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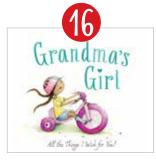

With the availability of additional funding, Taft College students also had a chance to participate.

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Unlock Healthy Habits: A Parent's Guide to Helping Kids Lose Weight

The number of adolescents and children who are battling obesity continues to rise. The World Health Organization says worldwide adolescent obesity has quadrupled in the last 30 years. According to the State of Childhood Obesity and data from the National Survey of Children's Health, in 2021-2022, 17 percent of U.S. youths ages 10 to 17 were obese.

September is National Childhood Obesity Awareness Month, a perfect time to focus on improving the health of children in your life. Maintaining a healthy body mass index early on can set a child on a path of continued good health into adulthood. Parents and other caregivers can help children lose weight in a number of ways.

- · Consult with a registered dietitian. A registered dietitian or nutritionist can help children reach a healthy weight. The RD will input information like age, height and weight, and by assessing health goals, come up with food plans and strategies to help a child improve his or her overall health.
- Cut back on processed foods. Adults tend to have control when food shopping, and kids simply rely on the foods they find in the home for snacks and meals. Fast foods and processed foods tend to be higher in calories and fat, so opt for more fresh, lean, and whole grain items.

- · Make smart ingredient swaps. Trade in white breads, rices and pastas for whole-grain alternatives. These "brown" products have fiber, which can help a child feel full for longer. Fiber also is essential to keeping cholesterol levels in check. Children may be hesitant to try new things, but research shows children are more likely to eat a new item after it appears on their plate a few times, so parents should remain persistent.
- · Skip the sugary drinks. Sodas, sweetened iced teas and even juices can be high in calories. Gradually switch over to water, unsweetened beverages and low-fat milk for kids.
- Serve a nutritionally sound plate. The MyPlate program from the U.S. Department of Agriculture indicates that a healthy plate consists of filling half a plate with vegetables and fruit, while a quarter of the plate should be a lean protein and the remaining quarter a whole grain. Low-fat dairy products also should be included.
- · Buy more fruits and vegetables. When shopping, opt for more fruits and vegetables, as well as other healthy snacks. Keeping chips and cookies out of the house limits kids' access to them.
- Exercise as a family. Find fun activities the family can enjoy that get the body moving multiple times per week.

FDA Approves Blood Test to **Detect Colorectal Cancer**

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved a new blood test that can screen for colorectal cancer in people over the age of 45. The Shield blood test, manufactured by Guardant Health, is the first blood test to be approved as a primary screening tool for colorectal cancer. This means it can be offered in doctors' offices alongside other screening methods. The test is meant to be a more convenient option for people in need of CRC screening who might otherwise skip colonoscopies or stool tests because they are unpleasant.



Is your Weight Loss Solution Putting you at Risk

A new warning is out for consumers who try to buy popular weight loss drugs online without a prescription. A new study finds that nearly half of all online pharmacies selling weight loss drugs are operating illegally. According to a study published in JAMA Network Open, about 42% of online pharmacies that sell semaglutide, the active ingredient in the anti-obesity drug Wegovy, are illegal, operating without a valid license and selling medications without prescriptions.

Experts warn that people who shop online for weight loss drugs face serious risks of receiving ineffective and dangerous products. The study's author says the average person cannot be expected to safely navigate the online medication minefield safely and they are exposing themselves to unregulated, low-quality, and potentially contaminated products.



Conquer the Creepy Crawlies: How to Beat Head Lice this School Year

The start of a new school year often means shopping for supplies, making new friends and getting acclimated to the teaching styles of new teachers. Unfortunately, a new school year also can mean head lice.

It's estimated six to 12 million head lice infestations occur each year in the United States among children between the ages of three and 11.

What is head lice?

A head louse is an insect that can infest people. Lice make their homes in human hair and feed on blood. Head lice multiply rapidly by laying small, gray-colored, oval-shaped eggs known as nits. The nits are sticky and attach to the base of the hair close to the scalp. Unlike other blood-sucking insects, such as mosquitoes or ticks, head lice are not known to spread disease.

Who gets head lice?

Head lice do not discriminate when they choose a person. They are equal opportunity feeders and will hop on



just about any scalp for a meal. The CDC says infestation with head lice is most common among preschool- and elementary school-aged children and members of their household, including caretakers.

What are the signs of head lice?

Itching is the most common symptom of head lice, says the Mayo Clinic. A louse bite causes an allergic reaction. Itchiness may occur on the scalp, neck and ears. During visual inspections of the hair and scalp, one may be able to see lice and nits. However, both the eggs and the lice themselves are very small, so it can be

challenging to spot them. Parents and caregivers who suspect a child has lice should consult with a school nurse or a pediatrician.

How can head lice be prevented?

The most common way to contract head lice is through head-to-head contact. Children should avoid head contact during play and other activities at school and home. Although transmission through shared brushes, combs, towels, hats, and clothing is less common, it is still possible, so sharing of these items should be discouraged.

The CDC says using a hot water cycle in the laundry and the high heat drying cycle can kill head lice on clothing and other items. Seal items that cannot be washed in a plastic bag and store them for two weeks.

Vacuum the floor and furniture to remove any nits or lice that have fallen off the head. Fumigant sprays or fogs, which can be toxic if inhaled, are not necessary to control head lice, indicates the CDC.

How to Talk to Your Children about their **School Day?**

arents: All parents wish that they knew what is happening during their children's day at school! However, without a camera in the classroom, they often have no idea what their kids did at school. Not all children are very chatty, so it is very important for parents to ask the right questions so they will know what their children are doing in school.

> Here is our list of questions that will help you start a conversation with your children about

their school day. They can be especially helpful if your children are tight-lipped. Good times to start these conversations are on a ride home from school, snack time after school, or at the dinner table. Be sure it is a time when you can fully focus on what the children are saying.

 How would you rate your day from one to ten?

· When did you have the most fun at school today?

- What was the best thing that happened at school today?
- · Was there anything that bothered you at school day?
- · Were you bored today? If so, when?
- · What made you feel proud of yourself today?
- · Can you tell me something interesting that you learned today?
- Did you do anything different today?
- · Were there any moments today that you felt worried or scared?
- · Were there any moments today that you felt proud of yourself?
- · Is there anything that you would like for me to talk to your teacher about?
- · Did you like your lunch?
- What are you looking forward to tomorrow?

First of all, you certainly don't want to ask all these questions every day. Two or three should be sufficient. After a while, you will learn which questions give you the most information about your children's school day.

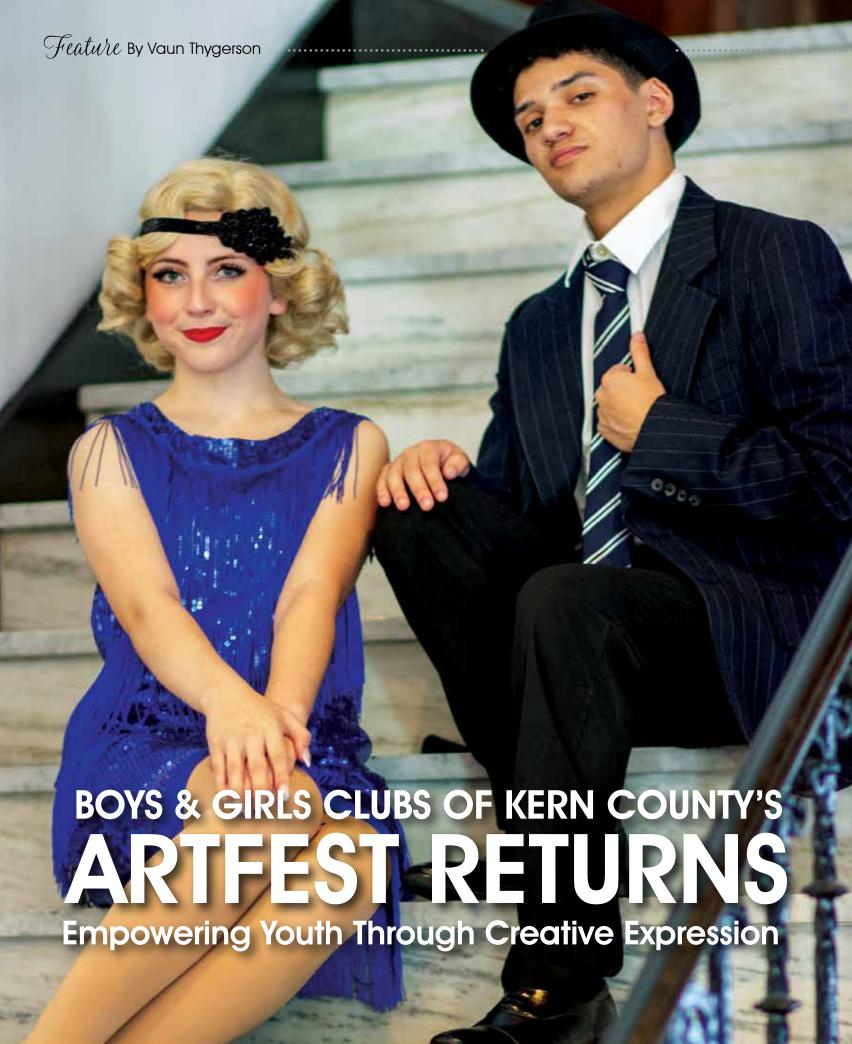
One additional pointer for your conversation time is being sure to listen carefully to your children and not interrupt them. It is also a good idea to ask for more information from time to time or to have them explain an answer more. In addition, you might expand a conversation by asking how they felt about an experience.

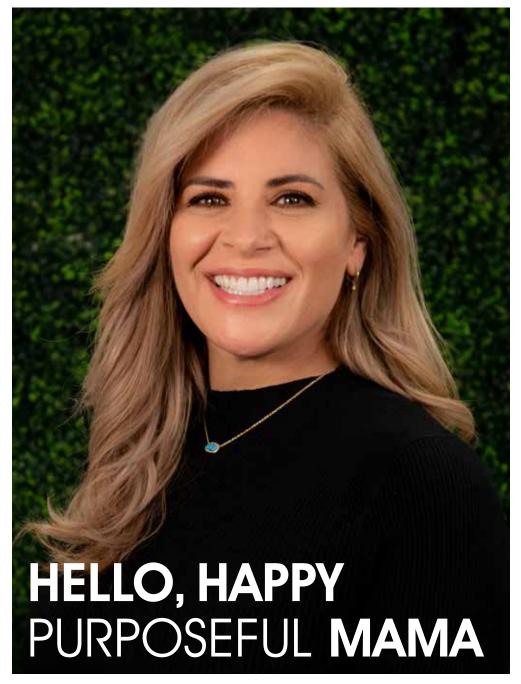

BGCKC's trained, caring Youth Development Professional staff and volunteers serve the communities in Arvin. Bakersfield, Frazier Park, Gorman, Lamont, Kernville, McFarland, Lake Isabella, Lebec, and Tehachapi with three traditional and 67 school-based Club sites. Their nutrition program provides over 2,500 meals daily to children in need.



Mari Pérez-Dowling's Inspiring Journey & New Opportunities

ari Pérez-Dowling, president and CEO of United Way of Central Eastern California. is best known as a standout community leader.

Originally from Ensenada, Baja California, Mexico, she immigrated at age 13, one of seven siblings who would be the first generation in their family to graduate from college.

"We struggled like a lot of immigrant families but I took extra classes, studied English at night and was Valedictorian," she said. "Work ethic was instilled in me."

Pérez-Dowling graduated from San Diego State University, completed a fellowship at Stanford and earned her master's at California State University - Bakersfield, After her divorce, she became a single mother to Monica, now 26, and Sebastian, born in 1999.

From the classroom to the boardroom, Pérez-Dowling has also focused on the

people-centered aspects of her work in teaching, radio and marketing. She accepted the position of president and CEO of United Way of Kern County in 2017, the first Latina to hold the position.

"There was some doubting and there was some applauding but I took advantage of the momentum change brings, which led to publicizing our programs," said Pérez-Dowling.

As the world struggled to navigate COVID, a private tragedy overshadowed the pandemic for Pérez-Dowling. Her son, Sebastian Martinez, age 20, died on March 15, 2020 in a collision on Highway 33. The next day, United Way of Kern County announced closure of publicfacing services as part of the pandemic response.

"I had to put my personal situation aside. I prayed a lot and asked God for strength," said Pérez-Dowling. "We got a miracle donation of \$1.3 million, a gift from an anonymous donor, in May 2020, which made it possible to have funding for families and agencies, to feed essential workers and individuals experiencing homelessness."

She recalls being guided by the community's faith and love during that difficult time.

"Through the commitment I have to serve the community, I have received love in return," she said. "I still have so many reasons to live and move forward."

The 2024 Talons Sebastian Martinez Memorial Scholarship was awarded for the third time this past May. It is open each spring to Centennial High School music program or color guard participants. Find more information at https://uwcec.org/sebastian-martinezmemorial-scholarship-application/.

Although Sebastian had played football since childhood, his focus switched to band as a junior at Centennial.

"Within a month, he became the leader of the drumline," she explained. "He gave it his all. That was a different side of him, which he always said was from me."

Pérez-Dowling played flute and clarinet in high school, and violin in orchestra as a senior. She took guitar classes and sang in college, a talent that continues.

When Lotus Radio honored her as one of its inaugural Tu Voz, Tu Héroe/Your Voice, Your Hero community business award recipients, Pérez-Dowling reconnected with former radio colleagues. She was then invited to record an album with Mariachi Vargas, the genre's premier group, which performs with Luis Miguel. As the third anniversary of the loss of her

son approached, she found herself flying to Guadalajara to meet the band. She received additional coaching from Julian Torres, a Hawthorne-born ranchera singer Snoop Dogg signed to Death Row Records in January 2024. Her album, "Canciones con Alma," was released in December. She chose to open with the

Last October, Mariachi Vargas headlined the second annual Festival del Mariachi, with proceeds dedicated to offset future student attendees' fees. In April, United Way of Central Eastern California hosted Noche de Mariachi: A Fundraising Fiesta for Musical Futures at Buck Owens' Crystal Palace, raising \$19,000. This year's event will feature world-renowned Mariachi Nuevo Tecalitlán at The Bakersfield Fox Theater on Sept. 7. Get details at https://uwcec.org/festival-delmariachi/.

Having her daughter join her on stage at Crystal Palace to sing is her favorite performance. A graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Monica returned to Bakersfield as a data analyst. During the song, Monica changed the lyric of Luis Miguel's "Si Nos Dejan" to "juntitas las dos," the feminine form of the adjective and article to describe the mother and daughter together again.

"God put us back together. We've invested in a karaoke machine and we're getting through life," said Pérez-Dowling. In November 2023, United Way of Kern County announced expanded services to three additional counties, along with a name change. United Way of Central Eastern California now serves residents in the counties of Kern, Mono, Invo. Northern San Bernardino and Indian Wells Valley. Priorities have included forging food bank partnerships, offering Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) services in Ridgecrest and advocating for equitable housing.

Keynote speeches are part of her role as an executive, including for the 2024 Bakersfield Women's Business Conference, where she spoke about how to heal through grief.

"I would encourage others who have gone through devastating experiences to funnel their passions into something they really enjoy and be intentional," she said. "I chose to sing. Every time I get on stage, I feel closer to my son. I've found that peace and want to share it with the world. As women especially, we can be heroes but we're also human."

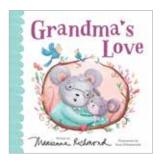

Honor Grandparents with Heartwarming Tales

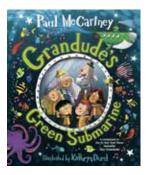

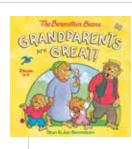

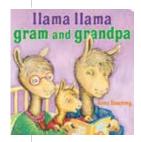

Foster Literacy Skills by Reading to Babies

It's never too early to begin reading to babies. In fact, reading to infants beginning at birth helps support their cognitive development and their bond with parents. It also increases the likelihood that parents will continue reading to children as they grow, improving language skills and concentration to prepare them for academic success.

Zero to Three, an organization focused on early childhood development, recommends these book-type quidelines for babies and toddlers:

Birth to 6 Months - chunky board books, soft fabric books and vinyl bath books

6 to 9 Months - board books with short, simple stories and colorful illustrations

9 to 18 Months - board books with simple stories, stories with rhymes and phrases that repeat, and stories with pictures of other babies and familiar objects like animals

18 to 24 Months - longer, slightly more complex stories; humorous stories; and stories featuring silly rhymes

24 to 26 Months - books with paper pages, nonfiction stories about things like animals or seasons, and books that discuss jobs

Model downtime

Show your children what downtime means by practicing it yourself. Share intentional breaks together. Everyone needs a break from work and other responsibilities.

Encourage balance

There is more to life than dedication to one pursuit. Help your child develop diverse interests, hobbies and friendships. If games. friends or even academics are taking up too much bandwidth, intervene.

Seek professional help

Know that mental health resources are available. Start by calling your insurance provider to find

out about covered options near you. Be willing to seek help for yourself and show your child that there is no shame in seeking outside assistance.

Unique ways to put rotisserie chicken to use

SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL CHICKEN MONTH, and rotisserie chicken, once a novelty, is now a staple in supermarkets and food centers. Its flavor and convenience make it a popular choice for quick, easy meals, especially when dining out isn't an option. Enjoy it straight from the container like traditional roasted chicken or use it in various dishes. Here are some ideas for incorporating rotisserie chicken into your meals.

went to see my doctor. He likes to order tests, scold me for gaining weight, and prescribe medication for a variety of woes.

And not just because my esophagus is scarred and narrowed from all that heartburn I had during my pregnancies but because there truly are too many pills. As

Didn't bother me. I passed back out, vaguely wondering why I had not yet heard him re-alarm the house.

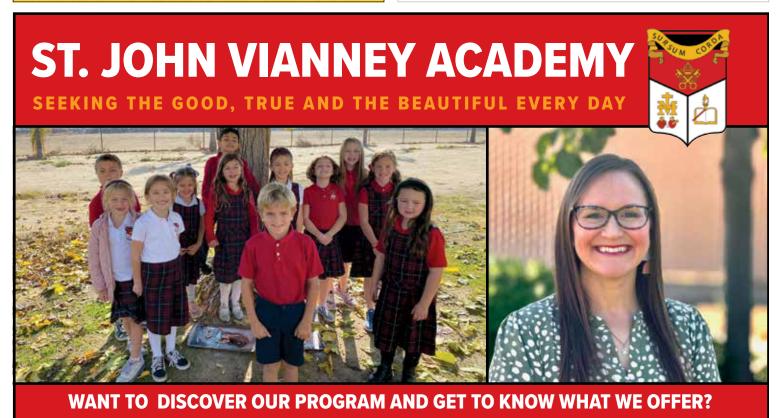
I suppose I learned one thing from having babies: how to fall asleep at every opportunity. Next up: extreme pill swallowing.
