Almaden resident holding book launch to celebrate new book about basketball hero Wataru Misaka



Leland's Quixilver FRC 604 Robotics Team wins title of Milstein Division Champions at FIRST World Championships

Quixilver team receives second title, the Milstein division's autonomous award, recognizing their consistent and high-performance robot operation

lmaden Valley's Leland High School's renowned robotics team, Quixilver FRC 604, clinched the coveted title of Milstein Division Champions at the FIRST World Championship, held last month at the George R. Brown Convention Center in Houston, Texas.

The Milstein Division Championship, a pinnacle event in the realm of high school robotics, drew in teams from across the United States and worldwide. This was the 33rd year of FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Robotics Competition that saw participation from 3,500 teams spanning 28 countries, comprising over 86,700 high school students, who competed in more than 170 regional and district events in 2024. Out of the 3500+ FRC teams only 600 secured spots at the championship.

Teams undertook the challenge of designing, building, and programming 125 lb. robots within a tight timeframe of 6-8 weeks for this year's Crescendo challenge.

Monterey Bay Regional and the Sacramento Regional tournaments, solidifying their place among the elite competitors at the world championship. Quixilver were also finalists at the Silicon Valley Regional.

The team was awarded the Quality Award, the Industrial Design Award sponsored by General Motors, and the Innovation in Control Award this year at these regionals.

In addition, Eugene Fang, 604 alumni and technical mentor for Quixilver was presented with the Woodie Flowers Finalist Award at the Monterey Bay Regional.

The Woodie Flowers Award recognizes individuals who inspire students through excellent communication, innovative teaching methods, and a passion for empowering the next generation of leaders in STEM fields.

The world championship consisted of 8 divisions of 75 teams each. At the end of the qualification matches in the Milstein Division, Quixilver ranked #1 with a record of 9-1-0. As the #1 seed alliance captain, Quixilver chose Team 9483 ("Istanbul Wildcats" from Türkiye), Team 1058 ("PVC Pirates" from NH) and Team 78 ("Air Strikes from RI) as their alliance partners.

With double- elimination playoffs, Quixilver's alliance won an additional five playoff matches to clinch the Milstein Division title, with a pinnacle high score of 151. This was Quixilver's third season winning their division at a FIRST championship.

The Quixilver team also received the Milstein


division's autonomous award, recognizing their consistent, reliable, and high-performance robot operation during autonomously managed actions, underlining their technical prowess and innovation.

Advancing to the Einstein field, Quixilver's alliance competed again with the other seven divisions' winning alliances. Facing formidable competition, Quixilver's alliance secured a 5-6th place position after the double elimination rounds.

Reservoir plans to move forward after judge rejects lawsuit alleging project would hurt environment

he \$4.5 billion project, known as Sites Reservoir in California, is moving forward after a judge's decision to reject a lawsuit by environmental groups opposed to it.

The new reservoir is planned for the rolling ranchlands west of the town of Maxwell, about 70 miles northwest of Sacramento.

Sites would be California's eighth largest reservoir and bring about water to 24 million people, including residents of Santa Clara County, parts of the East Bay and Los Angeles.

The project is supported by President Biden, Gov. Gavin Newsom, farm organizations, labor unions and about 20 water agencies, including the Santa Clara Valley Water District, Zone 7 Water Agency in Livermore, and the Metropolitan Water District in Los Angeles, all of which are partners and would receive water from the Sites Reservoir.

"California needs more water storage, and we have no time to waste," Newsom said Tuesday. "Projects like the Sites Reservoir will capture rain and snow runoff to supply millions of homes with clean drinking water."

 $The\,reservoir\,would\,store\,water\,diverted\,from$ the Sacramento River in wet years, for use by cities and farms around the state in dry years.

Sites would be the largest new reservoir in California since 1979, when the federal government opened New Melones Lake in the Sierra Foothills between Sonora and Angels Camp.

The plan is opposed by the Sierra Club, Friends of the River and other environmental groups who say that filling Sites would divert too much water from the Sacramento River, hurting endangered salmon, steelhead and Delta smelt, and depriving the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta of fresh water.

"We're disappointed by the court ruling," said John Buse, an attorney with the Center for Biological Diversity in Oakland. "There is considerable momentum for this project. But people need to weigh that against the fact that it is expensive and has limited benefits and significant environmental costs."

Last July, Newsom signed a law designed to speed construction of water, solar, wind and transportation projects.

Under the new law, lawsuits that are filed under the California Environmental Quality Act, known as CEQA, must be decided within 270 days on such projects. The Sites Reservoir lawsuit was decided in 148 days.

CEQA is one of the state's landmark environmental laws. Signed by former Gov. Ronald Reagan in 1970, it requires developers to evaluate their projects' impacts on air pollution, water pollution, wildlife, traffic, noise, and other factors. Newsom and former Gov. Jerry Brown have acknowledged the law has had unintended consequences, stalling for years projects that are important to the state and its economy.

The environmental groups who sued the Sites Project Authority, a collection of local government officials in the Sacramento Valley who are proposing the new reservoir, have until Friday to decide whether to appeal.

The project has nearly all of its funding lined up.

Last week, the Biden administration granted another \$67 million to the project, raising the total funding from Congress and the administration to \$519 million. It also has received a \$2.2 billion loan from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, a \$450 million loan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and \$875 million in state funds from Proposition 1, a water bond approved by California voters in 2014. Much of the rest of the money, and the loan repayments, would come from water agencies around the state who buy its water.

If the environmentalists' lawsuit is not rekindled by a higher court, the final hurdle for the project is to receive water rights from the State Water Resources Control Board, which is appointed by Newsom. Hearings are set to begin in July and run until next April, said Jerry Brown, executive director of the Sites Project Authority.

Brown, who is not related to the former governor, said Wednesday that the project is on track to break ground in 2026 and finish by 2032.

"We need to get it built so that we are prepared for our future," said Brown, the former general manager of the Contra Costa Water District. "This court ruling shows that California can still build big water projects and do it in an environmentally sensitive way, which we have to do because

climate change is affecting our water system, which isn't set up for what is coming at us."

Had the reservoir already been built, it would have filled to the top in the past two winters. Brown said. It would hold 1.5-million-acre feet - enough for 7.5 million people in a year. In response to environmentalists' concerns, Brown added that the project would have diverted an average of only 6% of the water that flowed through the Delta during January to April.

During big winter storms, up to 90% of the

water flowing through the Delta flows to the ocean because state and federal pumps at Tracy do not have the capacity to capture more.

Buse, with the Center for Biological Diversity. said pumping in drier times is what worries him.

"Those biggest flow periods are the least controversial," he said. "The greater concern is when the flows are not as great, and they would still be taking water. That's when it would have more impact on salmon and other fish. Those are critical periods."



Juliana Meeks of Almaden named to University of Rhode Island Spring 2024 Dean's List


he University of Rhode Island (pictured right) announced that **Juliana Meeks** of Almaden Valley has been named to the Spring 2024 Dean's List.





TECH JARGON OF THE WEEK: Large Language **Models (LLM)**

broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words: Large Language Models (LLM)

Have you been reading about ChatGPT, GPT-4, Lambda, Falcon? Do you wonder where they do fit in the world of Artificial Intelligence and Machine learning?

They are all LLMs. Let's understand what an LLM is.

A Large Language Model (LLM) is a neural network that is trained to understand language and can be used for various tasks, like summarizing, translating, predicting, and generating text. An LLM is trained on massive text datasets such as Common Crawl, Web-Text2, Books1, Books2, and Wikipedia.

Over millennia, humans developed spoken languages to communicate. Language is at the core of all forms of human and technological communications; it provides the words, semantics and grammar needed to convey ideas and concepts. In the AI world, a language model serves a similar purpose, providing a basis to communicate and generate new concepts.

An LLM is the evolution of the language model concept in AI that dramatically expands the data used for training and inference. In turn, it provides a massive increase in the capabilities of the AI model. While there isn't a universally accepted figure for how large the data set for training needs to be, an LLM typically has at least one billion or more parameters. Parameters are a machine learning term for the variables present in the model on which it was trained that can be used to infer new content.

What are large language models used for? LLMs have become increasingly popular because they have broad applicability for a range of NLP tasks, including the following:

• Text generation: The ability to generate text on any topic that the LLM has been trained on is a primary use case.

• Translation: For LLMs trained on multiple languages, the ability to translate from one language to another is a common feature. • Content summary: Summarizing blocks or

multiple pages of text is a useful function of LLMs.

• Classification and categorization: An LLM can classify and categorize content.

• Conversational AI and chatbots: LLMs can enable a conversation with a user in a way that is typically more natural than older generations of AI technologies.
