stagecoach stop in the early days of Tuscumbia's history.

The grounds will come alive with music, food, crafts, and living history demonstrations. All of these events are in celebration of the founding of the city. Live music will be featured by the Cane Creek Cliff Dwellers. The fivepiece group plays an assortment of bluegrass, old-time music, folk, country, and popular rock tunes with a twist.

Although the exact date is unknown, accounts place the arrival of the first settlers of European ancestry at Big Spring (Spring Park) in the year 1815. By 1817, there were already houses and business being constructed at the place, making Tuscumbia the oldest of the four largest cities of the Shoals.

Michael Dickson is considered the first settler of Tuscumbia. He was greeted and made welcome upon his arrival by Chickasaw Chief Tuscumbia. It was fitting that when the



final name for the town was chosen by popular vote, the chief's name was selected. Dickson is said to have operated a hostelry in a series of log cabins on Spring Hill, of which this cabin may be the only remaining. Reports that it served as a stagecoach stop seem to support this theory. It was donated in 1983 by Charlie Carmichael to the Colbert County Historic Landmarks Foundation.

The Foundation, keeper of the log cabin located at 300 N. Dickson St., hopes that in hosting the Founders' Day event, it will provide an opportunity for citizens to visit the small museum, which is furnished to reflect the lives of these pioneers.

Step inside the cabin to experience the past. Spinners and weavers will be demonstrating their craftsmanship. In addition, there will be homemade chicken stew and a bake sale. raising funds to provide preservation of the log cabin and other historic sites in the county. The popular food truck Smashed will also be on site. The free event runs from 10am-3pm making it an ideal spot for a delicious lunch, a history lesson, and fun.

Too often, such organizations are colored by religious politics -- shaped by rivalries and dogmatic axes to grind which may have little or nothing to do with what GOD's Word actually says. And, in this way, they are in the bleachers -- leading partisan cheers, caught up in the games of power and greed and pride, foreign to humility and submission to GOD's authority, GOD's will.

Behind the bleachers -- away from the rancor and clamor of worldly ambitions -- one can hear GOD more clearly. The message found there is less likely to be laced with worldly aims, more likely to set forth the unadorned will of GOD, explained by someone not so caught up in these distractions.

Certainly, you will also find there, behind the bleachers, those who are misguided and caught up in their own imaginations about what is revealed in GOD's will. How do you tell the difference between such teachings and those that are sound, anchored in Scripture? One way is by observing whether what is said is backed up by solid references to Scripture, so you can check it for yourself in GOD's Word. Another way is to know something about the person saying it: is that person wearing an aluminum helmet? Does the person's life reflect a reverence for GOD's will?

GOD's Word was written to be understood by you and me, not just the specially appointed, specially ordained religious authorities. (II Corinthians 1:13) And, contrary to popular opinion, people who share a desire to do GOD's will can share a common understanding of what GOD says. (John 7:17)


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

Visiting Policy at Children's

BIRMINGHAM-Children's of Alabama has implemented its seasonal visitation policy for its in-patient units as of October 1. This change will protect patients, staff, visitors, and the community from the potential spread of illness during respiratory season.

Visitors must now be at least 13 years of age and symptom-free.

Visitors should not come to the hospital if they are experiencing any of the following:

- Fever in the last 24 hours
- Runny nose
- Cough
- Sore throat
- · Exposure to anyone with flu-like symptoms
- Masks are recommended but not required. However, masks may be necessary in some patient care areas.

With a few exceptions, Children's allows visitation daily from 9am-9pm. All visitors must register and wear hospital-issued identification before visiting any area.

The Well Woman Project provides cancer screening to low-income, uninsured women of the Shoals throughout the year with medical exams, mammograms and education programs that promote healthy lifestyle choices. A mammogram can detect possible breast cancer much sooner than an at-home breast exam. making better the chances for a positive outcome.

Breast cancer is the second most fatal of cancers in women after skin cancer.


volunteers in our community," she said.

The top campaigns from the 2023-24 season were recognized including Constellium which raised the most money through a Workplace Campaign, the Times Daily for the greatest increase Workplace Campaign donations (percentage), Marriott-Shoals Conference Center for the largest amount of inkind contributions, and Kiley Floren as United Way board member of the year, along with several others.

The Clyde W. Anderson Award for Philanthropic Leadership goes to and individual nominated by community members for outstanding volunteerism and impact to the organization. Established in 2018, it is named for Clyde W. Anderson, the founder of the local United Way program in 1955. This year's award went to Kaytrina Simmons, Chairwoman of the Florence City Council, who has been a tireless supporter of United Way and many of its member agencies.

The goal for the 2024-2025 campaign is \$1.3 million. McNulty said the 2024-2025 campaign includes a new focus of "improving the impact that United Way is making in the community."

New marketing materials for the year were unveiled including new brochures, a new annual report video, and new t-shirts. "Our theme for the new video is 'a day with a dollar,' and it highlights our partner agencies and shows where donor dollars go."



McNulty said that involvement has been growing modestly since COVID, and the 2024-25 season holds promise as a solid comeback year with the United Way's focus area expanding to include Franklin and Marion counties in addition to the current Lauderdale and Colbert county coverage.

"We are looking forward to an increase in giving and creating new partnerships with companies doing workplace campaigns with us," she said.

Sixteen non profits with 23 programs were funded with a total of \$377,000 through United Way of Northwest Alabama during the '23-'24, year and an additional \$340,000 funded internal United Way initiatives like 2-1-1 and the Dolly Parton Imagination Library.

The 2-1-1 program functions as a call center for those in need of assistance with things like rent, food, recovering from tragedies, even sudden health or personal issues. dialing 2-1-1, individuals are connected with a representative who can lead them in the right The direction. line fielded over 9,000 individual calls during the 2023-24 season.

In addition, 2,445 children received a monthly book through the Imagination Library, 1,814 people utilized the Ride United

transportation program, and 290 families received support through COVID Wraparound services.

McNulty hopes to continue strengthening and building relationships with local organizations, businesses and community leaders.

United Way hopes to reach that goal through fundraisers, individual donors/sponsorships, and growth in workplace campaigns that can easily be organized with interested employees for as little as \$2 per pay period.

Those contributions are often negligeable on most paychecks, but they add up quickly for those organizations that depend on United Way to

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

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

The Medical Arts Building


The Sannoner Historic District, which includes structures on upper North Court and upper North Pine Streets, is the very first Historic District in the City. (Today, there are ten such Districts.) Each structure within this initial District has a fascinating history,

of course, with the Medical Arts building as an outstanding example. (See the accompanying photograph.) The nomination papers were prepared in 1976 by the



excellent local historian, the late Alfred McCroskey. Constructed in 1925 in the style of Spanish Revival architecture - complete with a stucco and brick façade and a tile roof – this interesting building naturally draws the immediate attention of many passersby. A very notable characteristic of this fine building is that it is the first commercial building in downtown Florence with a steel infrastructure, which set the bar higher for any commercial building that might follow. Its original purpose, as its name (Medical Arts building) implies, was to provide spacious, comfortable offices for professionals in the medical field; today, however, the offices accommodate a wide range of businesses and organizations. It was designed by Lloyd Maffett, a local resident whose training was actually as an engineer, not as an architect. Most well-known, probably, of his other architectural projects is the handsome Buffler family home in St. Florian which, today, serves as the town's gracious community center. Mr. Maffett also served as the connecting link between the Florence City Board of Education and the contractor who built the second Coffee High School in 1951.



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Civil cases and criminal cases are very different. Any criminal case that causes a personal injury creates a civil case against the person who caused the injury.

All crimes that injure another person can also be civil cases. However, in a criminal case, the state is the plaintiff, and they bring the action. In a civil case, the person who is injured brings the case. In


a criminal case, the state is seeking criminal penalties, which can include the loss of liberty, while in a civil case, the injured party is seeking compensation for their injury, which can include pain, suffering, mental anguish, lost wages, and permanent disabilities. These are money damages in our system of justice.


You might ask how criminal cases impact civil lawsuits. Criminal cases will have priority and typically be heard first. Civil cases are generally subject to a stay because if there is a criminal case pending, the defendant has the right not to talk about the case. We've all heard the Miranda warnings, where police officers tell an accused person they have the right to remain silent. That right to remain silent remains in place if a civil suit is brought. The civil action and the injured plaintiff must wait until the criminal case ends.

Remember that in a criminal case, the burden of proof is beyond reasonable doubt, while in a civil case, it's simply more likely than not or by a greater weight of the evidence. Someone who is found guilty in a criminal case doesn't have much of a defense in a civil case. We see this frequently with people who are injured by drunk drivers. It can happen during a shoplifting incident or virtually any other crime that results in a person being injured.

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Medicare Minute

"Medicare Pre-AEP"

Each year anyone who is on Medicare and enrolled in a Medicare Advantage Plan (MA) or Prescription Drug Plan (PDP) has an open enrollment period to make changes in their plan if they wish. This open enrollment period is called the Annual Election Period (AEP). It extends from October 15th to December 7th. There is also a period from October 1st to October 14th that is commonly called Pre-AEP.

Pre-AEP is an important time for Medicare beneficiaries. Insurance companies who offer MAs or PDPs cannot release their plan information for 2025 until October 1st. You can use this time to review your current plan to see if there has been any significant changes in your premium or copays. It's also a good time to review the prescription drug coverage of your plan, especially if you have had changes in the drugs you are taking. If any new plans are coming into your county, this is the time they are announced so be on the lookout for those.

Pre-AEP can also be a confusing time. Although it's designed for you to gather information on any changes that are coming for 2025, you may get phone calls or letters from insurance companies or your local agent. Local agents, in particular, like to use Pre-AEP to reach out to their clients and do policy reviews for the next year. This is totally acceptable under Medicare rules. It is also acceptable for you to attend a meeting or seminar during Pre-AEP to hear the details of 2025 plans. The one thing you cannot do is officially sign up for a new plan until after October 15th.

The good news is if you're happy with the plan you are in you won't have to do a thing. You will automatically roll into the 2025 plan as long as it's still offered in your area. If you have any questions about Pre-AEP you can contact our office for

• On Oct. 4, 1988, televangelist Jim Bakker was indicted on federal charges of mail and wire fraud and conspiring to defraud the public. The case against him and three aides exploded into scandal after it was revealed he'd had a sexual tryst with former church secretary Jessica Hahn in a Florida hotel. • On Oct. 5, 1974, Dave Kunst finished the first round-the-world journey on foot, which took him four years and 21 pairs of shoes. His reason for embarking upon the 14,500-mile journey across four continents: "I was tired of Waseca [his home town], tired of my job, tired of a lot of little people who don't want to think, and tired of my



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Health Insurance Options for Early Retirees

Dear Savvy Senior

I'm going to retire in a few months and need to get some temporary health insurance until I can enroll in Medicare at age 65. What are my options?

Early Retiree

Dear Early,

There are several places early retirees can find health insurance coverage before Medicare kicks in, but the best option for you will depend on your income level, your health care needs and how long you'll need coverage for. Here's where to look.

Affordable Care Act: For most early retirees who aren't yet eligible for Medicare, the Affordable Care Act (ACA) health insurance marketplace, also know as Obamacare, is the best option for getting comprehensive health coverage. And you won't be denied coverage or charged extra for preexisting health conditions.

And, if your income falls below the 400 percent poverty level after you retire – anything below \$60,240 for a single or \$81,760 for a couple in 2024 – you'll also be eligible for a subsidy that will reduce your monthly premiums. The ACA also ensures that at least through 2025, households with incomes above that 400 percent poverty level will not have to pay more than 8.5 percent of their income for a benchmark policy.

To see how much subsidy you may be eligible for, use Kaiser Family Foundation subsidy calculator at *KFF.org/interactive/subsidy-calculator*.

To shop for ACA plans in your state, visit *HealthCare.gov* or call 800-318-2596. Or, if you want some extra help, contact a certified agent or broker at *HealthCare.gov/find-assistance*.

COBRA: Another temporary health insurance option you may be eligible for is the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA). Under this federal law, if you work for a company that has 20 or more employees, you can remain on your employer's group health plan for at least 18 months – but could last up to 36 months. But be aware that COBRA isn't cheap. You'll pay the full monthly premium yourself, plus a 2 percent administrative fee.

To learn more, talk to your employer benefits administrator or contact the Employee Benefits Security Administration (*Askebsa.dol. gov*; 866-444-3272).

If, however, the company you work for has fewer than 20 employees, you may still be able to get continued coverage through your company if your state has "mini-COBRA." Contact your state insurance department to see if this is available where you live.

Short-Term Health Insurance: If you can't find an affordable ACA plan and COBRA is too expensive, another possible option is short-term health insurance. These plans, which are not available in every state, are cheaper, bare-bones health plans that provide coverage for up to 3 months with a one-month extension available. But be aware that short-term plans don't comply with the ACA so they can deny sick people coverage, they don't cover preexisting conditions and they can exclude coverage essentials like prescription drugs.

To find and compare short-term health plans, try sites like eHealthInsurance.com or PivotHealth.com.

Healthcare sharing ministries: If the previously listed options don't work for you, another temporary solution could be healthcare sharing ministries (HCSM). These are cost-sharing health plans in which members – who typically share a religious belief – make monthly payments to cover expenses of other members, including themselves.

HCSM's are cheaper than paying full out-of-pocket costs for traditional health insurance but be aware that HCSM's are not health insurance. They don't have to comply with the consumer protections of the ACA, and they can also reject or limit coverage for having pre-existing health issues and limit how much you'll be reimbursed for your medical costs. Preventive care typically isn't covered either.

To look for these plans, comparison shop at the three largest providers – Samaritan Ministries (*SamaritanMinistries.org*), Medi-Share (*MyChristianCare.org*), and Christian Healthcare Ministries (*Chministries.org*).
