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The Importance of Raising Independent Thinkers

More important than all the money or education in the world, is the ability to think for oneself. To be able to draw one's own conclusion and know what one believes (and doesn't), as well as what one wants (and doesn't), is probably the most valuable tool a person could have in their toolbox of life. If you have young children, are expecting, or thinking about starting a family, here are some things to have in your toolkit to help foster an independent thinker who is strong and resilient.

Why is independent thinking criti-

In this day and age we all encounter a constant influx of what others think and believe (and what we should be thinking as well). We are bombarded with a plethora of differing opinions and judgments. It's easy to become swayed into doubting ourselves, and our own truth, too quickly believing what we see and hear. Not everyone has the best of intentions, so it's important for our children to learn to think for themselves.

What's resiliency got to do with it?

We live in a world where for some reason, everyone thinks they're right all the time, every time. It's getting more and more difficult for our voices to be heard over all the noise. Everyone seems to be in competition to be heard and unfortunately, not everyone is eloquent when they do it. There are some nasty people out there who don't care about what they say, to whom they say it to, or how they deliver it. To raise a strong independent thinker, you must raise one who is also resilient enough that they won't be knocked down with one simple rebuttal or rude comment. When I began homeschooling 27 years ago, I was given this advice: "Don't shy away from talking about homeschooling or your choice to do it. If others are criticizing you, it's an

opportunity for you to research your reasons, know your why, and it will help you talk about your choice with others." The truth was, we were already receiving backlash from family, so it was expected we would get it from others, and we did. Being uncomfortable became okay; the more I followed the advice, the better I felt about my decision. I had done my research, knew my why, and I was happy to share it. I was also just as happy to walk away unphased by people's opinions of me and my choices. That was their opinion (accompanied by their assumptions about my childrens' future), and they were entitled to them. I never argued. Sometimes I thanked them for their input if it was a valid thought for me to consider. Otherwise, I informed and educated them from a homeschooling mother's perspective (and experience) then carried on.

How to raise resilient independent thinkers

This starts by allowing kids to be



individuals at home. By fostering that environment, they can naturally become their own person, with their own mind, and find comfort in being supported to do so. Practice asking questions. Not dead end ones which result in "yes", "no", or "I don't know". Not questions which cause kids to become stubborn or guarded, on the defense wondering what answer you are looking for. Ask open ended questions in a genuine caring fashion; ones that facilitate thinking. Independent thinking. Give kids opportunities to make their own decisions. I have long been a proponent of this. It helps kids develop gut instincts, critical thinking skills, and face consequences of their actions which are a result of their thoughts and decisions. Over time, they learn to follow their gut too- which includes internal dialogue that, in part with research, fosters a belief system that begins to develop naturally and over time and cannot be swayed to do things that are not in alignment with life goals or their core feelings. Be honest with them. Tell them that over time they may lose friends, because they will. But also explain that these are their developing years and it is normal. As they grow and mature, they will move forward, in and out of circles of friends. Tell them it's very okay, even though it might hurt, and in time they will wind up finding more of their tribe of like-minded people and will appreciate those relationships immensely.

Fostering independent vs stubborn thinkers

Modeling what we want from our children is always first. Restrain yourself from being overly opinionated with responses (which, frankly, is more reaction than response). Otherwise, they'll shut down, or worse, argue with you. Main-

Families have their own reasons for choosing private school over public, and class size may factor into those decisions. According to U.S. News and World Report, the student-to-teacher ratio at private schools in 2021 was 12.5 students per teacher, lower than the average 15.4 at public schools. The National Center for Education Statistics says public schools have an average class size of 25 students, compared to 19 students per class in private schools. Thought-Co. indicates public school classes can be as large as 25 to 30 students, particularly in urban neighborhoods, while most private schools keep their classes limited to 10 to 15 students. Freemont University reports that students learn faster and perform better in smaller classes. Those in classes with fewer than 20 students often get more individualized attention, participate with greater frequency, and have better communication with the teacher.

Parental involvement is a key factor in students' performance

Success in school can carry over to successful experiences later in life. That underscores the benefits of developing skills in the classroom. Students learn in their own way, and at times there may need to overcome various obstacles.

The job of education does not fully fall on educators and administrators. Education begins at home. Research has found that kids benefit significantly when parents and other caregivers are strongly involved in a child's education. A 2020 study published in the Journal of Prevention and Intervention in the Community found that parental involvement in a child's education is associated with improved academic performance. Specifically, children whose parents are more involved in their educations have higher levels of academic performance than children whose parents were not as

A 2005 study from researchers at the Johns Hopkins University Center of School, Family and Community Partnerships showed that school practices that encourage families to support their students' math learning at home led to

higher percentages of students scoring at or above proficiency on standardized math tests. Additional research indicates the benefits also extend to other subjects and areas of learning, including language comprehension and expressive language skills.

With so much to gain from parental involvement in students' educations, parents can embrace these strategies to get more involved.

- Develop a partnership with the teacher. Open communication with the teacher(s) can help parents stay up-to-date on what is going on in the classroom and learn early on where a student may need extra support. Then parents can offer extra guidance if it is feasible, or look into an experienced tutor.
- Be firm but supportive. Too much academic pressure may cause a child to pull back or even test boundaries, and that can lead to students falling behind in school. Parents must find the right level of involvement and guide their kids without sounding like good grades are "make or break" the relationship.
 - Attend school functions. Parents



can go to open houses, back-to-school nights, conferences, and other events held at school to show support and interest in their children's education. Involved parents also build school-based networks this way, which can be called upon if their student needs additional support in the future.

• Establish a schedule at home. Stu-

dents can benefit from a schedule, with regular bedtime, homework time and opportunities to relax. Knowing what to expect and when to expect it can take some of the stress out of learning and studying, according to Nemours health.

Parents working in concert with schools and their children can lead to better academic outcomes.

Essential Skills for Children to Develop in Preschool

(Family Features) The skills young children need for success in elementary school and beyond are developed during the first five years of life. For families, it's critical to select the right preschool - one with thoroughly trained faculty and a curriculum designed to nurture foundational academic, social, emotional and physical skills - then extend learning to home.

Experts from The Goddard School's education team - Dr. Lauren Loquasto, senior vice president and chief academic officer; Dr. Maria Shaheen, director of early childhood research and innovation; and Karie Ann Middleton, director of early childhood education programs - share this guidance to help families prepare their children for success in, and beyond, elementary school.

Core Skills to Prioritize in Preschool

Most families, when thinking about their child's preschool education, naturally default to focusing on academic skills, and those are certainly important. Children should develop a well-rounded foundation of literacy and mathematics skills. This includes building vocabulary, pairing sounds and letters and sounding out new words, as well as learning to count and connecting a number of objects (e.g., three blocks) to the corresponding numeral (3).

Just as important as the academic skills, however, are social and emotional skills. For example:

- Identifying feelings and emotions in themselves and others, and responding appropriately
- Entering a new social situation, making friends and navigating conflict
- Basic self-help skills, such as knowing how to independently eat, use the bathroom and zip up their jackets

Lastly is the development of early physical skills, such as balance and learning to use a pencil and scissors.

Inquiry-Based Learning: The Optimal Approach

The best educational approach supports all skill development - academic, social, emotional and physical - while children are engaged in play and exploration. In these supportive environments, teachers can actively observe children

ing notable happenings in professional fields that interest you. That might mean monitoring news stories and setting up search terms to alert you to the latest articles. You may also be able to subscribe to publications dedicated to the industry and join professional organizations connected to the field as a student ambassador. Researching the field can give you a stronger idea of how you can become more directly involved as a student.

Expand Your Education

As a student, you may have limited opportunities to explore your career field while also meeting the requirements for your high school diploma. However, you can join (or start) a club to sharpen your focus on areas you have a special interest. You can also look for ways to learn more about your chosen field outside of school



hours by attending camps, seminars and workshops. You may even be able to land a part-time job, internship or apprenticeship that provides greater visibility to your future career plans.

and listen carefully to understand their interests and curiosities then guide the instruction accordingly.

This is the basis of inquiry-based learning, a framework that embraces the natural curiosity and sense of wonder children bring into the classroom. Researchers from leading universities found when children are interested in what they are learning, attention spans are maximized, and when they feel in control of their learning, engagement is higher.

At The Goddard School, inquiry-based learning is brought to life via its exclusive education program, Wonder of Learning. With teacher-guided inquiry topics, children learn about themselves and the world around them by exploring their interests, investigating concepts and asking questions. Taking Inquiry-Based Learning Home Inquiry-based learning is not limited to the classroom. In fact, to best support young children, families should practice the approach at home, too.

Families can start by narrating what they and their children are doing and verbalizing the emotions that correspond with their experiences. For example, "I can see by your face you aren't sure if you like that new vegetable. I wonder if it's the flavor or the texture?" Beyond listening to their responses, watch their faces for cues and respond accordingly. Give children choices, when possible and safe, such as choosing their outfits or snacks. Making choices helps them develop critical thinking skills and builds confidence and motivation.

Infuse open-ended questions throughout daily life. For example, ask "What makes you curious?" Going further, have children draw what they are curious about.

To help families practice inquiry-based learning, The Goddard School published a children's book, "Curious Blueberry the Carousel Horse," written by Steve Metzger and illustrated by Bruno Robert. The story follows Blueberry and her colorful carousel animal friends as they learn to find joy through curiosity and questions. Cues throughout the story prompt the reader to ask open-ended questions, creating an engaging and individualized experience for children.



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

tain a flexible mind; open to change, potential to be wrong, and give yourself the freedom to pivot your opinion with proper research and listening to perspectives. Kids should learn how to be open minded; show them how.

Can raising an independent thinker create challenges for parents?

Yes. So be ready, if you want to raise a strong child. It could lead to some push and pull. That can be scary and challenging. Ask me how I know. I have a middle child, and her way is THE way. But she's also teachable, and that's smart. She hears what is being said. While she may not always agree in the moment, I do often have the privilege of hearing, "See, I listen". The above approach should help. But be patient, it may take time; don't give up.

Will independent thinkers make better choices?

Raising independent thinkers can create better decision makers. Rather than doing something based on what the crowd is doing, a child who is strong in their own identity will follow their

own compass. They may avoid jumping on the bandwagon, or at the very least give it a second thought; seeing more quickly how a decision might lead them down an undesirable path. Instead of operating out of fear, a need to fit in and be accepted because they lack belief in themselves, they'll stand up and do something better.

Is it too late for your teen?

That's probably one of the most misleading myths that exist about humanity; that you can't teach an old dog new tricks. If you've been reading my column for any length of time, you will know what my answer is. No. it's never too late, it's not even too late for you. You can support the teenager in your life to become more of an independent thinker, even when they seem to have their mind (and entire lives) figured out. To start, follow the same suggestions above during your interactions with them and keep an open mind yourself, and you'll already begin the process (and maybe even the reversal of a follower).


