New Cornerstone President hopes to help grow the Southwest Michigan population

Cornerstone Alliance has announced the appointment of Marla Schneider as its new president and chief executive officer.

Schneider takes over for Rob Cleveland, who left earlier this year for a similar role in Louisiana. Schneider is currently the president of Greater Muskegon Economic Development. She tells us she's originally from Fort Wayne, Indiana and she's spent a fair amount of time in Southwest Michigan vacationing, so she knows the area.

Heading to Cornerstone, Schneider says she'll focus on a few major priorities.

"I think there's a huge opportunity with population growth," Schneider said. "There's been a population decline in Berrien County since the 70s, which is different than what we're seeing in the surrounding counties and regions, and especially if you look up along the lakeshore."

Schneider says growing the population and expanding access to housing will go hand in hand with business attraction and expansion.

"Some of those things are fight readiness, community development projects, all of those things that play a part in the business expansion attraction and quality of a place."

Schneider says she's found success in Muskegon engaging the Muskegon Heights community and bringing it new development. She sees parallels in Benton Harbor.

Schneider was attracted to the Cornerstone Alliance position because she says it's a high-profile organization in an area she already admired. She'll start at Cornerstone Alliance on January 6 and plans to get out and about right away to introduce herself to the community.

Dave Says Keep a Boundary in Place

Dear Dave

I have a money market account that I use as both my checking and savings account. I have a debit card and check writing privileges with the account, and I get a better interest rate on my money. Is what I'm doing a good idea, or is it better for some reason to have separate savings and checking accounts?

Dear Bonnie,

It's always good to have a physical and emotional boundary between your savings and the everyday funds in your checking account. This is especially important when you're talking about savings or an emergency fund.

There's nothing inherently wrong with getting a better interest rate, but when everything is all lumped together it can become easy for the line between savings and checking to become blurred. And if you're not careful, you might find yourself dipping into your savings or emergency fund for things that aren't emergencies without realizing what you're doing. . – Dave

My husband and I have been blessed financially in our work and in our lives. We simply love working, money aside, even though we could both easily retire and be very comfortable. These feelings

have made me think a lot lately about what's really important in life. How do you balance ambition with contentment?

Dear Barb,

I get the feeling you thought ambition was the opposite of contentment. But I don't look at it that way. It's not like a teeter-totter. They don't have to balance out, because they're not on the same spectrum

I'm content and ambitious. I'm content with what we have and what God has entrusted to us. But I'm not content to sit around and do nothing just because we've been blessed. That kind of attitude isn't contentment. It's apathy. I do what I do because I love helping people. You can have peace and contentment, and still be ambitious. They're not inconsistent concepts.

In my mind, problems are created when ambitious people are driven by a lack of contentment.

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Let me ask you something. Do you think Jesus was content? Do you think He was ambitious? I believe the answer to both questions is yes. Just think about how He lived, and how He instructed us to live. Think about His mission and His purpose.

More than anything, I think it has to do with what's driving your ambition. If a desire for "stuff" is the motivating factor, then maybe they are on the same spectrum. But that's a really bad way to live your life. You can buy and pile up tons of stuff, but you're not going to be truly happy until you find contentment.

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Newspapers Prove Their Trustworthiness Once Again, Research Shows

It's a familiar refrain, but it bears repeating: newspapers are among the most trusted sources of information in today's media landscape. A new report from **Kantar**, the global data and analytics company, underscores this point with fresh findings that place newspapers at the top of the trust rankings. According to Kantar's *US Media Reactions Report*, consumers rated newspapers No. 1 for trust, relevance, and even for their effectiveness in consumer advertising.

The last point is especially noteworthy, considering the growing trend of "over-targeting" in digital advertising. Kantar's report highlights how this practice is pushing consumers to seek out more "natural" and less invasive advertising experiences, particularly in offline channels like retail media networks and, yes, newspapers. In fact, newspapers ranked third globally in advertising equity-just behind point-of-sale and cinema, and ahead of most other media. These attributes clearly set local newspapers apart in an era where consumers are increasingly skeptical of digital media and its sometimes questionable practices.

The entire show is filmed virtually, allowing the viewer to see each designer / sewist working in their own studios following along from concept to finished garment. The Continued on page 18

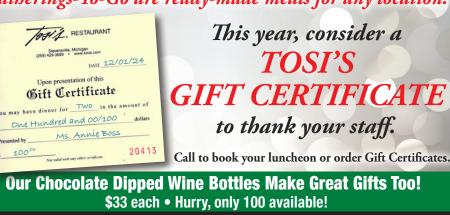

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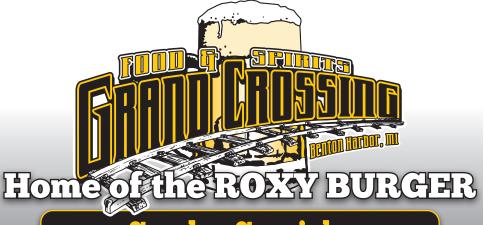
