atric leadership. She enjoyed her two-year local PCF project, "Cultivating Meaningful Conversations to Guide Care," which focused on launching the POLST (Physician Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment) program in Maine.

Hospice and palliative medicine is the medical specialty that focuses on improving quality of life and relieving pain and other symptoms in seriously ill patients. Palliative care can and should be provided to patients who continue to receive treatments to try to cure or control their disease, regardless of their prognosis. Hospice is a specific type of palliative care for patients whose life expectancy

is likely to be six months or less. Hospice and palliative care also helps patients and families understand their treatment options and make decisions about their care, and provides information on spiritual and psychosocial services, support for family and caregivers and grief counseling.

"This program recognizes extraordinary individuals who continue to enhance the delivery of care for seriously ill patients and have brought true innovation to our field," noted Wendy-Jo Toyama, MBA FASAE, AAHPM CEO.

"These visionaries represent thousands of clinicians, educators, and researchers who continue to innovate and lead the field to provide the highest quality care and support for those living with serious illness and their caregivers." noted Vicki Jackson, president of AAHPM.



Lewiston announces city board, committee vacancies

LEWISTON, ME - The City of Lewiston is seeking resident volunteers to serve as members of the City's various boards and committees. The following city boards and committees have current openings: Board of Appeals full member, Androscoggin County Budget Committee - District 2, Planning Board associate member, and Lewiston Senior Advisory Council representatives from Wards 1, 2, 4, 5, and city wide.

The Board of Appeals is charged with hearing citizen appeals regarding orders, rules or failures of certain municipal entities to act relating to the zoning and land use code, building code, property maintenance, fire prevention codes, etc. The board has limited authority in granting conditional use permits and variances of zoning setbacks and related requirements.

The County Budget Committee will review the proposed budget, meet with each department and make recommendations to the Commissioners. The committee meets September through November. Residents can look up their county district on the that enhance the commuelection page of the City of Lewiston's website.

The Lewiston Seniors Advisory Council serves as an advisory council to the City Council in regard to community issues affecting seniors and shall serve as a liaison between the seniors of the community and the city. The committee shall enable seniors to send and receive recommendations from the City Council for consideration, to work toward goals that empower all of the community's senior population, and to undertake service projects

The Planning Board performs duties prescribed by ordinance and state statute regarding subdivision review, major development review, and amendments to the land use code. It directs the preparation and maintenance of the official city zoning map and the city's comprehensive plan. The board reviews the annual capital improvement program and the acquisition and disposition of all public ways, land, buildings and other municipal facilities not acquired through tax-lien foreclosure. It hears and decides applications for conditional use permits, where the development is a major development as defined by City Code.

Lewiston residents who are interested in applying can contact the City Clerk's Department to complete a committee volunteer application. Application forms are also available on the Boards Committees page of the City's website at www.lewistonmaine.gov. Committee descriptions, meeting times and other information about committee service are also available on the Citv's website. Applications can be submitted at any time and will be accepted until the positions are filled however the requested filing deadline is 4:00pm on Wednesday, August 28.

Residents are welcome to contact the City Clerk's Department at 513-3124 with any questions they may have regarding the committee appointment process. Completed applications shall be submitted to the City Clerk's Office for processing. Office hours are Monday -Friday, 8:30am - 4:00pm.

To the Goslings and Back

Mere Point Boat Launch in Brunswick provides boat access to Merepoint Bay. Nearby Maquoit and Middle Bays are also easily reached from this location. Operated by the Town of Brunswick, the upscale facility offers all-tide deep water entry and egress. Amenities include two boat ramps, a large dock, lots of parking, two toilets and a picnic area.

There is a downside. According to the town, the landing also provides an option to separately launch kayaks and hand-carry watercraft. This is misleading as the steep narrow stairs and weird contraption supposedly designed to lower kayaks down to the water is, in my opinion, unsafe. I never use it and I don't know any other kayakers who do. Instead, the ramps are our choice to embark and disembark; a far safer alternative.

I wrote the Town of Brunswick about my safety concerns but they never responded. The landing was built by the State of Maine at the taxpayer's expense. It would seem reasonable to conclude the intent of constructing the facility was to create a safe launching environment for all users, not just motor craft.

Located near the end of Merepoint about 6 miles from the business section of Brunswick,

the landing also provides convenient access to a multitude of islands in the northern Casco Bay region including the Goose and Gosling Islands. I recently announced a Penobscot Paddle & Chowder sea kayak trip departing from the Mere Point Boat Launch. My planned destination was West Gosling Island where a Maine Island Trail Association (MITA) campsite is located. Happily, two frequent sea kayak companions, Ellen and Mark Nelson, agreed to join me.

The three of us met at the landing on a hot, steamy morning. Light to moderate winds out of the southwest were predicted and the tides were going to be uncooperative for most of the day. We launched our kayaks from one of the ramps without problems. My experience has been that kayaks and motorized crafts are quite compatible when loading and unloading. Patience and respect for one another are the keys.

A light sea breeze was a refreshing relief from the sultry air crossing Merepoint Bay to Upper Goose Island, about a one mile expanse of open water. We passed an oyster farm on the east side of Upper Goose before progressing beyond a narrow channel that separates it from Lower Goose.

The tiny Gosling Islands were visible in the distance as we navigated along Lower Goose. Several moorings populate the area between the southeastern end of Lower Goose and the Goslings. On most summer days, numerous pleasure crafts are parked there. Not on this occasion; only two lonely vessels were taking advantage of the ideal boating weather.

West Gosling has a sandy beach that facilitates an easy landing. Shortly after we pulled our kayaks onto the shore, a team of MITA employees arrived in a motorboat and cleaned the site. We found shade from the sun next to the campsite for our lunch break. While walking the shoreline, Ellen discovered a substantial community of periwinkles in the intertidal zone, something I'd missed during previous visits.

We considered paddling a long mile farther south to Little Whaleboat Island. After further discussion, our decision was to travel west across the bay to a chain of islands leading north to Merepoint

As we were advancing towards the northern terminus of Bustins Island, Mark noted a fog bank was approaching Little Whaleboat. By the time we stopped at the next island, Pettingil, it was completely enveloped in fog. Our serendipitous decision to forego the traverse to Little Whaleboat was a fortuitous one.

Progressing north along Williams Island while taking advantage of a tailwind, we inexplicably encountered turbulent seas. There didn't appear to be any obvious explanation. We speculated that underwater shoals coupled with strong tidal currents were probably the cause

Sister Island is northern-most in the sequence of islands before Merepoint. Given the earlier choppiness, the one mile passage between them that connects Merepoint and Maquoit Bays was surprisingly calm.

The launch area was busy when we arrived. No problems were experienced while using a ramp to disembark.

King welcomes first results of drug price negotiations

D.C. — U.S. Senator Angus King (I-ME) celebrated the White House completing the first round of Medicare negotiations to lower the price of 10 prescription drugs, which will lower out of pocket costs for Medicare beneficiaries on eligible drugs and save Medicare — and American taxpayers — billions. The announcement comes nearly two years after the Inflation Reduction Act, which King supported, was signed into law. In

addition to the negotiation

cluded a cap on the coats in insulin and a \$2,000 cap on out-of-pocket drug costs for adults on Medicare. Tens of thousands of Maine Medicare enrollees currently take the 10 drugs included in the negotiations, paying annual out-of-pocket costs up to nearly \$5,000 in 2022.

"Today's announcement from the White House is welcome news which has been a long time coming. One of the first bills I ever cosponsored in the Senate was the Medicare Prescription Drug Price Negotiation Act and thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act, this vision has finally become a reality," said Senator King. "For many older Maine people on a fixed income, affording lifesaving drugs can be a tremendous financial strain — sometimes forcing folks to choose

between their health or putting good on the table. With 30% of Maine people enrolled in Medicare, this is a game-changing step forward toward ensuring our seniors have better access to prescription medications while also reducing the heavy financial burden of high out-ofpocket costs. The savings from these new lower prices will also be a huge boost to the financial strength of Medicare itself, helping to insure its long-term viability. This is a real victory for people across Maine and the nation, and I look


forward to working with my Congressional colleagues to advance additional common sense ways to deliver better healthcare at lower costs.

Senator King has consistently worked to reduce healthcare costs for Maine people. The Inflation Reduction Act has laid the groundwork for — and in some cases already implemented — long-term changes in federal policy that will keep people healthier and deliver higher quality care at a lower cost to patients and Medicare. These benefits are

delivered while simultaneously reducing the deficit by finally allowing Medicare to do what any other large customer in America can do in a free market negotiate bulk discounts. This will save taxpayers hundreds-of-billions from the Medicare budget. Last spring, Senator King introduced legislation to fast track drug pricing negotiations and continue to lower drug costs for older Maine people. He also has joined colleagues in calling on the Biden Administration to authorize cheaper, generic drugs.

Maine receives \$450M grant to cut climate pollution

BOSTON, ME – As part of the Biden-Harris Administration's Investing in America agenda, U.S. Environmen-Protection Agency announced the general competition selection of the New England Heat Pump Accelerator to receive a \$450 million Climate Pollution Reduction Grant to implement community-driven solutions that tackle the climate crisis, reduce air pollution, advance environmental justice, and accelerate America's clean energy transition.

The New England Heat Pump Accelerator is a coalition application led by Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, in partnership with the Maine Governor's Office of Policy Innovation and the Future, Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources, New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, and Rhode Island Office Energy Resources. The selected application will fund projects across Connecticut, Maine, New Massachusetts, Hampshire, and Rhode Island that will rapidly accelerate the adoption of cold-climate air-source heat pumps, heat pump water heaters, and ground source heat pumps. The project will support coalition partners in providing resources for more than 500,000 single-family and multifamily residential buildings.

"President Biden believes in the power community-driven solutions to fight climate change, protect public health, and grow our economy. Thanks to his leadership, the Climate Pollution Reduction Grants program will deliver unprecedented resources to states, local governments, and Tribes to fund the solutions that work best in their communities," said EPA Administrator Michael S. Regan. "Selected recipients have put forward ambitious plans to advance sustainable agriculture, deploy clean industrial technologies, cut emissions and energy costs in homes and commercial buildings, and provide cost- and energy-efficient heating and cooling to communities, creating economic and workforce development opportunities along the way."

"No community should have to worry about a future of heat waves, flooding, and sea level rise; and every community should be able to seize the opportunities of a transition to a clean energy future. Today's announcement underscores our commitment to addressing the climate crisis head-on through collaborative, community-driven solutions," said EPA Regional Administrator David W. Cash. "The \$450 million Climate Pollution Reduction Grant for the New England Heat Pump Accelerator will not only advance our region's clean energy transition and create good jobs, but also deliver significant benefits to our communities by improving air quality, reducing energy costs, and fostering environmental justice. By working together, Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Rhode Island are setting a powerful example of regional cooperation and innovation in tackling climate change."

"Heat pumps have become a greener, more energy efficient way for Maine people to save money during harsh New England winters," said U.S. Senator Angus King. "Across our state, we are already seeing the impacts heat pumps have on minimizing our carbon footprint while maximizing the amount of money staying in the pockets of Maine people. Our state will continue to lead in the cost-efficient energy space thanks to this EPA grant for the New England Heat Pump Accelerator Program."

"Mainers rely on fuel oil to heat our homes more than anywhere else in the country. Maine has already made significant progress on turning this high energy burden into an opportunity for climate progress, and this Climate Pollution Reduction Grant will accelerate our statewide transition to cleaner, more efficient, and cost-effective heat pumps. This grant will not only save Mainers and our neighbors money on their energy bills but will further America's climate goals to curb fossil fuel emissions and meet the growing challenge of climate change," said Congresswoman Chellie Pingree.

EPA made its selections through a rigorous grants competition that was designed to be fair and impartial. The Agency reviewed nearly 300 applications that were submitted by entities from across the country and requested a total of nearly \$33 billion in

al funding to implement local and regional solutions. Many of these projects can be expanded and provide examples that other states, local governments, Tribes, and even businesses can replicate in their work to tackle the climate crisis.

Together, these selected projects will implement ambitious climate pollution reduction measures designed by states, Tribes, and local governments that will achieve significant cumulative GHG reductions by 2030 and beyond. When estimates provided by all selected applicants are combined, the proposed projects would reduce greenhouse gas pollution by as much as 971 million metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent by 2050, roughly the emissions from 5 million average homes' energy use each year for over 25 years.

EPA expects to announce up to an additional \$300 million in selections under the Climate Pollution Reduction Grants program for Tribes, Tribal consortia, and territories later this summer.

State, Tribal, and local action is vital to deliver on the President's commitment to reduce climate pollution by over 50 percent by 2030 and achieve net-zero emissions no later than 2050. The innovative measures contained in the selected applications, developed with input from local communities, are expected to achieve substantial public health benefits such as reducing exposure to extreme heat, improving air quality, reducing energy burden for lower income Americans, improving climate resilience, and providing workforce and economic development opportunities, particularly in low-income and disadvantaged communities.

The Climate Pollution Reduction Grants advance President Biden's historic Justice40 Inioverall benefits of certain climate, clean energy, and other federal investments flow to disadvantaged communities that are marginalized by underinvestment and overburdened by pollution.

The grants will fund projects supporting the deployment of technologies and programs to reduce greenhouse gases and other harmful pollution across the country and build the infrastructure, housing, industry, and competitive economy needed for a clean energy future. These grants will also help businesses capitalize on new opportunities, spur economic growth and job creation in new and growing industries, and support development of training programs to prepare workers. EPA expects to award the funds later this year, once all legal and administrative requirements are satisfied.

Many of the proposed projects contained in the selected applications announced, as well as the \$250 million in planning grant funding that EPA is providing under the CPRG program for development of Climate Action Plans by state, local, and Tribal governments across the country, will complement the Biden-Harris Administration's historic federal actions and national climate strategies across sectors. Those include: the U.S. National Blueprint for Transportation Decarbonization, the Administration's efforts to achieve 100% clean electricity by 2035 and make zero emissions construction common practice by 2030, the Industrial Decarbonization Roadmap, the U.S. Buildings Decarbonization Blueprint, the Administration's climate-smart agriculture efforts and Nature Based Solutions Roadmap, the U.S. Methane Emissions Reduction Action Plan, the National Climate Reand coalitions of these en- tiative, which aims to silience Framework, and





Weekly homilies have, indeed been lively, engaging participants listening in person and on Zoom.


