
As the sun begins to set, head over to the Lyman P. White Park Amphitheater on East River Road for Live Music

Aitkin School District dealing with old, outdated buildings as challenge

The last of the public listening sessions was held by the Aitkin School District on June 25. The Aitkin School Board recently updated its strategic plan and continues the planning process for the future of the school district.

For this — the last of about 15 sessions — there were about 20 community members at the high school and online for the meeting. Superintendent Dan Stifter was present, as well as Roland Hill from the school board.

Lynn Dyer and Glen Chlode, from ICS, the district's planning consultant,

led the meeting. Both men have extensive backgrounds in education in Minnesota.

"When we are all done with this process, we hope to bring enough information to the school board and community to make our education system better," said Chlode.

This is only one group of many asked to give their opinions. Groups included school district staff and students and community members.

The group came up with a few insights. For positives in the school district, it named college in the schools, the ag program and great community support.

Challenges include aging buildings that are not energy efficient and a high school without green space where the athletic fields are in two different spaces — and not attached to the school itself. The district does own a large parcel of land just south of Aitkin where there may be a future school or schools. At the end of the session, participants were asked to

state their vision for the Aitkin

School District in 20 years. Most of the answers indicated the need for one campus location for all schools and sport fields. Other goals were to have a financially sound district and one where students perform well on stan-

dardized tests. The consultants will be compiling the information looking for "commonalities." Data will be presented to the school board in July and to school staff and community members in August.



at the church on Monday. Burial will be at the Bethlehem Lutheran Cemetery in Askov at 3:00 p.m. on Monday.


He was born in Minneapolis on August 3, 1963 to Kenneth and Sandra (Mattsen) Solom.
