Report: San Jose teenagers earn 2.4 times from digital platforms than national average

Teens in San Jose earn the highest online incomes of all US teenagers, study shows

New data finds teenagers in San Jose earn an average of \$1,705 per year from digital platforms, 2.4 times more than the national average for online earnings.

New data has revealed that teenagers in San Jose earn an average of \$1,705 per year from digital platforms, ranking top with the highest income for teen digital earners.

In the neighboring city of San Francisco teens are earning approximately \$1073.75 a year through digital platforms. Teens in San Diego and LA are earning an annual average of \$824.20 and \$867.53 online respectively.

To explore the scale of teen earnings through digital channels in the US, Whop, the all-in-one platform for digital products, gathered survey data from US teenagers aged between 12-18 years old to produce the US teen digital earnings report 2024. The findings



show that teenagers in the US are capitalizing on their digital presence and turning screen time into serious income.

The study showed that two in five (42%) teenagers across the US are actively earning money online. Additionally, around one student in every high school,

around 40,000 US teenagers, earns \$10,000 or more each year via their digital channels. Meanwhile, just 38% of 16-19-year-olds were in employment or searching for a job in May 2024.

How are teenagers making money online?

Digital entrepreneurship ranked highly when asked about their career aspirations, 33% of San Jose teenagers stated they aspired to be a TikTok creator. A further 33% stated they'd choose to be their own boss, selecting entrepreneur. This was followed by a doctor/nurse (27%), a Youtuber (20%) and an actor (20%).

- Clothes and apparel - Selling clothes, footwear, or apparel accessories is the most common method teenagers are using to earn online, with one in six doing so. Over four hundred thousand (439,310) US teens are earning at least \$1,000 a year through selling clothes online.

- Social media - One in three students under the age of 18 have been approached by a brand to

Fall energy bills to include \$55.17 California Climate Credit for PG&E electric customers

In October, millions of residential and eligible small business customers will receive the California Climate Credit on their Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) electric bill. Customers do not need to do anything to receive the credit.

Residential households with an active electric account will receive an electric credit of \$55.17, the same amount they received in the spring. The twice-a-year electric credit was first delivered in April, in addition to an annual natural gas credit of \$85.46 for residential customers with a natural gas account. Combined-use customers' total bill credits for 2024 is \$195.80.

Eligible small business customers will receive the electric credit in October, bringing their total bill credits for 2024 to \$110.34.

- Gaming - Video games are another source of income, with over 450 thousand (454,907) teenagers in the US earning over ten times above average.

It's evident that operating online has given teenagers a platform to leapfrog the traditional roles to become their own boss, highlighting a whole digital economy that US teenagers are at the forefront of.

Cameron Zoub, CGO and co-founder of Whop, says:

"The way people make a living is changing — Gen Alpha and Gen Z's entrepreneurial mindset alone is proof of that. They aren't mindlessly scrolling as some would have you believe. They're building their networks, meaningfully engaging with brands, and creating their own path to financial freedom."

Taking action

When I took office, I promised we would take bold action on homelessness. I promised not to let the perfect be the enemy of the good. And I promised that together we would deliver results.

Soon after, we launched our weekly Saturday clean-ups. One of the first clean-ups we organized was at Watson Park. Some of you reading this were there, and may remember, as I do, how horrific the conditions were.

Along the edge of the park near the creek—a greenspace that should be open and clean—was filled with debris, rotting former belongings and human excrement, and dozens of stolen shopping carts. Even after two clean-ups, the park and surrounding environment are still impacted by camping and neighbors have told me they don't feel safe using the park. This is unacceptable. We can't make lasting progress if we have people living in unmanaged, unsafe conditions without security, sanitation and basic rules.

This week, we took action to change that. We took another step toward fulfilling the promises I

made to treat homelessness like the crisis it is and finally restore this park to what it should be – a clean, safe, welcoming place for everyone to enjoy.

This neighborhood will be the first to see the benefits of a new solution we are going to test — one that will preserve our park and protect it from re-encampment – our first Safe Sleeping Site.

My team and Councilmember Torres' office recently went door-to-door, letting neighbors know that they'll be the first to see the effects of this new approach. We'll be working with the neighborhood every step of the way to ensure this solution benefits everyone.

Likely to open in early 2025, these sites will serve those currently living in encampments in the immediate vicinity first. We will then create no encampment zones within a minimum two-block radius of the site to prevent the unmanaged, unsafe sites from returning to the neighborhood. This is a new approach that we believe will reduce the impacts of encampments and help get people stabilized and on a path toward self-sufficiency as we invest in more treatment beds, shelter beds and affordable housing. All of these solutions are valuable, but we can't wait for the most permanent solutions in order to take action on the crisis in front of us today.

We're still working through the details of operation, including how many people will be served at this site, but we know that services will include sanitation, trash pick-up, security and case management. There will be a code of conduct strictly enforced with bans on weapons and drug use on site, and support in accessing the resources our homeless neighbors need to get on a better path. You can see the site and hear more about the plan below.

This site will be the first of a few to move forward this year, as we step up our efforts to end the era of unmanaged, unsafe encampments and all of the issues that come with them. Last year, we reduced unsheltered homelessness in San Jose by nearly 11%, but far too many neighborhoods are still severely impacted by unmanaged encampments and can't wait years until enough affordable housing is built. While we take an "all of the above" approach that includes building new treatment beds via our County government, tiny homes, safe parking sites, and affordable housing (as well as investments in upstream homelessness prevention), we will also move more decisively to manage the situation on our streets for everyone's sake. That's what safe sleeping sites are all about.

We can't allow our public spaces to fall into squalor any more than we can allow our homeless neighbors to live in it – that's why we're moving with urgency to create a better quality of life for all of us. We'll keep you updated in the coming weeks and months as we continue to make progress and work with the immediate neighbors to establish a Safe Sleeping Site that works for everyone.

San Jose cop running for office to stay in race despite administrative leave

San Jose police sergeant and City Council candidate, Tam Truong, has been placed on administrative leave amid allegations of mortgage fraud. He said he plans to continue his campaign for elected office.

Truong, who's worked in law enforcement for two decades and is running against incumbent Domingo Candelas for the District 8 San Jose City Council seat in November, was sued last year for allegedly defrauding an escrow officer with the Orange Coast Title Company, which allowed him to ditch his mortgage and collect nearly \$540,000 from the sale of a home.

"The employee has been placed on administrative leave for a personnel matter," a spokesperson for the department told San José Spotlight.

Truong said the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office

A first-generation college student who began his higher education journey as a community college student himself, López has almost 25 years of experience as a community college faculty member and administrator.

After serving as an English as a Second Language faculty member, López, a native Spanish speaker, transitioned into administration where he currently serves as vice president of instruction at Skyline College in San Bruno, California.

filed a complaint against him.

“This single-count complaint filed by the district attorney’s office represents nothing more than an allegation. It is based on a misunderstanding of all the facts in this case,” Truong told San José Spotlight. “This matter has been settled through a civil proceeding, which is the appropriate venue. There is no evidence that I intended to mislead anyone. What we have here is a rush to judgment and an effort to criminalize innocent conduct without a full understanding of the facts.”

The district attorney’s office filed this charge against me on the eve of the election, depriving me of sufficient time to clear my name through the judicial process before voting begins.”

Truong said he has an “impeccable record of public service.”

“As someone who immigrated to this country from Vietnam at a young age, I believe in the rule of law and in our justice system. I am grateful for the overwhelming support from colleagues and members of the community who know me for my integrity and the strength of my character,” he said.

He said he trusts the justice system to clear his name.

“I have not committed a crime, and I plan to continue with my campaign,” he told San José Spotlight.

Sean Webby, spokesperson for the Santa Clara County District Attorney’s Office, declined to comment on a potential criminal complaint. Officials with the Santa Clara County Superior Court didn’t respond to requests for comment.

The insurance company’s lawsuit claimed Truong “used his position of trust and authority as a SJPD Police Officer to fraudulently convince” an escrow officer that a lien on his property could be removed from a preliminary title document, according to court documents from last year.

The complaint filed against Truong in Santa Clara County Superior Court in September 2022 said he showed the escrow officer documents from his 2015 Chapter 7 bankruptcy to help convince her the lien was eliminated from his home on Plumstead Way in San Jose. After defrauding the escrow officer in January 2021, the complaint alleges Truong conspired with two others to sell the Plumstead home in July 2021.

Truong’s actions resulted in the sale going through as if he owned the title of the home outright, without any liens, the complaint said. Rather than pay back his mortgage with the money from the sale, he is alleged to have pocketed the cash and later reinvested it in another home.

San José Spotlight last year also reported that Truong at one point owed more than \$30,000 to a former employee of his

private security company, Training and Protective Services, which he started in 2012 to offer private patrols for neighborhoods just as the city's police force was hemorrhaging officers due to Measure B, a 2012 ballot measure that slashed retirement benefits for police officers. Truong supported the controversial measure in his 2012 council run.

In a wage theft case filed with the state labor commissioner in 2014, one of Truong's employees, Kevin Halverson, claimed he worked nearly 1,700 hours in the first half of 2013, but was paid for only a little more than 500 hours.

Following a hearing and testimony from Halverson and some of his coworkers in early 2015, the labor commissioner ordered Truong to pay Halverson \$34,071 in wages, damages, interest and penalties. Truong's company dissolved a short time later.

In early 2015, the San Jose Police Department suspended Truong's department-issued outside work permit, which the

department uses to monitor officers' business interests separate from police work, while police leaders considered whether it was a conflict for him to profit from the department's short staffing problems.

Truong is once again running for the same seat he sought through an appointment process in 2023.

Candelas, who was ahead of Truong in the March primaries, said he's reserving judgement on his November challenger.

"I'm going to let the process run its course. My focus as councilmember for District 8 remains the same: keeping our community safe, cleaning our streets and parks and creating stronger neighborhoods," he told San José Spotlight.

Mahan said that while he awaits the outcome of Truong's case, he's withdrawing his support for him in the District 8 race.

"This is a serious charge that requires a fair, thorough and timely investigation," Mahan told San José Spotlight. "While I understand Tam Truong has stated he is innocent of this single charge, that must now be determined through our judicial system. Given these facts I am withdrawing my endorsement until such time as this case is resolved."

San José announces area for first safe sleeping site in city history

Located along the Coyote Creek, the site will bring relief to neighbors, restore Watson Park, and help City meet environmental mandate

The City of San José just took a significant step toward establishing a safer, managed alternative to unsheltered homelessness at 1157 E Taylor St.

This location was selected from eight potential sites that the San José City Council unanimously approved for further analysis in June of this year.

If the location continues to prove suitable, it will be the first safe sleeping site to open in San Jose, likely in early 2025.

“Last year, we did a clean-up at Watson Park, and the conditions were shocking — a greenspace that should be open and available for all was covered in human excrement, filled with debris and overrun by shopping carts. We can’t allow our public spaces to fall into squalor any more than we can allow our homeless neighbors to live in it,” said San Jose Mayor Matt Mahan. “This area will be the first to see the benefits of this new solution to homelessness — one that will preserve our park and protect it from re-encampment. We’ll be working with the neighborhood every step of the way to ensure this solution benefits everyone.”

In this year’s budget, the City Council voted unanimously to allocate dollars toward the cre-



ation of several Safe Sleeping Sites with the capacity to serve a total of 500 homeless people currently living on the streets of San Jose or along one of the City’s many waterways.

“I’ve lived in San Jose for several decades, witnessing the increasing plight of people living in the streets, the creeks, or anywhere they

could find,” said Jeff Levine, a local resident and spokesperson for the Roosevelt Neighborhood Association. “I applaud and support 100% the City creating safe sleeping sites. Our neighborhood understands that solving homelessness requires all neighborhoods throughout the City to be supportive of plans to get people out of the creeks, highway overpasses, streets, parks and into supervised housing.”

The magnitude of the homelessness crisis has affected the health of City waterways, and this initiative is a part of broader budget investments designed to maintain the City’s stormwater permit and comply with the Clean Water Act by reducing pollution in the rivers and creeks that flow through San José — 88% of which is attributed to unmanaged, unsheltered living conditions along these waterways.






