Town of Gorham election, referendum information

GORHAM, ME -- A General Election, Referendum Election, and Municipal Election will take place on Tuesday, November 5, 2024 in which voters will have an opportunity to vote to elect the President, one of Maine's two United States Senators, Maine's two Representatives to Congress, all members of the Maine Legislature (State Senators and State Representatives), certain county officers (which could vary by county), as well as appointments to the Gorham Town Council and Gorham School Committee. The Referendum Election will also allow Maine's citizens the opportunity to vote on People's Veto Referenda, Direct Initiatives of Legislation (i.e. Citizen Initiatives), Bond Issues, other referenda proposed by the Legislature, and Constitutional Amendments.

The Town has two seats open for three-year terms on the Town Council, and two seats open for three-year terms on the School Committee.

Absentee voting will take place in the Council Chambers starting October 21st thru October 31st during regular business hours (Monday - Thursday, 7:00am - 5:00pm)

Extra voting hours will be offered on Saturday, October 26th from 8:00am - noon and Wednesday, October 30th until 7:00pm.



CMMC gathers to commemorate Lewiston tragedy, one year later

LEWISTON, ME Central Maine Medi-

cal Center (CMMC) team members gathered for a somber ceremony on Oct. 25 to mark the one-year anniversary of the mass casualty incident in Lewiston.

The event took place in the main hallway of CMMC where the final patients who were wounded in the mass shootings were escorted out as team members lined the hallway to say goodbye.

Following a moment of silence and invocation by staff chaplain Claire Curole, several members of Central Maine Healthcare's senior leadership team spoke to those who gathered.

"Whether you were at CMMC that night or in the day or days after the lockdown was lifted you made a difference," said Steve Littleson, DBA, president and CEO, Central Maine Healthcare. "And here we stand together, grateful that we are here at this hospital that, for almost 140 years, has cared for our community.'

"In all the chaos, we were nurses," said Kari Paradis, vice president of





Nursing and Patient Services at Bridgton Hospital. "We put our training and skill to the test and into practice. We assumed roles, took charge, staved focused and saved lives."

"What was most touching about the past 12 months was the way we came together," said John Alexander, MD, chief medical officer, Central Maine Healthcare. "And although it's hard, and we will never forget, we now make our way to the future carrying this with us along the way."

On the evening of the shooting, CMMC quickly assembled a large team of surgeons who have expertise in orthopedics, cardiovascular, thoracic, colorec-

tal, urologic, plastic and general surgery.

They were aided by more than 100 nurses, nurse practitioners, physician assistants and other CMH healthcare professionals, all of whom have had extensive training in mass casualty incidents.

A total of 15 severely injured patients were transported to CMMC. Two were deceased upon arrival. One patient died after being admitted. Thirteen lives were saved.

Most admitted pa-



CMMC within the first few weeks following the incident. Three, however, had an extended stay in the ICU because of their extensive injuries and the complicated, multiple surgeries they required.

Maine musicians memorialize Lewiston shooting in song

TURNER, ME -- "Private Person," a song by Maine musicians Jason J. Carey and Scott K Fish, tells the story of the October 2023 Lewiston, ME mass shootings by Robert Card; imagining how history might have changed if just one of several authorities had heeded the warnings and calls to help the troubled Card.

"Card referred to himself as a 'private person.' The night Card went on his rampage, we had already been working several months on a video documentary about mental illness. Particularly about the difficulty of sufferers getting proper help, because of the nature of the illness, and lack of available resources," said Carey.

The Lewiston shooting tragedy was an awful demonstration of the worst aspects of mental illness.

* A man in denial clearly in need of help

PineCone Records, USA

* Family and friends pleading with authorities to help the man

* Authorities ignoring or dismissing the calls for

* And finally, the man reaching a mental breaking

After absorbing news stories laced with quotes from victims' family members, Card's family, law enforcement officials, military personnel, elected officials, and the general public - Fish and Carey responded to the shooting through song.

"Private Person" imagines what conversations might have gone through the shooter's head, as well as conversations about what went wrong, and how we could have done better in Lewiston and Statewide.

Fish said, "Someone with mental illness often doesn't know they're ill. That's part of what makes sufferers tough to help."

"Add to that a shortage of trained mental health professionals, a lack of mental health facilities. We basically ask our neighbors with mental illness to fend for themselves," said Carey.

"Private Person" makes clear that doing nothing is neither a strategy nor an option.

How many times should someone have to ask for help before help is giv-

Carey and Fish hope "Private Person" will help persuade people to consider the wisdom, the humanity, the decency, of providing a helping hand to individuals grappling with mental ill-



Maine Policy releases school board member survey

PORTLAND, ME –

Maine Policy Institute released the Maine School Board Member Survey, its newest publication, which surveyed current Maine school board members on 40 education-related issues to identify board members' top concerns across the state.

The survey found a majority of school board members view the performance of their individual board as "good" or "excellent" and said their board engages in Maine Policy's school board best practices. It also found that self-identified liberal and conservative school board members are increasingly polarized on controversial "culture war" issues in K-12 education.

Top Issues

School board members across Maine are most concerned about mental health, staffing and behavior issues within schools. Eighty-six percent of respondents were concerned about mental health problems among students, 83 percent about teacher shortages, and the same number expressed concern about bullying and harassment. Four-infive board members also identified chronic absenteeism as an ongoing con-

"Over the last few years, the number of students struggling with mental health and behavioral issues has increased. These challenges, among others, are driving teachers to leave the profession, worsening the state's teacher shortage," said Jonah Davids, research fellow at the Maine Policy Institute and creator of the survey. "The fact that school board members across the state, regardless of political views, identify these as their top concerns shows that these problems go beyond political perception and are affecting nearly everyone."

Minor Issues

Among the 40 issues surveyed, members were least concerned about racial/ethnic achievement gaps, controversial curriculum, activism from parents, financial transparency and internet access. Just 39 percent were concerned about LGBTQ+ book bans, 38 percent about sexually explicit books, and 36 percent about critical race theory.

Polariza-Political


Board members who identified as liberal or conservative generally share the same top concerns as all board members but diverge on issues related to activism by students and parents, gender and sexuality, and diversity, equity and inclusion policies.


Only five percent of liberal board members identified critical race theory as a concern compared to 73 percent of conservative members. Similarly, 63 percent of liberal members expressed concern about the lack of diverse representations in curriculum and learning materials while only 18 percent of conservative members identified this as a concern for their district.

"Many people care deeply about these culture war issues and genuinely want to make progress on them. But results like these show that when it comes to these inflammatory topics, liberals and conservatives are almost in different worlds," said Davids.

The survey was created by Davids and distributed electronically to Maine school board

Final Days on the Petawawa River



Bill & Sally Blauvelt navigate Schooner Rapids

For the fourth consecutive day, six of us awoke to glorious weather while on a Petawawa River expedition in Ontario. The weather had been phenomenal. The days had been hot and sunny with light winds and the nights cool but comfortable. A brief rain shower the night before had been the only imperfection. Even more remarkable, blackflies had been nonexistent.

We were camping at Natch Rapids, the last of three demanding sections of whitewater. With the exception of chipmunks and red squirrels, wildlife sightings had been rare on the trip. However, early that morning, a bull moose crossed the river just above our campsite.

Natch Rapids consists of two falls, the first being the most difficult. Four of us had lined our boats around upper Natch the previous day. Two of our companions, Ken Gordon and Eggman DeCoster, had decided to run the steep two-stage descent first thing in the morning. We set up safety with throw bags on both sides of the river in anticipation of their attempts.

The falls begins with a horizon line, so locating the correct entrance is problematic. Paddling a canoe, Eggman missed the preferred route and scraped down a narrow chute between two boulders but stayed upright before plunging effortlessly over the second ledge drop. Ken navigated his expedition kayak down the correct channel angled left to avoid an ugly pour over below. However, he was unable to correct his boat angle and plummeted diagonally over the lower ledge but landed smartly at the

Buoyed by their successful descents, our steadfast band proceeded through a narrow canyon towards lower Natch falls. Bill and Sally Blauvelt had previously scouted the two-stage pitch so we followed them in their tandem canoe. They flawlessly negotiated down the twisting rapid and everyone replicated their route one boat at a time. The river description rates both Natch rapids Grade 3. I consider the upper significantly more challenging than the

Below, a series of well-spaced waves provided the perfect opportunity to play. Eggman was able to execute a superb wavesurf in a loaded canoe while everyone cheered him on. Shortly after, vertical cliffs that exceed 300 feet in elevation marked the end of the canyon. Rare ferns reportedly grow on the cliffs.

Following an extended section of flatwater and a few easy rapids, we arrived at the beginning of Schooner Rapids, a two-mile stretch of almost

continuous whitewater we had enthusiastically anticipated. The very entertaining rapids lived up to our expectations. Midway through, we passed under Hydro Line Bridge, the first sign of civilization since the beginning of our journey.

After Schooner Rapids, we entered scenic mile-long Coveo Lake. At the outlet of the lake, Five Mile Rapids begin. We stopped at cluster of rocks at the top for lunch. From that vantage point, feisty waves at the start appeared very inviting. As expected, navigating through them was very stimulating. Unfortunately, they gradually diminished over the next two miles, not five.

Subsequently, strong currents propelled us along at a rapid pace. We were surprised when several islands were encountered in an area where the river widens. A review of our maps indicated we were ahead of schedule and had unexpectedly arrived at the top Whitson Lake.

After careful inspection, we selected the best of four campsites on the south shore of the lake. The spacious location provided plenty of room for five tents and included a large communal area with a fire ring. This was the best site since our first night. Every campsite we stayed at on the Petawawa included a wooden box toilet, a much appreciated amenity.

The exceptionally good weather continued for our final day. Sunny skies and mirror calm waters facilitated easy crossings of Whitson, Smith, and Mc-Manus Lakes. Short exhilarating rapids separated the lakes.

The takeout at the northeastern end of Mc-Manus Lake where Algonquin Portage Outfitters had delivered our vehicles was easily located. Our vehicles were a welcome sight.

The six of us parted company for our separate road trips home. We had the satisfaction of knowing we had experienced a truly remarkable wilderness river trip with phenomenal weather, an abundance of excitement, great friends and no blackflies.



Maine songwriters release "Leave the Maine Flag Alone"

TURNER, ME -Leave the Maine State Flag alone. It ain't broke. Don't fix it. That is the core message in a new song/music video released Monday, Sept. 30th, by Maine songwriters Jason C. Carey and Scott K Fish. Their target audience, say Carey and Fish, are Maine voters who are asked this Election Day, November 5th, to choose between keeping Maine's current flag, or replacing it with an old design, replaced by the Maine State Flag 115

Carey said the song idea came about during a conversation he and Fish were having about nonessential matters on which Maine government wastes time and taxpayer money, while essential, tougher issues are left undone.

"Car-killer roads, homelessness, underperforming public schools, drug addiction, high electric costs. These are just a few of Maine's essential matters Maine lawmakers ignore," said Carey. "Let's solve those problems. Then if there's time and money left over we can talk about the wisdom of changing the Maine State Flag," he said.



MDIFW offers reminders for local hunters

MAINE -- Hunting continues to be one of Maine's safest outdoor activities. With over 230,000 licensed hunters, our state has averaged less than six hunting related incidents per year over the last ten years. Last year was Maine's safest year on record, with only one hunting-related incident!

Maine Department of Inland Fisheries &

Wildlife reminds readers that hunter orange is an essential component of safety during hunting season for hunters as well as non-hunters who recreate on land open to hunting.

In addition to treating every firearm as if it is loaded, keeping the muzzle pointed in a safe direction at all times, and using safe carrying methods, hunters are taught

from day one to always be certain of their target and beyond. In the Maine woods, orange is obvious!

Hunter orange laws vary by state and season. Below is an outline of Maine's hunter orange clothing requirements. Let's get another safe season in the books!

A decal on an article of clothing that is otherwise solid hunter orange is permissible. Articles of hunter orange clothing must be in good and serviceable condition and visible from all sides.

FAME financing to assist Sawyer Enterprises, LLC

— At their monthly meeting held on September 19, 2024, the board of directors

of the Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) approved \$1 million in financing for Sawyer Enterprises, LLC d/b/a FISBA North America, a Portland-based precision manufacturer of microphotonics.

Microphotonics is a branch of technology that deals with directing light on a microscopic scale and is used in optical networking. Sawyer Enterprises, LLC uses microphotonics in optical designs that are used in medical and life sciences.

FAME approved a \$1 million FAME Direct Loan to the company. The financing will be used to help the company expand its Maine operations and finance a portion of construction costs at its Portland facility. FAME's financing is expected to help to create more than eight Maine jobs in the near future and retain

an additional ten Maine

"We are pleased to provide support for Sawyer Enterprises as it expands its operations here in Maine," stated FAME Board Chair Richard Trafton. "Precision manufacturing is one of Maine's targeted industries as outlined in Maine's Economic Development Strategy. We hope this financing will enable the company to grow and innovate utilizing Maine's STEM workforce."

Sawyer Enterprises, LLC, formed in 2017 and originally operated as Gray Optics, was acquired in 2023 by FISBA North America LLC, a wholly owned subsidiary of FISBA AG. FISBA AG is a Swiss

company that develops and manufactures microphotonics for medical and life sciences industries.

The planned renovations to the Portland plant will allow the parent company to move operations and equipment from Tucson, Arizona to Maine.

"We are grateful for FAME's support, which will enable us to expand our Maine operations and create more good paying jobs," stated Wallace Latimer, President of FISBA North America. "We appreciate Maine's talented workforce and look forward to creating more innovative products that are in demand within the medical and life sciences markets."



King urges review of suicide prevention efforts

D.C. — U.S. Senator Angus King (I-Maine), a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC), has written a letter to Comptroller General Gene Dodaro urging the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) to begin work on a report that reviews suicide prevention matters of the reserve component of the Department of Defense (DOD). The Fiscal Year 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) requires the GAO to conduct a review of suicide prevention and

response policies for re-

serve personnel, and the extent to which the DOD and military services have coordinated these policies at the federal, state and local levels. Senator King's letter comes just weeks ahead of the first anniversary of the Lewiston shooting that was carried out by an Army reservist, who failed to receive adequate mental health care.

Over one-third of U.S. military service members serve in the reserve component, which provides trained units and qualified personnel in times of war or national emergency, or to fill the needs of the Armed Forces

whenever more units and personnel are needed. In 2023, the DOD reported that the suicide rate among reserve component personnel was generally similar to that of the U.S. population. However, reserve component personnel offices often have limited access to military suicide prevention resources.

"It has been nearly a year since Sergeant First Class (SFC) Robert Card II committed the deadliest mass shooting in Maine's history, killing 18 and wounding 13 on October 25, 2023, in Lewiston, Maine. Since the tragedy, multiple press

reports, investigations by the Army, and the Governor of Maine's special commission have revealed troubling matters. I urge you to consider these investigations and to meet with all stakeholders as you conduct your review," wrote Senator King.

"Service members in reserve status are critical to our Armed Forces and represent nearly one-third of the total force. I am concerned that they experience limited access to military-supported suicide prevention resources. Authorities can be confusing and blurred for service members including com-

manders at all echelons. Effective coordination between unit commanders and local authorities is misunderstood, yet it is critical to ensuring public safety and that service members receive the care that is needed," continued Senator King.

Representing one of the states with the highest rates of veterans per capita, Senator King is a staunch advocate for America's servicemembers and veterans. He has been among the Senate's most prominent voices on the need to address veterans suicide, and has repeatedly pressed for action from top De-

cials on this issue. Most recently, at the request of Senator King, the Department of Defense (DoD) released a new report breaking down suicide rates in the Armed Service by job function. Additionally, he recently wrote a letter urging further investments in traumatic brain injury research, the signature wound of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars that has unfortunately led to a high number of veteran suicides. This past August, he introduced legislation to provide safe firearm storage for veterans in an effort to reduce suicides.

\$2M to train next generation of fishermen, women

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King and U.S. Representatives Chellie Pingree and Jared Golden announced that two commercial fishing associations have been awarded a combined \$2,067,434 in grant funding to support training and workforce development for the next generation of Maine fishermen and women. The grants were awarded through the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA)

Young Fishermen's Development Program.

"Maine is known around the world for our proud fishing heritage thanks to the generations of hardworking men and women who have sustained it," said Collins, King, Pingree, and Golden. "These investments in youth workforce development will help ensure that young Mainers entering the commercial fishing sector have the skills and support they need to succeed, preserving the strength of this vital

industry now and into the future"

"MCFA's mission of advocating for sustainable fisheries and vibrant fishing communities is focused on doing this work with the goal of building a brighter future for the next generation of fishermen and fishing businesses in Maine. The Young Fishermen's Development Act, which was identified as a priority by the Fishing Communities Coalition, provides much needed resources to invest in our next generation and we are pleased to be able to deploy funds to created educational tools to advance fishermen wellness," said Ben Martens, Executive Director of the Maine Coast Fishermen's Association. "Thank you Senator Collins, Senator King, Representative Pingree, and Representative Golden who co-sponsored this important legislation

and who have continued to lead in ensuring it is annually funded."

"Thanks to YFDA support, MCCF's Eastern Maine Skippers Program will be able to continue to meet our next generation where they are, and provide them with very authentic maritime and marine science learning to support future maritime careers, including fishing and science - skills that directly translate into the workforce here in Maine, and elsewhere," said Alexa M. Dayton, Ph.D., Executive Director of Maine Center for Coastal Fisheries. "The future of lobstering and maritime careers in Maine is bright, and this program is helping to keep kids in school to complete their education, and providing mentorship to help them put it all together for the long run. The great news is, we have demand for

the program from teachers, students, families and that's a signal that we're still going strong with a vibrant fisheries economy in Maine."

The funding is allocated as follows:

Maine Coast Fishermen's Association - \$1,771,092 to establish an online knowledge hub targeted toward young fishermen and women that will include educational training content focused on career development and caring for your physical and mental wellbeing as part of the commercial fishing industry.

Eastern Maine Skippers Program - \$296,342 to provide targeted career development opportunities for young fishers. The program will serve eight rural Maine coastal schools and train 80 high school students and 16 post-graduates annually through

workshops, vessel-based activities and mentorship.

NOAA's Young Fishermen's Development Program was established by the Young Fishermen's Development Act, legislation that the entire Maine Delegation helped lead to final passage in 2020.




