Valley Water and national weather service urge the community to prepare for winter storms

alley Water, the County of Santa Clara, and the City of San José held a news conference featuring a winter outlook forecast discussion by the National Weather Service and an outline of the joint flood emergency preparedness efforts Nov. 13.

Last winter, Valley Water partnered with the County of Santa Clara and local cities to help residents stay safe by distributing 140,000 free filled sandbags. Valley Water stated that it's committed to working with local agencies and the community to help everyone be aware, be ready and be safe during extreme weather events.

Valley Water is urging residents to prepare for an uncertain winter by finding out if their home or business is at high risk of flooding, locating free sandbag distribution centers and signing up for Santa Clara County's emergency alert system.

George Casey is new San Jose D10 councilmember

eorge Casey is the new San Jose City District 10's councilmember, beating incumbent Arjun Batra.

San Jose Planning Commissioner Casey received 57.88% of the vote, or 23,268 votes, over Councilmember Batra with 42.12% of the vote, or 16,935 votes.

Casey's priorities include public safety, hiring more police officers, cleaning up encampments and addressing the housing and homelessness crisis.

On election night, Casey flashed huge smiles, while his supporters clapped and cheered. They flocked to him with hugs, handshakes and high fives.

They tell him how proud they are of him and how happy they are with the results.

"I'm overwhelmed," Casey told San José Spotlight. "I think they just had confidence in me and my background, and they believed in me."

District 10 covers the Santa Teresa and Almaden areas in South San Jose. Batra was appointed to the seat in January 2023, when it became vacant after voters elected then-District 10 Councilmember Matt Mahan as mayor in 2022.

"We ran a good campaign with integrity, and we will expect the results will get tighter. Whatever happens we will see in the final results," said Batra on election night.

With a background in urban planning and

experience on the planning commission, Casey said he has an inside view of how housing markets and development work.

"I want to revitalize downtown and support businesses by addressing blight and crime," Casey said. "The city's onerous regulatory environment is what hinders investors from coming in. The Planning Department is also understaffed, causing delays in the permitting process for housing developments."

Casey wants to create a pipeline by introducing students in middle and high schools and colleges to law enforcement. Casey wants to create a down payment assistance program for officers to be able buy a home in the city as a way to keep them from jumping ship to work in other cities.

To address the housing crisis and lack of affordable homes in the city, Casey proposes increasing the supply of homes by building more naturally affordable starter homes, such as condominiums and townhouses.

Casey said there isn't enough urgency when See CASEY, page 4

it comes to solving the homelessness crisis and that the county needs to play a greater role. He sees building more tiny homes as the quickest solution to ending homelessness. However, he wants these sites to require drug treatment, mental health services and job training.

During his 22 months in office, Batra said he's worked on addressing issues his residents view as most pressing. That includes public safety, homelessness, traffic safety — especially around schools — cleaner parks and lower costs of services. Batra, 78, has lived in Almaden since 1987. His background doesn't include the typical long-running list of political positions — instead, he is a retired Intel executive and software engineer who forayed into government a few years ago after working for former Mayor Sam Liccardo's office of technology and innovation.

Since the start of his campaign, Casey raised \$287,950, including \$32,000 from loans, and spent \$276,414. Batra raised \$242,524, including \$100,000 from loans, and spent \$180,762.

New limit on student smartphone use in California schools July 2026

ov. Gavin Newsom recently signed controversial legislation requiring California school districts to limit student smartphone use during the school day by July 2026.

The Phone-Free School Act — AB 3216 — makes California the fifth state to require all public schools to restrict student phone use on school grounds.

"We know that excessive smartphone use increases anxiety, depression and other mental health issues — but we have the power to intervene," Newsom said in a statement. "This new law will help students focus on academics, social development and the world in front of them — not their screens — when they're in school."

The governor's office said the new law will involve "significant stakeholder participation" to ensure schools' policies are responsive to communities' "needs and desires."

The law says students must be allowed to use their phones in emergencies or when permitted by a teacher, administrator or doctor. Students can also use their phones if their individualized edu-

cation program requires it.

Some schools in California have already limited the use of cell phones. San Mateo High School became a phone-free campus in 2019, and Los Angeles Unified School District voted earlier this summer to ban students' use of phones beginning in 2025.

Evan Low concedes Silicon Valley congressional race to Sam Liccardo

State Assemblymember Evan Low has conceded the race for Silicon Valley's hottest congressional seat — sending former San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo to Washington D.C.

Election night results launched Liccardo into a comfortable 20% lead over Low for Congressional District 16, a trend that hasn't changed much since subsequent ballot tallying updates. Low — whose campaign was backed by police, nurse and teacher unions — congratulated Liccardo and expressed gratitude for his supporters.

"Although the outcome of the election is not one we hoped for, I am proud of the people-first campaign that we ran, focusing on the very real issues that affect the daily lives

of CD-16 voters," Low, the Chinese American state lawmaker who spent a decade building power in Sacramento, wrote in a statement posted to X, formerly known as Twitter.

Low said he spoke to Liccardo — whose campaign saw support from climate and gun control advocacy groups — on Wednesday evening and thanked him for a hard fought campaign.

"His success will be our success here in Silicon Valley," Low said.

Liccardo is working to put a team of congressional staff in place to serve his district in Silicon Valley and in Washington D.C.

"I thank Evan Low for his well-

wishes and congratulations earlier this evening, and I was also pleased to receive a message of congratulations and support from Congresswoman Anna Eshoo," Liccardo said in a statement announcing Low's concession. "I join our community in expressing our profound gratitude for her three decades of leadership and service to our community."

It was a bitter and unusual fight for the seat. A historic tie in the primaries sparked a contentious recount that left Liccardo and Low bumping heads with negative campaigning, endorsement jockeying, heated debates and dueling FEC complaints.

Both candidates are tight with established Silicon Valley political circles. But they differ on key issues such as Proposition 36, a statewide ballot measure which would ramp

up criminal punishment for petty theft if approved in the election. Liccardo has come out in support of the measure, while Low said he's against it.

San Jose to launch pilot program addressing monitoring of oversized and lived-in vehicles

n response to environmental and safety issues caused by oversized and livedin vehicles, the City of San José's Department of Transportation (DOT) is developing a pilot program to better monitor and enforce parking rules.

Over two months, DOT staff manually took stock of every oversized or likely lived-in vehicle parked citywide. This inventory will help identify areas of highest concern and guide the establishment of 30 temporary and 10 permanent tow-away zones in the most impacted neighborhoods.

"Keeping our streets clean, safe and accessible is one of government's most fundamental responsibilities," said San José Mayor Matt Mahan. "This inventory will allow us to monitor the worst RV hotspots in the city and track our progress toward dismantling them."

City staff found just over 900 oversized and likely lived-in vehicles on city streets. The map will be updated as the new enforcement program is launched, giving residents a real-time look at the progress being made.

The Oversized and Lived-In Vehicle Enforcement (OLIVE) program was requested in Mayor Mahan's March Budget Message and funded by a \$1.5 million budget addendum in the FY 2024-2025 budget that directs the department to identify areas impacted by oversized and likely lived-in vehicles on city streets, set up temporary tow-away zones for cleanup and street sweeping, and assess the feasibility of implementing permanent parking restrictions in certain areas.

As part of this initiative, up to 30 sites will be selected for temporary tow-away restrictions to facilitate cleaning and encourage vehicle relocation. Vehicles remaining in these restricted zones will be subject to towing and impound if not moved voluntarily.

"This solution is a long time coming. It will provide critical relief to neighbors living in RVs and allow us to give them clearer pathways off of our streets," said Councilmember David Cohen (D4). "It will also ensure that our communities are less blighted, which will ease the tension between neighborhoods and residents in lived-in vehicles. I'm excited at the prospect of providing a broad set of solutions, and this site is a key step towards achieving our goals."

Parking-restricted sites will be prioritized based on the severity of parking concerns and associated issues such as but not limited to:

- Proximity of parked vehicles to sensitive areas including schools, parks waterways, storm drains, and emergency interim housing sites.
- The number of vehicles concentrated in an area.
- Site conditions including levels of observed trash, biowaste, and potential obstructions.
- Proximity of parked vehicles to Priority Safety Corridors and bike lanes.

While most sites will be considered solely using the above criteria, Council district offices will be able to advise on one specific location in their respective districts. Residents are encouraged to reach out to their Councilmember and provide feedback on areas that are significantly impacted by the presence of presumed lived-in and oversized vehicles. Once 30 sites have been selected, DOT staff will begin outreach to neighborhoods with proposed parkingrestricted sites and to people living in vehicles parked in the sites. Based on the suc $cess\,of\,the\,temporary\,restrictions, up\,to\,10$ sites will be considered for permanent parking restrictions.

The city is working to expand its offerings for those living in vehicles. It opened the Santa Teresa Safe Parking Site in July of last year which can serve up to 42 people and their vehicles. Early next year, the city plans to open its second and largest — the Berryessa Safe Parking Site — on a 6.3-acre lot in District 4, which has the ability to take up to 85 vehicles off city streets.
