



A minister's DREAMS come true.

Devron Holman lives out his dreams, serving his country and community.

ROMTHE pulpit, Devron Holman, the associate pastor for Mt Singi Missian B tor for Mt. Sinai Missionary Baptist Church, preaches with passion and conviction. His words are like a soothing balm for the weary soul as he ministers to the broken-hearted and the lost, offering hope and healing in the name of Jesus. His spirit is ablaze with the fire of conviction. After he leaves his office or his place on the pulpit, Holman receives divine confirmation that he has found his true calling — a calling to serve, to lead, and to inspire. But Holman's purpose extends beyond the church building, reaching into the heart of Franklin County, helping the pastor lead organizational and community-wide events. Ever since his earlier years, he walked the streets of his community and saw some faces of his neighbors — some struggling, marginalized, and forgotten. And with each passing day, his determination to make change grew stronger, and his commitment to social justice was steadfast.

Patricia J. Nimox, a single mother, raised her seven children, Devron Holman among them, in a God-fearing household. Living in a one-parent household couldn't dim their light and profound faith in God. Holman, the third eldest, looked up to his mother, watching her navigate single parenthood with wonder and admiration.

"Being the oldest of 12 siblings, it was just remarkable for me to witness that," Holman said. "I've always drawn my strengths from her. She molded me. My mom is my biggest motivation."

The melodies of gospel music rang through their home. It was a haven of warmth and love amidst the chill of poverty and hardship. Nimox, with her blessed hands and encouraging smile, was the beating heart of their humble abode — a ray of hope for her children in a world fraught with adversity.

Holman's path led him to the Marines. Here, he learned discipline, courage, and sacrifice, and his faith remained a steady anchor. He emerged a leader, his courage and compassion a beacon for his fellow Marines.

"The military has taught me a lot," he reflected. "The discipline it takes to be successful, the consistency, the ability to be fair toward people in spite of where they come from — it allowed me to see what success



looks like. My mom and the military really set me up to influence others."

One of Holman's biggest challenges was overcoming the loss of service members under his command.

"That was probably the heaviest challenge," he shared. "But my relationship with Christ definitely helped keep me grounded."

Even after retiring from the Marines after 26 years, his impact on those he served continues to resonate.

"Twe been retired 11 years, but I'm still getting phone calls from service members who served underneath my leadership, and that just motivates me to the highest level," he said.

After retiring, Holman returned to Franklin County, where he found a new calling at Mt. Sinai Missionary Baptist Church. As an associate pastor, he embraces his role with humility and conviction, offering hope and healing through his words and actions. For Holman, the church and the broader community are simply an extension of his family. He sows seeds of inspiration, love, and care with each encounter.

"It allows me to be a part of the family of Christ," he explained. "Our hearts are for the people; our hearts are for God."

Every Sunday morning, the congregation gathers at 132 Walnut St. in Cowan.

With heads bowed and hearts lifted, they give thanks for their blessings, finding rest in their faith.

Holman and his biological and church families have become champions of change in the community, advocating for social justice and equality.

"The most fulfilling moments are when people reach out to me, ask me questions, or ask for prayer," he said. "It reminds me that people know there's a God out there."

From mentoring to advocating, he works tirelessly to break down barriers and build bridges, uplift the oppressed, and empower the disenfranchised.

"Regardless of how much I know, it won't do me any good if I'm holding on to it for myself. But I can distribute that knowledge to any and everybody that I want to and still not lose a thing."

For young people chasing their dreams, especially young people from minority groups, Holman has this advice: "Be careful who you surround yourself with. Dreams do come true, but we have to be active in making them happen. Put in the work, commit yourself to the right people, and trust the process."

Holman's dream for Franklin County is to be a place where opportunity is available to all.

"I hope that Franklin County continues to level the playing field by allowing quality and qualified minorities a fair chance to display their capabilities, accomplishments, and experiences," he said. "There are a lot of people out there who have a lot to offer." GN

TEPHANIE MAYFIELD stood atop the roof, the wind whipping through her hair and the vast expanse of the sky stretching before her. The freshly cut wood and the scent of asphalt shingles collided, baking under the sun. Every nail she hammered down resonated with the strength she had developed through years of trials and triumphs. Her fingers worked methodically, each motion reflecting the persistence she had built within herself.

Mayfield had a tumultuous upbringing, facing numerous challenges that could have defeated anyone. She dealt with a dysfunctional family, a sick sibling, and mental and chronic illness. Despite these obstacles, she perseveres every day. All of her setbacks somehow became the catalyst that helped her achieve her childhood dream of defying expectations and building a future — both literally and figuratively.

Born into the realm of flooring with her father's business, Mayfield's love for construction bloomed early. But unlike her father, who focused on interiors, Mayfield felt a calling to the open sky.

"The first time I got on a roof, I was in love," she admitted.

At a young age, her father instilled in her the belief that she could achieve anything she set her mind to and that no dream was too far out of reach.

He reminded her, "We can be absolutely anything we want to be if we put in the work and refuse to take 'no' for an answer or disrespect."

Making the decision to start her own company was challenging for her. But after losing a dear family member, she finally found the courage to take the leap. The pain of losing her brother opened her eyes to the harsh reality that, as a woman, she would always be judged differently, regardless of how much she accomplished. So, she decided not to let limitations hold her back from bringing her childhood dreams to life.

One day, while lying on a massage table, she asked God for a sign and poured out her heart to Him. He finally gave her a sign that made her realize it was time to start her own company. She knew that as soon as she got off the table, she would take the leap and start her own business.

"Your Roofing Gal was born out of the biggest heartache I had ever experienced personally or professionally. I know my big brother is cheering me on from the big blue yonder."

Despite finding construction work empowering, she still faces stereotyping and disrespect at times due to being a female in a male-dominated industry.

"There are always going to be some of those 'bad egg boys' that don't respect me as a woman of my craft," she admitted.

But Mayfield persists.

"I bring the feminine side of things. I look at the desires of a homeowner the same way I would my own home, and men can't always grasp the same vision a woman has."

This perspective became her superpower. She always knew that she would one day own her own construction business and wanted to build great things not just for herself but for other girls, too. Mayfield learned construction from the best of Middle Tennessee to the great Alaskan frontier to the flatlands of Kansas, which gave her an arsenal of wisdom and knowledge to hold on to.

Mayfield shared how her work reaffirms that she is fulfilling her calling.

"With every roof I step on, with every driver that sees my huge logo on my truck, people are seeing a woman do what they didn't think a woman could do."

With each shingle she lays, she's building a movement, supporting local nonprofits, and finding new ways to use her business to stay involved with her community.

As an ambassador for the Tullahoma Noon Rotary, she's spearheading initiatives to enrich playgrounds and promote literacy by building and donating library boxes to local parks.

She hopes to have a library box in every neighborhood soon.

Leadership comes naturally to Mayfield, but her infectious enthusiasm and never-ending support for other women make her a true leader. Her message to young girls is particularly powerful.


"Lock yourself in. Life is about learning what truly brings fire into your soul."

She wants to shatter the mold of societal expectations and empower girls to chase their dreams, no matter how unconventional.

"Your career path or even educational path does not have to make sense to anyone on this earth other than you," she said. "I got a degree in accounting because that is what 'made sense' to others. As a mentor, my goal is to help kids listen to their own voices and hearts. So many children live in the box of forced ideas from their parents, from school, [and] from society."

As Mayfield's company grows, her vision remains the same.

"I look forward to hiring and training other women to be rockstars in construction. I want to have a successful business while impacting and enriching as many lives as I can within Southern Middle Tennessee," she said. "True change starts at home in your own community, and I am dedicated to that. Big change starts in small places." GN

ARRAR JEAN Ford's childhood was a series of hospital stays and operating rooms, each leaving its mark on her. Born with a genetic disorder that necessitated numerous orthopedic surgeries, Ford's early encounters with the medical world were not just a matter of treatment but of profound self-discovery. As she grew, so did her fascination with the intricacies of the human body and the art of healing. During her medical training, she found herself drawn to orthopedic surgery, perhaps influenced by her own history. However, something shifted within her during an OB-GYN rotation. Ford's residency in Detroit's fast-paced environment exposed her to the diversity of patients from various backgrounds, teaching her acceptance and fortitude. Now, as she prepares to transition her practice to Franklin County and Southern Tennessee, Ford eagerly anticipates the opportunity to serve her community and provide exceptional care to women from all walks of life.

"While I grew up in Tullahoma, I spent a lot of time in Winchester and the surrounding area, particularly during my time as Miss Dogwood," Ford said. "I look

forward to taking care of the women of Franklin County and the surrounding area."

Ford's belief in herself and commitment to hard work and focus have propelled her forward throughout her journey — even in the face of adversity. From overcoming multiple surgeries and personal loss to excelling in medical school despite setbacks, Ford's perseverance shines as a guiding light and a ray of inspiration for aspiring physicians.

"I learned that the key to success is focus and hard work," Ford affirmed.

As she looks ahead to the future, Ford's goals encompass far more than her medical practice — she envisions a legacy defined by dedication to her profession and community. She said, "I intend to stay in the Franklin County area for the remainder of my career."

1 lg. pkg. strawberry gelatin

11/2 - 2 c. boiling water

2 pkgs., strawberries, frozen,

slightly thawed, 10 oz.

In a large bowl, mix together pretzels, 4 T. of sugar, and margarine. Pat pretzel mixture in a 9x13 baking dish. Bake at 400° for 6 minutes. Cool. In a mixing bowl, mix cream cheese, and 1 cup of sugar. Fold in whipped topping. Spread over pretzel crust. In a separate bowl, mix strawberry gelatin with boiling water. Stir until dissolved. Add frozen strawberries. Refrigerate until gelatin starts to thicken slightly. Stir, then pour over cream cheese layer and refrigerate until set.

3 med. peaches, peeled, sliced,

In a medium mixing bowl, combine sugar, baking powder, flour, and salt. In a small mixing bowl, combine milk and butter. Pour over sugar mixture. Mix until smooth. Pour into a greased 12x8x2 glass baking dish. Spread peaches evenly over the top of butter. Sprinkle with blueberries. Bake at 350° for 50 minutes or until batter rises through the fruit and top is golden brown. Serve cobbler warm and topped with vanilla ice cream, if desired.

Angie works to break the cycle of domestic violence and help women find their strength.

T JUST 12 years old, Angie Sanders' mother was brutally murdered at the hands of an abusive ex-boyfriend. It was a nightmare that never seemed to end. The trauma left scars that wouldn't heal

for years. In February 2021, Sanders' world was rocked again. Just as she had begun to pick up the pieces of what was her new life without her mother, news arrived that her mother's murderer was up for release due to COVID-19.

It was like the wound ripped open all over again. Fear, a long-dormant monster, awoke with a vengeance. Anxiety began to cripple her, robbing her of peace and security. Sanders became scared to

walk outside alone, and everywhere she went, she peered over her shoulder, convinced he would soon find her.

Sanders knew she had to fight for herself and her family.

"I went into a deep depression, and I knew for my husband and kids I had to get help," she said.

She sought counseling and, through therapy, began to chip away at the layers of trauma.

But it was her faith that truly became her anchor. And then, a flicker of hope emerged from the darkness.

"I spent many nights at the altar crying out to God," Sanders shared. "And one night, He gave me peace I had never felt before."

Then came a dream — a vivid image that would change the course of her life. In that dream, she saw herself opening a shelter for women and children affected by domestic violence. It was a calling she couldn't ignore. So, she prayed about it. But then doubt began to creep in.

"There is no way I can make this happen," she thought.

Another prayer replaced the flicker of doubt in her spirit. With a deep breath, she took a determined step forward, setting out to make her dream a reality. With the support of her devoted husband, her pastor, and a circle of close friends, Deborah's Safe Haven at Calvary, named after her mother, Deborah, became a reality in July 2023.

"I never want another child to go through the childhood trauma and generational curses that I had to go through. A woman should not have to live every single day in fear," Sanders said.

Deborah's Safe Haven is a compassionate, faith-based organization that offers vital support and care to those who have survived domestic violence, breaking the cycle of abuse in Franklin County. With commit-

tance to those in need.

she knows so well. She believes that it is crucial to end the cycle of domestic violence and motivate women to find their inner strength. When they visit Deborah's Safe Haven, she encourages them by assuring them, "you are not alone," and "you are deserving of love and respect." Her most rewarding moments are seeing the smiles on the faces of women and children who are finally free from fear.

Deborah's Safe Haven currently operates without a permanent shelter. It relies on compassionate volunteers who generously donate their time to help support the women and children during their transition. The shelter's ultimate goal is to establish a long-term refuge for them. This would allow them to receive vital services and begin to heal in a safe and supportive environment.

Unfortunately, many people don't realize the severity of the need for a shelter that focuses on helping survivors of domestic violence in our county. Others are aware of the dangers of domestic violence but are too afraid to help. They tend to believe that if they don't witness it, then it's not their problem.

There are four main types of domestic violence: physical, sexual,

and economical. If you notice any signs of domestic violence, you should offer your help. It's crucial that we all take responsibility for identifying the signs of domestic violence and offer assis-

emotional,

Even a small act of kindness such as a hug, smile, advice, or listening ear could significantly impact someone's life and motivate them to take the necessary steps to leave their situation. We must work together to create a safe and supportive environment for survivors of domestic violence all over Middle Tennessee. GN

TIFFANY PARTIN'S heart raced as the sound of the engine faded to silence. She was already on high alert from an ambulance call, and now she raced toward the injured motorcycle rider being wheeled into the hospital. As the gurney drew

into the hospital. As the gurney dre closer, she felt a surge of adrenaline and inspiration as she prepared for surgery on the unconscious rider. She knew that a new journey, from small-town dreamer to orthopedic trauma healer, was calling out to her. Her desire to make a difference burned brightly within her, and she knew this was the beginning of an exciting journey. Partin felt confident in her abilities and knew

that she could change the lives of her patients. This experience only strengthened her resolve to pursue her passion for medicine with enthusiasm and dedication.


This orthopedic trauma nurse practitioner at Saint Thomas Rutherford traded in

her childhood dream of becoming a doctor for a path paved with grit, compassion, and the occasional

compassion, and the occasional motorcycle mishap.

Partin grew up in Cowan, a town where neighbors are family. Here, she learned the value of community and the importance of giving back, a principle that would become the compass guiding her career. Premed initially seemed like the natural





fit, but the cutthroat competitiveness left a sour taste in her mouth. It wasn't the kind of environment where Partin, a self-proclaimed "empath," could thrive.

It was a "quarter-life crisis" that prompted introspection, steering her toward a different yet equally fulfilling path. Nursing became her calling. This profession resonated with her natural inclination toward caregiving. The fast-paced chaos of the emergency department fit her like a glove. But then came COVID-19, a relentless wave that threatened to drown her in emotional exhaustion. Witnessing the devastation firsthand pushed Partin to reevaluate. Enter orthopedic trauma — a chance to focus on healing, a skill she desperately craved.

She explained, "COVID broke me to the point where caring for patients and having to know how to treat every type of problem became too much. Orthopedic trauma allowed me to still be able to help patients in emergent situations while focusing on what I could do for them from an orthopedic standpoint instead of constantly having to worry about everything."

The hospital where she was working started a trauma program two years ago. As one of the most

experienced nurses, she was selected to be a part of the emergency department (ED) team that worked with the trauma team in all the trauma cases that came into the ED. She had been working in the ED for a long time, and hardly anything was exciting or new. However, working on trauma cases allowed her to learn new high-acuity skills and provided unique cases that opened up an entirely new world of health care to her.

Her path toward success, however, wasn't a smooth ride. Just as she began nurse practitioner school, she watched her marriage dissolve right before her eyes. The challenges of single motherhood threatened to derail her dreams.

"My husband was starting to struggle with an addiction to alcohol," she reflected. "I wanted to be able to help him so badly, but I also had a 2-year-old daughter to protect. His addiction continued to spiral where my child and I were no longer safe in the same house."

The divorce process was lengthy and tedious.

"I worried about my daughter's safety daily. Dealing with COVID at work, being a full-time grad

ork, being a full-time grad student, navigating through a high-conflict divorce, and trying to raise a toddler was all too much to bear at times."

But Partin, driven by the love for her daughter, her biggest cheerleader, refused to give up. Her parents were always there to reassure her that she had done her best in helping her ex-husband and his continued struggles were not her fault. Whenever Partin couldn't attend her daughter's events due to work, her parents were there to cheer her on. They were always available to help her whenever needed, and their constant support kept her going.

Today, Partin passionately serves at Saint Thomas Rutherford. She feels a profound responsibility to this hospital, which nurtured her and now cares for her family. Here, she lives out the values the Cowan community instilled in her as a child, offering a helping hand to those in need.

"This hospital cares not only for my community but the community that raised me. So I feel it is my responsibility to continue to do my part to make this hospital the best it can be," Partin said.

Partin often recalls a particularly inspiring case involving a young victim of a motorcycle accident. Even while sedated Partin spoke to him, pouring her hope into his recovery. The next day, he woke up, recognizing her voice and ready to fight through his situation. These transformations remind her that sometimes all it takes is being present and offering a little support to another human being.

Partin's message for aspiring health care professionals is this: "Don't give up when it gets hard. Keep pushing through challenges like a diamond formed from coal, and shine bright for the world to see."

She aspires to continue inspiring people, but most importantly, she wants to show her daughter that dreams really do come true.

"I want to be an example to her that dreams are achievable and that she is capable of great things." **GN**

Blooming Where Planted


Verna, who was once an expert in milking cows, now spends her days nurturing delicate flower seedlings. However, her current life has come full circle.


