East Side Union High School District implements new strategies to face financial challenges

Santa Clara County Office of Education initiates Fiscal Expert position

Special to the Times letter dated April 12, 2024 from the Santa Clara County Office of Education Superintendent to the East Side Union High School District stated that ESUHD will be using a County paid Fiscal Expert to help dial in the deficit spending in approved ways.

What has occurred is the ESUHSD is being helped by the Santa Clara County Office of Education and the following Resolution was approved at the September 19, 2024 School Board Meeting which called for proposed cuts for ESUHSD.

It was also discussed at the board meetings that many different departments of the ESUHSD pitched in to lower costs in the upcoming and future years.

County leaders secure purchase of East San Jose hospital

🖚 anta Clara County leaders have approved a \$315 million effort to acquire and integrate Regional Medical Center into California's second largest public hospital system - and restore the lifesaving care a for-profit corporation systematically cut from East San Jose.

While the county is still finalizing the agreement with HCA Healthcare, the Board of Supervisors on Tuesday voted unanimously to appropriate the money in its health department budget - with \$175 million going toward acquiring the hospital.

Officials allocated up to \$30 million to purchase independentlyowned medical office buildings nearby, and another \$10 million for broker fees and inspections. Up to \$20 million will be used to buy and implement electronic health record software. Another \$80 million will fund the first few months of operating Regional Medical Center, as the county incurs costs of services while waiting to get reimbursed by commercial insurance, Medi-Cal and

The county plans to restore the trauma, stroke, and heart attack services HCA cut from Regional in August as soon as the purchase is complete. County leaders hope to achieve that — and transition Regional's workforce to county employment — early next year. Obstetrics, labor and delivery and newborn care services cut in prior years will also be restored, but that timeline has to be determined post-acquisition.

Regional is the county's fourth hospital purchase since 2019 and potentially saves East San Jose from becoming a health care desert. Around 50 residents and patient advocates urged officials See HOSPITAL, page 6

San Jose officials question who controls Vietnamese garden

San Jose officials are reckoning with a political fight over a park important to the city's older Vietnamese community.

The issue reached a handful of councilmembers at Wednesday's Rules and Open Government Committee, which voted unanimously with brief discussion for a clear explanation as to how the parks department manages access to the Vietnamese Heritage Garden for public events. This comes after District 7 Councilmember Bien

a monthly flag-raising ceremony at the garden. City parks employees then changed the garden's locks — keeping it closed to the public except during special events and causing yet another rift in the long-divided community.

Doan held a news conference ahead of the meeting, where he accused his political rival Ha

Trieu's group of using a private key to the garden to "manipulate, influence and strike political favor" in the community. Doan further alleged Trieu's group harassed and intimidated other organizations like the Vietnamese American Roundtable and Immigrant Resettlement and Cultural Center. Neither of those groups responded to requests for comment.

Trieu, chairman of the United Vietnamese American Community of Northern California, denied those allegations. "I never talked to the Immigrant Resettlement and Cultural Center or

Vietnamese American Roundtable about the flag raising, all statements are false," Trieu told San José Spotlight. "I categorically deny the false statements and I will engage an attorney to respond appropriately to any false statements."

Since 2021, Trieu has held his own key to the garden after becoming a "park adopter," which he has argued allows him certain privileges like hosting events without reservations.

Doan is reserving the garden on the first Saturday of every month, the same day Trieu's group holds its own event. Doan says this gives other community groups an opportunity to run the show and that his office has already received 11 applications. He said Trieu's group would still be allowed to apply. Doan didn't specify on how the city parks department would judge each application and decide who gets access to the garden.

"The parks department is overseeing the whole process at this point," Doan said. More than a dozen residents spoke during public comment, but City Hall was left fumbling when most speakers made their comments in Vietnamese. The city didn't have a human interpreter on hand, instead relying on the artificial intelligence software Wordly which failed to translate properly.

The issue prompted an apology from Councilmember Pam Foley to the audience, implor-

ing the speakers to comment in English if they could. Doan presented an employee of his own office to pause each speaker every few sentences so she could translate in real time.


Speakers like Mary Nguyen questioned the need for Doan's new rules, saying the flag-raising ceremonies have gone for years without a hitch under Trieu's group. "Does the Vietnamese Heritage Garden belong to the city or council District 7?" Nguyen asked.


Other speakers sided with Doan, lauding him for opening the event-hosting opportunity to different organizations, and dismissed the need for a council discussion at all. District 5 Councilmember Peter Ortiz, who also represents a portion of the city's Vietnamese American community and has raised concerns over Doan's rules, requested the committee take up the issue. He said his office has had difficulty answering questions from constituents over "who is in charge." He's waiting to see if the parks department will offer those specifics on how it will evaluate the different groups that applied to run the flag raising ceremony.

"I am hoping it will," Ortiz told San José Spotlight. State lawmakers raised similar concerns last week over Doan's announcement, which came after Doan found himself at odds with Trieu during an unrelated June restraining order trial that roused drama in the Vietnam War refugee generation over who in the community is viewed as sympathetic to the Vietnamese government.

The garden dispute opens a bitter new chapter of political divide in Little Saigon's older social circles. Since June, the divide has sparked a tense courtroom battle between Doan and a powerful businessman. Meanwhile, a staffer in Mayor Matt Mahan's office who testified in that trial is suing several members of the community for defaming her as a communist over a charity she helps run that does work in Vietnam.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the East Side Union High School District is committed to ensuring that the District is competitive in attracting and retaining highly qualified teachers and classified staff and to ensuring equity and access to educational opportunity for all students;

WHEREAS, such budgets and projections are based on currently available information regarding the state budget, are continually updated at statutorily required reporting periods, and are subject to change as the state budget is developed and passed each year;

District website summarizes Parcel Tax Measure "N" "WHAT IS MEASURE N?

Measure N is a parcel tax on the November 5, 2024 Presidential Election ballot. Levied on a flat perparcel basis, parcel taxes are used to fund educational programs and services, and support teachers and staff. If approved by at least two-thirds of the votes cast, it will raise approximately \$6.4 million annually for five years.

HOW MUCH WILL MEASURE N COST?

Measure N 's annual parcel tax is \$49 per parcel for five years. Funds come from a fixed tax on all parcels—residential, commercial, agricultural and industrial—located within the District.

IS THERE AN EXEMPTION FOR SENIOR CITIZENS?

Yes, seniors can apply for an exemption for their residences.

WHAT TAXPAYER PROTECTIONS ARE IN PLACE?

Measure N ensures that there will be full public disclosure of all spending. An independent Citizens' Oversight Committee must review and report on all Measure N expenditures, and a third-party auditor will audit all expenditures. Measure N includes a specific list of programs on which funds may be spent. Funds can only be spent on East Side Union High School District's projects and cannot be taken by the state and spent elsewhere."

at the meeting to prioritize community input while moving swiftly to restore services

Laisha Martinez-Reyes, an organizer for Latinas Contra Cancer, said county residents are already feeling the shockwave of Regional's cuts that occurred last month.

"Other hospitals are now becoming more impacted and patients across the county have to commute farther for quality care. This is a time sensitive issue that is impacting patients' lives daily," Martinez-Reyes said at the meeting.

Supervisors balanced their excitement over the purchase with what's sure to be a bumpy road ahead: Integrating the hospital into the county's system.

"Today does feel like a pre-honeymoon moment," President Susan Ellenberg said at the meeting. "It will be tough. There will be challenging moments that won't have as many smiles as today."

The county hospital system is a massive weight on the taxpayer general fund — the county's main source of money for public services and social safety net programs. This year, county leaders had to close a \$250 million deficit in their \$12.4 billion budget. The public hospital system accounts for half of this year's budget with \$6 billion in spending and more than \$1.26 billion coming out of the general fund.

Supervisor Joe Simitian, who is terming out this year alongside Supervisor Cindy Chavez, warned his colleagues of the coming trials, such as balancing hospital jobs and salaries with limited money.

"When people are giving you hell from the microphone — and they will — it is important to always listen and reflect on what people are saying. But it's going to be essential for the survival of the system to find ways to reduce that subsidy," Simitian said. "That's going to be the less joyful part of the action we take today."

County supervisors requested a work plan for engaging residents on the transition by January or February.

"I do think the trepidation of what's happening in the community is something we can quell if everyone understands when they get to weigh in," Supervisor Cindy Chavez said at the meeting. "One of the questions is going to be: Which services come back first and why?"

Speakers also questioned the fate of Regional's employees in the transition process.

When Santa Clara County bought three financially-struggling medical facilities in 2109, county officials promised nearly 1,700 workers at O'Connor Hospital in San Jose, Saint Louise Regional Hospital in Gilroy and DePaul Medical Center in Morgan Hill they could keep their jobs. But workers said the county reneged on that pledge once it took over. Workers described the early months under the county as "chaos," with hundreds forced to reapply for jobs they'd had for decades and take written tests with little to do with their work.

"We hope we can learn from the past," Jamie Thompson, a labor organizer whose union Engineers and Scientists of California Local 20 represents health care workers at Regional, said at the meeting.

County Executive James Williams said a merit system will facilitate the process of onboarding employees.

"It will greatly ease and reduce what was definitely the biggest source of friction in the 2019 acquisition," he said.



Transfer Learning

Transfer learning

In traditional machine learning, the goal is to train a model to perform a certain task like classification or regression.

With transfer learning you take a pretrained model and use it (adapt it) to a new task. Because pre-training the model is quite expensive, the idea of transfer learning is the following: can we re-use some of the knowledge learned during the pre-training process and apply it to a new task that benefits from that knowledge?

Transfer learning is not a new idea, it just became more common with modern neural networks that are large and costly to pre-train. Let us understand with an example:

Imagine you have a model (a smart system) that has already been trained to understand and process language by reading lots of text, such as books, articles, and websites. This initial training is like teaching

the model everything it can about language – grammar, vocabulary, and common ways words are used together. This process is called pre-training, and it takes a lot of time and resources, like how a person might study for years to become an expert in a subject.

Now, instead of starting from scratch every time you want the model to do something specific (like answering questions or summarizing documents), you can take this pre-trained model and adapt it for a new task. This approach is called transfer learning.

With transfer learning, we take the model that's already learned general language skills and fine-tune or adjust it for a new task. Think of it like hiring an experienced writer to write for your blog. The writer already knows how to write well, so you only need to teach them the specific topic or style you want for your blog.

Transfer learning helps save time and resources because you're building on top of existing knowledge. This concept isn't new, but with today's large and complex models (like LLMs [Large Language Models]), it has become more popular because these models take a lot of time and computing power to train from scratch.

When he wasn't in the orchards, he could be found playing softball, trap and skeet shooting, working on cars, or enjoying the thrill of water and snow skiing. He had a deep passion for the outdoors, whether it was hunting with friends or following his favorite sports teams—the San Francisco Giants, 49ers, and Golden State Warriors. His sense of adventure extended to traveling the world, often with an invention idea swirling in his mind, and he

was known to be surrounded by famous entertainers throughout his life.

Vincent attended Pala Elementary and graduated from Bellarmine College Preparatory 1952 then went on to San Jose State. In 1954, he met the love of his life, Colleen.

The two were married on September 28,

1957, in a beautiful ceremony at the Cathedral in Reno, NV—after waiting for the prune season to finish, of course. In May of 1960, they were blessed with their daughter Teresa, who became the light of his life. Throughout the years, Vincent and Colleen opened their home to many world exchange students, who grew to become part of their extended family.

Vincent was known for his unwavering generosity.

Whether it was donating to the church or supporting various charities, he never hesitated to lend a hand when it was needed "I always tried to help people". Above all else, his family was his greatest pride and joy. He was thrilled to witness his three grandchildren, Makaela, Joe, and Gino, grow into remarkable adults, and cherished the moments he spent with his great-grandchildren, Vincenzo, Kaelahni, and Julian.

Vincent Cortese Jr.'s legacy of love, hard work, and generosity will be carried on by his family for generations to come. He was truly one of the greatest men to walk this earth, and his presence will be profoundly missed by all who knew him.



San Jose planning commission gives green light to new **Kaiser hospital**

an Jose's planning commission has approved Kaiser Permanente to redevelop its medical campus and build a state-ofthe-art hospital which will begin construction in 2025.

Kaiser's plans include a 110-foottall, 685,000-square-foot hospital, energy center, and five-story parking lot at 250 Hospital Parkway. The new facility, which would be one of the first all-electric hospitals in the state, is 435,000 square feet larger than the current building and increases bed capacity from 247 to 303.

Kaiser is making the decision to



redevelop the campus rather than spend money on the existing hospital to meet 2030 seismic standards.

"I think it's an exciting project," said District 8 Commissioner Dilpreet Bhandal. "Kaiser is reinvesting dollars into the current facility and there's a net increase in beds and everybody gets their own room in the new structure."

Senior land use manager Tina Wehrmeister said that Kaiser will keep the current hospital up and running until construction is completed and will eventually demolish the building.




