CMMC tech back on road, thanks to fellow team members

LEWISTON, ME -- A Central Maine Healthcare (CMH) anesthesiology technician's transportation challenges have come to an end, thanks to his fellow team members.

Corie Hubbard has been at Central Maine Medical Center (CMMC) for less than a year and didn't tell anyone he was unable to get reliable transportation to and from work.

"It was very challenging, and I almost gave up hope," Hubbard said. "Even though I was trying to get ahead, every time I came close to buying a car, something else would hap-

Once his colleagues found out he was silently struggling with transportation, Tina Moring, CRNA, and the entire CMMC perioperative team decided to pool their money. Their hope was to raise \$5,000enough to buy a vehicle that could at least get Corie



to and from work.

"Corie is wonderful. He never misses a day of work and is always so pos-



itive," Moring said. "In just 10 days, we raised \$11,000. I was overwhelmed by the generosity of his team

members as well as other staff who barely knew him."

Tina did some car shopping and found a 2015 Nissan Rogue. With money left over, they paid for vehicle registration and six months of insurance. She and a crowd of surgeons, nurses, technicians and others surprised Corie in the hospital garage.

"It felt like a dream. It was mind-blowing," Hubbard said. "I have never cried so much in my life. The first day I drove to work it was so freeing. I drove with the windows down and the wind felt in-

"I am so grateful and so humbled. To see all of the people who made this happen for me. I want everyone to know what they did. I want everyone to know the kind of place this is and the kind of people who work here. It's been life changing."

Collins, King announce \$11M to for lead poisoning protection

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Senators Susan Collins (R-Maine), Vice Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee, and Angus King (I-Maine) announced that the cities of Portland and Lewiston have been awarded grant funding to help protect children from lead poisoning. The Lead-Based Paint Hazard

Reduction (LHR) grant program awards, totaling \$11,117,960, will help improve the health of Maine communities by fixing older housing and preserving affordable housing units that pose a lead hazard—such as the use of lead paint, more common in homes built before 1960. Additionally, this grant targets housing where chil-

dren less than six years of age live.

"The majority of Maine's housing stock was built prior to 1978, the year that lead-based paint was banned, which has resulted in our state having one of the highest levels of lead paint contamination in the country," said Senator Collins. "This federal investment in lead hazard

abatement will increase the safety of housing for families in Portland and Lewiston, helping to further alleviate this public health threat."

"Lead exposure and poisoning can pose extreme health risks, especially for young children who are still growing and developing," said Senator King. "Even small amounts of lead from paint chips and flakes can build up in the body and cause serious health problems. Families should be focused on helping their children grow and thrive, not worried about whether or not their house is hazardous. This robust funding will help more Maine families and children have a healthy and safe place to

call home."

The Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction program is funded through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). In addition to the LHR program, HUD also offers the Healthy Homes Supplemental funding that is available to further bolster lead-based paint hazard prevention and control.

DAR Marian Anderson Legacy scholarship opens

Undergraduate and graduate students studying music can apply for the DAR Marian Anderson Legacy Scholarship starting November 1. Sponsored by the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), the scholarship provides a one-time \$5,000 award to one student annually who is pursuing undergraduate or graduate study in music.

Marian Anderson (1897-1993) was a groundbreaking African American

contralto and an inspiration for civil rights. "This scholarship pays tribute to Marian Anderson's life, and the Daughters of the American Revolution seeks to honor her legacy through today's aspiring musicians. Her legacy lives on in others who aim for excellence in musical studies, are committed to their communities, and willing to stand up for what is right," said Pamela Wright, DAR President General.

Applicants should be accepted or currently

enrolled in an accredited university or college in the United States and have a concentration in music in their course of study. Music performance, composition, theory, or education are all areas that students may be specialized in to qualify for the scholarship. They should have a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale or the equivalent GPA on the scale used by the institution.

Applications require references sent through

the application system, so students need to request their references ahead of the Jan. 31st application deadline.

To recognize the city Marian Anderson called home, preference will be given to students from the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania metropolitan area, even if they are not pursuing music studies in the Philadelphia area. This scholarship is not automatically renewed. However, recipients may reapply for consideration each year for up to four consecutive years.

Celebrating the West Fest

Each September, the Army Corps of Engineers releases water from Ball Mountain Dam on the West River in Jamaica, Vermont. An event that attracts many Chowderheads with the Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society, the scheduled releases provide an excellent opportunity for paddlers to experience some outstanding late season whitewater boating. The releases have evolved into a veritable whitewater festival and Jamaica State Park is the hub of activity.

I first participated in the West Fest in September 1989. A friend associated with a paddling club called the Vermont Canoe Cruisers suggested making the five hour drive in search of fall whitewater. We experienced a bitterly cold weekend, and I found the crowded chaotic park shuttle to be an unpleasant experience. I resolved not to return.

That changed about 15 years ago when friends and fellow Chowderheads, Jean Miller, Ryan Galway, and Evan Eichorn, began organizing weekend long West Fest trips. They reserved the best park campsites a year in advance and ran their own shuttles to the top of Ball Mountain Dam rather than use the park shuttle. That alternative adds two rapids and requires a strenuous climb

over the dam to paddle the three-mile Class III whitewater descent. I was hooked.

In recent years, I've missed the West Fest due to other commitments. Some releases were also cancelled because of low

This year, I was back in the game. The dam was providing a one-day Saturday release and Jean was coordinating a club trip. The usual suspects had reserved convenient riverside campsites. A recent avalanche now blocks the park road so there's no park shuttle. Everyone has to complete the arduous trek over the dam.

Semi-retired, wife, Nancy, and I, make the West Fest a three-day weekend. This year, we decided to begin with a mountain hike in New Hampshire on the Friday before the release and a flatwater paddle the day after.

Both of us dealing with physical ailments, we chose Mount Willard in Crawford Notch for our hike, an easy ascent. The popular 3.4-mile trek with a spectacular view at the top was a good choice. No difficulties were experienced and more hikes appear to be in our future.

The following morning, a large group of Chowderheads in a variety of

boats met at Ball Mountain Dam prepared for an exciting day of whitewater. There was a sense of urgency because the release was limited to four hours and we hoped to complete two runs.

We hoisted boats onto our shoulders and began the steep climb to the top of the dam. The ascent is only half the fun. Boaters then carry their heavy burdens down narrow switchbacks for about a thousand feet to a pool above the initial

Our group was among the earliest paddlers to arrive. We began launching one boat at a time, canoes and kayaks first followed by two inflatables and a small raft.

The first rapid is called Initiation and it's aptly named. The longest and steepest falls on the river, we avoided a confusing maze of holes and barely submerged rocks as we plummeted to the bottom. Everyone made it safely down, but one kayaker needed to roll.

From there, whitewater is almost continuous to the campground. Our intrepid group negotiated through wave trains, dodged holes and boulders, and surfed waves while watching out for one another. Periodically, we caught eddies to regroup.

After passing through

a rapid with feisty waves called Boof Rock, we began peering downstream in search of The Dumplings, the most technical whitewater on the river. A collection of large boulders that block most of the river mark the beginning of the complex descent.

We assembled in an eddy on river left at the top and began carefully dropping down the left shore next to a huge boulder. The secret to a successful run is to execute an abrupt right turn below the boulder and then ferry to river right while avoiding a perilous combination of holes and rocks just downstream. Once past the hazardous obstacles, paddlers must turn left and negotiate through standing waves to the bottom. Our capable group successfully completed the required maneu-


Shortly after, we arrived at our campsites where we enjoyed lunch while contemplating the remainder of our West Fest weekend.



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NSB contributes \$2.5K to The Public Theatre in Lewiston

The Public Theatre has brought the spirit of Hollywood and Broadway to the old Ritz since 1992, and thanks to a partnership with Actor's Equity Association, the theatre is able to showcase some of the country's best actors in its productions.



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CoverME.gov's Open Enrollment begins

AUGUSTA, ME — The Maine Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) Office of the Health Insurance Marketplace (OHIM) announced that the fourth annual Open Enrollment period for 2025 began on Friday, November 1, 2024. Maine people without access to health or dental insurance coverage through their employer, Medicare, or the state's Medicaid plan, known as MaineCare are encouraged to find coverage through Maine's official health insurance marketplace, CoverME.

Enrollment Open runs from November 1, 2024 through January 15th, 2025. Maine people can visit CoverME.gov to compare private plans, apply for financial savings, and enroll in a 2025 health and dental insurance plan.

Consumers enroll by December 15th for coverage that begins January 1, 2025. January 15, 2025 is the last day to enroll for 2025 coverage, with benefits starting on February 1, 2025. Open Enrollment is the only time of year when consumers can enroll in coverage through CoverME.

gov unless they qualify for a special enrollment period as a result of a qualifying event, such as losing insurance provided through a job or MaineCare, a change in marital status, or having a baby.

"I encourage Maine people to visit CoverME. gov to explore their options and spread the word to help make sure that no person in Maine goes without health insurance that could save their life," said Governor Janet Mills. "Enrolling by December 15th will ensure that your coverage takes effect January 1, 2025 – preventing a gap in your health insurance."

"We encourage all Maine people who need affordable health or dental insurance to visit CoverME.gov during Open Enrollment to find coverage that fits their needs at a price that works for their budget," said DHHS Commissioner Sara Gagné-Holmes. "Having insurance is a critical component to staying healthy and CoverME.gov offers quality, affordable coverage for doctor's visits, prescription drugs, mental health, emergencies, and hospitalizations."

through CoverME.gov provide quality, comprehensive insurance that protects consumers if they have an accident or major illness and fully pays for preventive screenings. This year, thousands of Maine people will continue to save hundreds of dollars on average on their CoverME.gov health care premiums due to enhanced premium tax credits available through 2025. Today, 85% of people enrolled in CoverME.gov coverage qualify for help to pay for health insurance and save \$560 a month on average.

"Even those who could not afford coverage or did not qualify previously should check out CoverME.gov to see what financial savings they may qualify for," said Hilary Schneider, Director of the DHHS Office of the Health Insurance Marketplace, which runs CoverME.gov. Political Portal launched to empower young Maine leaders

MAINE -- Maine Youth Action has just launched the Maine Youth Political Portal (MYPP) as of October 11th, 2024. The MYPP is an online resource and inspiration made by and for young Mainers interested in civic engagement, especially those looking to run for publicly elected political office. It consists of a library of informational and training resources, a list of contacts for endorsements and networking with politically savvy mentors, and an intuitive candidate builder page that will enable users to walk through the process of planning



their campaigns.

Maine has the oldest population of any state in the country, which is reflected in our decision-making bodies' demographics. Yet a 2021 poll determined 44.3% of the population is under 35. Youth are an important bloc of voters, workers, taxpayers, and

Politicians visionaries. often craft legislation and policy with the next election cycle in mind. This is known as democratic myopia and can be combated by electing young politicians who consider the long-term. This leads to better decision-making, climate-focused policy, and nuanced solutions to complex problems.

"I believe that youth are not only society's future but its present. The Maine Youth Political Portal will help young Mainers become civic leaders and take charge of their futures in a time of unstable democracy, distrust in governments, and a decline of civic education in schools," says Anna Siegel, the former Advocacy Director of Maine Youth Action and an MYPP project lead.

The launch of the Maine Youth Political Portal was intentionally timed with the upcompresidential

election in November. Comprehensive and experiential civics education improves voter turnout. Providing young people with the tools to run for office makes them more likely to understand the importance of elections, research and evaluate the candidates on their ballot, and volunteer at election booths.

This project also won the national Call For Kindness competition sponsored by Riley's Way Foundation. Additional funding was awarded by the Youth Grant-Making Council of the Maine Youth Action Network. The project was also highlighted in a recent episode of the top-rated podcast Simple Acts, Big Impact.

"The Maine Youth Political Portland is such an important project and valuable resource for my generation. Youth want our voices to be heard, but getting involved in public policy as a young person can be very daunting," said a high school-aged volunteer who helped develop website content alongside over a dozen other youth volunteers, Maine Youth Action staff, and a hired intern who created the Maine Youth Political Portal.

Fall enrollment up 10% at Maine's community colleges

AUGUSTA, ME — Fall enrollment is up 10% at Maine's community colleges, breaking 20,000 students for the first time and marking another historic high enrollment for the seven colleges.

"This is what happens when you intentionally and strategically make college affordable, relevant, and accessible," said David Daigler, president of the Maine Community College System (MCCS). "This last year has been a period of tremendous growth for us, made possible by the dedication and excellence of our incredible employees and partners. Together, we're expanding opportunities for Mainers through Free College, early college, job skills training in a breadth of industries, and excellent transfer pathways to four-year colleges."

"We're grateful to see this surge of interest in pursuing an education at Maine's community colleges," Daigler said.

Fall enrollment was 21,385 students, compared to 19,477 students last year.

Enrollment has been boosted by the Free College program, which was

proposed by Governor Janet Mills in early 2022 and enacted by the Legislature a few months later. It covers 100% of community college tuition and fees for recent high school graduates.

"We're hopeful that Governor Mills and the legislature will support the continuation of Free College, but the clock is ticking," Daigler said. "This year's seniors are the last to qualify for this groundbreaking program. We strongly urge all high school seniors and their families to make plans now to start their college

journey tuition-free."

Fall enrollment has also been boosted by an increase in high school students taking early college courses, increased capacity in popular academic programs, and expanded hours more night and weekend classes. There's also an increase in returning students from last year's record-breaking fall enrollment of 19,477 students.

The increase in community college students is having a ripple effect, with the University of Maine System (UMS) reporting a 39% increase

in undergraduate transfer

MCCS-to-That UMS transfer pipeline is expected to increase significantly in the coming years due to the historic Transfer ME agreement reached between the two systems this summer. The agreement guarantees automatic admission - and eliminates UMS application paperwork or fees for MCCS graduates in transfer programs to seamlessly continue their education at one or more of Maine's public universities.

Official fall enroll-

ment figures do not include short-term workforce training students. More than 26,000 students have taken short-term workforce training classes since January 2022. Some of those students use short-term workforce training as an on-ramp to pursue a certificate or degree program, which in turn boosts official enrollment figures.

This fall begins the third academic year with the Free College Scholarship. Since it launched in Fall 2022, 17,132 Free College-eligible students have enrolled.

Maine home sales, values increase in September

AUGUSTA, ME—A higher inventory of single-family homes for sale in Maine has started to bring about a more balanced market to the state. According to Maine Listings, 5.39 percent more homes were sold in September 2024 compared to September 2023. The median sales price (MSP) for the 1,486 homes sold

reached \$409,450, an 8.68% increase over September of last year. The MSP indicates that half of the homes were sold for more and half sold for less.

"The statewide sold statistics from January through September 2024 are 3.9 percent ahead of this same time period from 2023, which was Maine's lowest point since 2013," says Paul McKee, President of the Maine Association of REALTORS® and Broker affiliated with Keller Williams Realty in Portland.

"The 4,971 available homes for sale in September reached the highest inventory number since October 2020 – 47 months. However, it is still below the level needed to fully

balance the market," adds McKee.

Nationally, sales eased 2.3 percent in September 2024 compared to September 2023. The National Association of Realtors today also announced a National MSP increase of 2.9 percent to \$409,000 in September. Regionally, sales in the Northeast decreased 6.1 percent com-

pared to last September, while the Regional MSP hit \$467,100—an increase of 6.0 percent from September of last year.

"We expect a steady finish for 2024," says McK-ee. "For-sale inventory levels have improved, overall pricing appreciation has slowed, and buyers remain active in the marketplace. Consumers are beginning

to understand that what we experienced regarding interest rates from 2008 until the present were not historically normal. Maine author publishes story of first White House menorah

Elisa Boxer, illustrated by Jewish Ukrainian-American artist Sofia Moore went on sale last week. This nonfiction picture book tells the history and importance


of the first official White House menorah, and how it has become a symbol of strength and perseverance against seemingly insurmountable odds.

Publishers Weekly just ran an insightful interview with Elisa Boxer and Kirkus praised the book as "poignant," "moving," and "an inspired and stirring tale to share at Hanukkah—or any time of year."

BEAM OF LIGHT provides the backstory of the first Jewish artifact in the White House permanent collection, fashioned from a wooden beam stored during Truman-era renovations.

That beam of White House wood sat in storage for seventy years, through thirteen different presidents, and recounts history it witnessed.

Sofia Moore's strikillustrations heighten the emotional content of this book beautifully. With earnest prose and meticulous care with her research, Boxer and Moore cast that beam as the narrating protagonist, imbuing it with a perspective that connects its own arc of resilience and renewal ("I was supposed to be destroyed," it repeats) with the history of Jewish people during WWII. "I am the centerpiece of the story



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

Maine State Chamber honors LA Metro Chamber

AUGUSTA, ME -The Maine State Chamber of Commerce held its annual meeting and dinner on Wednesday, October 30, 2024, at the Augusta Civic Center in Augusta. In addition to hosting a U.S. Senate debate in partnership with NEWS CENTER Maine, the Chamber presented a leadership award to retiring Thomas College President Laurie G. Lachance and honored the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce for their leadership and efforts following the October 2023 mass shooting tragedy in Lewiston. Lachance received the Chamber's "Dirigo Award" for her visionary leadership and decades of contributions and service to Maine. From 2012 to 2024, Lachance served as President of Thomas College in Waterville as the college's 5th President and the first female and alumna to lead

the college. From 2004-2012, Lachance was president and CEO of the Maine Development Foundation. Prior to MDF, she served three governors as Maine State Economist. Before joining state government, Lachance was the Corporate Economist at Central Maine Power Company. Lachance joins several Maine Governors, U.S. Senators, and Maine business leaders in receiving the Maine State Chamber's "Dirigo Award."

The Maine State Chamber recognized the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce as the 2024 "Dana F. Connors Chamber of the Year" for their leadership, resilience, and commitment to rebuilding and revitalizing the Lewiston-Auburn community in response to the mass shooting tragedy that took place on October 25, 2023, claiming 18 lives and impacting hundreds of people and businesses in the Lewiston-Auburn region and beyond.
