Runaround Pond - A Secret Gem

Runaround Pond in
Durham is a secret paddling gem. I found it by
accident a couple of years
ago and have returned
about a dozen times since.

For me, the narrow 2.7 mile body of water has multiple attractions. Sheltered on all sides, a pleasant paddle can be enjoyed even on a windy day. The winding shoreline is largely undeveloped leaving the impression of a wilderness environment. Wildlife is plentiful. Beavers, otters, deer, and a plethora of turtles are sometimes seen. The pond is a bird watcher's paradise. Eagles, ospreys, kingfishers, herons, red-winged blackbirds and others can

often be observed. The swampy aquatic vegetation produces a variety of radiant flora.

The only launch area is located in secluded Runaround Pond Park. The park consists of a boat landing, picnic area, hiking trail, toilet, and parking spaces for a few vehicles. Steep ledges next to the boat ramp are a popular fishing spot and picnic tables above provide an excellent viewpoint.

The pond's proximate location to my home in Topsham affords a convenient opportunity for impromptu half-day outings. In late June, a phone conversation with my long-time friend, Bob

Rowe, resulted in a decision to enjoy a midday paddling excursion.

When we arrived at the park on a hot, sunny, windless day, two kayakers were disembarking and several fishermen were lined up on the ledges. Since the ramp was congested, we parked in the two remaining spaces and carried our boats down to the landing. We both paddled kayaks. Canoeists also frequent Runaround Pond.

The water was mirror calm when we departed. Serene perfectly describes the picturesque location. Rounding the first bend, we interrupted a Great Blue Heron wading in swamp grass. He

reluctantly flew farther west. I've observed herons in this area on almost every visit.

Yellow pond-lilies were in bloom as we navigated westerly through the winding passageway. Numerous turtles were lined up on logs close to shore and beavers had been busy building lodges in several locations. We didn't see any beavers on this outing.

After passing the mouth of Libby Brook on the right, the main channel angled left and lily pads and swamp grass thickened. Progressing through the maze reminded me of negotiating a slalom course. However, instead of gates, we maneuvered around colorful flora.

Nearing the western terminus, the aquatic vegetation extended across the entire width of the now narrow corridor. We decided to return without further exploration. Two kayakers were encountered on the way back. Everyone agreed it was an ideal day to be on the water.

Before landing at the takeout, I encouraged Bob to investigate an exceptional gorge at the outlet of the pond. Turning right and passing through a tunnel under Runaround

Pond Road, we entered a narrow cliff-enveloped canyon that ends at an ancient dam built by Judah Chandler in the 18th Century. Chandler River begins below. The magical chasm is a must-see stop when paddling the pond. Several kayakers and canoeists were departing when we arrived at the boat ramp.

A few days later, my wife, Nancy, who was recovering from a nagging physical ailment, wanted to assess her improvement with a forgiving kayak outing. The first time I paddled Runaround Pond, I was recuperating from hip surgery. In my opinion, there is no better therapeutic choice. We were off on another Runaround Pond adventure.

This time, we went early morning on a weekday and the park was almost empty when we arrived on another hot sunny day with light winds. Again, the reliable heron was around the first turn. Predictably, he was unhappy to see us. Unlike my earlier trip, the elegant purple pickerel rushes had blossomed. The tall violet-blue flowers decorated much of the aquatic vegetation with an occasional yellow pond-lily adding to the dazzling spectacle.

We persisted beyond where the congested swamp grass and lily pads seemingly blocked further progress. Our efforts were rewarded with another stretch of open water that continued to a culvert under Auburn Pownal Road that marks the end of navigation.

Numerous paddlers were encountered during our return. As usual, we enjoyed a sojourn into the tiny canyon. Another exceptional day on Runaround Pond was completed. We'll be back.

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27th MIFF names Tourmaline Prize winners

WATERVILLE, ME—The Maine International Film Festival wrapped up its 27th annual edition Sunday, July 21, in Waterville, Maine. Thousands attended this year's festival, enjoying the opportunity to see 100 films across 10 days, including Maine-made productions, international movies from more than 40 countries, rediscoveries of beloved classics, world premieres, and much more. Among those 100 films were 22 made-in-Maine features and shorts, all of which competed for two juried Tourmaline Prizes. The prize, named for Maine's state gem, awards \$5,000 to the best Maine-made feature of the year and \$2,500 to the best Mainemade short of the year. The jury recognized The Ruse by Stevan Mena as best feature-length film and An Extraordinary Place by Tom Bell as the best short film this year.

Horror-thriller The Ruse enjoyed its world premiere at the Waterville Opera House during the festival and won the Tourmaline Prize over competition The Ghost Trap and Carlo...and His Merry Band of Artists. Elaborating upon their decision to award The Ruse, the jury especially pointed to the film's haunting cinematography and strong ensemble cast, led by legendary horror actress Veronica Cartwright (Alien, The Birds, Invasion of the Body Snatchers).

"The Maine International Film Festival is a world class event; the venue and staff are exceptional," said Stevan Mena, writer, producer, and director of The Ruse. "I made many friends during my stay, with filmmakers from around the world. Looking forward to returning again."

Nineteen films contested this year's Mainemade shorts Tourmaline Prize, screening in three different programs and grouped as Maine Narrative Shorts, Maine Documentary Shorts, and Maine Music Shorts. After much deliberation, the jury named An Extraordinary Place, in the Music Shorts program, as the winner. The film profiles the inner workings of and unique characters at WMPG, an indie radio station in Port-

"Our film is about a quirky little radio station in Portland, Maine, but really a lot more—it's about community and the love that the volunteer DJs have

for music, the station, and each other," said Tom Bell, director of An Extraordinary Place. "WMPG could be anywhere in the world, but it's here in Maine, and it's incredibly meaningful to receive an award from this prestigious festival in our own community."

Jurying the 2024 Tourmaline competition were: Wangeci Murage, a Nairobi-based broadcast media executive and creative content specialist; Sian Evans, founder of Farthest Films, Smash Inc. and Ffilmcompany, as well as a member of the Documentary Producers Association; and Se Young (Seth) Kim, Colby College assistant professor of cinema studies specializing in contemporary East Asian and U.S. cinema.

"While we've been screening made-in-Maine films since our first year, this is only the third time MIFF has offered a juried prize for Maine filmmakers," said Mike Perreault, the Maine Film Center executive director. "Each festival showcases an exciting, completely fresh wave of cinematic storytelling. We're so grateful to the jurors for their thoughtful deliberation and recognition of some of the best new works created in our state, and to the organizations that support these awards."

Prizes were sponsored by the Maine Film Office and the Unity Foundation.

Throughout the festival, moviegoers also had the opportunity to vote for their favorite new film screening at MIFF. More than 40 films were eligible, but the Audience Favorite award went to Palestinian-British drama The Teacher, with Samuel Beckett biopic Dance First a close second. Dance First The 2024 Tourmaline has already been booked for a regular run at the Maine Film Center in August, so those who missed it at MIFF will soon have the opportunity to see the much-lauded film, starring MIFF Mid-Life Achievement Award honoree Gabriel Byrne.

MIFF will return to Waterville for its 28th edition July 11-20, 2025. Visit miff.org for updates and to learn more about the festival, previous award winners, films, and more.

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
MSMT presents Beautiful: The Carole King Musical

Maine CDC identifies West Nile virus in six wild birds

AUGUSTA, ME—The Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (Maine CDC) announced today that six wild birds from multiple counties tested positive for West Nile virus (WNV). This is the earliest in the year that Maine CDC has found the mosquito-borne virus in birds.

Five of the birds were crows from Bangor, Bridgton, Fryeburg, Parsonsfield, and Sidney. The sixth bird was a hawk from Yarmouth. The Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife collected the birds as part of routine surveillance.

Maine CDC is additionally investigating one case of WNV in a Waldo County resident that was not acquired in Maine, but during travel outside the state. No mosquitoes have

tested positive for WNV yet this year. Maine last recorded a human case of WNV in 2018. In 2023, three animals and one mosquito pool tested positive for WNV in Maine.

Besides WNV, mosquitoes in Maine can also spread Eastern Equine Encephalitis virus (EEE) and Jamestown Canyon virus (JCV). As Maine CDC announced earlier this month, mosquitoes in Maine have tested positive for JCV this year. There are currently no known human cases of any locally-acquired mosquito-borne diseases in Maine this year.

"While West Nile and other viruses carried by mosquitoes are rare, they can cause serious illness," said Maine CDC Director Puthiery Va. "It's important that Maine people and visitors take precautions against bites, especially as these viruses are appearing earlier than usual this year. As you enjoy the Maine outdoors, protect yourself with simple steps and speak to your health provider promptly if you experience any symptoms."

These viruses spread through the bite of an infected mosquito. They cannot spread from human to human or human to animal. Although rare, these diseases can have severe consequences, including death. The best protection is to take precautions against mosquito bites.

Many infected people have no symptoms. Others experience fever and flu-like illness. Severe symptoms can occur, including encephalitis (brain swelling), and meningitis (inflammation of the spinal cord). If you experience any of these symptoms, call a health care provider.

You can take these simple steps to protect yourself from EEE, JCV, and WNV:

Wear long sleeves and long pants.

Use an EPA-approved repellent on skin and clothes. Always follow the instructions on the la-

Take extra precautions at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.

Use screens on windows and doors.

Drain artificial sources of standing water around the home. This is ideal habitat for mosquitoes to lay eggs.

Take steps to prevent mosquito bites when traveling.

To help prevent mosquito-borne diseases in pets, talk to your veterinarian. Horse owners can protect horses with vaccines against EEE and WNV.

Glen David Andrews Band brings New Orleans to the MWV

NH - The 41st Arts Jubilee Summer Concert Series comes to an end this Thursday, August 8th at Cranmore Mountain Resort. The final show features the Glen David Andrews Band. Mountain Top Music will open the show at 6 pm, followed by the Glen David

Andrews Band at 7 pm. Glen David Andrews, a native son and a beloved musician of New Orleans, is a warrior for cultural preservation at a time when indigenous traditions are being threatened in the city. His commanding voice and fierce trombone sound – both a powerful, emotional, and resonant blend of smoothness and grit – as well as his disarmingly honest manner pro-

vide a musical experience that never fails to meet the moment. Glen's music is packed with beauty, hardearned truths, compassion, humor, anger, joy, and most of all – hope.

Glen comes from a storied and extended family of musicians. He was born in New Orleans' historic Tremé neighborhood, which many consider to be the oldest Black community in the United States. Transfixed by the magic and mystery of the city's second-line parades, Andrews and his older brother, Derrick Tabb of the Rebirth Brass Band, along with their younger cousin Troy "Trombone Shorty" Andrews, learned the history of the brass band tradition firsthand from iconic fig-



ures like Tuba Fats.

Glen has been touring since the age of 14, performing in cities around the world. He has played in New Birth, Lil Rascals, and Tremé brass bands, bringing equal measures of musicianship and showmanship to each. He now fronts his own high-powered ensemble that expertly fuses traditions ranging from jazz to gospel to rock to blues and to funk, all in the same show, sometimes in the same song!

In recent years, he earned prestigious recognition and began making headliner status at the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival, considered the world's biggest block party the annual New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. Glen has also made notable appearances at the Voodoo Music Experience, Chicago Folk and Roots Festival, Houston International Festival, The Lincoln Center, Joe's Pub, House of Blues Nola, Tipitina's, and Kansas City's American Jazz Museum.

Glen has released several recordings under his own name including the popular "Redemption" and "Portrait of the Treme Prince" and is featured on the Galactic hit "You Don't Know" from the album "Ya-Ka-May."



UMS guarantees admission to MCCS grads

SOUTH PORT-LAND, ME — Maine's public universities will guarantee admission to graduates of the state's community colleges starting this fall.

Under the terms of a historic Transfer ME agreement signed today by Maine Community College System (MCCS) President David Daigler and University of Maine System (UMS) Chancellor Dannel Malloy, Maine's community colleges will proactively notify their students about the opportunities to continue their education postsecondary through UMS.

Interested students will receive coordinated advising from the two systems and be directly admitted to UMS universities that offer an aligned program. After completing their associate degree, MCCS graduates can seamlessly transfer to a Maine public university of their choice without filling out an application, paying application fees, or providing essays, recommendation letters and transcripts.

"This partnership will make it easier than ever for Maine community college graduates to continue pursuing their education at one of Maine's public universities, building upon my Free Community College initiative, which has enabled thousands of students to attend community college at little or no cost to them," said Gov. Janet Mills, who participated in the announcement. "I thank the Maine Community College System and University of Maine System for heeding my calls to make it even easier for Maine students to get a great education at an affordable price with a good-paying job waiting for them in the end."

Transfer ME builds on more than 180 existing articulation agreements that allow MCCS graduates to transfer to Maine's public universities and have all their Maine community college credits count, with further pathways being formalized.

Notification will begin this fall to qualifying students who have earned at least 30 community college credits and are enrolled in eligible degree programs, including behavioral health, biotechnology, business, education, hospitality, human services, psychology and pre-engineering. A complete list of programs and additional information is available at www.maine. edu/students/transferME.

"Transfer ME removes barriers to opportunity. We want all Mainers to know how successful they can be at the University of Maine System and in their careers. While we have long welcomed transfers from the Maine Community College System, instead of waiting for their students to come to us, we will now reach out to them together and provide a well-paved pathway to our public universities. We think this will be a real game-changer in raising awareness, aspirations

and access to affordable, door-opening bachelor's degree programs and upward mobility," said Chancellor Malloy.

"What students want and need is a clear-cut, simple route to a four-year degree, without a lot of paperwork and barriers. This agreement does just that," President Daigler said. "We expect this to be an enormously popular program that increases the number of Maine community college graduates continuing their education."

Under the leadership of President Daigler and Chancellor Malloy and in response to state workforce needs, there is a growing commitment to collaboration between Maine's two public postsecondary systems, which together enrolled 46,942 degree-seeking students in the 2023-24 academic year as well as tens of thousands of Mainers in free early college courses, short-term training and non-credit bearing educational programs.

Just 54% of Maine's high school graduates are

now choosing college despite demand from the state's employers for more workers with postsecondary degrees and credentials. Maine has a statutory goal that 60% of adults will hold a postsecondary degree or credential of value by 2025 – up from the current 55% – which is also reinforced by the State's 10-year economic strategy.

To ensure more Mainers can benefit from the transformative power of public postsecondary education and further strengthen the size and skill of the state's workforce, MCCS and UMS have partnered with the Mills Administration and the Maine Legislature to advance postsecondary education access and affordability.

and affordability.

For example, in 2022,
MCCS and Gov. Mills
launched a free tuition program to encourage more
recent high school graduates to go to college, including those who may not
have believed they could
afford higher education.
Since the launch of the
program, which is current-

ly funded for graduates or the equivalent in the high school classes of 2020-25, MCCS annual enrollment has increased by 20%. It has also led to the first year-over-year increase in the number of MCCS students transferring to Maine's public universities since before the pandemic.

Maine's community colleges are the largest source of transfer students to UMS. In 2023-24, 737 students from MCCS transferred to UMS compared to 681 the previous year.

While Transfer ME is the first system-to-system agreement of its kind in the state, there is a history of working together that Transfer ME leverages. For example, Southern Maine Community College (SMCC) and the University of Southern Maine (USM) have long partnered to make it easier for students to transition between the two institutions. More than 125 SMCC students who plan to transfer to USM now live in that university's new Portland residence hall and can participate in student life offerings there. Additionally this spring, the University of Maine and its regional campus, the University of Maine at Machias, and MCCS formalized Black Bear Advantage, a co-enrollment program.

"Maine employers need more workers with postsecondary credentials and this seamless transfer will help to ensure that more Mainers will benefit from postsecondary education and also increase the size and skills of Maine's workforce," said Finance Authority of Maine CEO Carlos Mello.

"I applaud the Maine Community College System and the University of Maine System for continuing to reduce barriers for students by developing seamless pathways between the two systems," said Educate Maine Executive Director Jason Judd, a UMS graduate. "Transfer ME will lead to more students in degree programs and more graduates ready to thrive in Maine's workforce."

Today's Transfer ME signing ceremony took place at the Spring Point Children's Center at SMCC. Through a partnership with SMCC, the University of Maine at Farmington has delivered its early childhood education bachelor's degree program there since 2007, making it more accessible to recent community college graduates and other place-bound working adults in southern Maine.

As a result of legislation enacted in 2015 to foster greater collaboration, MCCS and UMS report annually to the Governor and Maine Legislature on their ongoing shared efforts to promote efficiency, cooperation and strategic planning.

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King named 'Hero of Main Street'

WASHINGTON, **D.C.** — U.S. Senator Angus King (I-ME) has been recognized as a 2024 "Hero of Main Street" by the National Retail Federation (NRF) for his support of small businesses

this 'Hero of Main Street' award and will use this opportunity to continue highlighting the incredible businesses across Maine."

and American jobs," said David French, NRF Executive Vice President of Government Relations. "NRF is honored to recognize Senator King as a 'Hero of Main Street' for his continued support of the retail industry through legislative action and leadership."

NRF Hero of Main Street award eligibility is based on key votes, bill sponsorship and advocacy to advance the industry's priorities.

Senator King has been a champion for Maine's small businesses and entrepreneurs. In 2020, his bipartisan bill to reform the Paycheck Protection Program to make it usable passed the Senate and was signed into law. He also introduced the bipartisan Providing Resources for Emergency Preparedness and Resilient Enterprises (PRE-PARE) Act to help small businesses better prepare for natural disasters. Previously, he joined a bipartisan agreement that would improve the U.S. financial regulatory framework, promote economic growth, provide new protections to consumers, and strengthen small financial

institutions in Maine. He also led the Reinforcing American-Made Products Act, which would reduce the burden on Maine manufacturers by establishing a national "Made in America" standard. Most recently, he joined his colleagues in urging federal banking regulators to better protect small businesses. This spring, he was also recognized as a 2024 "Fiscal Hero" by the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget.

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


