New Maine MILL art installation memorializes shootings

LEWISTON, ME A new art installation at Maine MILL commemorates the one-year remembrance of the mass shootings in Lewiston. Maine MILL commissioned locals, photographer Tanja Hollander and multimedia Deaf artist Miia Zellner, to create an installation that uses all 261 plastic flower sleeves saved from Justin-Time Recreation and Schemengee's Bar and Grille.

Flowers are left as signs of mourning around the world, but this is the first installation that uses the plastic flower sleeves. Through this medium, the work will explore loss, the role of impermanent expressions, and the impetus behind shared community recovery from the effects of mass violence. The installation will be on view beginning October 16 in

the recently-created memorial room within the museum.

The mass shooting that took place on October 25, 2023 killed 18 people, including 4 members of the Deaf communitythe 10th largest shooting in United States' history. Lewiston-Auburn is now among many communities around the country that have been devastated by mass shooting events. Since October 25, 2023, Maine MILL has been leading the cultural response to the shootings, documenting, archiving and preserving all of the memorial items left around the cities. The museum has committed to having a permanent memorial space to display objects and changing exhibits related to the events.

About the Artists



an artist who works with photography, video, installation and social practice Tanja Hollander is to understand how cultural and visual relationships help us make sense of our challenging world. She was born in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1972 and received a B.A. in Photography, Film, and Feminist Studies from Hampshire College in 1994. Her last body of work, Are you really my friend? debuted in its entirety as an exhibition, short documentary and book for a year at MASS MoCA in 2017. Sections were recently exhibited at the Museum of Fine Arts (Boston), Portland Museum of Art (Maine), Virei Viral (Rio de Janeiro, Brazil), and the Carl-Schurz-Haus (Freiberg, Germany). She lives and works in Auburn, Maine.

Miia Zellner is a Deaf multimedia artist who lives in Lewiston, Maine. Zellner graduated from MassArt with a BFA in glass in 2022 with a Master of Art in Teaching (MAT) from Maine College of Art & Design Art in 2023. Their work explores themes of the Deaf experience and the relationship between humans and their environment. In addition to their practice, Miia teaches elementary art in Turner, Maine, and inspires students to discover their own artistic voice.

The exhibit is made possible by the Maine Community Foundation, the Elmina B. Sewall Foundation, the Maine Humanities Council, and the Maine Arts Commission.

The exhibit runs from October 16, 2024 to September 6, 2025.




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Newsmakers, Names & Faces 10th generation dairy awarded grant

TURNER, ME
-- Maine Farmland Trust
(MFT) has awarded a
\$65,000 Implementation
Grant to Brigeen Farms in
Turner, a 10th generation
family owned and operated dairy farm. Brigeen
Farms will use the funds
to implement elements of
a business plan to upgrade
the farm's infrastructure
and technology and reduce
operational costs to reach
efficiencies of scale.

As farmers Betsy and Bill Bullard put it: "The goal for the future is simple: to continue to evolve and position the farm in such a way that it continues to offer the same opportunities for future generations."

To become eligible to apply for the grant, Brigeen Farms completed Farming for the Long Haul, MFT's competitive two-year business planning program for experienced farmers designed to grow the long-term success and financial resilience of their businesses.

Over the course of the program, they received technical assistance to analyze their value-added enterprise, and developed a multi-year business plan to increase their milk production and finance infrastructure improvements to address labor, time, and cost bottlenecks.

"Maine dairy farms are essential to our agricultural sector, stewarding



vast acreages of farmland while contributing to rural jobs and economic opportunities throughout the supply chain. As one of Maine's longest-running family dairies, Brigeen Farms is a cornerstone in the community and a significant producer of Maine milk. Maine Farmland Trust is excited to support Brigeen Farms as they make these forward-looking investments to evolve and grow their business for years into the future," said Tricia Rouleau, Farm Network Director at Maine Farmland Trust.

Over the past 25 years, Brigeen Farms has grown from 65 milking cows to a herd of 580 registered Holstein cows, plus more than 800 crop acres for feed production. While wholesale milk is the farm's primary operation, selling 16.1 million pounds of milk in 2023 through the Dairy Farmers of America Cooperative, the farm has diversified to include Canty Cow Creamery, pro-

ducing and selling premium frozen custard, and a small compost business.

Under Brigeen Farms' multi-year business plan developed with support from MFT's Farming for the Long Haul program, their aim is to increase profitability and efficiencies of scale by growing their herd to 700 milking cows. By producing a higher volume of milk and investing in more efficient infrastructure, the farm hopes to increase its income and reduce its operational costs over the long term.

Through the Farming for the Long Haul program, Brigeen Farms also worked with a dairy expert on a financial analysis of a robotic, or voluntary, milking system to explore what such a transition might require. As labor costs continue to increase and the number of available and

interested farmworkers in the area declines, a priority in the business plan is to attract and retain employees with more opportunities to specialize and leverage newer technologies. The financial analysis identified that the gradual introduction of a robotic milking system could help to address labor challenges, but would require upgrades to on-farm milk storage and handling, the power supply, as well as changes to the way the animals are housed, feed is stored, and deliveries are made.

"The opportunity to learn from other successful Maine farm enterprise owners in workshop settings, as well as access targeted Technical Assistance funds for detailed business analyses has been extremely valuable as we chart the next steps for further modernization and improvement at Brigeen Farms. Im-

plementation Grant funds are enabling project work in 2024 to continue making strides on improved viability and profitability for our 10th generation family farm," said Betsy Bullard.

With the Implementation Grant funding, Brigeen Farms plans to construct a new operational hub facility with increased milk storage that will help set the foundation for a smooth transition of the business for generations to come at the farm. The new milkhouse will allow for greater bulk tank storage capacity, including a mechanical and water system set up, electrical upgrades, greater trucking accessibility, and easier employee workflow.

These efficiencies will reduce costs and risk, while setting the stage for the potential future introduction of a robotic milking system to achieve even greater efficiency. And as farmer-owners Betsy and Bill Bullard plan for their eventual retirement with-

in the next 25 years, they hope these improvements will position the farm business for a successful transfer to the next generation.

This is the eighth year that MFT has awarded Implementation Grants farmers, totaling \$1,385,359 in funds to support projects to help farm businesses increase their profitability and resilience to risk. After completing Farming for the Long Haul, participants have the opportunity to apply for the Implementation Grant and bring their business plan before a review committee of MFT staff and industry experts. Awardees must source \$65,000 in addition to the \$65,000 matching grant received from MFT, resulting in a total of at least \$130,000 toward the implementation of their plan.

These Implementation Grants, and the hundreds of hours of workshops, technical assistance, and individual support delivered to farmers annually through MFT's Farm Business Planning Programs, are made possible through the generosity of The Bingham Trust, Kennebec Savings, Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research & Education (SARE), Ram Island Conservation Fund, and the many supporters who recognize the value that local farms bring to our communities and econ-

Dairy workforce impact fund to boost jobs, skills in Northeast

MAINE – The Northeast Dairy Business Innovation Center (NE-DBIC) is excited to announce the launch of the Dairy Workforce Impact try. With \$1.215 million in funding, the initiative aims signed to address critical workforce challenges in the region's dairy indus-

try. With \$1.215 million in funding, the initiative aims to strengthen the workforce pipeline, improve career advancement opportunities, increase worker retention, and reduce barriers to participation in the dairy sector across 11 Northeast states.

NE-DBIC will pilot the Fund for two years, beginning this fall. Designed to spark, grow, share, and invest in workforce solutions, the Fund will provide grants and resources to support both farm and processing businesses across the Northeast. This

initiative addresses critical challenges, including a shortage of entry-level workers and limited career pathways in the dairy sector.

The Dairy Workforce Impact Fund focuses on four Key Priorities:

Strengthening the

Pipeline: Expanding the number of new workers entering the dairy industry

Building Skills and Career Opportunities: Elevating training programs that increase career advancement

Increasing Worker Retention: Fostering workplace cultures that improve employee satisfaction

Reducing Barriers: Removing obstacles for employees and new industry entrants, especially through training and development

This investment will be dispersed in one round of directed funds and two rounds of competitive grants. Directed funds will go to programs focused on strengthening Registered Apprenticeship programming, increasing access to supervisor skill-building opportunities, and growing the pipeline of new workers across the Northeast region. These programs are:

Speaker coming to Genealogical Society's fall meeting

Dr. Hall's presentation will begin at approximately 11:00 am after a brief business meeting and light refreshments.

Dr. Hall focuses his

research on the history of Wabanaki in Maine, particularly the ways that they have maintained relationships with their colonized homelands. He notes that Wabanakis is the collective term for the Penob-Passamaquodies, Mi'kmags, and Maliseets not only of Maine, but also New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and eastern Quebec.

Dr. Hall's presentation is titled:

Does Descent Mean Belonging? Incomplete Thoughts on the Relationship between Genealogical Heritage and Contemporary Wabanaki Communi-

Many people Maine have ancestors who were Wabanaki. Some have used these genealogical connections to claim that they belong to Wabanaki communities.

While there are connections between French Canadian and Wabanaki family histories, these connections can have many potential meanings, and many of these meanings are deeply contested. What is the relationship between membership in a Wabanaki nation and having Wabanaki ancestors? Dr. Hall's talk will not resolve this question, but he will do his best to explain why the answers are so complicated.

There will be time for a question-and-answer session at the end of Dr. Hall's presentation.

MFGS is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization whose purpose is to promote the study of Franco-American genealogy and genealogical research in the state of Maine.

Chowderheads Challenge the Petawawa River

The Petawawa River is one of the most renowned canoe tripping rivers in Canada. Most of the river is located in Algonquin Provincial Park in north central Ontario, the oldest provincial park in Canada. Famous for its exciting whitewater and spectacular beauty, the remote waterway has a rich logging history. The Petawawa derives its unusual name from Algonquian for "where one hears a noise like this," probably

While vaguely familiar with the Petawawa, I never expected to paddle it. Then last December, I received an unexpected Christmas email from longtime friend Bill Blauvelt. He and his wife, Sally, were organizing a Petawawa River trip for this

referring to the many rapids.

Thompson Rapid on the Pet-September and I was invited. I readily accepted the

welcome invitation.

The logistics for a Petawawa trip are daunting. Camping reservations are required in the various zones on the river but not for specific sites which are filled on a first-come first-serve basis. And, shuttle arrangements must be made for the isolated access points. The upper levels of the Petawawa are generally too low to run late summer so our plan was to begin at Lake Travers, a five-day trip. Bill did an amazing job of organizing the entire adventure.

The drive from central Maine to the Petawawa is about 10 hours (add an additional two hours if you get lost in Montreal which we managed to do). Six of us

met at the bustling village of Petawawa on a cold blustery day. Paddlers consisted of Bill and Sally in a tandem canoe, Pat Hamlin and Eggman DeCoster maneuvering solo canoes, and Ken Gordon and me navigating expedition kayaks. With the exception of Pat, all of us are Chowderheads with the Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society.

Despite stormy weather immediately before the trip, the forecast was exceptional for our five-day excursion calling for hot sunny weather, light winds, and negligible precipitation. Blackflies were a concern. Bill and Sally packed a screen tent for protection from the menaces should they appear.

On the drive to the

put-in, we stopped at Algonquin Outfitters where final shuttle arrangements were made and Pat rented a canoe. Our vehicles would be waiting for us at the takeout. Ominously, blackflies were a nuisance in the parking area. We received great news when signing into the park; no other paddlers were expected on the river – that meant no vying for campsites!

The long drive on quality dirt roads to the launch area on Lake Travers was uneventful. The lake itself was stunningly beautiful. No blackflies were noted when loading our boats. The lake was mirror calm when we embarked traveling north.

After paddling past a large island, the lake narrowed and we began searching for a campsite. Benefiting from the luxury of no competition, we inspected four potential sites before selecting an expansive island site with a magnificent view facing south – and no bugs.

Dense fog and cool temperatures greeted us in the morning. We lingered until the fog lifted and another glorious day ensued.

Soon after we departed, the lake narrowed and the river began. Three miles of flatwater brought us to the first whitewater on our journey, Big and Little Thompson Rapids. Unsure

of what to expect in terms of difficulty, we scouted Big Thompson from a portage trail on the right. Identifying no serious difficulties, we descended down the middle in loaded boats avoiding ledges on the left and sticky holes on the

Rated Grade 2, from river level Little Thompson appeared to be a straight forward plunge down the right side in feisty waves. However, when entering the moderately steep pitch we found it to be more complex than anticipated. Everyone did fine but the canoes took some water over the gunwales. This was a wake-up call as it appeared Grade 2 did not directly correlate with the more familiar Class II rating we use.

Around the bend, we passed a busted blue canoe on the shore. It's likely someone experienced a mishap in one of the Thompson Rapids.

Flatwater and quick water continued for several miles until we found a campsite on river left a short distance above the beginning of Grillade Rapid. We settled in anticipating that several difficult rapids would make the following day the most challenging of the trip.

MEMIC Group announces \$18.7M dividend

— The MEMIC Group Board of Directors has approved an \$18.7 million dividend distribution to as many as 17,000 eligible policyholders who obtain their workers' compensation insurance from the company. This 2024 dividend brings the total capital and dividend distributions for Maine policyholders to \$370 million since 1998.

MEMIC Group President and CEO Michael Bourque announced the dividend at the 2024 Mainebiz CEO Breakfast Forum in Portland.


"This year's dividend, equal to approximately 11 percent of premiums paid to MEMIC in 2021, reflects our policyholders' commitment to workforce safety," Bourque stated. "It underscores our collective efforts to prevent injuries and ensure injured workers receive the best medical care for a safe return to work."

Bourque emphasized MEMIC's mutual insurance model: "As a mutual company, we champion injury prevention and management. It benefits our policyholders, their workers, and makes financial sense. We applaud our policyholder members for earning this dividend."

However, Bourque also warned that significant rate decreases over the last few years, coupled with a spate of serious workplace injuries in recent months



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Groundbreaking to improve water quality in Androscoggin River

BURN, ME -- The cities of Lewiston and Auburn broke ground on a historic infrastructure project that will improve public health and the cleanliness of the Androscoggin River. The infrastructure project will expand the cities' treatment capacity at Lewiston Auburn Clean Water Authority by 20-percent, and

construct a holding tank to catch raw sewer and storm water to prevent pollution in the Androscoggin River during large rain events. In 2023, weather events forced 112 million gallons of untreated water and sewage into the Androscoggin River.

In Maine, thirty-four clean water utilities have old pipe infrastructure



that carry both sewer and storm water through the same network to a treat-

ment facility. When storms increase water volume, the untreated, raw waters automatically bypass overwhelmed facilities and divert into rivers, oceans, watersheds and bays.

A 2023 report by the Maine DEP says 745 million gallons of raw waters polluted Maine waterbodies - a 244-percent increase from 2022. Storm events brought a record 57 inches of rain in 2023. The impact caused water quali-

ty issues at beaches, rivers and bays, and forced the closure of a dozen fishing sites. The first 1-inch of rain carries 80-percent of the pollutants – stopping these overflow events is a project the state of Maine has been working on since

The \$30M project is one of the largest of its kind in the state of Maine.

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Grant to support historic preservation in Maine downtowns

HALLOWELL, ME – The Maine Development Foundation (MDF)'s Maine Downtown Center program is pleased to receive a \$750,000 grant from the Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Grants Program. MDF is one of only 17 recipients in 15 states to receive this funding. Revitalize ME Downtown funds are provided by the Historic Preservation Fund, as administered by the National Park Service, Department of Interior. The Historic Preservation Fund is supported by revenue from offshore oil and gas leases, not tax dollars. The program will offer

grants to historic property owners for preservation, restoration, rehabilitation, or energy efficiency projects in the downtown areas of communities currently served by the Maine Downtown Center program.

Funding in the form of subgrants will be awarded through a competitive program that will be administered by MDF. These grants will provide desperately needed financial capacity to encourage infrastructure development and leverage private sector investment increasing the commercial, educational, residential, or civic use and value of the historic properties. Grant applications and requirements will be made available in January 2024 at www.mdf.org.

"The National Park Service helps rural areas across the country revitalize their communities through historic preservation," said National Park Service Director Chuck Sams. "This locally stewarded work supports improvements to historic buildings, preserving America's cultural resources while benefiting local economies."

These grants mark the sixth year of funding for the program honoring the late Paul Bruhn, who served as executive director of the Preservation Trust of Vermont for nearly 40 years. State and Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, Certified Local Governments, special district governments, and nonprofits are eligible to apply for funding to create a subgrant program to fund multiple preservation projects in their rural jurisdictions.



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Rep. Cloutier applauds MDOL for seeking public feedback

AUGUSTA, ME -In May, the Maine Department of Labor (MDOL) published a first draft of its proposed rules for the state's new paid family and medical leave (PFML) program, which was created in 2023 as part of the supplemental budget enacted by the Legislature and signed by Gov. Janet

received Having public comment on those rules, MDOL has used that

feedback to make edits and and Rep. Kristen Cloutier, produce a second draft. In an effort to make the strongest set of rules possible for this program, MDOL released the updated rules for a second round of public comment that was due on September 30. They also held a public hearing on Tuesday, September 17 at 9:00 a.m. in the Frances Perkins Room at the Maine Department of Labor.

Mattie Sen. Daughtry, D-Brunswick, D-Lewiston, who sponsored the PFML legislation, applauded MDOL for its continued work to roll out this program. The legislators intend to review these new draft rules and provide comment.

"Maine's Paid Family and Medical Leave Program is going to be one of the most significant and transformative policies our state has seen in decades, with all Mainers

having access to a new benefit," said Cloutier and Daughtry. "It is critical that we have strong rules when we launch this program, and we're so grateful for the second opportunity for employees and employers alike to provide feedback. It's pivotal that this program be responsive to the specific needs of Mainers, and we thank MDOL for continuing to engage the public, which is crucial in creating a final result that

is thoughtful, responsible and works for everybody."

In the first round of public comment, Daughtry and Cloutier provided feedback including suggestions around the required notice of leave, premium contributions from employers with approved private equivalent plans, the minimum amount of leave that must be offered in order for a private plan to be considered substantially equivalent, and the provisions clarifying the affinity relationships covered by the program.

Maine's PFML program will offer eligible workers in the private and public sector 12 weeks of paid time off for family or medical reasons, including illness, to care for a loved one or new child. Payroll contributions to the program are scheduled to begin in January 2025, with benefits set to become available in May 2026.

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Discovering fulfilling work—and a second family

When Success moved to Maine seven years ago, thoughts of her aging mother back home in Nigeria weighed heavily on her mind. "I was supposed to be there taking care of her," Success said



That's how Success became interested in working as a Direct Support Professional at a small group home in Auburn. "I felt since I wasn't able to take care of my mother, I should take care of people here," Success said.

Success is one of scores of individuals who has found rewarding work in the field of Direct Support, ensuring Mainers with age-related, physical, behavioral, intellectual, and cognitive health needs have the support they require to stay safe, independent, and empowered to achieve their personal goals.

In Maine, there are many flexible full-time, part-time, or per-diem positions available. This work happens outside of a hospital or nursing home setting, and training opportunities are widely available. Most of these positions don't require advanced degrees.

"I feel fulfilled, and I feel so excited because a lot."

In her role as a Direct Support Professional, Success works with adults who are living with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. She provides whatever support they need with activities of daily living, so they can live as independently as possible. Her work can vary widely from day to day. She administers medication, gets them ready for bed, and does laundry. She also checks on them throughout the night. In the morning, she makes them breakfast and takes them to their programs.

For Success, seeing her clients' joy when she supports them in attaining a new milestone brings her joy, too. "After a good day at work, I feel fulfilled," Success said. "I feel so excited because I know I've achieved a lot."

This work has also given Success a chance to do something positive in her adopted home. "This is an opportunity for you to give back to the community you are coming into," Success said.

Success says in many ways, this job has given her a second family—through the friendships she has forged with her colleagues and the connections she has made with her clients. "When I walk into work, I see the excitement on the faces of those people I'm taking care of," Success said. "These are the families I have here in the U.S."

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
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
