Debunking Breast Cancer Myths



October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and while many women have an adequate understanding about their own risk for the disease, certain myths surrounding breast cancer persist. Such myths can lead to unsafe outcomes that jeopardize women's health. Here are a few of the most common misconceptions about breast cancer.

Myth: MRIs are more effective than mammograms.

The National Breast Cancer Coalition notes that no evidence exists to support the assertion that a magnetic resonance imaging exam is a more effective screening test for breast cancer than a mammogram. An MRI can be an effective diagnostic tool when doctors suspect something is wrong. However, the NBCC advises against using MRI to screen for breast cancer since it is more likely to yield a false-positive result than

a mammogram. Indeed, the National **Breast Cancer Foundation identifies** mammography as the gold standard for the early detection of breast cancer.

Myth: Breast size and breast cancer risk are connected.

This myth typically suggests breast cancer is more common in women with large breasts. The NBCF notes there is no connection between breast size and breast cancer risk. Breast density, not size, may be associated with a greater risk for breast cancer. Dense breast tissue refers to the ways breast tissue appears on a mammogram. Women with dense breasts are at higher risk for breast cancer because the dense tissue makes screening for the disease more difficult.

Myth: Most breast cancer patients have a family history of the disease.

The NBCC notes that roughly 15 to 20 percent of women diagnosed with breast cancer report a family history of the disease. Assuming only those with a family history are vulnerable to breast cancer gives women with no such background a false sense of security. which may discourage them from taking measures to lower their risk.

Myth: All breast lumps are cancerous.

The NBCF indicates only a small percentage of breast lumps end up being cancerous. Lumps should never be ignored and should be reported to a physician immediately. But it's important to avoid jumping to conclusions after finding a breast lump. A clinical breast exam can determine what's behind the lump, and women who discover a lump should remain calm until such an exam is conducted.

Avocado Advantage

Eating about 2 slices of avocado daily can lower diabetes risk for women by 24 percent, as written in Medical News Today. Avocados are high in fiber, vitamins, minerals, phytonutrients and healthy fats, which stabilize blood sugar. Try using avocado instead of mayo on your sandwiches.



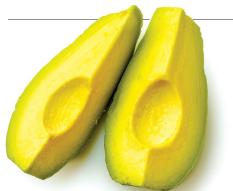
More than half of US teens have been bullied or harassed online. Despite the high number of occurrences cyberbullying isn't always easy to spot.

Cyberbullying refers to the use of electronic communication to bully a person, typically by sending intimidating and/or threatening messages. These messages may be sent in various ways, including through apps or via social media platforms.

Young people may exhibit their own unique symptoms if they're being victimized by cyberbullies. Parents can look for these signs and take action if they suspect their children are being cvberbullied.

- · A child becomes upset, sad or angry during or after being online or using their phone.
- · A child withdraws from family or friends.
- · A child expresses reluctance or refuses to participate in activities previously enjoyed.
- · A child has an unexplained decline in grades.
- · A child refuses to go to school or expresses anger or dissatisfaction with a specific class or school in general.
- · A child increasingly reports symptoms of illness for which he or she wants to stay
- · A child shows signs of depression or sadness.

Is Parenting Harmful to Your Health?

If you're a parent, you know how tough a job it can be- and the US surgeon general agrees. Dr. Vivek Murthy is warning that parenting can be harmful for vour mental health because mothers and fathers face dangerous levels of stress.

Dr. Murthy says he is blessed to be a father of two, but notes how difficult he finds parenting for himself and others. Being a dad is both the "toughest and most rewarding" job he's ever had, Murthy said.

"The stresses parents and caregivers have today are being passed to children in direct and indirect ways, impacting families and communities across America." he said.

In a recent advisory, Murthy said 41 percent of parents say most days they are so stressed they can't function, and 48 percent say their stress is completely overwhelming compared to other adults.

Murthy argued that parents today are facing different challenges from older generations, including social media, an increasing youth mental health crisis and the "epidemic of loneliness" that impacts younger people and their parents.

He also said the cultural norms should support parents talking more openly about their challenges.

"The work of raising a child is work, no less valuable than the work performed in a paid job and of an extraordinary value when it comes to the impact on the future of society," Murthy said.

The Two Ages That Shape Our Bodies

A recent study is providing new insight into the way we age. Rather than aging being a gradual process, the human body actually experiences two dramatic bursts of aging at a molecular level. The first at the age of 44, and then again at 60. The study, published in the journal Nature Aging, analyzed over 135,000 types of molecules affected by aging in 108 adults aged 25 to 75. These

molecules were tracked for age-related changes every three to six months.

For people in their mid-40s, the study detailed significant changes in molecules related to alcohol, caffeine and fat metabolism, heart disease and skin and muscle. For those in their mid-60s, significant changes were seen in molecules related to carbohydrate and caffeine metabolism, immune regulation,

kidney function and heart disease, as well as in skin and muscles.

Researchers say finding patterns like these can help with the diagnosis and prevention of diseases and can be used to improve health-care management and the well-being of aging populations. They advise making lifestyle changes such as drinking less alcohol and exercising more when nearing your 40s and 60s.



Q. Does homework really help students learn and reinforce classroom concepts or does it contribute to added stress?

HELLO, HAPPY ENCOURAGING MAMA

Stana Bright shares her story as a three-time breast cancer survivor, local champion for early detection

ctober is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, an observance highlighting the importance of screening, early detection and hope for a cure. For survivors like Stana Bright, however, that message is relevant all year long. "The awareness aspect is wonderful but for a breast cancer survivor, every month is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. It becomes a constant in your life once you've had cancer," said Stana. "That publicity and awareness in October is an especially helpful reminder for all women to take care of their breast health and get screened, which may possibly save your life."

A longtime area resident, the California native is married to her husband, Larry; the couple has two grown children and three grandchildren. Their children were 11 and 14 when Stana was diagnosed after a mammogram following a routine annual physical at age 40. Although she had passed a mammogram the year before without incident, follow-up a year later was recommended and she was found to have breast cancer.

"I'm really a rule-follower and when my doctor suggested the second mammogram, they found something that wasn't there the first time," she explained. "I was so happy I had gone in and done that so the cancer could be detected."

Stana took a leave of absence from her classified position in the Fruitvale school district to have surgery and be treated with chemotherapy for a year. She was then carefully followed by her oncologist.

A self-exam revealed a lump Stana found 17 years later. She was also treated with chemotherapy but diagnostic testing later revealed a third breast cancer diagnosis for which she was treated with radiation.

"I am an advocate for using all the screening methods because if I hadn't done all of those things, who knows,"

she said. "You have to be an advocate for yourself. Even though you're busy with your children and their activities, you have to go in and have that done. It really doesn't take that much time."

Stana has witnessed strides made in support as well as awareness in recent decades, as volunteers like her have shared their experience and made resources possible.

"When I was first diagnosed 33 years ago, breast cancer wasn't a thing people routinely heard about. I knew no one who had it or had survived," she said. "After cancer treatment that first time, I was asked by women who were forming Links for Life to come and speak to them because they wanted to see what was needed in the community."

The American Cancer Society now lists breast cancer as the most common cancer in American women, with the

average chance of a woman developing it in her lifetime at an estimated 13% overall. More than 4 million women in the U.S. are being treated for or have survived breast cancer, it reports. Although rare, making up less than one percent of cases, men can also have breast cancer.

Links for Life, a local nonprofit dedicated to promoting awareness, sharing resources and creating services for patients and survivors, was founded in 1992. Stana has been a faithful volunteer since the beginning. The organization's wig boutique came about as part of what she recommended as something previously missing in the area for women going through treatment.

"Losing your hair is like losing your identity," she explained. "Women walk out of our boutique or any other like it, they leave with a smile on their face and a confidence that wasn't there when they went in."

Stana has led a Links for Life support group for more than 30 years.

"New patients especially are yearning to talk with others who have been through breast cancer. Family and friends are wonderful but they want to talk to women who have actually gone through it. You need to talk to other women about it," said Stana. "I became very involved with Links for Life because I felt like I needed to give back. If I could help people walk through this experience by sharing my own, I knew that's what I should do." In addition to five and 10-year survivors

groups as well as a Spanish language group, a separate group for the recently diagnosed focuses on shared experiences as women go through treatment. Since the pandemic, the group has stayed virtual, which allows participants to be present on days they have treatment or are otherwise feeling unwell; many have young children they can care for at the same time during the Zoom sessions. The virtual aspect of the group also serves those who are immunosuppressed.

Support groups are available through Links for Life without charge. All funding garnered from grants and donations stays in the Kern County area to help local patients and their families. A variety of services are available, including a program to help those without insurance or whose insurance will not cover the cost of a mammogram; with a doctor's order, Links for Life can aid in making the mammogram possible.

"There are a lot of tears but a lot of smiles too," said Stana. "It's that mutual recognition of 'I see other women going through what I'm going through."

Although not technically a support group, coordinated social opportunities are also available for husbands and partners to find camaraderie with one

Among other services, Links for Life also offers a nutrition and grocery card program made possible through grant funding. A \$100 gift card to a local grocery store is available for any breast cancer survivor once diagnosed who participates by meeting with a registered dietitian in person or via Zoom. Patients can receive up to four \$100 gift cards during their treatment.

"Meeting needs during a critical time is what Links for Life is all about," said Stana. "Help is available but that awareness is key because it leads to better outcomes. Women are so often involved in caring for others but we need them to care for themselves so they can be here for themselves and for their loved ones."

THREE QUESTIONS WITH STANA BRIGHT

Q. What did the experience of surviving breast cancer help you to learn or better understand overall?

You need to be your own advocate. Many times, we do see young women who might feel that something is not right and they are told "You're too young for breast cancer" but they persist in finding out. Make sure that you take care of yourself.

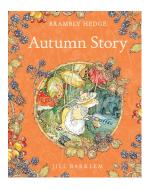

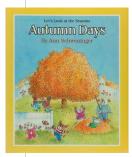

Ghoulishly Good Tipsfor Safe Trick-or-Treating

alloween is enjoyed by people of all ages, but few get a bigger kick out of the holiday than children. There are costumes to be worn, time spent with friends and the opportunity to collect free candy and other treats.

Although Halloween can be a fun time, the Children's Safety Network warns that it's also a time when accidents can happen. According to the CSN, the most dangerous day for child pedestrians is Halloween, with two times as many child pedestrians dying on Halloween compared to other days. It is essential to prioritize safety on Halloween, and following these guidelines can help.

These are some safety strategies designed to keep Halloween fun and incident-free this year. And remember ALL candy and other treats should be inspected by an adult before it is eaten.

Make sure costumes are short and avoid masks that obstruct vision. Costumes that drag on the floor are tripping hazards and masks can make it hard to see peripherally, which can lead to injury. Be sure that costumes do not cover the feet or drag on the ground and avoid masks that compromise vision.

Test out makeup beforehand. All makeup used for costumes should be tested for allergic reactions prior to use. Heed the

warnings on packaging and avoid putting makeup too close to the eyes or lips.

Improve visibility. It's important to be seen while trick-or-treating, and that can be achieved by making sure costumes and trick-or-treat bags feature reflective tape. Trick-or-treaters also can carry flashlights or glow sticks to improve visibility, and stick to areas with streetlights if going out after dark.

Stay on the sidewalk. Whenever possible, trick-or-treaters should stick to the sidewalks and avoid walking on the roads. This may not always be possible in neighborhoods without sidewalks, where parents and youngsters must be especially careful.

Trick-or-treat in groups. Children are safer in numbers due to the increased visibility of a crowd and because, if something happens, others can call for help. Parents can use their discretion on what age they feel is mature enough to let children go out alone. Until then, children should be accompanied by adults.

Keep pets locked away. Animals can become skittish when there are many people loitering outside of homes or ringing doorbells. Keep pets in a quiet room away from the action to prevent them from getting loose, injured or scared enough to bite or scratch someone.



Witchy Popcorn Balls

(8 Popcorn Balls)

INGREDIENTS

16 chocolate wafer cookies

Nonstick cooking spray

- 3 quarts popped popcorn
- 4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter or margarine
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows
- 3 tablespoons (1/2 of 3-ounce box) lime gelatin mix

- Green food color (optional)
- 3/4 cup chocolate chips
- Licorice strings
- 8 chocolate ice cream cones
- Orange sugar sprinkles, placed in small dish
- Jellybeans
- Candy corns

DIRECTIONS

Spread sheet of waxed or parchment paper over work surface and place wafer cookies on it.

Spray large mixing bowl with nonstick cooking spray and place popcorn inside.

In medium saucepan over low heat, melt butter. Stir in marshmallows and gelatin powder until marshmallows are melted and mixture is smooth. Adjust color with 1-2 drops food color, if desired. Pour mixture over popcorn and mix until coated.

Spray hands with nonstick cooking spray and press firmly to form into eight balls. Place balls on eight wafer cookies. Press candy decorations into popcorn balls to form "eyes," "nose" and "mouth."

In small, microwave-safe bowl, heat chocolate chips, covered, 10 seconds. Stir to aid melting. Repeat as needed until chocolate is melted and smooth.

Spoon about 1/2 teaspoon melted chocolate on top of each popcorn ball. Press licorice strings into chocolate to form "hair."

Dip cone edges into melted chocolate then orange sugar sprinkles. Place on remaining wafer cookies to form "witches' hats." Place hats on popcorn balls. Allow chocolate to set about 45 minutes before serving.

Serve or seal individually in plastic wrap.

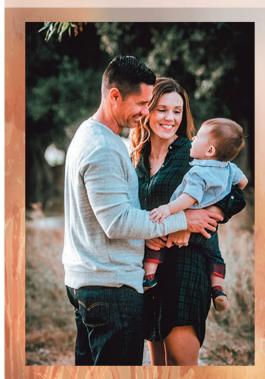

And he did.

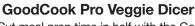

It's a Scary World: 5 Ways to Start a Talk

Choose a neutral setting

Think back to the best conversations you had with your parents and mentors. More than likely, they did not all take place in formal sit-down sessions. A neutral setting can help reduce tension. Talking in the car or over a meal may be more comfortable.

Ask what your child has heard

Start the conversation by listening more than talking. Beginning with a simple "I'm worried about this topic. What have you heard about that lately?" can give your child space to share what they already know and related feelings or assumptions. Addressing those can be key during the conversation.

WHEN ALARMING NEWS fills our screens with violent headlines, knowing how to discuss issues with our children can feel like a daunting task. From terror events in the world to school shootings closer to home, broaching headline-grabbing topics is up to every parent. Having those conversations is important and approaching them carefully shapes the next generation's view of world events.



Frame the message in safety

Quell anxiety by leading with the safety measures already in place at your child's school or within the community. List the ways prevention is established currently. Be realistic and admit that adverse events could happen; there is always a possibility of something going wrong but strategies are in place to deal with that unlikely situation. Name the helpers: we have outstanding heroes in the adults they already know, teachers, firefighters, doctors and police officers. All are here to help us and the adults are in control.

Emphasize what we can each do

Showing ways we can all help prevention methods is key but keep it age appropriate. If faith is part of your household dynamic, prayer could be mentioned. Practical steps like telling an adult when something is wrong or calling 9-1-1 can be items for review. Also remind your child that we must all help one another: use the opportunity to talk through inclusion, bullying and how to be kind. Remind your child that every person has the ability to be kind.



End the conversation with an open door policy

Let your child know talking about these topics is always okay. Give more options to contact you: bringing up fears with a note or by text may work for older children but other ways, like leaving a stuffed animal on your chair. may serve as a signal from younger kids that they need you to come and find them for a chat.

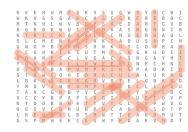
