No, Emma **Prusch Farm Park** isn't closing


Dispute between city, foundation generates social media storm

his newspaper along with other media received an urgent notice stating that Emma Prusch Farm Park in San Jose, located at a site at King and Story roads was shutting down.

Despite anything the public has heard to the contrary in print or on social media sites, the park is thriving with families enjoying the Park's new playground while goats, pigs, roosters and peacocks strolled around to the amusement of onlookers.

The turmoil began after supporters of the Prusch Farm Park Foundation posted that the city had served the foundation with an eviction notice to have all its property removed by Nov. 18. The post suggested this was being See PARK, page 4



District 8 San Jose Councilman Domingo Candelas wins reelection

By Times staff writers 🔫 an Jose Councilmember Domingo Can-S delas is headed for four more years on the city council after a tumultuous election fight with police Sgt. Tam Truong, representing Evergreen, Silver Creek and Lake Cunningham communities.

In a heated fight for reelection, San Jose **Councilmember Domingo Candelas appears** to be headed for another four years on the city council.

In the final vote count, incumbent Candelas won against San Jose police Sgt. Tam Truong, with 56.63% of the vote, with 19,737 votes. Truong received 43.37% of the vote, with 15,118 votes.

"After more than 30,000 door knocks, thousands of phone calls, I truly understand what issues our community neighbors are having, and I feel good for the kind of campaign we ran and the conversations we had," Candelas said. "I look forward to serving District 8 in the next four years.

Candelas said his priorities for a second term are making communities safer, empowering neighborhoods and keeping the streets clean.

"It's important that we respect the democratic process," Truong said. "I want to extend my respect and gratitude to our opponent. While Domingo and I may have different ideas, we share the same commitment to improving our city and making it thrive. To the incredible volunteers, staff, supporters — thank you. Thank you for your hard work and dedication. And to my family and friends, your support has meant the world to me."

Truong has been entrenched in controversy and faced criminal proceedings. The Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office charged Truong with grand theft related to mortgage fraud in September. The fraud charge was dismissed a month later. He was put on administrative leave from the police department amid the investigation and the state police board temporarily suspended his officer certification.

Since the start of his campaign, Candelas raised \$298,204 and spent \$264,913. Truong raised \$197,046 and spent \$192.164.





done in retaliation for the foundation's belief a few months ago that funds were improperly used for purposes other than the park.

Unfortunately, as neighborhood groups sent emails and reposted the original post, many came to the conclusion the city was closing the park. In actuality, the foundation had been a "guardian of the Farm" and partnered with the city since 1979. The Farm represents less than 1% of the Park's 44-acres, according to Parks Director Jon Cicirelli.

"The city hasn't had a formal agreement with the foundation in more than a decade, and only part of the park controlled by foundation members is Emma's Kitchen Garden. The foundation does not operate the Park."

In 2021 the city went through a process to find an operator for Emma Prusch Farm Park and selected Veggielution, the nonprofit that already had been running programs at its six-acre urban community farm at the park. The main dispute by the Foundation is the park's finances related to a gas station lease on the property. In 1962, Emma Prusch gifted the land from her family's dairy farm to the city on the condition that it remain an agricultural park and that any revenue generated would go back into it mainly from a nearby gas station.

A Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services spokesperson told San José Spotlight their decision to end negotiations with the foundation had nothing to do with its request for information. They maintain that no money has been missing or mismanaged.

The city contracted an outside mediator to try and come to an agreement with the foundation, Cicirelli said, but the two sides were unable to resolve their differences. He said in a letter on Oct. 31 that the city decided to "end negotiations" with the organization.

Sal Pizarro stated in his Mercury News column: "It would be a shame to see Emma's Kitchen Garden fall into disrepair or even to have the Prusch Farm Park Foundation ushered out after many years of organizing volunteers and activities at the park. The foundation helped keep the park in the public eye as San Jose grew up dramatically around it."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR ESD Superintendent accused of election violation

Dear Editor:

wanted to bring your attention to a significant unfolding matter in the Evergreen School District involving the Superintendent, Dr. Antoine Hawkins, and allegations of a possible violation of California Education Code Section 7054.

According to witnesses, Dr. Hawkins may have allegedly encouraged management staff to support two incumbent board members in the current election, allegedly advising against endorsing another candidate (me) who is a former principal of the Evergreen School District. This alleged incident, if accurate, would potentially violate the provisions of Education Code 7054, which prohibits school officials from using district resources or authority to influence election outcomes.


Upon learning about this from witnesses, I reported the alleged violation to the Registrar of Voters who then escalated it with the District Attorney's office. I also reached out to the Board, an email from me was sent to them and I also attended a special board meeting to inform the Board in person. The Board has officially been informed multiple times of the alleged violation of the Superintendent. I requested an impartial investigation to clarify these actions and uphold transparency within the district.

This allegation suggests that Dr. Hawkins might have used his influence and position to potentially manipulate election results in favor of the two incumbents. Such actions, if confirmed, would represent a significant breach of the ethical standards expected of district leadership and could compromise the integrity of the election process. This issue is of particular concern given the expectation of impartiality and neutrality in school leadership, especially in matters of public elections. Many in our community would appreciate the Evergreen Times shedding light on this situation, especially the residents (more than 9,000) who voted for me, as it directly impacts on the integrity of our school district's leadership. Thank you for your attention to this matter. I believe the community would benefit from knowing more about what is happening in our school district, especially with such serious allegations in play.





Bookworms rejoice! The San Jose Public Library, located in the heart of the Silicon Valley with 25 locations, officially announced the elimination of late fees as of July 2024 (three months ago).


This means if you started checking out books on July 2024 and you're late in returning them, you do not have to worry about late fees any more on them.

Those who have late items before that date still have the opportunity to volunteer your fines away on those older items by doing volunteer work, book replacement program and the read away your fines program to clear away all fees.

TECH JARGON OF THE WEEK Differential **Privacy**

By Shubhi Asthana ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this



"techie" word - and even after you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

Differential Privacy

Imagine the U.S. government collecting census data or a hospital sharing information for medical research. In these cases, people's personal information is at risk. Although each piece of data might seem harmless on its own, combining small bits from different sources could reveal private details about someone. This is the issue differential privacy aims to solve.

What is Differential Privacy?

Evergreen

Differential privacy is a method that protects personal information in large datasets, like census records or medical information. It ensures that no one can identify an individual by comparing data from different sources. Whether it's a curious neighbor or a company seeking private details, differential privacy uses advanced techniques to keep personal data secure.

How Does Differential Privacy Work? Differential privacy works by adding "noise" or slight changes to the data. This extra layer of "fuzziness" makes it hard for anyone to pinpoint exact details about individuals in the data, while still allowing researchers to gather useful insights.

Here are some methods used to add this noise:

1. Laplace Mechanism: This method adds a certain amount of random noise based on the size of the dataset, ensuring individual privacy. The more data there is, the more noise is added to balance out privacy and accuracy.

2. Gaussian Mechanism: Similar to the Laplace method, this technique also adds noise but is based on a different probability calculation (the Gaussian distribution). It adjusts the noise according to privacy and sensitivity needs.

3. Exponential Mechanism: Rather than adding noise, this method selects data at random from a dataset based on probabilities, allowing answers to questions without revealing specifics.

Why is Differential Privacy Important? Differential privacy is especially valuable when working with sensitive information, such as healthcare records or largescale surveys. It protects user data without compromising the quality of insights, making it a powerful tool in data analysis. By applying differential privacy, organ-

izations can safely analyze data without

risking individual privacy. This approach supports responsible data use in a world where privacy matters more than ever. About the Author

2024. Throughout her time at VTA, Chavez has been a passionate advocate for the agency, its employees, and passengers throughout Santa Clara County.



Mobile camera pilot program launched to quell crime

mall businesses struggling with rampant crime in East San Jose are in need of help which is coming from a recently launched mobile

camera pilot program. The city of San Jose just announced it has launched a mobile camera pilot program at Lions Plaza on Tully Road

- part of the city's ongoing emphasis on using technology solutions to provide a presence or help solve cases as its police department grapples with staffing shortfalls.

The Tully Road-Eastridge area is in the process of creating a business improvement district, which will collect assessments from businesses in the vicinity to address public safety. These activities, including keeping streets clean are evolving separately from the camera pilot program.

"I believe there's nothing more basic than keeping our community safe," San Jose Mayor Matt Mahan said. "It is the fundamental responsibility of our government, and since taking office, I've tried to make sure that city hall is focusing on the basics like public safety. That being said, this community here, this corridor, (Tully Road-Eastridge Business Association), has not entirely yet felt the impact of that shift to a focus on the basics. They have still been experiencing repeated break-ins and property damage while simply trying to run a small business and make ends meet."


Mahan, District 8 Councilmember Domingo Candelas and San Jose Police Chief Paul Joseph on Tuesday unveiled two portable camera arrays with a speakerphone and license plate reader.

The police department says they will not monitor the cameras 24/7, but it will have access to the data collected along with business owners in the area

Candelas requested the camera purchase be included in the budget at a cost of \$50,000.

"They feel unsafe," Candelas said. "They feel their business is at risk because of the constant shattered windows and robberies. Han Kee, for example, down the street, has been in business for 39 years and it would be a shame to see them close their doors for fear of the issues that they have felt. A nail shop owner on the other side of the road had to reduce their business hours because once the sun went down, people did not feel safe."
