

Newsmakers, Names & Faces Andwell addresses top misconceptions about hospice

Q&A with Andwell Health Partners' Hospice Director, Katherine Pushee, RN, MBA

While hospice may mean different things to different people, there are some common misperceptions about hospice that we hope to clarify here. To shed light on some of these misunderstandings, we've enlisted the help of Andwell Health Partners' new Hospice Director, Katherine Pushee.

Q: What are some of the most common misconceptions about hospice?

A: One common misconception of hospice is that people may feel that choosing hospice care means "giving up." In fact, in hospice, we take a holistic approach to chronic illness to improve quality of care for those within our community. Two common goals are: reducing unwanted visits to the emergency department or hospital, which may result in aggressive treatment that is not consistent with the

patient's goals and preferences; and alleviating the burden of care on families and other caregivers.

Another misconception is that a hospice is a physical space. While there are hospice facilities where patients may receive care, hospice is primarily a service and approach to care. You do not have to "go somewhere" to get hospice care. We come to you, with nursing, home health aides, social workers, chaplains, and volunteers collaborating to bring care and improve quality of life for the patient and their families.

Q: Why do you think these misconceptions about hospice persist?

A: I believe that these misconceptions about hospice persist due to lack of understanding around the hospice benefit in general. That fear of "giving up" in going on hospice clouds all else. Once people understand what hospice care really is, and the benefits that it can provide,

then we are able to deliver care to more patients and their families who would benefit from it.

Q: How can hospice care providers and organizations better educate the public to dispel these misconceptions?

A: One of the most significant ways a provider or organization can better educate the public is partnering with an organization such as Andwell Health Partners to help have those conversations with patients and their families. Providers are often busy within their medical world and may not have time or resources to fully address all of the patient's and caregivers' needs. 



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Seniors Not Acting Their Age **Navigating Historic Flagstaff Lake**

A large group of Chowderheads from the Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society was preparing for the second day of their annual Fall Supper weekend of outdoor activities in Carrabassett Valley. Several decided on mountain bike rides in the area; I had scheduled a paddling trip on Flagstaff Lake.

A major concern for our planned lake excursion was wind. During the previous day, we had experienced gusty gales that brought down trees and caused numerous power outages throughout the state. However, overnight conditions improved dramatically: light variable winds and sunny skies were forecast. The trip was on!

Flagstaff Lake has a rich compelling history. In the fall of 1775, during the early days of the Revolutionary War, Colonel Benedict Arnold led a small army on an epic march through Maine and southern Quebec to conduct an ill-fated attack on Quebec City. For several days, the beleaguered army struggled through what was then the Dead River and now Flagstaff Lake. While in that vicinity, a hurricane destroyed a large number of their bateaux that carried most of the food supply. At the time, Arnold is believed to have raised a flag in what became Flagstaff Village, hence the name Flagstaff.

Subsequently, the three small communities of Bigelow, Dead River, and Flagstaff were established along that stretch of the Dead River. In 1950, Long Falls Dam was constructed flooding the villages and creating Flagstaff Lake. The residents, many resistant, were removed through the process of eminent domain. Some remnants of the former villages still exist, much of them underwater.

Eleven paddlers in 9 kayaks and a tandem canoe joined me at the boat landing on the western shore of Flaggstaff Lake in Stratton on a calm, cool, sunny morning. That was the meeting place not the planned launch point. Instead, we drove north on Route 27 to Eustis and motored east on Flagstaff Road to Myer's Beach. From that location, the distance to a campsite situated where the former Flagstaff Village was located is about four miles. That was our destination.

Vehicles cannot drive to the beach. Rather, boats must be carried across a narrow bridge and launched in a tiny inlet that connects with the lake.

enthusiastic Our band of Chowderheads quickly spilled out into the lake. Clear skies provided spectacular views of the towering Bigelow Mountain Range that parallels the southern shore. We delighted in that majestic vista for the remainder of the outing.

Our choice to delay paddling until Sunday was a good one as winds were negligible as we navigated easterly past Flagstaff Peninsula and along the shoreline of a large island in the western center of the lake. Lofty Flagstaff Mountain and Picked Chicken Hill dominated the eastern horizon. Slightly west of distinctive Jim Eaton Hill, two small boats could be seen next to the shore close to what appeared to be our island campsite destination.

A trio of paddlers greeted us when we arrived at the campsite. The friendly boaters were camping at another location east of Jim Eaton Hill, but were investigating the area. They had spent the previous day paddling in extremely gusty winds

and had been fortunate to survive the ordeal without capsizing. We were thankful to have waited a day for the winds to subside.

Our group of inquisitive Chowderheads lingered at the exceptional campsite for lunch and some exploration. Two rusted vehicles, remnants from the former Flagstaff Village, were found on the outskirts of the campsite. There are several locations that appear to be the remains of old building foundations. Later research by one kayaker in the group, Suzanne Cole, indicates we had paddled over numerous submerged former homes. During periods of very low water, some of the surviving structures can reportedly be seen.

Returning in the shadow of the Bigelow Mountain Range with light winds, we paddled west towards Myer's Beach. Several walkers could be seen strolling on the beach as we approached. This was a remarkable day to experience the beauty Flagstaff Lake from any vantage point.

We disembarked satisfied to have completed an exceptionally scenic fascinating excursion.







Stanton Bird Club holds next lecture in series

LEWISTON, ME -- On December 2nd, the Stanton Bird Club will be hosting the second in its 2024-25 lecture series with a focus on birds of the temperate zone with Micah Miller PhD, Director of the Arctic Program with the Biodiversity Research Institute. The camp fosters a sense of community where both children and their families receive essential resources, encouragement, and connection. Importantly, 100% of families are provided scholarships, ensuring that financial barriers do not prevent participation.

Camp No Limits is expected to receive over \$24,000 in donations from the members of 100+ Women Who Care Southern Maine. The two runner-up presenters at

the event, Sebago Lakes Region Fuller Center for Housing and Ferry Beach Association, will each receive \$2,000 in recognition of their dedicated work and impact in the community.

100+ Women Who Care Maine Southern Maine was founded in November 2014 with 80 women in attendance. Today, the group has grown to 485 members. As of its 10th anniversary, 100+ Women Who Care Southern Maine has raised over \$650,000 for Maine nonprofits.

The group is made up of women dedicated to making a difference by supporting local nonprofits. Women are welcome to attend meetings as guests to see if the group is a good fit for them. Each member commits to donating \$50 each quarter to the nonprofit chosen at each meeting, although attendance is not required. At each meeting, three nonprofits-randomly nominated by members— present 5-minute pitches, followed by 5 minutes of Q&A. Afterward, the group votes to select the nonprofit that will receive the donations. Donations go directly to the nonprofit via credit card or check.



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



Efficiency Maine's awarded "Leader of the Pack"

AUGUSTA, Efficiency Maine's success accelerating the electrification of home heating was honored with the prestigious "Leader of the Pack" award from The American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy (ACEEE). The award, which is bestowed every five years, recognizes outstanding energy efficiency programs across the United States. This year ACEEE made awards in 10 categories from among nearly 100 programs nominated across the country.

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Efficiency Maine emerged the winner in the Home Electrification category for its programs promoting heat pumps and heat pump water heaters in residential buildings. The award for this category is given to a "comprehensive program that replaces a home's fossil fuel appliances and equipment with more efficient electric alternatives." Efficiency Maine's programs have consistently delivered among the highest rates in the U.S. for heat pump and heat pump water heater installations per capita. The Efficiency Maine programs comprise extensive consumer education resources, including tools and tips on its website, as well as a tiered system of income-differentiated rebates, pilot programs to test new technology, and close collaboration with trained heat pump install-

ME ers, plumbers, and electricians across Maine.

> ACEEE is а non-profit research organization that develops policies to reduce energy waste and combat climate change, and is renowned for its analysis and rankings of energy efficiency programs across the country. The award committee evaluated programs on multiple factors, such as ambitious long-term goals, interim metrics to measure progress, effective marketing to reach target audiences, performance evaluation for ensuring effectiveness, and community engagement, especially with historically underserved communities. It cited Efficiency Maine's programs for the "significant advancement of heat pump installation and its substantial financial incentives."

> "These exceptional efficiency programs are leading the way for saving energy, cutting pollution, and lowering energy bills," said Jasmine Mah, senior research analyst at ACEEE and lead researcher for Leaders of the Pack. "Utilities and third-party program administrators seeking to establish or improve energy efficiency programs can look to this diverse set of leaders as models."

"This award is the result of a great team effort, led by the contractors in Maine who are marketing and installing heat pumps and heat



pump water heaters at record rates, and aided by consistent support for Efficiency Maine's programs from our Board of Trustees and state legislators and officials," said Michael Stoddard, executive director of Efficiency Maine.

As an early leader in promoting the use of heat pumps in cold climates, Efficiency Maine has now rebated more than 175,000 heat pumps for space heating. In 2023 alone, more than 25,000 Maine homes received Efficiency Maine rebates for heat pumps or heat pump water heaters, equivalent to 4.5% of all Maine year-round residences in the state. The quasi-state agency's heat pump programs have received national recognition in recent years for demonstrating success in cold climates, achieving broad geographic distribution throughout the state, improving homes of low-income and moderate-income families, and piloting new applications in manufactured homes. The programs are also noted for fostering a fast-growing sector of small businesses com-

prising more than 700 registered trade allies.

The heat pump water heater initiative has been able to achieve the best market penetration in the U.S. by offering incentives to achieve price parity with baseline electric water heaters at the point of sale in retail and distributor outlets, such as Lowe's and Home Depot. Since its inception, the program has rebated more than 70,000 heat pump water heaters in Maine, a state with approximately 570,000 year-round homes.

"Maine has been a leader in air source heat pump adoption through the leadership of Efficiency Maine Trust to establish industry standards, quality control, and clear and transparent marketing for customers," said Patrick Woodcock, president & CEO of the Maine State Chamber of Commerce. "Further, it would not have been possible without the partnership with dozens of Maine businesses who saw the opportunity to lower energy costs and improve home heating and cooling quality to make Maine's nation-leading adoption

possible. The recognition through the American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy's 'Home Electrification Leader of the Pack' is the culmination of over a decade of work from the staff at Efficiency Maine Trust and highlights the continued opportunity in market transformation to meet our state's and nation's decarbonization goals and requirements."

"Efficiency Maine's initiatives allow PHCC contractors to offer valuable incentives to their customers that result in a win-win for both parties," said Alice Ames, executive director of Maine Association of Plumbing-Heating-Cooling Contractors (PHCC). "Our ongoing positive relationship with Efficiency Maine helps these money-saving incentives reach more Maine homeowners as they adopt new energy-efficient heat pumps and heat pump water heaters."

"Thanks to the leadership of Governor Mills and Efficiency Maine Trust, Maine has set an example for the nation on how efficient, cost-savtechnologies like ing heat pumps can benefit residents and businesses and significantly reduce our reliance on imported fossil fuels," said Dan Burgess, director of the Maine Governor's Energy Office. "I congratulate Efficiency Maine Trust on this award and look forward to continued collaboration with the Trust and other partners to build on our success and deliver more energy and cost savings for Maine homes and businesses."

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

When Amy talks about her work, supporting individuals who are aging at home and living with disabilities, she doesn't talk about what her job takes, but instead about all that it gives back to her

"It's just so fulfilling," Amy says. "There are so many things that we take for granted that mean so much for other people to do. It makes you so thankful for what we have. And my relationships with them make my heart so much bigger"

Amy supports her clients with activities of daily living. That can entail a wide variety of tasks on a daily basis. Some days that may mean helping a client get out of bed and get dressed, water her plants, or prepare her favorite sandwich for lunch. Often it means supporting her client with managing routine errands like trips to the grocery, that create opportunities to connect with familiar people and places. Amy is so grateful to give her clients - and their families - the peace of mind to live independently at home.

"It means so much to be able to give them positive



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experiences, a sense of control, and a sense of connection that otherwise would be lost," Amy says.

It's been nearly a decade since she moved into this field, and left her long-time waitressing job. "I don't think I'd ever go back," she says.

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Lewiston's Kyle Simmons takes lead in Tri-Town Family 5K

LEWISTON, ME -- Lewiston's Kyle Simmons cruised to victory in the 13th Annual Tri-Town Family 5K on Sunday, November 10th in Minot, Maine.

Simmons previously won the race in 2022 and shaved off some time this year, finishing in 19:06. He was followed by Poland Regional High School's Riley Lamb (20:15), a junior.

On the women's side, Poland Regional High School freshman Mackenzie Lane set the pace (24:55), followed by Kelly Harmon of Litchfield (26:19).

In 2012, Bruce M. Whittier Middle School in Poland received a grant to start a full-school running program. Teachers and staff coached students and provided opportunities for students to walk and run together. The program has evolved over the years, but it has consistently helped develop the community within the school, strengthening relationships amongst students and between students and teachers.

The Tri-Town Family 5K was created to culminate Bruce M. Whittier Middle School's first run program. Originally named the Whittier Family 5K, the first race was a great success with 236 people finishing the run/ walk event through Minot's beautiful trails and fields. Over the first thirteen years, 2,866 people have crossed the finish line. This year, there were 174 finishers.

Registration for the Tri-Town Family 5K is free thanks to the generous donations of local businesses. Their contributions pay for a



timing company, DJ, refreshments, prizes and other supplies that help make the event special. Each year, there is money left over to help buy new sneakers for middle school students.

On top of recognizing overall top finishers and age group winners, there is a special category for the first Bruce M. Whittier Middle School Mid-Knights to complete the 5K. This year's top Whittier runners were 8th grader Jackson Garcia (20:17), who finished third overall, and 8th grader Allie Cort (31:10).

Next year's Tri-Town Family 5K is tentatively scheduled for November 9, 2025. Thanks to the kindness and generosity of our friends in the community, it will again be a free event open to all.
