasant Grove, the Golden Tigers advance to play Area 10 champ Leeds, who knocked out No. 8 Boaz in three games. Russellville will travel to Leeds for the series.

"Leeds is a really good program who beat a really good Boaz team, a top 10 team in 5A. In my opinion, Leeds is an extremely good baseball team, and an extremely underrated baseball team that I don't think has gotten the recognition they deserve," Smith said. "I know that they have several returning players with playoff experience, so we know they're going to be a challenge. Somehow we always seem to find our way to playing Leeds in the playoffs." "The task is tall, but with that being said, if you're not excited about it then your wood's probably a little wet. This is what you work for, for these kinds of opportunities," he added. Scouting Leeds to the extent possible, Smith said he and his staff have identified some of the challenges awaiting the Golden Tigers when they take on the Greenwave this weekend. "Leeds has two really good, tough lefties that we're going to see on the mound. Both are different and do different things well, so a lot of our week will be spent preparing our guys for what they'll see from them," Smith said. "They have five or more guys that can really hurt you at the plate and a good supporting cast around them, as well, so we'll be talking to our pitchers, going over scouting reports, trying to familiarize them with those guys and how we want to approach them.

"At this time of the year there's a lot of talk and time spent on scouting other teams and going to games and trying to learn as much as you can about your opponents, but, honestly, we're really trying to motivate and challenge our guys to execute our plan," he added. "If you can't execute then the scouting report isn't worth anything. Execution is just as important, if not more important, than preparing for whatever the other team is doing, so we're really challenging our



team and focusing on executing what we want to do." The Golden Tigers have a week's layoff before the series against the Green Wave begins. During the regular season the Golden Tigers rarely went more than two or three days without playing a game, so this week-long wait to play the next contest presents a change of pace in preparation.

"To combat not playing earlier in the week we scrimmage. We kind of split up Monday Tuesday so they're shorter scrimmages and that way we can work on some specific things we

want to get done. But it also presents our guys with some live opportunities, Smith said. "Then we'll start dialing in on a scouting report and repping what you're going to see and creating an atmosphere at practice that will hopefully help our guys not to be overwhelmed at someone else's place." "You've got to be firing on all cylinders this time of year, so it's up to us coaches to have these guys ready to go. We're going to take ownership of that and I'm going to take ownership as the leader of this program to set the pace for that. Have no doubt, you know these guys are all in now," he added. This is Jess Smith's second postseason appearance as head coach of the Golden Tigers. One of the valuable lessons Smith said he learned from Russellville's postseason appearance last season is to try to prepare the team for a hostile road environment. While he said the coaching staff will do its best to ready the team for a rowdy opposing atmosphere, Smith hopes Golden Tiger fans will travel, wherever round two is played, in support of the team. Having friendly voices behind them, Smith said, goes a long way. "I know I'm asking a lot, but we'd love for their help on the road next week..." Smith said. "We would love to have the greatest fan base in the state behind us so that (the environment is) not such an overwhelming advantage for the home team.

"We really appreciate the fans showing up for us. It really means a lot," he added. "I'm thankful for them coming out on a Thursday night and staying out late with us, and we hope that we'll see them on the road with us next week.

# Homeward Bound: Belgreen to host baseball playoff series for first time in 34 years

The Belgreen High School varsity baseball team advanced to the second round of the AHSAA playoffs over the weekend and, for the first time in decades, will have the privilege of hosting a postseason series.

Belgreen (14-12), the Class 1A Area 14 runner-up, traveled to Pell City on Friday and Saturday to take on Victory Christian School, the Area 9 champion, defeating the Lions two games to one to move on to the next round.

"For us to go into their place and win the first game, split (on Friday) and then come back the next day and win the series, it was big for our guys," Belgreen head coach Nathan Vincent said. "Even with our youth, all the youth that we have, our guys just competed. Everyone, one through nine in the lineup, was just competing."

Game one eventually belonged to the Bulldogs, but the contest needed nine innings to decide the winner. The game was scoreless through the first five innings, but Victory Christian went ahead 1-0 in the bottom of sixth. This left Belgreen with just three outs to work with in an attempt to tie the ballgame or go ahead—anything to extend the game. The Bulldogs came through in the clutch.

Landon Cox, Belgreen's leadoff hitter to start the seventh, reached on an error and was moved to third on the next at-bat thanks to a single by Ty Hamilton. A crucially laid bunt by Alex Guidry then scored Cox from third base to tie up the game 1-1.

"We were down 1-0 after the sixth and for us to come back and tie the ball game up—I think we had a squeeze bunt on the play to tie it up—I think that was big for us," Vincent said.

The Bulldogs were kept in the game due, in large part, to a stellar pitching performance from Will King. King tossed eight and one-third innings, allowing just two runs off five hits, and striking out seven batters

"Will was phenomenal. He threw strikes and we made the plays behind him," Vincent said. "He did an excellent job. It was like last week when we went to Hackleburg and beat Hackleburg at their place. He went into (the Victory Christian) game like he did Hackleburg, with the attitude that no one was going to beat him that day."

Belgreen won it in the ninth with three runs in the top half of the inning. Back-to-back singles and a few free bases on errors led to King scoring the go-ahead run. Two plays later, another error scored Cox to make it 3-1 before Guidry, after stealing third base, was scratched across on a groundout, making it 4-1. The Lions pulled back a run in the bottom of the inning, but Guidry, coming in in relief, got a strikeout and a groundout to end the game before any more damage was done.

"Those three runs in the top of the inning were huge, and I think it shows the resiliency of this team," Vincent said. "Even though we're young, we can still compete anywhere in our lineup."

Victory Christian evened the series with a win in game two, beating Belgreen 10-6. The Lions scored in every inning, and the Bulldogs were held to just three hits while committing five errors. It just didn't go Belgreen's way in game two, but the defeat didn't deter the visitors, who came back for the decisive rubber match on Saturday confident they could come out on top.

The Bulldogs jumped on top of the Lions early, keeping Victory Christian off the board while scoring five runs through the first three innings. After pushing across a solo run in the second inning—an RBI double by Rush Berryman scored Konner Trapp—the Bulldogs put a four-spot in their following at-bat. Ashton's RBI single scored King to make it 2-0, and then an error after a bunt by Mitchell scored Ashton from third base. Guidry and Trapp scored the next two runs, making it 5-0, thanks to a wild pitch and a passed ball.

"I think we just played good, fundamental baseball," Vincent said. "We did several hit-and-runs, several bunts, a few squeezes. That's been our identity, small ball baseball, and we stuck to it."

Landon Cox got the start on the mound for the Bulldogs and tossed a complete game, seven innings. He allowed four runs, two earned, off nine hits and struck out four batters.

"We threw Landon Cox in game three and he threw a phenomenal seven innings in 94 pitches, I think," Vincent said. "A lot like (King in) game one, he threw strikes and we made the plays behind him, just playing fundamental baseball."

Cox's four runs allowed were given up in the fourth and fifth innings, cutting Belgreen's advantage to 5-4, but the guests were able to add two more insurance runs—solo runs scored by Cox and Guidry in the sixth and seventh innings made it 7-4—to close out the pivotal game three a little more comfortably.

"They were pumped up to win, for sure, and I think they were very excited," Vincent said of his team's postgame reaction.

By eliminating Victory Christian, the Bulldogs not only got the opportunity for another week of baseball but also ended one of their long postseason droughts.

"I think it's the first time since 1990, so 34 years since the last time Belgreen has hosted a playoff series," Vincent said. "I think that was in the back of (the players') heads. They wanted to host, they wanted to get people to come out to Belgreen to support them and show everyone what they're capable of."

Belgreen will have the luxury of home field advantage in round two, but the team coming into town will be no pushover. Appalachian, the top-ranked team in Class 1A according to the Alabama Sports Writers Association poll, will be vying to send the Bulldogs out of the tournament once again. A familiar postseason nemesis for Belgreen, Appalachian has ended Belgreen's season the last two years, so Vincent knows what his squad will be up against.

"They're the No. 1 team in 1A, so they're going to be good and they're well coached," Vincent said. "Our biggest thing is we're just going to have to make the plays, throw strikes, and just keep being who we are."

Vina will next compete in the 1A Sectionals, set for April 25-26 in Winfield. There are 13 schools set to compete in Winfield with each hoping to qualify for the state tournament.
