
High school senior brings magic to Bay Area community; conveys educational messages



ennis Moran, a dedicated art educator and talented artist, passed away at 85. Known for his passion for teaching and creativity, Dennis's legacy continues to inspire many. Born in April 1939 in Nebraska, Dennis moved with his family to Salinas, California, in 1947. His artistic talents flourished early, leading him to graduate from Salinas High School in 1957. He earned his teaching credential from California College of Arts and Crafts in 1961 and later a Master's Degree in Art Education from the University of San Francisco in 1976.Dennis's 36-year teaching career began at Dinuba High School and continued in San Iose. where he taught at John Muir Junior High, Steinbeck Junior High, Gunderson High School, and Willow Glen High School before retiring in 1998. He was recognized as "San Jose Unified School District Teacher of the Year" in 1976. Beyond teaching, Dennis was an accomplished artist, starting a caricature business in 1977 at the San Jose Flea Market. His artistic endeavors took him to events and even onboard Royal Caribbean Cruise Line.

Dennis also excelled in welded steel sculptures, with one of his notable works displayed at Trinity Cathedral in San Jose. Dennis married Joan Ford in 1960, with whom he had three children: Brian, Greg, and Darcy. After their divorce, he married Mary Wayne Penny in 1978, building a blend-



ed family.

He was known for his kindness and willingness to help others in his community.

Dennis's creativity extended to music, where he played guitar and composed songs. He enjoyed various hobbies, including running, hiking, and painting.

Even as dementia took away his ability to create, he remained a cherished member of his community.

Dennis is survived by his wife Mary, children Brian, stepsons Steve and Dave Penny, grandchildren, and sister Colette. He was preceded in death by his daughter Darcy. John Wesley Epperheimer, 77, of San Jose, Calif., died unexpectedly June 26, 2024, at his home in San Jose with his wife, Patti Holderman, by his side.

John and Patti had only recently returned from a dream safaritrip to South Africa.

Affable and sociable, John was thought of by many as a mentor and a friend, was viewed as the glue that helped hold his far-flung family together.

In his first career, John was a newspaper editor for 20 years. He worked at several newspapers during that time, including the Ames (Iowa) Tribune, the Charlotte (N.C.) News and the San Jose Mercury News. In 1990, the Mercury News won a Pulitzer Prize for its coverage of the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake. He took great pride in being part of that newsroom.

As a newspaper editor, John held true to the principles of journalism: truth, accuracy and objectivity, the continuing erosion of which caused him great pain.

For eight years after leaving his editing career, he wrote a newspaper column titled "Reinventing Yourself."

And that he did. John returned to school and received a master's in organizational development from the University of San Francisco. He directed corporate services at the Career Action Center, a nonprofit organization, design-



ing and operating employee career development programs for Fortune 500 companies.

He spent 24 years as president and owner of Workpath Group LLC, an executive coaching business specializing in high technology, bioscience, not-for-profit and professional services organizations.

John was born Nov. 28, 1946, in Harrisburg, Ill., to William S. (Bill) and Marian Epperheimer, and graduated from Harrisburg Township High School. In addition to his master's at the University of San Francisco, he received an undergraduate journalism degree from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, Ill., and completed a Knight Fellowship from Stanford University.

In addition to his beloved wife, John is survived by two sons and daughters-in-law, John M. Epperheimer (Adriana Chuzak-Trufyn) and Jason Epperheimer (Sau Lin Cheah); two grandchildren, Jonathan Epperheimer and Haylee Epperheimer; his sister and brother-in-law. Beth and Humphrev Barger; nephews Bill (Glenda), Joe (Beth) and Tim (Ann) Epperheimer and their families; nieces Jennifer Simpson (Josh) and Emily Douglas (JT) and their families; his sister-in-law, Loretta Colombel: and his former wife and mother of his sons, Margaret Friedrichs. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his big brother, William M. Epperheimer, in August 2023. John, Bill and Beth were as close as far-flung siblings could be

John's hobbies included pickleball, reading and napping with his and Patti's dog, Misha.

To sum it up, from another comment: "There are worse things in life than being kind and smart." John was both.

regreen Valley is a place where Botany and Horticulture students can find the diversity and variety they seek in insects and plants as well as the spectrum of The Hydrologic Cycle.

Being in a Horticulture Certificate Program through UCLA Extension since last summer has afforded me some academic and professional insights into the process of gathering data and sharing this with audiences everywhere throughout San Jose, its valleys, and California at large.

The certificate program in Horticulture through UCLA Extension is comprised of six courses that run roughly eleven weeks each. The courses range

but well worth the effort and resources. Evergreen Valley College and San Jose City College are sibling campuses, and each has courses in both Life Sciences

from \$750.00 to \$1250.00 each so this

is a major investment of funds and time

each has courses in both Life Sciences and Physical Sciences. With ambitions and objectives of focusing on niches and sub-niches of Horticulture within San Jose and its valleys, Evergreen Valley is definitely on my radar as a prime audience and target for the messages of Drought Management, Drought Mitigation, Water Conservation, Water Management, Xerigation, and Xeriscaping.

Drought Management and Drought Mitigation for Evergreen Valley in July/August are the hottest months of the year. Irrigating late at night is what has been recommended to me for many years as an Irrigation Technician and former garden center and nursery consultant and specialist. Subgrade Irrigation and Subterranean Irrigation are catching on in Arizona, Nevada, and other states in America with measurable success rates. The people of Evergreen Valley, San Jose, California are advised to

irrigate in cycles between midnight and 6 am. Irrigating in 10-minute blocks is what Irrigation Technicians tell me. Three 10-minute cycles per night between midnight and 6 am is what is ideal and optimal.

Evergreen Valley has grades and slopes to the homes and other properties, so this creates the challenge of keeping a close watch over saturation in the soils and runoff. My QWEL training tells me clay soils and predominantly clay soils have a saturation and runoff point at or near three to five minutes.

There are complex metrics for calculating applied irrigation in the CLIA and QWEL training manuals for the exams. Distribution Uniformity and Irrigation Efficiency are two other metrics used by my CLIA and QWEL professionals and technicians. For now, I suggest working closely with an Irrigation Contractor or an Irrigation Technician to create and implement an irrigation schedule and water budget.

You can find professionals and technicians through CalWEP and they can provide a recommendation for a QWEL professional.



ontinuing to push for improved access to mental health services for older adults, the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors unanimously supported a series of rec-

ommendations from the County's Behavioral Health Department.

The recommendations include enhancing existing safety net programs, expanding suicide prevention efforts, and improving wait times for cognitive assessments.

"Our older adult population is growing fast," said County Supervisor Joe Simitian. "That makes it even more important that we find better ways of getting folks connected to the mental health services and programs they need. I look forward to seeing a workplan before the end of the year showing how we can implement these improvements."

In November 2023, Simitian and Board President Susan Ellenberg asked County staff to analyze existing services for older adults, identify the unique needs of older adults and the barriers they face when looking for care, and provide recommendations to close any gaps identified in this resulting report.

By 2030, adults aged 65 years and older will make up 20% of the County's population. According to a 2019 report from the County's Department of Aging and Adult Services, by 2035 older adults will outnumber children in the County for the first time, five years sooner than the nation as a whole.

Older adults experience unique challenges as they age. Life changes, such as managing serious illness or the loss of loved ones, can impact mental health. Loneliness, grief, and social isolation can affect even those with support and resilience, and lead to depression and anxiety.

TECH JARGON OF THE WEEK

Few-shot learning

ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this "techie" word – and even after you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

Few-shot learning

Training data is the foundation of machine learning. But extensive training data isn't always readily available, nor are the computational resources needed to train an ML model. To address this issue, developers can use few-shot learning, an approach that relies on a significantly smaller data set. Unlike traditional methods that require vast amounts of labeled data to achieve accuracy, few-shot learning aims to train models to generalize from just a few examples.

N-shot learning

The practical challenges of training data availability and quality have spawned a general category of ML training called n-shot learning, where n represents some small number of samples.

There are three typical variations of n-shot learning:

Few-shot learning, which uses a relatively small set of labeled data points to train an ML model.

One-shot learning, a variant of few-shot learning that uses just one labeled sample for training.

Zero-shot learning, an extreme approach that attempts to handle new data without any existing data samples.

Few-shot learning is particularly beneficial in scenarios where obtaining a large dataset is impractical, such as in rare medical conditions or specialized industrial processes. This approach is increasingly used in areas like computer vision, where models must recognize objects from a few images; robotics, where robots need to learn new tasks quickly; and audio processing, where speech recognition systems must adapt to new accents or dialects with minimal data.

However, the reduced data requirements come at a cost. Few-shot learning can limit the diversity and complexity of an ML model, potentially leading to overfitting or underperformance in highly variable real-world

environments. Despite these challenges, ongoing research in few-shot learning seeks to enhance the robustness and generalization capabilities of models, making it a promising solution for a wide range of AI applications. Techniques like meta-learning and transfer learning are often used in conjunction to improve few-shot learning outcomes, allowing models to leverage prior knowledge and adapt quickly to new tasks with minimal data.




