New Life Church breaks ground in East Baltimore

Baltimore—Tuesday, June 23, 2015 will go down in East Baltimore's architectural and religious history as the day the new and larger New Life Evangelical Baptist Church broke ground at the corner of East North and Milton Avenues.

The church, which will rise among rows of abandoned, boarded up houses in one of the inner city's most economically depressed and heroin plagued neighborhoods, was hailed by church founder and pastor, Reverend Milton Emanuel Williams, Jr., as another "next step" in New Life's mission to save both lives and souls by bringing hope and healing to those struggling in the "evil grip" of heroin.

When completed, the church building will accommodate over 500 New Life faithful, while also freeing up more space in their one-of-a-kind faith based Turning Point Methadone Treatment Clinic for patients seeking recovery from addiction. The Clinic currently treats 2,000 addicts a day.

Reverend Williams told the gathering of parishioners and religious and government dignitaries at the ground breaking ceremony that he sees this move forward as an example of what can and should be done by his fellow ministers in the heroin war now raging in Maryland.

Reverend Williams pointed out that most churches in Baltimore and the state continue to exclude drug addicts

and remain reluctant to welcome them into their congregations, while very few even offer spiritual counseling to those suffering from addiction.

"Envision with me, if you will, a day when all churches of every faith located in drug ravaged neighborhoods become Jacobs Ladders of helpful heavenly light leading the way to recovery," Reverend Williams said. "And, God knows, our government leaders and law enforcement need our help more than ever as the heroin wave continues to crash over all of Maryland and all America. They correctly see that the real victims of drug abuse are the Community, the family, and the overburdened tax payer."

He added that while some in the on-going heroin battle still fear that an effective approach to lasting recovery may never be found, the church's treatment clinic has found one way out of addiction that actually works: Methadone treatment combined with spiritual counseling is truly a Godsend.

"Therefore," he added, "Religious leaders throughout this state and nation should not be surprised to learn, as we have, that the first step toward recovery from drug addiction is often through a church door."

War, Murder and The American Way

He sat with them for an hour in prayer. Then he pulled his gun out and started shooting. And today our national numbness is wrapped in a Confederate flag. The young man who killed nine members of Charleston's Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church the night of Wednesday, June 17, 2015, was an old-school racist.

"I have to do it," Dylann Storm Roof is said to have explained. "You rape our women and you're taking over our country. And you have to go."

Roof's roommate told ABC News the next day that he was "big into segregation and other stuff" and "he wanted to start a civil war." And this is America, where we have the freedom to manifest our lethal fantasies.

However, this is bigger than racism and the pathetic monster of white supremacy. Racism is a name for one of the currents of righteous hatred that coils through our collective unconscious, and over the decades and centuries it has motivated terrible crimes against humanity. But the "civil war" that Roof participated in is, I think, much larger and much more meaningless and not all the participants are loners.

"In a pattern that has become achingly familiar to him and the nation," the New York Times reported, "Mr. Obama on Thursday strode down to the White House briefing room to issue a statement of mourning and grief as he called on the country to unify in the face of tragedy."

Indeed, it's the 14th time, according to The Guardian that he has done this since he has been in office. It's the 14th time he has said words like: "I am confident that the outpouring of unity and strength and fellowship and love across Charleston today from all races, from all faiths, from all places of worship indicates the degree to which those old vestiges of hatred can be overcome."

America, America, land of the mass murderer. Mass murders have increased 14-fold in the United States since the 1960s, sociologist Peter Turchin wrote two and a half years ago, after the Sandy Hook killings. In his essay, called "Canaries in a Coal Mine," Turchin made a disturbing comparison: Mass murderers kill the same way soldiers do, without personal hatred for their victims but to right some large social wrong. He called it the "principle of social substitutability"—substituting a particular group of people for a general wrong.


Dylann Roof had a toxic "cause"—to reclaim the Old South, to reclaim the country, from an unwelcome human subgroup but the solidarity in which he acted wasn't so much with his fellow racists as with the strategists and planners of war. Any war. Every war.

Every murderer believes the violence he is wielding is "good violence." Think, Timothy McVeigh, whose fertilizer bomb killed 168 people at the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City in 1995. He called his victims "collateral damage," co-opting the official language of the Gulf War in which he served. Mass murderers mimic and find their inspiration in the official wars we wage as a nation. Take away the massive public relations machinery that surrounds these wars and the deaths they cause are just as cruel, just as wrong. The abstract "enemy" dead, in every case, turn out to be human beings, who deserved to live.

Every war and every mass murder spreads fear and hatred—and inspiration—in their aftermath. The next day, USA Today reported, the vigils at two South Carolina Churches in Charleston and Greenville were disrupted by bomb threats and had to be evacuated. So did Charleston's county building.

"At some point," Obama said, "We as a country will have to reckon with the fact that this type of mass violence does not happen in other advanced countries. It doesn't happen in other places with this kind of frequency—and it is in our power to do something about it."

Deadline Nears for 9th Annual Gaines Literary Award

Baton Rouge, La.—The deadline for submissions to the 2015 Ernest J. Gaines Award for Literary Excellence is August 15, 2015.

Sponsored by Baton Rouge Area Foundation donors, the Gaines Award honors outstanding fiction—novels or short-story collections—from rising African-American authors published in 2015. Galleys for 2015 publications are also accepted.

The award recognizes Louisiana native Ernest Gaines' extraordinary contribution to the literary world. Information on criteria and entrance forms for the award, which includes a \$10,000 cash prize, is available at www.ernestjgainesaward.org.

Submissions are to be judged by a national literary panel and the winner will be announced in November. The award ceremony will take place on January 21, 2016, at the Manship Theatre in downtown Baton Rouge.

A Louisiana native, Gaines' critically

acclaimed novel "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman" was adapted into a 1974 made-for-TV movie that received nine Emmy awards. His 1993 book "A Lesson Before Dying" won the National Book Critics Circle Award for fiction. He is Writer-in-Residence Emeritus at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette.

The 2014 Gaines Award winner was Mitchell S. Jackson for "The Residue Years," which was also named an Honor Book by the Black Caucus of the American Library Association.

Previous Gaines Award winners include "The Cutting Season" by Attica Locke, "We Are Taking Only What We Need" by Stephanie Powell Watts, who also won a prestigious Whiting Writers' Award, and "How to Read the Air" by Dinaw Mengestu, who was selected as a 2012 MacArthur Fellow subsequent to winning the Gaines award.

The Baton Rouge Area Foundation has worked for 51 years to improve the quality of life across south Louisiana. It connects fund donors with nonprofits and has granted more than \$350 million to a variety of nonprofit recipients.

The change we need is within our grasp: A business school dean's perspective

I am privileged to have a unique vantage point from my eighth floor office window on the campus of Coppin State University, a panoramic view of the Baltimore skyline from Mondawmin Mall to the Francis Scott Key Bridge and beyond. While beautiful, the view provides little indication of what is happening behind the veil of the city.

Those who are aware of the daily lives of many citizens of Charm City know that the events referred to as "the uprising" were somewhat predictable. The socioeconomic disparities in our city have created conditions that fostered a letting of emotions, and an unfortunate degree of opportunistic criminality, fueled by decades of marginalization and growing pockets of intense deprivation.

While many correctly suggest the events were a direct response to the tragic death of Freddy Grey, we must also admit that the young man's untimely death was merely an accelerant for an already smoldering flame of frustration.

How did we arrive here after so many centuries of struggle for advancement? What will it take to change the conditions that fuel this kind of explosive frustration in the community? The answers to these questions are more complex than any one person can answer. However, I'm offering the perspective of a business school dean in a Historically Black Institution located in the heart of West Baltimore, who is a faith leader with a heart for the holistic well being of the people.

I will first offer several observations and then close with a few concluding thoughts:

My first observation is that the problems do indeed have a racial element, but are more comprehensively economic. I grew up in southern West Virginia, coalmining country. The coalmines provided jobs to many African Americans and a pathway to a middle class standard of living, the same way the steel mills did in Baltimore. Now, southern West Virginia is gripped by poverty that is similar, if not worse, than what we witness in Baltimore. The differentiators are that it's rural and it's predominantly white.

The second observation is that the social justice emphasis of the hundred years following slavery never transitioned or sufficiently included an economic justice component. There was a de facto black economy during segregation that all but disappeared as a result of integration. While integration was necessary and progressive, the lack of a focus on economic parity left African Americans with an inability to build substantial ownership and control over organizations that now allowed them in.

The third observation has to do with the weakening of institutions that provided pathways for masses of African Americans during the great migration from the

south that occurred from approximately 1890 until 1970. There was a network of educational, religious, and economic institutions that provided a support system for advancement. While they were limited in resources and had to operate within an unjust system of segregation, they were able to function in a concerted, integrated manner for the advancement of their constituents.

Observations are of little value without actionable ideas. I do not suggest that they are exhaustive or even wholly accurate—I do believe they hold a degree of merit.

Institutional Wholeness: It is condescending when people ask the question "Why hasn't the emergence of African American leadership solved all the problems in their jurisdictions?" There is a need to develop systems of accountability and continuous improvement in all institutions. Whether governmental, religious, academic or otherwise, the need is no less present in institutions led by African Americans. There are models such as The Baldridge Management System Model that would serve well.

Collaboration: There has been a growing disconnect among institutions over the past 60 years that serve largely African American constituents. Strategic reconnections must be established between educational, religious, financial, community, and commercial institutions that serve these populations. The psychology of oppression as led some to aspire to their own fiefdoms, leaving behind the masses and failing to establish systems that will help others ascend. When the restrictions of segregation were removed, many moved on without consideration of the others who had desire to follow.

Private funding: We must more effectively articulate the value of investing in our causes. Those who have resources

understand the concept of "return on investment," even if they lean toward conservative, more exclusionary social philosophies. As a business school dean, I encounter countless business people who simply want employees with the knowledge and skills to do the required tasks. They will invest in our systems of human development if we can demonstrate outcomes.

Governmental Support: Political influence and power is a direct result of education and community-level organizational efficiency. Votes are valued and there is nothing more powerful than informed, organized voters. Faith-based organizations, community organizations, local chambers, and other community-level organizations must begin to work together to build influence. We have to prioritize, synthesize, and strategically appropriate to maximize our influence on the governmental system.

Constituent Inclusion: Eugen Robinson's book "Disintegration," is a masterpiece that captures the new demographic realities. The arrival of Hispanic, African and Caribbean immigrants, and the dramatic increase in the biracial and multiracial populations have irrevocably changed what it means to be black in America. In addition, we must bridge the divide between all who people struggle to achieve socioeconomic parity, including those in the white community. Coalition building is essential in the new economy.

Baltimore residents get ‘Second Chance’

It was 12 years ago when Mark Foster started Second Chance Inc. with about four individuals. Today, the founder, president and CEO of the nonprofit couldn’t be more proud as about 150 individuals now work to take apart buildings that would otherwise be demolished and dumped in a landfill.

Second Chance Inc. specializes in salvaging windows, appliances and above all, the lives of individuals who have faced barriers from incarceration to not having enough of an education to land employment with family-sustaining wages.

“Really, it’s a second chance for people as well as a second chance for materials,” Foster said. “To be able to work those two together is to do great things for a community.”

Second Chance offers reclaimed materials to the public at a discount, helping fund job training and workforce development programs.


Salvaged items available for sale range from rolls of chain link fence to marble fireplace mantels. The community-driven model turns profits, attracts investors and solves social problems, according to officials.

Clarence White, one of the men hired and trained to do this delicate work, learned how to safely and skillfully remove lumber and stone and to take kitchens and bathrooms.

White told Voice of America News that working with Second Chance has been a life-changing experience.

“Beforehand I was selling drugs, doing all the wrong things,” he said. “I went to prison, I came home and was looking for a job and a lot of jobs weren’t hiring me. Second Chance provided that opportunity. They believed in me and I went from not feeling confident, feeling like I can’t get a job, I cannot do this, I cannot do that, feeling limited, to feeling limitless.”

In addition to job training, the com-

pany also provides life skills workshops.

White has opened a bank account and moved into his own place. But more importantly he said, “I’m able to provide for my daughter and give her a better life.”

Foster’s organization hasn’t gone unnoticed. Maryland Democratic U.S. Senator Ben Cardin recently joined the leaders, partners and staff of Second Chance, Inc. to discuss how unique ventures in social enterprise like those underway at the nonprofit organization housed inside a sprawling former factory could help answer some of the myriad challenges faced in today’s inner cities.

In a roundtable conversation earlier this month that centered on the organization’s efforts to hire and train people from adverse backgrounds in the fields of deconstruction, architectural salvage, retail, operations and customer service, Cardin heard first-hand accounts from four employees with criminal back-

grounds who had turned around their lives following the opportunities afforded them by Second Chance.

“It never ceases to amaze me what people can do when they are given even the smallest glimmer of hope, and I saw that transformative power on display at Second Chance,” he said. “If you want to see people from some incredibly challenging backgrounds turning their lives around, visit them in South Baltimore. Second Chance isn’t only equipping people with the skills needed for ‘green-collar’ jobs; it’s helping communities renew themselves.”

Foster said the recognition from the senator is appreciated.

“Our focus from [the] beginning as to who the organization would ultimately serve was the hardest impacted members of the community, those most difficult to employ,” he said. “There’s unemployment, there’s structural challenges for people living in certain neighborhoods

to access work and know how to access work.”

Between 60 and 65 percent of individuals are returning citizens, Foster said.

“They’re getting some skills in a program that lasts 12 to 18 months and in that period of time they’re able to get a lot of skills and learn to conduct themselves in terms of job applications in the future,” he said. “For us, we’re helping people to get on the ramp to employment and helping them to remain employed.”

Once employed, workers usually land wages well above the minimum at companies such as BG&E and the Amazon warehouse.

“The one thing we think is that people are motivated by hope that there could be a better future,” Foster said. “The people are really the thing that should drive us the most, giving those people opportunities that they otherwise wouldn’t have.”

“We all fantasize about a relationship we’d like to do over or something we’d like to change about our past. I think there are a lot more opportunities for second chances in our lives than we think.” —Jean Smart

Are Terrell Suggs days in the NFL coming to a close?


Baltimore Ravens outside linebacker Terrell Suggs recently spoke about being the last man standing and the fact that he is on the “back nine” when it comes to his NFL career. Following Ed Reed’s retirement and more significantly, the trade that sent Haloti Ngata to the Detroit Lions, has left Suggs as the last defensive stalwart from the Ravens top notch defense that helped the team win the Super Bowl in 2012.

Suggs usually makes it a point to remind people how young he is whenever he is asked about his age. That wasn’t the case at mini-camp this year. The 13-year veteran sang a different tune this year. He said that he wanted to pace himself and make sure that he had something left for the end of the season.

“It’s year 13 for me. I can’t really be stressing. I used to always say, ‘I need to be ready by minicamp,’ and it used to weigh on me, bother me. I didn’t want to let it bother me this year. I owe it to myself to sit, pace myself.” Suggs said. “Therefore, come the tail end of the season – Week 9, Week 10 - I still have something left in the tank. I’m just trying to pace myself and really not try to do too much right now.”

Last season got off to a different start. Suggs came to mini-camp noticeably lighter in weight and had high energy levels. He showcased the change by running all over the field and from drill to drill. This year, he still hustled on the field but he admittedly was not quite in game shape. Suggs described himself as not being at his “fighting weight” but more so at his “walking around” weight.

This off-season required a different approach for him. He didn’t want to stress and wanted to let his body heal from the physical abuse, which is something that

he said he owed to himself. Despite that, Suggs was definitely functional on the field at mini-camp and said that he will be fine by July.

Entering his 13th year is something that Suggs feels requires a change in the thought process. He said that when a player gets into the teens, playing becomes a year-by-year process. His focus is on this year, which is a year that he is really looking forward to because of what this team can do. After the season, he will reevaluate where he is and make a decision based on that.

At 32, Suggs still feels like a young man but he cautioned that playing like a Raven is different from other teams.

“I am only 32, but you know, we play a different kind of football here. We have a different kind of training camp, so my 32 may not be the next guy’s 32. I am a young 32 but 13 years in the NFL is still 13 years in the NFL even though I’m still a young 32.” Suggs said.

The departure of Ngata is another thing that has changed Suggs’ mindset. He says that it was weird coming back and not

having Ngata there with him in Owings Mills.

“It’s year 13, so it’s weird. It’s a whole new look, whole new team. I’m just trying to enjoy it. It’s a whole new feel. It’s definitely weird having everybody kind of just move on.” Suggs said. “It definitely was kind of weird coming back and him

not being here. He’ll always be a Raven in spirit but I’m just trying to cope with it for right now.”

The 2014 season saw Suggs accomplish many things. He teamed with Elvis Dumervil to form the NFL’s most productive sack duo. The two combined for 29 sacks. Suggs had 12 sacks, which was the second highest total in his career. He also became the 31st player in NFL history to garner 100 or more sacks.

That is a huge accomplishment in the eyes of Dumervil. “Over 100 sacks, to me, that’s a Hall of Fame-type of career. You’ve got to respect what he’s done—Defensive Player of the Year, Super Bowl Champion. He’s been doing it for almost 12 years. He’s a student of the game.”

The days of seeing #55 causing mass disruption on opposing offenses may be coming to an end. Suggs spoke like someone in the twilight of their career recently.

The 2015 season could be a special one for the Ravens because of many reasons but if it is the last season that the Ravens have Suggs, it will really be the end of an amazing era.

How thermostats save homeowners money and energy

Homeowners who have not yet upgraded to a programmable thermostat could be doing themselves a significant disservice. Not only are programmable thermostats key to saving energy, they also save money.

The Alliance for Environmental Sustainability note that for every degree they adjust their thermostats, homeowners save between one and three percent on their heating and cooling bills. Setting the thermostat slightly warmer in the summer and a notch or two cooler in the winter can save a considerable amount of energy and money. The United States Department of Energy says homeowners who make slight seasonal adjustments to their thermostats can save as much as 10 percent a year on heating and cooling costs.

However, such adjustments are only truly effective when homeowners commit to them on a daily basis. The best way to stay on top of temperature settings is to purchase a programmable thermostat, which allow homeowners to predetermine when heat or air conditioning will turn on and off. According to Energy.gov, a common misconception associated with thermostats is that a furnace or an air



conditioning system works harder than normal to get the space back to a comfortable temperature after the thermostat has been set back, and that this hard work means the overall savings are negligible. However, when a home's interior temperature is similar to the temperature outside, the home will lose energy to the

surrounding environment more slowly. The lower the interior temperature, the slower the heat loss in cold weather, and a higher interior temperature will slow the flow of heat into your house in hot weather.

Programmable thermostats are available in a variety of models. Some are easier to program than others. Certain thermostats can be linked to a home's wireless system so that adjustments to the thermostat can even be made when you are not at home. Consult with an HVAC expert to see if a particular thermostat works best with your system. Some homes may benefit from a dual or multi-zoned system, which allows homeowners to adjust the temperature independently from other floors or wings of a home.

The location of the thermostat also is important. The thermostat should be placed where it can get the most accurate reading of the house. It should be on an interior wall away from direct sunlight, doorways, drafts, and windows. It should not be directly facing an air vent. Avoid placing furniture above or below the thermostat, as such furnishings can impede proper air flow.

If you feel like your HVAC system is cycling on and off even after programming, you may need to call a technician, who can determine if there are any obstructions to the thermostat or if the unit is the appropriate size for your home.

Additionally, Smith's plans include a global classroom and she will produce a show on location at various UNESCO World Heritage Sites that will highlight the need to preserve historically signifi-



Reginald F. Lewis Museum Celebrates 10th Anniversary

You know you're doing something right when jazz star Maysa helps to kick off your 10th anniversary celebration!

"We've got a really great year of delights in store," said Dr. Skipp Sanders, executive director of the Reginald F. Lewis Museum, where the remainder of 2015 will be focused on the arts and cultural landmark's decade-long existence.

"We're working ourselves to the ground on anniversary plans and loving it," Sanders said.

It began on Thursday, June 18, 2015 with a concert by Maysa, the award-winning and Baltimore-born jazz artist whose "Blue Velvet Soul" album earned seven Grammy nominations. Followed by a performance by the Dance Theatre of Harlem on Saturday, June 20, 2015, the dance company's only full-length appearance in the Mid-Atlantic region this year.

Located on E. Pratt Street, the museum features exhibitions that detail the history of black Americans. This year, the museum will also celebrate its anniversary by introducing, "Lewis Now," a new creative space for community artists.

"We've been working on a strategic plan and we got so excited by this that we decided to do it now instead of later," Sanders said of the new space that's opening in July with "Devin Allen: Awakenings in a New Light," the first solo show of the Baltimore photographer which exhibits images of the protests that took place in the aftermath of the death of Freddie Gray.

The PNC Bank-sponsored event will

feature Allen's photos that graced the cover of Time Magazine in May, making him just the third amateur photographer to accomplish that feat. Sanders says Allen's images show both the struggle and humanity of protest, including from the side of law enforcement.

"It was powerful," Sanders said. "You see an African-American police officer with a tear running down his face, a young child wearing a police man's hat. You're getting the whole picture of what was happening."

Sanders says the museum has had its share of ups and downs and the economic downturn a few years ago suppressed a lot of potential growth for all museums.

"All arts institutions were really hurting, but we're blessed to have survived," he said. "We are a state institution so we do receive state support but what we're doing is showing that when we rebound, we have a real renaissance. It's important that everyone understand how crucial such an arts institution is in making the community vibrant and alive and intellectual."

Museum officials are also working in collaboration with Morgan State University on a future performance and they're also developing a curriculum with the state Department of Education for fourth through twelfth graders.

"We're trying to meet common core standards. We really want to honor the

teachers and educators and to make the museum a resource," Sanders said.

As the museum enters a new decade, officials say they are looking forward to the culmination of the anniversary celebration with a black tie event in November that will feature new ideas, culture, art and music.

The museum's official 10th anniversary gala is scheduled for 8:30 p.m. on November 14, 2015 and the honorary co-chairs will be State's Attorney Marilyn J. Mosby and her husband, Councilman Nick J. Mosby, Eddie C. Brown and C. Sylvia Brown.

Tickets will go on sale next month for the gala and will be available at the museum or its website.

"A large part of our problem always had been becoming visible. We're a museum not a mausoleum and as visitors begin to move through our exhibits in our permanent galleries and see all of the things about the great legacy of African American history that none of us saw in depth, they see all of the information that we need to relearn," Sanders said noting that African Americans served varied roles even during slavery and not all were slaves.

The museum prides itself on educating the public and the anniversary allows for reflection.

"We know that at 10 years old, you need to take a look at yourself and see how you need to refresh and update," Sanders said. "We will be getting a review of ourselves this year and see what we need to do to refresh and update."

Larry White Sr. nominated for Best Community Leader

Larry White Sr., the CEO and founder of VIPeVENTS Concierge LLC was nominated as Best Community Leader for Steve Harvey's Neighborhood Awards. This year, White was among over 50 entrepreneurs and nonprofits giving back to the community throughout the country competing for \$30,000 to be used for community outreach and programs. Although the Glen Burnie resident did not advance to the second round of the contest on May 27, 2015, White is still a winner in the eyes of many.

Through his work running an event planning and event marketing company equipped with transportation vehicles, he crosses paths with individuals like Dr. Natalie Forest, Ph.D. the CEO of Natalie Forest International. The owner of the Baltimore-based business nominated White for Best Community Leader.

"I decided to nominate Larry White, because after having gotten to know him last June, I have seen his heart and soul truly beat for the community. Even the networking events, which appear to be business, are all about business then giving back to the community. Everything that he does has some kind of community aspect or goal to it. Therefore, because he doesn't think about himself in this, he is just a prime example to me of somebody who brings the community together," Forest said.

White spearheads many community endeavors, such as The Black History Program, which has been running for four years. It is offered to students who attend Meade Senior High School, Frank Hebron-Harman Elementary School and Freetown Elementary School. Participants are recommended by guidance counselors. Workshops and seminars are organized by White. He finds volunteers to assist in his signature program, which teaches students financial literacy, health and wellness and African American history.

"It is really designed to assist Title I schools to have community service (and) also education on African-American history, because a lot of our youth today just don't know what our history is. I think that's significant when they go out to college, because if you know where you came from, you have an idea of how to be competitive."

Every November, one week prior to Thanksgiving, the entrepreneur partners with Chick-Fil-A in Pasadena to distribute approximately 5,000 hot box lunches to families through churches located in Maryland. White also organizes an annual Christmas holiday toy drive that has been held for three years. He has worked with Big Brothers Big Sisters in Baltimore to distribute items for children, in addition to Sarah's House, located in Fort Meade, Maryland. Sarah's House is a shelter battered women, which offers transitional housing for homeless families. Even outside of holiday periods,

White works with the shelter to offer assistance such as donating prepared meals.

Every August before school begins, White leads a backpack drive to provide backpacks to youth who receive free and reduced lunch at four to five schools in Anne Arundel County, including Georgetown East in Annapolis. He also donates them to students located in Prince George's County, Baltimore City and Baltimore County.

"My wife and my five children, we all team up to lead by example," White said, noting his family's commitment to community service.

In 2014, White was awarded the Dream Keepers Award at the annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Awards Dinner held in Anne Arundel County, primarily because of his successful Black History Program. White is reportedly the first person to receive the honor without being a senator or congressman.

The Navy veteran who served for 12 years coordinated events when he served in the military. He believes that volunteering to help the community is "everybody's job."

White explained that he felt humbled and proud to represent Maryland and his hometown of Gary, Ind. as a nominee for the Steve Harvey Neighborhood Awards. Giving back has been in his blood since he was a young person.

"I do none of it for me. I do it all for the adults and the children," White said.

Comcast offers new technology for visually impaired, blind customers

According to the U.S. Census, an estimated 8.1 million people have a visual disability. Comcast has taken a technological leap to offer a more inclusive entertainment experience for those who are vision-impaired by addressing the usability of the company's products. On June 15, 2015, over 40 members of a technology user group visited Comcast's Innovation Lab in White Marsh.

The user group, which meets monthly at the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped in Baltimore, often explores adaptive technologies through technological demonstrations.

While visiting Comcast's Innovation Lab, group members learned how to use Comcast's X1 Talking Guide, which is a voice-enabled television user interface, that was launched in 2014. Additionally, a new voice-activated remote that works with the X1 Entertainment Operating System, unveiled in May this year was demonstrated.

"It [the remote] allows those with disabilities freedom to access content. It's a much easier way to find shows that they're interested in," said Chad McCauley, director of product management at Comcast.

McCauley explained that about three years ago, Comcast hired Tom Wlodkowski as vice president of audience. Wlodkowski's team is involved in design and development of future enhancements, remotes and devices. They work in the Comcast Accessibility Lab to develop accessible products, features and showcase assistive technologies. Focus groups and usability testing is conducted with key communities of people with disabilities. This activity helps Comcast to educate their employees about accessibility, while allowing customers to learn more about how they can access services.

Wlodkowski's team also began to realize that they could help an underserved segment of the community by adding enhanced features to their existing platform, such as the voice-activated remote. The remote is equipped with a

microphone button. Users hold the button down and speak to enable the system to turn to a channel. It reportedly recognizes thousands of common commands. Viewers can also do things like navigate Xfinity On Demand, search for networks, shows and movies and set DVR recordings.

"We want viewers to get to the shows and movies they love quickly, and we've built a remote control that's smart, fast and intuitive. You don't have to learn a new language or speak like a robot. Just press the blue button, say what you want to watch and it appears on screen," said Sree Kotay, Comcast Cable's chief software architect in an article on their corporate website.

Jerry Price is the coordinator of a technology user group and an Adaptive Technology Education Program coordinator at the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. Price remarked that he is constantly looking for new technology to introduce to his group. He discovered Com-

cast's X1 Talking Guide video on YouTube. Price, then tweeted to Comcast to explain that the technology user group wanted to attend a product demonstration in Baltimore. The company embraced the idea of opening the doors of their lab, which is typically only used by employees to experience new technology.

After an introduction to the products in White Marsh, a live Q&A allowed members who are blind or visually impaired to navigate the X1 platform. They experienced how the X1 Talking Guide features a female voice that reads program titles, network names, time slots and DVR and On Demand settings aloud. Attendees also tried out the new Xfinity remote with voice control. It complements the talking guide. Comcast customers can reportedly navigate tens of thousands of shows and movies on the X1 Entertainment Operating System with their voice by using the remote.

Price agreed that Comcast's recent

innovation helps blind and visually impaired individuals to watch television and access digital information and entertainment better.

"I think it's incredibly helpful being able to use the DVR, which is something that the visually impaired community has never been able to do. In all of these years, they've never had a talking DVR, and the DVR has been around for a while, so there has been a long gap from using the VCR," Price said. "Also, being able to find the channels quickly, and being able to navigate to the types of shows and movies that you're looking for is really a big help."

Existing customers who have the X1 Entertainment Operating System with DVR service can order a free voice-controlled remote online, or they can pick one up in a local Comcast store.



“Dope” movie earning raves as it opens nationwide

Rick Famuyiwa never doubted that he had a special movie project on his hands with the new film, "Dope."

Armed with the knowledge of how Hollywood can sometimes divert from a filmmaker's plot, Famuyiwa made sure to protect his precious story line.

"It was important for my vision of the film to stay in tact," he said in a statement through his publicist. "[My vision] is something I don't think could have been accomplished in a major studio."

The Hollywood-centric publication Variety, called the film a buoyant teen caper comedy that's one of this year's brighter Sundance commercial prospects.

The film contains so much playful energy and wit to Famuyiwa's indie-est project since his 1999 movie, "The Wood" that few viewers will mind, Variety reviewers said.

able as a straight-A student who can outsmart gangsters as well as someone who is intimidated by class bullies or any girl with any interest in him.

How Do You Handle Life's Detours?

Wise Decisions Can Start With Noticing Silver Linings

News and Experts—The loss of a job; a bad break-up; a nasty accident; a new, obsessive habit; a big move to a new town; health problems experienced by you or a loved one – these are some of the many things that can turn your life upside down. These are life's detours that you don't expect.

Could there be a good way to respond to such turns in life? Is it honest to "look on the bright side?" Isn't the root feeling hurt?

"I don't think most people could ask you to deny your feelings, but you don't have to be led by the nose by feelings, which have a primary characteristic of being temporary," says Steve Gilliland (www.stevegilliland.com), a member of the Speaker Hall of Fame and author of the recently released "Detour," the follow-up to his widely acclaimed "Enjoy The Ride."

"Life is change—it's axiomatic. Most of us accept this on an intellectual, abstract basis. But when it comes to experiencing change, we often resist it. Fear of change causes immense yet unnecessary suffering. Personal growth and maturity are based largely on how you respond to life's unexpected detours."

Gilliland summarizes a few basic steps to dealing with life's detours:

•Ask yourself about opportunity. We don't like most of life's detours because


