There is wonderful entertainment throughout the weekend including ongoing live performances.


Stop by the different cultural booths that feature crafts and items from many homelands.

While each city and town have their own style of dress, the black and red is the typical style for all of Palestine, yet the type of embroidery shows exactly where we're from. Part of my outfit is gold. Palestinians' hands, necks, ears, feet and even hair, are always adorned in gold. To us, gold symbolizes wealth, happiness, healthiness and stability. Gold also is a method of investment in our culture, allowing for the said stability of our lives and future. Favorite family tradition: One of my fa-

vorite family traditions is how we celebrate our religious holidays, Eid Al-Fitr and Eid Al-Adha. 
